Our new business year starts with our March Edition. Alan Lewis, our super efficient Advertising Manager, is working tirelessly to renew the advertisements and to allocate the available spaces which are, as always, in great demand. I would request please that all advertisers, old and new, please send us their advertisements for this year. Because of the change in the computer editing program, it will ultimately make the advertisements easier to handle if they are assembled in this software.

From your calls and comments, I know that the December, colourful edition, was very much appreciated. The colour printing costs are high, if you want us to continue to use colour, we may have to look at raising the magazine subscription costs in the future. I do have plans to include one coloured 'business promotion' page each month, which will be available for local business to buy and would help towards some of the extra costs. We will also be introducing a limited amount of coloured advertising space. I should welcome your comments as to whether you would like to see a more colourful Gazette and the funding issues involved. Currently subscribers pay £3 for 10 copies of the Gazette. The actual cost of printing the magazine, in its current form with just a colour cover and colour back advertisement, is approximately 85p per copy. These costs are covered by your subscriptions, the advertisements and a grant £400 annual grant from the Council.

Some years ago our webmaster, Judy Whitehouse,

set up the village website, www.naphill.org.uk. This is such a useful resource where you can read the archived copies of the Gazette, dating back to 1937, locate local tradesmen, read the history of our village keep up with calendar dates, follow us on Twitter, and so much more! We are currently looking at ways to make this site even more useful.

So New Year and new developments, the Gazette never sleeps! I look forward to receiving your ideas for things you would like to see included in the magazine and on the website.

A Personal Perspective

If you regularly read this article you will know that over the last three years I've tried to paint some kind of picture of what life is like as a parish councillor. Last night was exceptional!

Our Full Council meeting started at 8pm but finished well after midnight, but I trust I'm not putting you off any thoughts you had about putting yourself forward to be a parish councillor. What happened was that we had over 30 separate items to consider, and everyone there wanted the chance to add to discussion or suggest action that HPC (Hughenden Parish Council) might take. What made it exceptional in a positive way, however, was that everyone stayed awake, there were no shouting matches or use of offensive language, and everyone really wanted us to finish what was on the agenda.

The reason behind this is that each councillor wants to do the best for around 9000 people in the area, and sometimes that all takes time, which is probably the main commitment anyone becoming a councillor has to make, together with the certainty that we will never please all of 'the people' all of the time, to use a well-known phrase.

We are, as you probably know, all unpaid volunteers. We were in a warm room, had water to drink, and someone had thoughtfully provided some Maltesers, and we had the opportunity to influence things for the community's benefit.

Sometimes in small groups and sometimes in larger committees we discuss specific ideas regarding the future, and also the impact of some historical events. For our immediate area, Naphill and Walter's Ash, for instance, we are moving forward with regard to road safety issues near the Co-op store, and will be getting views from the Residents' Association, local businesses and local residents. We aim then to apply some of the thinking to road safety close to the new Post Office in Naphill. We are also looking for ideas about how to make the small pond in Walter's Ash more attractive. A parish-wide 'youth event' is being organised, though we are at an early point in planning it. You will also in the near future receive a 'Parish Survey Form', to get your views on a wide range of topics, which should help HPC to really know a bit

more about how you feel about things, particularly those where we can do something positive.

On top of these forward-looking plans, we also have to consider 'internal' issues, which can affect the effectiveness of HPC.

Friends of Naphill Common

Our Open Meeting is on Friday 7th February in Naphill Village Hall. Doors open at 7.15 pm and the meeting will start at 7.30 pm. The event is free and you are very welcome. Tea and coffee will be available. Our speaker is the historian Frances Kerner and her talk is entitled 'Wild and Picturesque Places': A local and national history of our common land. It is also our AGM. The business will be got through quickly but it will be a chance for you to hear about what we have been doing, details of our accounts and membership and, most important, you will have the opportunity to vote in a new chairman and committee, and even offer your services and ideas if you wish.

When the new committee is formed we will set about organising a programme of events for the year. This will probably include some familiar activities such as the mini-beast safari for children, the fungus foray and the bat walk, but we hope to introduce some new ones – so if you have any ideas please let us know.

Our walks are going well. The short walks (2-3 miles) are led by Chris Miller and take place on the first wednesday of the month, starting from the Village Hall at 10.30 am. The longer walks are on the third Monday of the month and are led by Ron Collins who sent the following report, together with a photo by Peter Davis:-

'Our last walk of the year started from The Gate pub in Bryant's Bottom and was about five miles long. Despite being pre-warned about the steepness of some of the climbs there were some thirty two stalwarts who braved the weather to enjoy a wonderful circular walk that took us to Prestwood and Speen before returning to Bryant's Bottom. Following the walk about half the group enjoyed lunch and good company in The Gate.

A reminder that our walks starting from January will commence at 9.30am prompt from the Village Hall. Our walks are about five miles long and we walk at a pace that suits everyone. This has become quite a social event with lunch at a local pub for those who want it. Dogs are most welcome. Why not come and join us and enjoy the countryside and good social interaction. We look forward to seeing you.'

2014 is going to be an important one for our local common because the chief landowner, the West Wycombe Estate, intends to start felling in the autumn. They have to get the agreement of the Forestry Commission and Natural England (because it is an SSSI). Although the Friends of Naphill Common have no official status, we have been asked to help and are doing our best to influence what is done. We want to protect the important

trees and archaeological features and try to ensure that, if felling must take place, it is to the benefit of the common and those who use it. By opening up the broad walks and glades we may achieve greater bio-diversity and drier paths from which to enjoy it.

The Common was once a forest of juniper but, like elsewhere on the Chilterns, almost all have disappeared. The juniper cuttings taken from our few remaining aged specimens have been returned to us from the Scottish nursery and we hope to plant them out in about a year's time, if we can find a suitable location. It would be good if the felling produced a big enough clearing.

One last point: it is time to renew your subscriptions if you are already a member and to join if you are not. It is only £5 so please support us. Please contact our membership secretary Lynn McMinn (tel. 01494 564667) or you can join at our Open Meeting.

Picture This

This month, I'm writing about the 50 Shades of Grey. Now, what has come to mind? Have you got a clear, vivid picture? And is it in colour or in black and white? If it is too colourful, keep it to yourself. If it is in black and white, however, I'm interested. Because if you think 50 shades of grey is interesting, think what might be possible with 256!

It's February, and it will probably snow. Bad news for motorists and naturists. Great news for photographers. But snow, especially with bright sunshine and blue skies, isn't easy for your camera to cope with; it's too bright and it's too white. And the brightness means that all that beautiful, sparkly-white snow in your viewfinder is likely to turn out grey. So, my 'Picture This' tip is how to make sure your snow stays white....

The clever exposure electronics inside your camera 'see' everything you point your camera at as a shade of grey. In fact, they can 'see' 256 shades of grey ranging from black to white. The trouble is that these clever electronics will 'see' the first thing you focus on as being a mid-grey tone. So if you point your camera at a black cat in a snow scene and do nothing to help the electronics, you will produce a mid-grey cat.

When you want to make a snow-scene picture, first point your camera at something in your picture that is neither very white (snow) nor very black (your cat): in other words, something in the middle!(In sunlight, green grass or leaves are 'seen' as mid-grey so should do the trick.) Half-press and hold the shutter button on the 'something in the middle' object, compose your picture in the viewfinder and then fully press! Your snow should be white and any black cat in the vicinity will not have become Persian. With an iPhone camera, touch and hold the part of the screen centred on the 'in the middle' object until a square appears, remove your finger, move your phone to compose your picture and press the button. You might need to practice a few times and check that your picture remains in focus but your snow scenes will be so much better.

This month's cover picture has no bright sunshine, just grey drizzle and mist and the softly-muted colours of winter. Your camera electronics would do a good job here. The picture location is Falconer's Hill Wood, Walter's Ash. I wanted to capture the cold, dampness of the soft, grey light of a Chiltern February.

I'm looking to encourage you to make photographs that you are proud of and would hang on the wall of your home. The Gazette Editor is also on the lookout for photographs for the front cover. Pictures need to be a portrait format to fit the format of the Gazette. At school I loved maths: I knew there would be a "right answer" and all I had to do was to find it. Today my equivalent is the su doku puzzle. It doesn't matter whether it is "fiendish" or "difficult", there will be a solution. But as an engineer, I discovered that real-life problems don't usually have a single perfect solution: you need to make trade-offs between performance and cost, between long-term and short-term, and between ideal and possible.

In taking decisions and making choices, we instinctively weigh up the options and look for the best way forward, the "right answer". Sometimes there is a definite obvious choice. Often there are pros and cons. Occasionally we are given an "offer you can't refuse".

Some folk are naturally decisive. Others like me dither because we haven't got all the facts, and if we have got all the facts, then the decision has just become too complicated! My boss once said that I have the ability to think of ten good reasons why something cannot be done, which was no good when he demanded it be done!

We've started our New Year, and some of us have made new resolutions, (though few have kept them!) None of us can know for sure what this year will hold, so we make our decisions, partly encouraged by our hopes and partly constrained by our fears. In theory we try to choose and do what is "right".

Each January, my church holds a Covenant Service, re-affirming our commitment to the Lord. It includes these words:-

Christ has many services to be done: Some are easy, others are difficult; Some bring honour, others bring reproach; Some are suitable to our natural inclinations and material interests, others are contrary to both.

Before God there are right ways of living, right choices to be made, right attitudes to one another, right services to be done, right priorities and ideals. But they are often not as simple as the "right answers" to my school sums. And certainly God's ways are not always pain-free. The bible stories tell of people trying to obey God and to do what is right. Clearly they didn't get it right every time, but even when they did, life had its problems.

The greatest example of course is Jesus, who did what was right, but suffered persecution and crucifixion. We who choose to follow in his footsteps, do so knowing that blessings will be mixed with sorrows, and not always in equal proportions.

I pray that your blessings will make your sorrows tolerable, and you will have courage to make decisions and choices for right.

for the use of stones in the verges. Carl Etholen has given the parish council the money to pay for this. At our recent meeting we needed to decide the location, where we would like to place the stone(s) and the size. Not as easy as it sounds! Following consultation with the National Trust we will use the location suggested by Sustrans and published in their report. It is near the back entrance to Bradenham Manor. The size was a bit more complicated, but we have made some suggestions. Now we are waiting for the report from TfB. The process is unfortunately very, very slow.

We had an interesting presentation on a community web site. There are not just financial implications for a parish council web site, but we need to make sure all current legislation is adhered to. A full report of all the various options and costs will be drawn up and discussed at a future meeting.

We have been told that the Secretary of State will make the decision on the traveller site in Walter's Ash by March 2014.

Our accounts were found to be in accordance with proper practices and all relevant legislation and regulatory requirements had been met.

The next meeting will be on Monday 17th March 2014 at 7.00pm in the cricket club.

Hughenden Parish Council Report

The Christmas break now seems a dim and distant event, but hopefully, most people had the opportunity to take a break from the pressures of life and concentrate on family and friends. It was certainly a welcome break from Parish activity, but we seem to have started the New Year with a bang and look forward to a busy period ahead.

Our first Full Council meeting of the year certainly gave us plenty to think about although finishing at 12.45am is not something we wish to become a regular occurrence. There were times when Ever Decreasing Circles came to mind, but hopefully future meetings won't get quite so bogged down in administrative debate.

The money stolen by a previous Clerk is still a hot topic as we struggle to get the Court Order payments completed. As this was only half the full amount stolen, we had hoped that our insurance would cover the rest, but this was negated by the lack of procedures in place at the time, so we are now considering a Civil Claim.

We have now agreed the precept (the element of your Council Tax that contributes to the Parish Council's budget) for the year ahead which, due to a slight reduction in WDC support, will be 0.1% higher than last year with a commitment that our overall budget therefore remains the same. Part of the budget is used to provide donations to worthy causes in the Parish. In December, we were delighted to provide a grant of nearly £3000 to Naphill and Walter's Ash School to support their Forest School and the excellent work they do in giving children the experience of learning about the environment and themselves in our wonderful local woods. The recent high winds have brought the Council's responsibilities for its land into sharp focus, especially the potential danger from falling trees and branches. We are therefore having to carry out a full survey of all the trees to determine whether any pose a danger and need action.

Continuing on the outdoor theme, we are in the process of getting the Walter's Ash pond surveyed to determine its future. Given its proximity to the bus stop, it is unfortunately a dumping ground for all sorts of litter and is not in a good state. We are therefore working with the Resident's Association and the school to look at options for getting it back to its former glory and maintaining it.

Finally, we now have the Feasibility Study into parking

and safety options for the areas around the Coop. This is available on the Parish Council website, but we now intend to set up meetings with interest groups to consider options – with nothing ruled in or out at this stage. Unfortunately, we have been unable to get any response from Bucks CC in addressing similar issues outside Costcutter, but we hope we might be able to embarrass them into taking this seriously.

The big challenge that faces WDC will be the need to build 700 - 900 homes a year, and find new places for business too, while at the same time delivering the right infrastructure and protecting and maintaining our high quality environment. This is an increase from the 400 homes that are currently built each year and will be very difficult to achieve because 71% of the District lies in the AONB and 48% in the Green Belt.

WDC want you to get involved and they need your input - your views, ideas and concerns. You can view the full Local Plan or just read the summary on the WDC website at www.wycombe.gov.uk/newlocalplan

A major consultation is running until Friday 4 April 2014. If you are interested in how WDC proceeds with their Local Plan please go to one of their local events to discuss and debate more about the choices they face.

A Little bit of Local History

At my recent Past Times Exhibition, I had my Newell family album on show. Although the Newell family lived mostly in High Wycombe, they have strong connections with Naphill.



My Grandfather, Walter, was Newell's nephew. Claude Newell, who was a builder in High Wycombe, put in a quote to build our village hall. The hall was to be built with the money raised through lots of events

and over many years by the Naphill folk. Claude Newell was awarded the contract and in 1928 our village hall was built, at budget cost, on the land given by Coningsby Disraeli.

My great, great Grandfather, Joseph George Newell lived in High Wycombe and after closing in the evening, he used to run around the roads of High Wycombe. He, with several others, formed the Phoenix Harriers which had previously been linked with others as 'The Cycle and Athletic Club'. I actually had a program of events in the Newell Family Album which was on show at the exhibition.

One special race which Walter ran was in 1908 and was run from Thame to High Wycombe. The town centre was closed and crowds lined the streets. The runners raced past the Saunderton Workhouse, roared on by the inmates, on past the cheering crowds at the West Wycombe Pedestal to the finishing line at the Guildhall in High Wycombe where the Mayor and Councillors were on hand to greet and congratulate them. Walter came in first but

this was not the end of his exciting day! He ran on home as his wife had gone into labour with their 4th child. On arrival, there was his new born daughter, of course named 'Marathon Mary'!

Grandfather went on to run many more races, one of the most notable being the Windsor to Staines in 1914 with 43 competitors from many European countries. The race was started from Windsor Castle, by King George. Walter William Newell came home in 15th position. I am very proud of his achievements! Please see the photograph, taken by Richard Holroyd, of me holding Grandfather's 130 year old running outfit.

A Personal Perspective

If you read last month's article you will know that we recently held a Full Council meeting that had a record number of items to consider and lasted well past midnight. The following meeting had far fewer items, and I'm glad to say we finished much earlier. Perhaps there is a connection!

For anyone considering becoming a Parish Councillor at some point, it certainly helps if you can feel comfortable working within committees, and it is always satisfying when enough people, often with different backgrounds and interests, come to decisions or make recommendations that will affect a sizeable number of residents, and even better when action starts taking place. So the following is an update on recent progress.

You will know already that there are a whole host of road safety issues relating to the shops area in Walter's Ash. The Residents' Association worked hard for many years to seek action, and more recently Hughenden Parish Council (HPC) paid for a 'feasibility study' from Transport for Bucks, as well as gathering additional ideas. Recently we held a small meeting primarily of residents living on or near Main Road, Ash Close, etc., and in a few days we hope to hold one involving local businesses. At this point your Ward Councillors are primarily listening! We will then sift through all the ideas to see about presenting and refining them at a variety of meetings: HPC itself, one or more Public meetings, etc. If it looks like the ideas will need considerable finance we will in parallel discuss that with various businesses and public bodies.

Because the road safety issues in Walter's Ash have some similarities with road safety concerns near the Post Office in Naphill, we are hoping that much of the thinking will subsequently be applied there as well.

During the time I've been a Councillor, HPC has considered 'improvements' to the Pond in Walter's Ash, but each time has paid for any emergency work and postponed coming to conclusions about just what should be done, if anything, to make it an

attractive local feature. So in the last few months we've had a few meetings, which have also included staff from the school, and are hoping to get approval for involving one or more environmental experts to come up with suggestions. Do you have any ideas about what to do with the Pond? If so, please contact HPC (clerk@hughendenpc.org.uk), or phone 715296.

In another part of our Parish, Widmer End, I've recently been involved in seeking agreement between local residents, HPC, BCC, TfB, and WDC! We've ended up with an agreement in principle to consider spending 'S106' monies primarily on a pedestrian crossing, but we are in the early stages of sorting out the details. It is clear that road safety issues dominate our thoughts wherever we live.

We also have a number of ongoing projects that will affect the whole of our Parish: Phil Conran's article mentions the Parish questionnaire which is a preliminary to working on a Parish Plan; we are looking at ways to improve Communications across the Parish; We are organising a 'youth event' within the Parish; and we have ongoing discussions with the Allotments charity. All of these, and more, involve personal time for some Councillors, with the simple reward of seeing things come together with a satisfactory outcome!

WANTED – TEENAGERS

We are looking for some teenagers to help us organise an event in Hughenden for teenagers. We want them to help us decide where it should be held, what activities to offer, what food to offer and

to help us budget for the event. It would be good experience for anyone building up their personal statements or CVs.

Here's the background.

We are Councillors on Hughenden Parish Council (which covers Naphill & Walter's Ash). The Council is drawing up its Parish Plan and we need to get the views of everyone in the parish about what the Council should be doing, including what services it should provide for people who live here.

We particularly want to get the views of young people, including teenagers, because there aren't any young people on the Council. The average age of the Councillors is about, well let's say pretty old.

Young people are notoriously difficult to reach. Funnily enough they don't like answering boring questionnaires and aren't keen on turning up at meetings.

So we are organising an event for young people in Hughenden in the Easter holidays which should be fun and attract young people. In return we will be asking the young people who come to give their views about living in Hughenden, what they think the Council should do – and what they themselves might do to help.

We would like young people to help us organise the event – and take some of the decisions.

We have a date (17 April). We have a budget (£1000). We have some ideas (we can offer skateboarding, a mobile games bus, Sound Studio, and a group of young inspectors to interview the young people perhaps on video like Big Brother).

However we need a venue (we need somewhere quite big inside and outside), we need publicity (how do we contact all the young people in the parish, how do we design a flyer and how do we use social media?), and we think we should offer food (but what?). We need young people to help us make these decisions and get things done. We also have to sort out security and we have to come in on budget!

So we need the input of young people and they might learn some new skills (and hopefully enjoy themselves).

Bradenham Parish Council.

At its last meeting the parish council set the Precept for 2014-15 at £7000, the same as the previous year.

The Road Safety Survey for Village Entry Signs by Bucks County Council was discussed. The comments in the report were accepted, the main point being that a village entry sign should be placed within the 30mph zone, not in the derestricted area. We discussed placing a brick and flint wall instead of a large boulder and decided that the National Trust should be approached to get their views. Bradenham Woods Lane is planned to be resurfaced in the next financial year and the parish council will try to use that to have the next phase of the Sustrans traffic calming scheme implemented.

We had noted that the A4010 is planned to be used as a High Speed 2 construction traffic route. This would have a major impact on the community. The Environmental Statement published with the Bill in November 2013 showed indeed that the A4010 is intend to be used for HS2 construction traffic. The meeting discussed the problems that could cause and decided to object to these plans. We cannot object to the principal of the Bill itself, but can raise objections on relevant items in the Environmental Statement.

After extensive research and debate it was decided, that although it would be preferable to have a web site, with our current budget, we could not afford to have one. It will be reviewed again in due course.

Planning: the Chairman spoke at the Wycombe District Council Planning Committee (22/01/14) on planning application 12/07953/FUL for the change of use at Shana. The council had objected to this application on Highway grounds and these had now been alleviated, however there was disappointment that the recladding of the riding school had been withdrawn from the application and that Saturday opening hours had been added.

Our County Councillor Carl Etholen had attended the meeting and had given a detailed update on Bucks County Council affairs.

Hughenden Parish Council Report

In early March, the Council will be distributing a questionnaire to every household in the Parish. The questionnaire is effectively a survey on Parish life and

contains a number of questions designed to inform the Council in the development of a Parish Plan which we will launch in draft form for consultation at our Annual Parish Meeting in May. We are seeking your views on areas of the community where we might be able to make a difference. We want to understand what it is that annoys and delights you about where you live; what your key priorities are for us for the future; what the needs of different generations are now; what it is that you would like us to do.

For instance, we ask about your concerns on road safety. We would like to know what facilities you feel we should provide for children and teenagers. And we are looking to understand the effect of crime in this area. A Parish Council has a limited budget and limited powers, but increasingly, it has the freedom to develop new opportunities that go beyond our traditional areas of responsibility. Whilst it has been difficult to understand the much vaunted concept of Localism we heard so much about at the last election, it does seem that the Government is keen for Parish Councils to do more, although of course, without extra central funding. And we must also be aware that if we don't play a more active part in managing our own future, others will do it for us. We are already seeing the threat of large scale housing development coming out of Wycombe District Council's latest Local Plan. Thousands of new houses that must be built somewhere in the District over the next few years and we must ensure we are in a position to protect our community from inappropriate development in our Parish.

So this Questionnaire is very important to us as it will help to shape the future for Hughenden Parish and for the villages of Naphill and Walter's Ash.

In early March, each household will receive an envelope that will contain the questionnaire and a reply-paid envelope. Please take the time to complete the questionnaire and return it to us as soon as possible, but by the end of March at the latest. It is completely anonymous and is not marked in any way to show which house it came from. We will then analyse the responses during April and develop the Plan in time for our APM in May when we will launch it for consultation.

If you lose your questionnaire or have not received it by mid-March, you can go onto the Parish website www.hughendenparishcouncil.org.uk to download a new one or simply call the Clerk and you will be sent one.

Please please please participate! You may think it a bit long or that some of the questions seem strange, but it has been made as short as possible and the questions have been very carefully thought through.

Christmas Lights

The team hope everyone enjoyed the lights. We had one extra garland this year and the tree looked better than ever. Mike Leggett was the lead climber and he was assisted up the tree by Tom Oxnard. Mark Blamey from Saunderton drove the cherry picker and he was assisted on high by Stephen Fountain from Widmer End and by Kevin Oxnard. David Greenwood and Simon Mason of Hughenden Valley spent a long time up a tall ladder tying/untying the ropes at the ends of the garlands. The team on the ground comprised Gary Putnam from Lacey Green, Ron Collins, John Harris, Terry Aldridge, Peter Brown, Glenn Gavin, Peter Davis, Tom Oxnard, Henry Oxnard, Neil McMinn, Jack Mason of Hughenden Valley and myself. That's 19 people – quite a team.

We put up the lights on 23rd November and took them down on 12th January. We were blessed with good weather on both days. However, in between we had some of the rainiest and stormiest weather experienced for many years. We had a first – a gale on 23rd December broke off the mast at the top of the tree. Fortunately the safety rope prevented the sphere from crashing to the ground. Mike Leggett went up the tree on Christmas Eve to effect repairs (assisted by Kevin Oxnard on the ground) to make sure the tree looked OK for the vital Christmas period. Mike Leggett and I adjusted the garlands on four occasions early in December to improve the lights, including the fitting of artificial branches at the top of the tree to improve the shape. Mike is a perfectionist! We had another first – an intermittent short-circuit at the top of the tree which put out the lights for a day on two occasions. At the time of writing we have not found the cause, but suspect it was because of the violent weather.

We must give our thanks to Arbourtech Services of Downley Road who provided the cherry picker free of charge and to Mark Blamey who drove it once more. Thanks also to Cathryn Carter who organised the collection tins in the village shops, to Claire Christian from The Wheel who provided sandwiches and soup and to Marlene Mason who provided tea, coffee and hot mince pies (with whisky this time at the special request of Ron Collins!). The equipment up the tree takes quite a battering from the elements, so a very special thank you to YOU, the public, who through your generosity in the collection tins provide the money for replacement equipment, electricity and insurance for the operation. The tree was planted in 1937, so it was 76 years old in 2013. Mike Leggett and I have been putting up the lights for 38 years – half the life of the tree!

Thank you to the almost sixty people who attended our open meeting and AGM on 7th February, despite the wind and rain. I am sure everyone enjoyed the fascinating and scholarly talk by Frances Kerner on the history of common land. The ancient maps and documents were intriguing and made me realise how much we could discover if we were to undertake an historical study of our common. The committee was re-elected and consists of Kevin Bennett, Ron Collins, Peter Davis, Sheila Draper, Peggy Ewart, Philip Hussey, Trevor Hussey, Lyn McMinn, Chris Miller, Marek Pawlik and

Steve Rodrick. Neil McMinn has kindly agreed to be co-opted onto the committee and this will be confirmed at our next meeting. We will soon be preparing our programme for the year ahead.

It is going to be a crucial and busy year. The West Wycombe Estate intends to begin felling up to 20% of the trees in the autumn. We can't stop this but we can try to influence how it is carried out. We must ensure that the felling is done so as to enhance the Common by widening the rides and paths and clearing round the ponds. We have already supplied those concerned with maps and inventories showing the ancient trees, archaeological features, rare plants etc., with the aim of protecting them, and we will try to monitor the work as it proceeds. Following our recent pond survey, we also want to embark on a careful programme of work to improve their bio-diversity. We also aim to plant out the juniper cuttings taken from our existing bushes. All this, together with a series of events, working parties and walks should keep us busy.

The Friends of Naphill Common has no official status. The reason why we have been able to get involved in the felling scheme and do all the other things is because of our impressive membership. It is essential that we keep up the numbers, so please renew your membership: it is only £5 for a year. Our membership secretary Lynn McMinn (01494 564667) would like to hear from you.

We hope to offer a series of events throughout the year: some as before and some new ones – including a tour of a selection of the oldest buildings in the village, led by a building historian. Meanwhile the Walks for Health will continue. Join Ron Collins at 9.30am at Naphill Village Hall on the third monday of each month for a long walk (5-6 miles), and join Chris Miller at 10.30am at the Village Hall for a short walk (2-3 miles) on the first wednesday each month. Sinkhole Sunday

Being awoken by a sobbing daughter saying her car had gone down a hole is not something you expect on a Sunday morning, but nor was the tidal wave of media attention that followed it. Our initial report to the police ('we'll look into it sir') led to the appearance of a pair of police cars, the Council Building Control inspector and a fire engine. For a couple of hours, we had a crowd of rather bemused officials scratching their heads, wondering what to do next. Eventually it was decided that nothing could be done until the insurance assessors came in, so the hole was surrounded by cones and we assumed that would be that and it would all get sorted out by insurance. For us, the relief of what might have been had Zoe been in the car completely obscured any worries about the house and we enjoyed an extremely relaxed evening with our lovely neighbours, Suzanne and Mark Hobbs who instantly offered us dinner and a bed for the night as we were advised we shouldn't sleep there.



What we hadn't realised was that the Fire Brigade had put out a news item - complete with photos - on the Sunday afternoon. This was picked up by a number of Press Agencies and started to appear on websites (the Daily Mail Online's headline of 'Family flee village home' caused some amusement as we read it in our kitchen). As Monday dawned, the media poured in. For eight hours, we couldn't leave the house and therefore had no idea of the chaos that there must have been on Main Road, especially at school drop-off time. Sink holes of this size are clearly a rarity in this country, but the fact that there was a car at the bottom seemed to be the real interest. Zoe had gone off to work completely unaware of what was unfolding so they were deprived of interviews with her and the country was subjected to endless replays of BBC, ITN and Sky News interviews with Liz and me.

Quite why the BBC needed a reporter, camera crew and enormous outside broadcast lorry at the site virtually all day, we never discovered, but it was both incessant and exhausting with constant - very polite - requests for photos from the bedroom window that overlooked the hole which meant them all tramping through our immaculate (!) house.

But the event didn't just bring the media, it brought out

a constant stream of offers of help and good wishes and we have been overwhelmed by local people's kindness. Offers of beds, office space (I work from home) and any other help came from all over the village and we would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to everyone.



It also showed the good side of the insurance industry. Aviva have been brilliant and as many will have seen, the hole was filled with 350 tonnes of concrete by Thursday evening and they straight away put us up in rented accommodation. At the time of writing, they have still to do a lot of testing and further work to do to ensure that the house is completely secure, but by the time you read this we will be back in. There are others we must thank too. The Collinges next door for the delicious cake. PC Lee Turnham who has been a real gem in keeping the press in order and looking after us. Coles and Blackwell who have been fantastic and have got Zoe out of a hole by lending her a car. And amazingly, Autotrader who rang up out of the blue and have replaced her beloved VW Lupo, Bruce, who is now buried forever under the concrete.



So what caused the sinkhole (or the Lupole as it quickly became christened)? The theory is that 50 years of the gutter soakaways eroded the sandy soil under the clay, creating a cavity that chose that moment to collapse, probably because of all the recent rain. Where it all went, they are not sure although the old chalk mines may have played a part. But hopefully

borehole testing will give a clearer picture over the coming days. The engineers certainly felt it was an isolated case that just arose through a freak series of events – a perfect storm - but if we learn any more, we will let you know.

Finally, we would just like to apologise for all the disruption this event has caused to village residents, both on the Monday with the deluge of media and on the Thursday, with the constant stream of concrete lorries. Hopefully, this will be a storm in a teacup and Walter's Ash won't be forever linked to sinkholes. But for us, it was an extraordinary and surreal week with many memories – some good, some bad - that will remain with us for a very long time.

A FOREST SCHOOL



Whilst many parts of the country have been struggling to withstand the current weather conditions, here at Forest School the children have been learning to manage the conditions and to adjust to the changing habitat.

Part of our work as a Forest School is to monitor any ecological impact that we may have in the forest and to work

within a sustainable site management plan. We work closely with the National Trust in doing so. Our local ranger came and met with us this term, discussing a couple of concerns that we had regarding the impact of footfall in these conditions. After he inspected the various areas thoroughly, he assured us that all is well.

Some of you may already be aware that last term we were very excited and hugely appreciative of a generous donation from our local Parish Council. We are happy to report that this has made a great difference to our drying facilities and also to purchasing more waterproof clothing for the children; without which Forest School would be a seemingly impossible task!

So far, Spring term has been awash with fun and games! Utilizing their recently acquired skills, Year R have been busy making fishing rods to fish for sharks, stingrays, crocodiles and goldfish (to name but a few) in the deep hollows. During an earlier session, we talked about why some trees are thick and some are

thin; we decided to measure them by using pieces of string. The children then compared their various finds and ordered them by length. After discussing a multitude of factors, the children commented;

"...a tree was planted a long time before this one; this one is a different kind of tree; that one is the Grandad and this one is the baby; maybe this one has had more water? Or more sun?"

We then arranged our findings into circles on the ground and worked out how to tell exactly how old a tree really was using our diagram and a cross section of a log! Excellent!



One of our favourite times in the forest is when we read the children 'Silly Billy' by Anthony Browne. This is a story about a little boy who, after advice from his Grandma, makes himself some Mayan Worry Dolls. It's a very busy session for us as the children work industriously using bark peelers

(your common garden potato peeler and yes; they are fabulously good at this!) to smooth their sticks. Next, the lashing of string begins in earnest in order to fasten their doll and then the wool and leaves to adorn their wonderful creations. The children all take great pride in their work in the forest, as do we, and this task in particular is rewarding for all of us...not to mention excellent fun

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From Our Local Methodist Minister

Dear Friends,

By the time you read these words, it may be that the floods will have subsided a little and some of the affected households will be in the tedious process of clearing, cleaning, disposing of ruined belongings, and chasing the insurance companies. The politicians will still be blaming each other and the media/public will be blaming the politicians. In the meantime, thousands of volunteers, soldiers, emergency services and public authority workers will have been working valiantly to make the suffering and inconvenience less unbearable.

In past times, God would have been heartily blamed for this flood and His prophets and priests would have been defending His actions by decrying all the recent wickedness of the people, and telling them "you're only getting what you deserved!"

Nowadays floods may still be called "acts of God", but floods tend to affect all low-lying property, and not just the ones with especially wicked residents. We can also see that if more money had been spent on dredging the waterways, and improving the sea-defences, then some of the consequences would have been less severe. And we can see that building houses on the nice flat land beside the river does bear some risk. And our vast areas of concrete and tarmac allow quick runoff, and our efficient agricultural methods don't soak up as much water as previously. So our whole way of life comes under scrutiny!

One of the fascinating aspects of the recent weather has been the ability to see the next big storm coming across the Atlantic, and accurately predict wind speeds, and tidal surges, and likely storm damage, and announce the monotonous "20 to 40mm of rain due in the next 24 hours". Our ability (or at least the ability of the Met Office computers!) to calculate these factors is impressive. Our ability to do much about it, is feeble in comparison!

Today (when I was not having to defend God's honour in bringing floods, like my predecessors might have had to do) I was asked: "So, Mike where do you stand on this global warming? Are you a sceptic?"

I think my friend who asked this, had been listening to the argument which says the present floods are due to climate change brought about by humanity burning too much fossil fuel and generating too much carbon dioxide. It is fair to say that our UK climate is more often more unseasonable, and more extreme, and more records are broken, than say 50 years ago, and the average temperatures have been higher in the last 10 years, even when you include some very cold winter weather (not this year of course!). And the politicians have been defending their lack of flood-preparedness by saying this is the wettest winter for 250 years, and no-one could have predicted that and made adequate defences. When it is said that average temperatures will be

half a degree warmer, and the sea level will rise another 10 cm, that doesn't sound much at all, when you consider how variable our temperatures and sea levels are from day to day, never mind century to century. Yet those tiny changes affect the weather patterns, and places like UK are on the boundary between Continental Eurasia and the Atlantic, where small global variations cause big local changes, and more unstable weather conditions.

Yes, I think the global warming/ climate change/ carbon footprint argument is probably correct, but the calculations are very difficult, even for modern computers. UK weather forecasts more than a few days ahead are necessarily uncertain, so long-term calculations have to be done a different way. No-one can predict the local weather for Bank Holiday in 2024, let alone in 2124. No-one can prove the floods of 2014 were/are due to climate change. But as far as I can see, the calculations almost all predict climate change with increasing extreme events, and this has been pretty extreme!

But I think we should be cautious how much we claim for the climate change predictions. I go back to the last couple of chapters of Job (in the Old Testament). After Job has complained at God, God humbles Job with many unanswerable questions about the mysteries of Nature, or the wonders of His Creation, including several about the causes of weather. We now know some answers to some of those questions, but by no means all.

Picture This

Ever since the invention of photography, there has been a debate: is photography art? Should photographers be allowed to wear berets and have a temperament? Or should they only be allowed Gortex waterproofs and Wellies? What do you think, is photography art? To truly immerse yourself in this philosophical question, try reading this true story and the rest of the article with a Poirot accent and an aniseed flavoured drink.

The phone rang:

"Hello" I breathed

"I would like to order a picture" purred the voice on the phone "an anniversary present for friends who were married in the church but now live in Canada."

The picture was of Hughenden Church in snow and with bright blue sky.

"How romantic" I said

"The picture is lovely and is exactly what I want. Is the original a watercolour or an etching?" she enquired.

"No, it is a photograph" I replied, carefully masking my temperament.

“Oh,” (long, long pause) “then I don’t think it is quite what I want”.

Fascinated, I tried to engage in conversation to discover why the fact that it was a photograph killed the romance, made a difference, but she couldn’t find the words. I’m guessing she didn’t want to hurt my feelings; she couldn’t say Photography isn’t ‘art’.

But it is art so this month’s tip is about art; the art of choosing what you decide to include in your picture. If you were an artist who paints, you would start with a blank canvas and then paint in whatever you wanted to include in your picture. As a photographer, you have to start with what is right there in front of you and then work to exclude what you don’t want in your picture.

This month’s cover picture by Mark Dell is a striking image and illustrates what to exclude and what to include. Woodland is very difficult to photograph; it’s messy and with all those woody trees, it’s complex. Woodland is full of dark shadows and bright patches of light which cameras find difficult to cope with.

Mark concentrated on and included just a few trees, choosing his viewpoint carefully so that the tree trunks were clearly separated from other trees. Coming straight at the camera, the dazzling light creates drama; this is called back-lighting but if you want to be very Left Bank, contre jour. But sunlight straight into the lens of your camera can be a photographic disaster and you might end up looking for - or groping for an optician - due to sun-blindness. The powerful sunlight has been partly excluded by one of the trees and, by including only a part of the sun, a starburst effect has been produced which gives a sparkle to the picture.

So my tip to all you artist photographers is to choose carefully what you want to include in your picture and what you want to exclude. Whatever the weather, enjoy your art.

What do you know about the DAVIS CUP? Perhaps, like me, very little except that Andy Murray has helped The British Team in San Diego to reach the Quarter Finals after 28 years! Here's a bit about its history from Wikipedia:

The Davis Cup is the premier international team event in men's tennis. It is run by the International Tennis Federation (ITF) and is contested annually between teams from competing countries in a knock-out format. The competition began in 1900 as a challenge between Great Britain and the United States. By 2013, 130 nations entered teams into

four occasions with New Zealand and Australasia, and finishing as runners-up 19 times). The present champion is the Czech Republic, which beat Serbia to retain the title.

The women's equivalent of the Davis Cup is the Fed Cup. Australia, the Czech Republic, and the United States are the only countries to have held both Davis Cup and Fed Cup titles in the same year.

The tournament was conceived in 1899 by four members of the Harvard University tennis team who wished to challenge the British to a tennis competition. Once their respective lawn tennis associations agreed, one of the four Harvard players, Dwight F. Davis, designed a tournament format and ordered an appropriate sterling silver trophy purchasing it from his own funds for about \$1,000.

Davis went on to become a prominent politician in the United States in the 1920s, serving as US Secretary of War from 1925–29 and as Governor-General of the Philippines from 1929–32.”

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

Planning News. Redundant Farm Buildings. The Government has changed its mind about the proposed new legislation allowing for the replacement of redundant farm buildings by up to 3 new residential properties. The National Parks and AONBs will be excluded from this new rule although it will be allowed in the Green Belt.

Community Infrastructure Levy

Many residents may not be aware of this extra cost of development in Wycombe District.

Development may be liable for CIL in the following situations:

Any new dwellings, regardless of their gross internal floor area.

New building (such as extensions) where the gross new build floor area comes to **more than 100 square metres.**

A change of use from non-residential to residential use, when the building in question has not been occupied in its lawful use for a continuous period of six months in the previous three years.

Relief for self-builders and domestic extensions

In February 2014 the Government introduced exemption from CIL for self-builders. Under this system, anyone who is extending their own property, or building a new property to occupy as their primary residence, can claim relief from CIL. This is not an automatic process and must be applied for.

Relief is also available when new builds are being provided for affordable housing or charitable purposes.

Charges

CIL is charged at a flat rate per square metre:

For Residential Development which includes dwelling houses and houses in multiple occupation, including sheltered accommodation the CIL cost is £125/sqm in some urban areas such as High Wycombe, but £150/sqm in most areas outside High Wycombe including Naphill and Walter's Ash.

Picture This

Well, after last month's focus on seeing photography as art, I thought that I'd continue the theme and start with a quote:-

"Photography is not about the thing photographed, it is about how that thing looks photographed"

Gary Winogrand

Now, not many people know this: several artists - including Van Gogh, Constable and Hockney - used viewfinders, sketching aids or, would you believe it, 'lenses' to help them draw and paint. So, if it's good enough for these artists, it's good enough for photographers too.

My tip for this month is to use a framing viewfinder before you grab your camera. You can easily make one. All you need is a piece of black coloured card about 100mm x 75mm (that's 4" x 3" in old money). In the centre of the card, make a rectangular cutout about 50mm x 35mm (2" x 1.5"). Take a look at your subject through the cutout and move around your subject holding the viewfinder at various distances from your eye until you create a composition you like. It will be like looking at a framed picture. Don't be embarrassed to do this even if you are out and about. I've spent many hours peering at the world through a piece of black cardboard. People stare but they never ask.

This month's cover picture was created in this way. I planned to get to Hughenden Park before the sun was fully illuminating the flowers - that would have been too bright for the camera to cope with. Arriving at 7.00am, I found them all in shade and drooping in a sort of botanical drunkenness due to a late frost. So I had to wait until the sun had risen enough to warm them up for their big day in front of the camera. I used the framing viewfinder to find a place where the flowers looked good as a picture. I chose a very low viewpoint to emphasise the flowers in the foreground and to give a 3-D feel to the composition. Choosing a higher viewpoint would have emphasised the mass of flowers and given a different feel which wasn't the picture I had in my mind. After setting up the tripod and camera, I took the light readings. Then, I wound up the clockwork shutter, slid in a graduated filter and set a polarising filter. All I now had to do was wait until the breeze dropped so that there was some, but not too much, movement of the flowers, and press the shutter.

So, grab a piece of card, cut out a hole and see the world in a different way; the way that Van Gogh, Constable and Hockney did. Your photographic art demands nothing less. And with all this early Spring weather, get out and create a masterpiece!

From Our Local Methodist Minister

After the Easter Holidays, this year the children go back to school (most of them, I believe!) on Easter Tuesday ie the day after bank Holiday Monday. It doesn't make much difference to me now, but in the days when our children were at school and I was working hard up to Easter Sunday evening, the week of school holidays after Easter was quite precious. But in recent years it has been deemed more important to have school terms of standard length than to follow the seeming randomness of the church calendar!

Approximately, Easter in UK is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox (21st March when day and night are both exactly 12 hours). For a more accurate definition you can spend a few happy hours on the internet! But if you really want to know the date of Easter next year or indeed in 20 years' time, just consult the tables which have been calculated for us up to the year 4099.

If you're thinking of celebrating Easter with the Eastern Orthodox churches, beware, because they calculate with the old Julian calendar, and Easter can be up to 5 weeks after us, and only in occasional years is it the same date as us.

The exact year of Christ's death and resurrection is not certain, but it must be a year when Passover was on a Thursday or Friday, and that can be calculated.

So some aspects of Easter seem rather vague, but you can be sure that Easter is celebrated on a Sunday wherever you are and in whatever church. It's the day when Christ was risen from the dead, the highlight of the Christian year. And you can be equally sure that He was crucified on the previous Friday. All the evidence is clear that it was the day before the Sabbath (Saturday), and also Passover was being celebrated either on the Thursday or the Friday that week. The date of Passover was determined by the full moon, and so it was logical that Easter also be calculated by the moon.

In the weeks before that first Easter, Jesus was making His way slowly and deliberately southwards from Galilee to Jerusalem. He told His disciples that He would die there, and three days later be raised to life, but they didn't understand and didn't believe, but they could see that this could become a very dangerous situation.

We don't know how certain Jesus was that He would die there, nor whether He knew on what date, but we can be sure that He risked death, and did not back off from it, because He knew it was the right thing to do, His purpose in life.

In our own lives there are many uncertainties, but a few things are definite! We are unlikely to know the date of our own death, but it is certain to happen. We cannot be certain of the exact dates and circumstances of Christ's death and resurrection, but all the evidence shows that it happened, even if common-sense says resurrection cannot. We may be

a bit doubtful about the theological explanations about this, but we can be certain that millions of people down the ages and across the world today, have found in their own heart that it seems to be true, and their lives have been changed by it and it has directed their motives and priorities for their remaining days on this earth.

So I wish you all a good Easter Holiday and I pray that you will find sufficient certainty to put your trust in Jesus Christ, who has died and is risen.

Friends of Naphill Common

What a winter! High winds and seemingly constant rain have left the Common strewn with fallen branches and laced with muddy paths. Our working parties have systematically widened and cleared many paths with the aim of making it possible to avoid the deepest mud, but the task is enormous. If you would like to help please contact Peter Davis 01494 569303.

At last we have some dry weather and the first summer migrant birds will soon be arriving: chiffchaffs, willow warblers, blackcaps and whitethroats and, if we are very lucky, a cuckoo. There are always a few of the warblers on the Common but the relative lack of brambles and other low cover does not help. If the proposed felling leads to more open areas and less holly the bird population may increase and become more varied.

Someone recently asked about the origin of the name for the Crick, but that is a difficult question. The origin of the land is less mysterious. When the part of the Common lying in Hughenden Parish was enclosed in the mid-19th Century, a piece of land of about 2½ acres was left unenclosed for the use of the villagers. This was the section between the Glebe and the kissing gate almost opposite the Wheel. Legend has it that there were several attempts to enclose it, but gates and fences were surreptitiously dismantled. Around 1930 its size was more than doubled by the purchase of a field which had been part of Vincent's Farm (now commemorated by Vincent's Way). It cost the village £500, plus paying to take out the hedge and turf the cricket square. A slight ridge across the Crick is still visible where the hedge was removed. Those with sharp eyes will have spotted that the original Crick is covered in fescue grass which it inherited from the Common, while the newer section, from the kissing gate up to the Village Hall has meadow grass.

The name 'Crick' is another matter and speculation is as precarious and full of pitfalls as our roads. It is tempting to think that it is a shortening of 'cricket field' but, as far as I know, there never was a cricket pitch on the original land. Indeed, part of it was covered in gorse until the tennis courts were laid out. According to The Concise Oxford Dictionary of English Place-names, the origin of 'crick' in names such as Cricket St. Thomas, Crick (in Northamptonshire) Crickheath, Cricklade, etc., is from the British (Iron Age) 'crūc', via the Old English 'crȳc', meaning a round hill or hillock. If that is the origin it would beat the 15th Century 'Stokkynglane' as our oldest local name perhaps by 1500 years!

Our programme of activities is still being devised but you can join Ron Collins at 9.30am at Naphill Village Hall on the third Monday of each month for a long walk (5-6 miles), and/or join Chris Miller at 10.30am at the Village Hall for a short walk (2-3 miles) on the first Wednesday each month. Both walks are free

and open to anyone. Go to our website for more information.

A FEW WORDS ON POLLINATION

Pollination is of critical importance to fruit and vegetable growing. Nearly all the crops we grow need to be pollinated by insects. It should be remembered that cereal crops also require pollination. One naturally thinks of honey bees, but other insects are also very important pollinators. Bumble bees do an excellent job, as do flies and other insects even including wasps. In recent years honey bees have been having a hard time, so we are fortunate in having the other insects. In 2013 in my garden and on my allotment I saw only two or three honey bees – literally only two or three. I put down the cause as the almost-continuous rain from about 4th April until Christmas the previous year. The blossom was continuously soaked and the poor bees could not obtain pollen. I heard a story about a beekeeper who opened a hive of 12,000 honey bees and found 12,000 bodies. They had starved to death. And one reads stories in the press about new diseases coming in from other countries to decimate our honey bee population. Now, thank goodness for the other pollinating insects; without them we would be in a pretty pickle. Fruit growers in some parts of the world wipe out other insects with heavy doses of insecticide then pay beekeepers to bring in hives of honey bees at pollination time. Unfortunately there are now not enough hives so those fruit growers have been hoist by their own petard.

I was surprised to learn recently that honey bees live as worker bees for only two months. What a shame. They are born, work like stink for a couple of months, then die. They do not have an ideal work-life balance. Luckily the queen bee will produce up to 2,000 eggs per day so there are plenty of replacement bees. I have always found bees to be friendly creatures, and never aggressive. On the allotment and in the garden they buzz around me, often coming quite close. If they show great interest in a flowering plant I am just about to touch I wait a little while and the bee buzzes off. I know some people are very nervous about bees, especially people who might have an allergic reaction to bee stings, but if one keeps calm and lets the bee go about its business the bee will soon fly off in search of nectar elsewhere. I have the same attitude to wasps – they won't attack me if I don't attack them. Wasps can be a nuisance especially when one is having a meal outdoors, or by getting through my anti-bird net to feast on my cherries, but they have their part to play in totally-organic gardening since they eat prodigious quantities of the insects we don't want such as whitefly and other aphids. So from now on I am not going to eradicate any wasp nests I find on the allotment, and shall be chanting:

*Come friendly wasps and fly by me,
And eat the aphids one, two, three".*

Pollination is essential for most of our crops but there are exceptions. Perennial vegetables such as sea kale, asparagus and Good King Henry do not need to be pollinated, nor does rhubarb. Some other crops require pollination during the same year that one takes the crops, such as beans and fruit. On the other

hand some vegetables need to be pollinated the year before, such as brassicas and root crops, where one sows the product of the previous year's pollination, ie the seeds. I sometimes let a few biennial carrots, leeks, beetroot and parsnips grow for another year so that I can collect enormous quantities of seeds for future sowing.

Sometimes one cannot use insects to pollinate. I give three examples. My espalier apricot tree flowers normally in February when there are no insects around, so I hand-pollinate using a cotton bud, making a buzz, buzz sound to fool the apricot. The second example is my greenhouse, which is an insect-free zone. I take precautions of the organic kind, since in the past I found that whitefly were irresistibly attracted to my peppers and aubergines. Just like many other gardeners I grew the usual marigolds in the greenhouse as a deterrent to whitefly, with mixed results, then discovered by accident what I call my secret weapon – oxalis triangularis. Some corms of the latter dropped accidentally a few years ago onto the soil of the deep bed where I grew tomatoes. They spread rapidly, produced beautiful flowers, and for several years I have not had whitefly in the greenhouse, nor any other kind of insect. In consequence I have to regularly hand-pollinate my peppers and aubergines. My all-female cucumber plants emphatically do not need to be pollinated since that would make the cucumbers taste bitter. As for tomatoes, they scatter their pollen liberally so there is no need to hand-pollinate, except for the first trusses of flowers low down on each plant. There does not seem to be any need to hand-pollinate the grapevine in the roof of the greenhouse so it too must scatter pollen liberally. The final example is that of strawberries on the allotment, grown under fleece to bring forward fruiting and to keep off hungry birds. Under the fleece there are no pollinating insects but the wind causes the fleece to have undulating waves and the stirring-up of the air under the fleece distributes the pollen, resulting in perfect pollination.

One does have to take measures sometimes to enhance pollination. A case in point is sweet corn. This cereal crop has pollen-producing flowers at the top of the plant and corn cobs lower down. Each cob has a stream of tassles and every single one has to receive pollen in order that every grain of corn on the cob will grow to full size and be full of sugar. To improve the chances of successful pollination one grows sweetcorn plants in a block. I usually have a block six by six in the back garden, with each plant about 18 inches from its neighbour. I grow them in the garden because badgers would take the cobs just before they were ripe if I were to grow them on the allotment. (I once lost 136 plants on the allotment in a single night; the head badger must have brought all his family for the feast and they must have had a rare old time pushing the plants over and gorging themselves on my delicious sweetcorn, which they took for maize.)

Getting runner bean flowers to set can be a problem. Some books advocate spraying with a fine water spray in the evenings. For some years in the garden I have been growing sweet peas amongst a few

“Painted Lady” runner beans, which are mainly grown for show on a Monnet Arch. I have just heard that to attract pollinating insects one can grow morning glory or sweet peas among bean plants – which I had been doing unwittingly in the garden! Both of these flowering plants are twining climbers. Henceforth I shall divert a few sweet pea plants to grow among my runner beans and climbing French beans on the allotment. On another aspect, I always let a few bean pods mature then collect the beans for sowing the following year, but this can produce unexpected problems. Getting one plant to fertilise another through the transfer of pollen results in hybridisation. If all the bean plants were of the same kind there would be no problem in using the resultant beans as seed – they should come true. However, in the past I have grown up to eight different varieties on my bean framework and suffered unintended hybridisation. This resulted in some of the following year’s pods having red beans and others black - when the expected colour was grey! That is incidentally how the amateur gardener can find his or her place in gardening history by breeding a novel variety. Perhaps one day I will breed a monster bean called “Biggous Beanus Masonia!”



A Personal Perspective

If, as I hope you will, you come to the Annual Parish Meeting on the evening of Thursday 15th May, held this time at the Primary School in Hughenden Valley, we might well have some modest refreshments, though plans for that haven't been drawn up at the time of writing. What is certain is that any refreshments will not be elaborate. As a Parish Council we are always careful to remember that any money spent ultimately comes from all residents of the Parish.

The same is true when councillors, and the current Chairman in particular, get invited to some 'outside' event, such as the AGM of a village hall or residents' association, where light refreshments are typically offered, perhaps as a 'thank you' to those who turn up.

The main advantages of such meetings lie in the chance to rub shoulders with people, some of whom we might have communicated with only via email, and to seek answers to questions which had already been raised. So it was, for instance, a short while ago when I attended a morning 'conference' by Transport for Bucks. I was able to chat with many about ongoing issues within our Parish, and they included the new Cabinet Member for Transportation, a recently-appointed person in charge of contact with 'customers' that includes parish councils, and two officials who can influence the progress of ongoing road safety issues in two separate parts of the parish. At the end, there was a light buffet.

The current Chairman of Wycombe District Council has been responsible for several events which I've attended on behalf of the Parish Council. For instance, he introduced a simple and short service for Commonwealth Day, which ended with tea or coffee, and a tempting cake. A 'Civic Service' was

recently held in Hambleden, a picturesque village between Marlow and Henley that I'd never been to before, again with light buffet afterwards.

The final example comes from the Royal Air Force, who in each of the years I've been on the Parish Council has invited Ward Councillors for Naphill & Walter's Ash, along with representative business people, members of local organisations, etc. to their 'annual reception'. As well as light refreshments there is the chance of informally chatting to others, perhaps for the first time. Subject to weather conditions, there has been both a marching band and a fly-past by one or more aircraft, at low level. We hope they will continue their tradition!

NAWARA is supporting HVRA in asking the Parish Council to press Highways to improve road signage and linage to reduce the risk of accident on this roundabout.

P C Lee Turnham has suggested the Give Way Sign and broken line markings on Valley Road are replaced with a STOP sign and a solid white line.

It has been a busy few weeks in school but in Forest School we have enjoyed a wonderful balmy time under the canopy. The children have super keen eyes and all around us are signs of the changing season. At Forest School we are truly blessed to consistently witness the children's discoveries and following on from a very wet and mild winter spring is now stirring so the intrepid explorers are gathering vast amounts of proof that change is afoot...



We have enjoyed the blossom en route and are learning about the baby chipmunks that we love to tip toe past (as much as wellies allow!) so that they peek out & greet us! Awaiting the Bluebells arrival we speculate English or Spanish?.. Catkins are

decorating our path into base-camp and talk has turned to wind-pollination. Bird song is truly vibrant now and every session in the forest is accompanied by our resident Woodpecker, initial wonder at his amazing vibrational tune has now relaxed into a familiar sound-scape.

During the storms of winter large trees have fallen in and around Forest School, these are used primarily as climbing trees; pirate ships, Treasure Island and a jungle look out amongst others. Other discoveries are bug hotels, mini-

Our programme of events is taking shape. On Saturday 24th May we will have a Birdsong Walk. Whether you know the different songs or would like to learn some, please join us. We will start from the Village Hall at 9.30am and walk around the Common and Cookshall Farm, perhaps 2 to 3 miles in all, led by some who know the different calls and songs. Given reasonable weather we should hear some woodland birds such as chiffchaffs, willow warblers, blackcaps and nuthatches, and some farmland birds such as hedge sparrows, blackbirds, song and mistle thrushes, blue tits, greenfinches and, with luck, even a cuckoo.

On the evening of Tuesday 24th June, starting from The Wheel car park at 7 pm there will be a walk around part of the village entitled 'Naphill in 1913' led by an historian of buildings, Marian Miller. Marian, who is Honorary Librarian of the Bucks Archaeological Society and a freelance researcher, will tell us about some of the older buildings on the walk. It is free but, sorry, no dogs please.

Marian writes: "You've probably heard of Lloyd George's People's Budget of 1909 which introduced old-age pensions. But where was the money to come from? The government came up with the idea of a tax on the increase in value of land but that meant they needed to ascertain the base value of every piece of land in England and Wales. Hence the 1910 Valuation Survey - otherwise known as the 'Lloyd George Domesday' - was born and surveyors were dispatched to every part of the country. It was 1913 before they got around to Naphill. The intended tax never materialised but fortunately for us we are left with the legacy of maps and surveyors' field books which are available for all to see at the National Archives in Kew. Using those maps and information from the field books and 1911 census we will take a stroll around the east end of Naphill, beginning and ending at The Wheel, and explore Naphill as it was just before the Great War. Walking will be mainly on pavements but there will be a short stretch of rough ground between Hunts Hill Lane and Downley Road."

We will be at the Fete on Saturday 14th June and our walks

will proceed as usual. You can join Ron Collins at 9.30am at Naphill Village Hall on the third Monday of each month for a long walk (5-6 miles), and/or join Chris Miller at 10.30am at the Village Hall for a short walk (2-3 miles) on the first Wednesday each month. Both walks are free and open to anyone. Go to our website for more information. There will be another bat walk at a date to be announced and various other events later in the year.

We are still in negotiations with the Forestry Commission, West Wycombe Estate and Natural England in an attempt to ensure that the intended felling ends up benefiting the Common. To this end, we are also trying to finish our survey of the significant trees. This has been complicated by the fact that the aluminium labels are being removed. They are probably being eaten by squirrels or gliss gliss, but some may have been removed by human hands. Please don't - if you do you may even be condemning trees to death because the labelled trees are to be saved from felling

All of our activities are free but it is essential that we keep up our membership, especially as it is our main lever in negotiating with official bodies and landowners. So please ensure that you join or renew your membership. It is only £5 per year.

Picture This

For only three weeks in late April to May, the Chiltern beech-woods will be staging a dazzling, evocative drama. Set in a theatre of epic proportion, spotlights of scintillating light will pierce a canopy of emerald green, and softly illuminate a perfumed stage filled with performers dressed in vibrant blue and pink. A performance not to be missed as this is for one season only.

And you can be the audience, the only person there, immersed in the drama, savouring the heady perfume and capturing the drama in your own unique way.

I am of course, talking about Bluebells. And I could have simply said "this month Bluebells will be out and they make a great subject for a photograph; get out there with your camera." But I didn't.

A photograph can be much more than just a record of a subject. It can have a presence and a mood that captures your attention and your imagination created through the combination of the subject's beauty and the vision of the photographer.

This month's cover has Bluebells - *Hyacinthoides non-scripta* - and lots of them. The location of the photograph is Falconer's Wood (that's the name given on my map) which is behind the RAF base at Walter's Ash. The wood is an easy 3 minutes walk from Bradenham Woods Lane.

So my photography tip for this month is to notice how you feel about the subject of your photograph. When you are out in the wilds of the Common and come across something that stops you in your visual tracks, notice how you feel. Assuming it's a pleasant feeling and you haven't just stumbled into the Blair Witch Project, find a viewpoint where you can create a composition that captures the feeling. Then hold your breath and press the button.

Later, if you choose to show your photograph to someone else, they may also get the same feeling. This is called 'Equivalence' but there is no guarantee of it as the great photographer, Ansel Adams noted:

'When I see something, I react to it and I state it and that's the equivalent of what I felt. So I give it to you as a spectator, and you get it, or you don't get it but there is nothing on the back of the print that tells you what you should get.'

By the way, do make sure that no performers are harmed in the making of your production.

From Our Local Methodist Minister

Dear Friends,

We meet a wide variety of people in the course of our lives, and some make more impression than others. I'm sure you could name a few who were influential in your life, probably in your youth. Or perhaps are still influential today. And there are a lot whose influence we'd be hard-pressed to say exactly. Sometimes we remember to thank God for such folk.

Occasionally such encounters and influences are life-changing. An old preacher told me I ought to become a preacher. I was a very shy young man, not at all eloquent, having an unclear understanding of God, and a weak faith: on the face of it a poor choice for a preacher! But surprisingly it set me wondering if this could be God's calling of me. It certainly wasn't wishful thinking! And now here I am.

There is a poem* by Andrew Pratt that begins:-

*This day so strangely changed a man,
whose heart was warmed by what he heard,
that from that moment all the world
would echo to his word.*



The man was John Wesley, who had tried hard to do what he thought right before God, but knew that his life and faith were incomplete. On that day 24th May 1738 he went "very unwillingly" to a religious meeting where someone was speaking about Martin Luther's writings, and during that meeting he felt his heart "strangely warmed".

"I felt I did trust in Christ, in Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

Wesley became a changed man as he shared his new faith with all who would listen, and with some who didn't want to hear! He was a strong influence on the lives of thousands of individuals, and brought about much social change in this country and across the world. The Methodist Church today was founded by him.

Keen Methodists celebrate on 24th May each year, or on the previous Sunday which they term "Aldersgate Sunday", after the place where Wesley's heart was "strangely warmed".

In most churches in May we continue to celebrate Easter and the resurrection of Christ. Here was a man who influenced many during his mortal life, as described in the bible, but on account of his risen resurrected life he has influenced more people than anyone else on earth, before or since.

Take time this May to consider who has influenced your life, and who has made you what you are today, for better or for worse. And give thanks to God for those who influenced you for better.

One of my greatest aims in editing the Gazette is to ensure that it is a truly a community magazine which informs and reflects the interests, concerns, news and events of our great locality and community. SO! I am so very pleased that the Line Dancers and Cubs have submitted their articles this month and of course, my thanks to all our regular contributors..

Hughenden Parish Council – April 2014

Many of you will be wondering what has happened with the Parish Plan Questionnaire that we promised you back in February. The Council contracted with the Bucks Free Press leaflet delivery service who promised a minimum of 95% delivery on the basis that there might be some houses that could not easily be found. Delivery was allegedly carried out in early March, but it quickly transpired that large swathes of the Parish were missed. The BFP initially strenuously denied this but faced with mounting evidence, had to concede that had not met their contracted performance. Indeed, it could be said that their performance made England's recent Ashes debacle seem a resounding success. The problem is, they have not been able to tell us which houses they missed – which we believe is most of the Parish – and we therefore have no choice but to do a re-run. This is planned for May/June when delivery will be carried out by local volunteers – including Councillors – to ensure that this time, every house is included. We will also have an on-line version available and we will ask everyone to respond unless they did receive the

questionnaire the first time and responded then. We are very sorry for this shambles and hope you will understand the problems we have had. We won't be using the BFP distribution service again!

You may have seen further press coverage in the BFP about the recovery of money from our former Clerk, Lynne Turner. Just to set the record straight, the theft was of £28,200 but the judge only issued a Confiscation Order under the Proceeds of Crime Act of £12,388. However, the Council has only received £8695 of that and it transpires that due a shortfall in the pension policy cashed to pay the Confiscation, the Court has determined that she need pay no more. In the April Full Council meeting, the Council agreed to pursue Mrs Turner for the outstanding amount of £19,505 through the Civil Courts together with interest accumulating from the date of the issue of the civil proceedings and any legal costs incurred. That process has now commenced.

On a lighter note. We were delighted with the number of local residents who were able to attend the Open Evening at the school on 1st April about the parking and safety issues around the Coop. Whilst some might think the optimism misplaced, we are hopeful of progress as we have now started dialogue with the RAF to improve Community engagement and look for opportunities for local improvements. We will keep you informed.

Finally, we would urge you to come along to the Annual Parish Meeting starting at 8pm on Thursday 15th May at HUGHENDEN VILLAGE SCHOOL. There will be brief reports on our activities and finances and then a talk by Penelope Tollitt, the new Wycombe District Head of Planning. This is your chance to hear what we have been up to and to question us and Penelope on whatever you like. Wine, soft drinks and snacks will be served afterwards and we welcome the opportunity to meet as many of you as are able to make it.

Bradenham Parish Council

It has been a busy time for the parish council. We were aware that the traffic calming suggestions made by Sustrans would not be easy to implement and that there would be many hurdles to overcome, but the whole process is proving far more difficult than envisaged. Money is a major issue, the fact that we are looking to implement changes in the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and in a picturesque National Trust village adds more complications and then Transport for Buckinghamshire is the authority who has to approve everything, all this means everything takes a very long time. It was decided to ask Transport for Buckinghamshire to come to the parish and discuss the way forward before we spend more money on more plans, surveys and risk assessments. We are due to meet with them late in April, we have great support from our County Councillor Carl Etholen. Arabella Grandage offered to coordinate a speed watch campaign in the village, so watch out!

As you are aware one of the routes for the construction traffic for HS2 is along the A4010 through our parish. The route will be used 24/7 for 7 years, we are not

sure how many extra vans, HGV's etc. could be involved. The parish council have decided to object to the A4010 being used as a route for construction traffic. The A4010 is already heavily used, it is the main route for emergency vehicles, the railway bridge in West Wycombe is unsuitable for large HGV's and the impact on the whole community and area would be enormous. Having already made comments on the Environmental Statement that accompanied the Hybrid Bill, we will now petition Parliament.

The parish council have commented on Wycombe District Council's Local plan.

We still have planning appeals running for the site at Shana and the site at the Hedgerow, which has required additional research and comments. We have just found out that the appeal for the Shana site has been allowed, we are still waiting on the Secretary of State to decide the Hedgerow appeal.

The next meeting will be on Monday 12th May at 7.00pm at the Cricket club, all welcome. We will start with the Annual Parish meeting, followed by the Annual Parish Council meeting, when the Chairman and Vice Chairman will be elected. We will finish with an ordinary meeting.

Grow Your Own!



The UN has said that we need to double food production by 2050 to take account of a population rise from 7.2 to 9.2 billion and a change in eating habits towards more meat-eating. The UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has just reported that by 2050 there will be a reduction in crop yields of about 70% in some areas offset by an increase of about 30% in other areas, leading to a net decrease in crop yields – mainly in two of the four staple crops wheat and maize. That makes it far less likely that we will see a doubling of food production by 2050. It seems that food may be unavailable in many parts of the world and will be much, much more

expensive in the richer countries.

From Trevor

I have a photograph of some of workmen in the brickyards. I attach one which was taken circa 1905 or a little earlier, with three of my family. I know it is not what you asked for but it is of interest because it may be connected with the recent sink hole in Walters Ash.

It was taken in Moxham's brickyard (known as the 'Small Holdings') which was roughly opposite Ash Place and the present School. They dug clay pits all up that side of the Main Road, later filled in with goodness knows what - so they may have been ultimately responsible for the later

subsidence. The men are - Back row: ?; Bob Monger (foreman); ?; ?; Charlie Brown. Middle Row: Len Brown; ?; John Hussey; Will Hussey. Front: Tom Hussey. (John Hussey was my grandfather -he came to a tragic end in 1916 under a steamroller.)

News Chiltern Hotel (formerly The Rose & Crown) in Saunderton. Planning consent has been given to convert the property to residential use as a house with 4 reception rooms and 13 bedrooms!. Two of the conditions stipulated by Environmental Services are (a) installation of electrically powered ventilation (b) adequate landscaping and fencing to protect residents from road noise. Negotiations over car parking will be necessary as Highways owns a lot of the area permitted for parking by former hotel visitors.

Road Resurfacing.

Bradenham Woods Lane

Road closure starting 13 May without sufficient warning. The BCC Project Manager of the Capital Maintenance Project explained that immediately following a survey of Bradenham Woods Lane, when it was decided resurfacing was essential, the contractors found a short gap in their work schedule, so Highways booked them without further delay, but this left no time for early warning to road users. We are told the top surface will be laid in June. This will probably take no more than a day and is unlikely to require road closure.

In relation to our complaint about the increasing potholes in Main Road, we were told these were scheduled to be filled following resurfacing of Bradenham Woods Lane.

Coombe Lane. A serious case for structural repair. Cllr David Carrol has chosen Coombe Lane as a priority. A senior Highways official informed us that Coombe Lane was highlighted at a meeting on 12th May 2014. The conclusion was that plane and patch would now not be adequate, and that resurfacing was necessary. An inspection will take place shortly with resurfacing works to follow in the next few months. Date still to be confirmed.

Date of next meeting. 8pm Naphill Village Hall. 12th June 2014. As usual the meeting is open to any residents who wish to attend.

From Our Local Methodist Minister

The real thing or a signet ring?

My father wore a signet ring as his wedding ring, and when he passed away I inherited it and I am proud to wear it on my little finger. It has his initials rather than mine, but they are so worn as to be practically illegible. But on the inside there are clear hallmarks, and an inscription including a date about 6 months before their wedding. I guess this was an

engagement present, but the inscribed lady's name is an odd spelling of my mother's name which I've never seen elsewhere!

My parents were educated, well-organised people, so these discrepancies are something of a mystery, but I can guarantee that this really was the ring that Father wore for as long as I knew him.

Recently we were looking at the Old Testament book of Haggai, and particularly the very last verse: "I will take you, my servant Zerubbabel and I will make you like my signet ring, for I have chosen you," declares the Lord Almighty." Zerubbabel was the leader at Jerusalem, and although he could not be made king, the prophet Haggai declares him to be like God's signet ring, which sounds a bit strange to us.

But a signet ring in those days was used to authenticate documents, in the same way that we have used signatures and pin-codes and computer passwords. The signet ring was pressed into hot wax or soft clay to leave an impression which was difficult to replicate except with the same ring. Kings and emperors had their own signet ring (or sometimes some other seal), and the prophet indicates that "Almighty" God surely has such a signet ring, and that ring is Zerubbabel. Such a ring was very powerful: it enabled the wearer to act in the name of the owner, whether king or God. It had authority.

We were looking at the authority of biblical people chosen by God as His servant, and how that relates to people today who feel called by God. And are they the real thing? Do they have God's authority? Or are they deluded fakes?!

I looked again at Father's signet ring and his initials SH. If pressed into hot wax, the symmetric letter H would look ok but the asymmetric S would be back to front. This sort of signet ring is purely decorative! It's the real thing in that it is my Father's ring that he wore for 5 decades, but as a proper signet, it is not!

I turn then to the people around me, both those who feel called by God and those who don't. Are they the real thing? Or are they decorative, or fake?

Proper signet rings and seals make an impression when pressed in hot wax. Do we make an impression? And do we make a correct impression, or back to front, corrupted? History is full of the people who made an impression, for good or for ill. Those who made little impression, were just not recorded. What about us? Shall we leave a good impression for later generations to admire, or a bad impression for them to deride?

All of us are given responsibilities in life, and perhaps given authority: are we fit to be described like Zerubbabel as the signet ring?

Friends of Naphill Common

On the evening of Tuesday 24th June we will have a guided walk through a slice of the history of Naphill, led by the historian Marian Miller. Starting at 7pm from The Wheel we will visit several of the older buildings in the south eastern end of the village. It was all once part of Naphill Common but, after the mid-19th Century enclosures, the Common was pushed back to its present boundaries. Marian will be using a survey of 1913 to work out how the village changed. Join us on what I hope will be a fine evening. It is free but, sorry, no dogs! Before that, we hope to see you at the Fete on Saturday 14th June. This year much of it will be inside a marquee so a sunny day is almost certain. We will have a quiz for children to puzzle over.

At the time of writing I don't know how our 'Birdsong Walk' went. I am aware of the diminishing number of birds that I hear around the village – and I don't think it is my ageing ears at fault. Cuckoos once called until they became monotonous; lately we are lucky to hear one. Skylarks soared above many of the fields and the village supported a fine collection of martins, swallows and swifts. Perhaps the lack of insects and weeds in the surrounding fields is

the reason. I have heard blackcaps and chiffchaffs on the Common and there are plenty of blackbirds, finches, wrens, robins and dunnocks singing with gusto.

You can join Ron Collins at 9.30am at Naphill Village Hall on the third Monday of each month for a long walk (5-6 miles), and/or join Chris Miller at 10.30am at the Village Hall for a short walk (2-3 miles) on the first Wednesday each month. Both walks are free and open to anyone. Go to our website or our posters for more information. There will be another bat walk on Friday September 12th starting from the Village hall at 7.30pm. It will be led by the bat expert Bridget Parslow. The date of the fungus foray is yet to be settled. There is likely there will be regular moth trapping sessions on warm evenings but it is not possible to predict when these will be. In the past we saw some rarities. All moths are released unharmed.

There are at least seven ponds on Naphill Common, plus one or two possible sites. Most provided water for livestock on our dry hilltop when the Common was regularly grazed. One, Willow Pond, began life as a pit for clay and sarsen stones, another, Shipwash Pond, has a characteristic promontory used for washing sheep, and another, Dew Pond, may have been the water supply for the (possible) Romano-British farmstead. As the tree cover has spread all of them have deteriorated and lost much of their once rich pond life. We are trying to get Natural England to accept a long-term management plan by which we can reverse the decline. We may even be able to coax the internationally rare starfruit back into flower – last seen in Daisy Pond the 1990s. The proposed felling would give us a chance to open up a small area around some of the ponds to let in more light. Negotiations are staggering along. If we get permission we will need someone with a licence to handle Great Crested Newts and two of us are undertaking the training required.

If you are interested in the Common, enjoy walking there and care about it, please consider joining the Friends of Naphill Common. It is only £5 a year and our large membership is the only lever we have in trying to preserve this treasure. Where change is inevitable, as with the proposed felling, we can at least try to ensure that there are benefits for the Common. Our membership secretary is Lynn McMinn 01494 564667.

Picture This

In April's Gazette, I said that if you were caught in the open, peering through a hole in a piece of black card, people may stare but will not ask. Well, I've discovered that's not true.

Last week, there I was on my hands and knees eyeing up the crop behind Great Moseley Farm. With contra-jour lighting (see the March Gazette) the graceful curves of the leaves reminded me of ballet dancers' limbs; (I hadn't been drinking - the morning was still young). Suddenly, the sharp bark of a Weisler interrupted my reverie. Standing as tall as any Weisler can but keeping its distance, the dog was warning its human companion that something weird was afoot.

The human half of the duo approached. "What are you photographing?" "The wheat" I replied, "I like the way the sunlight illuminates the leaves and the resultant patterns of light and shade". (I didn't mention the ballet dancers). "Oh I see" she said, "I think I should bring my camera out when I'm walking. Sometimes I see something and I think 'that would make a good photograph'".

She's right. We all see pictures, and we need a camera to capture them, to freeze the ballet dancers in time. And, as I wrote last month, it doesn't matter if no one 'gets' your picture. So my main tip this month is pretty straightforward. Always carry your camera - and it really doesn't matter what sort. A renowned photographer was once asked 'Which is your best camera?' 'The one I have with me', he replied.

I have a few more tips this week about what makes a good cover photograph. The beautiful cover picture of the Red Kite by Paul Goby is a great example of what I think makes a really good one. The picture is a vertical format so it fits the shape of the Gazette; horizontal pictures don't fit and can't be used. There is space at the top so the Gazette title doesn't cut through an important element of the photograph. The subject is eye-catching and in sharp focus; blurred pictures don't look good as covers. The light is good; dull light makes dull pictures. And the final test: would you hang your picture on your hall wall?

So, carry your camera. With the forthcoming fete, you'll have lots of opportunity for creating great pictures.

At the Annual Parish Council Meeting Teif Jones was elected Chairman and Jan Pearce was elected Vice Chairman. At the Annual Parish Meeting the Chairman reported that we had had a busy year and gave the financial report.

The Parish Council is petitioning parliament on the

High Speed 2 Railway Bill, with its objection to the construction route for the High Speed 2 Railway running through the parish on the A4010 from J4 M40 to Princes Risborough.

We have again entered the "Best Kept Village" competition, judging will be in June.

We have been busy with our traffic calming plans and had a very encouraging meeting with Transport for Buckinghamshire to look at the way forward. You will have noticed that Bradenham Woods Lane has been closed for the filling of many of the major potholes, which is preparation work for the full resurfacing of the road from the top of the hill (main Road/New Road- Walter's Ash) down to the A4010. This is due to take place in June/July or at the latest in August. It is the intention that the centre white line will not be replaced to encourage users to reduce speed. An assessment of this plan is due to be carried out before it can be agreed. It is part of our speed reduction proposals. We are also looking at changing the colour of the road surface through Bradenham Village and introducing 30mph roundels on the road. We are due to carry out "Community Speed Watch" in Bradenham village in June.

The next meeting will be Monday 21st July at Bradenham Cricket Club 7pm. The meeting is open to the public and the press.




Grace

Year 6 are extremely busy this term; SATS are approaching and they have started to rehearse


songs for the Year 6 end-of-year production – Poptastic. Everyone is really looking forward to the auditions which will be taking place in a couple of weeks.

A Personal Perspective

I In the last edition of the Gazette I mentioned that everyone was invited to the Annual Parish Meeting (APM), which met a few days ago. I have some different overall observations of that meeting.

First of all, I commend all those who came to Hughenden Valley school. You probably know that we have no fixed venue for holding the APM, and it is shared around different parts of the Parish, so for some the two or three miles might have been too far, or perhaps other meetings occurred on that night. However, I must admit to being a little disappointed with numbers when we recall that there are nearly 9000 residents across all parts of Hughenden Parish, from Naphill & Walter's Ash to the other six villages.

What we lost in terms of numbers was, I believe, more than amply compensated for by what took place. The APM is an opportunity to outline some of the aspirations of the Council for the next 12 months, and to comment on what's been happening in the previous 12 months. Unlike some past

meetings, there was a general goodwill and a hope that we can concentrate on positive projects within the Parish. We had, for instance, a number of youngsters who presented a video of views by youngsters at a recent Parish 'Youth Fun Day', which was held at Naphill Village Hall and the Crick. I think those teenagers who presented and subsequently faced a number of questions from the audience are to be commended. They carried it off with true professionalism.

It is worth noting that we are actively on the lookout for schemes which we could help organise, that might benefit groups of parishioners. Youngsters and the elderly are two such groups, for instance.

We should also thank our keynote speaker, Penelope Tollitt, who is head of Planning at Wycombe District Council, who outlined some dilemmas she continues to face with regard to the district's 'Local Plan', where the decisions that are taken are likely to affect each of us for many years, particularly with regard to the quantity and quality of homes in our locality.

I'll finish this article with a success story. Minor, perhaps, but success it was! Regular readers will know that from time to time I've encouraged everyone to contact Transport for Bucks, whenever you've seen potholes, and thought 'someone should do something about it'. You might remember that you can contact that organisation by internet, email, phone, or letter. In my success story, I'd let them know about a single pothole on our small cul-de-sac, not as a Councillor but as an individual resident. Within a week I saw white lines around the rectangle to be repaired. One day later, the repair itself had been made. So in the modern jargon, if each of us 'owns' the responsibility to report potholes where we live or where we regularly drive, our collective small efforts might just add up to a locality which has far fewer potholes!

We have had two notable events since our last contribution. On 17th April, you may have seen a hive of activity at the Crick as the Parish Council Youth Event took place. Organised by two of our Councillors (Linda Derrick and Sade Adoh) as a Parish event, we were fortunate that Naphill Village Hall had the best suited facilities and was therefore chosen as the venue. Upwards of 150 youths aged 10–18 attended the event that had activities such as a mobile skate park, the Bucks CC IT bus, cooking and pool had been set up and there was universal approval for a really popular afternoon. Aside from providing entertainment, the purpose of the event was to get the views of the younger generation in

the Parish across a wide range of topics – what they want in the Parish (a skate park being by far the most popular answer), what they can do to help others, what they enjoy about where they live etc. A ‘talking heads’ video has been produced which is available to view through the Parish website and we would urge people to watch it as it gives a great insight into youth hopes and expectations in the Parish.

The other notable event has been the start of an



RAF Liaison Group. We are extremely grateful to Wing Commander Alan Jones who is working with the Parish Council to look at improving ties between the camp and the Parish in general. We had our first meeting at the beginning of May and will continue quarterly meetings to identify opportunities for shared resources to help improve the lot of all age groups within the Parish.

Finally, you may be interested in a report we have now produced into the fraud perpetrated by the Clerk back in 2010/11. This gives the background to the fraud – how the Council’s finances are run, what went wrong, how the fraud was carried out and what has been done to make sure it can’t happen again. We have tried to be completely open and balanced

and we hope this will now draw a line under the event although of course we are still pursuing the outstanding amount through Civil Proceedings.

Grant temporary planning permission for a period of 4 months for Hedgerows, to give them time to prepare the Nursery site in Flackwell Heath.

Mr Murphy and Mr O'Connor have an excellent site in Flackwell Heath, owned by Mr O'Connor, similar in size to Hedgerows and bordering open Green Belt. They should be moving out of Walter's Ash by the end of October. We hope they will return the GB/AONB Hedgerows field to the natural state they found it in before they took up residence in 2010.

Dilute Sewage. The diversion of some effluent into Hughenden Stream, by Thames Water, should cease by August.

Aircraft Noise. Due to runway resurfacing, late night flights are being diverted. We are suffering some of the noise but Windsor and Datchet are far worse off. The resurfacing is due to finish by 31 October this year.

News: Uplands Hotel, Four Ashes Road, has been listed Grade II. The listing expressly excludes the old stables and what's left of the walled garden.

HS2 Construction Route

As was reported in the June edition of the Gazette Bradenham Parish Council discussed the planned HS2 construction route and decided to petition Parliament.

One of the routes for construction traffic – uses the A4010, M40 J4 to Princes Risborough and comes through Bradenham Parish. We all use the A4010 to go to work, to shop, to take our children to school, to go to the hospital etc. We have also suffered the long delays that build up on this road in the mornings, evenings or when there is any obstruction. The A4010 is heavily used by emergency vehicles especially after the closure of A&E in High Wycombe and its transfer to Stoke Mandeville. Use of this road for construction traffic will make delays much worse.

Consequently Bradenham Parish Council has petitioned Parliament. It's too late to object to the HS2 project but we can object to aspects of it which affect us personally. Petitioning Parliament is a complicated process which includes traditions and language which dates back centuries and which requires the personal delivery of the petition to Parliament. Even after this Petitioners can be called to explain their grievance to a Parliamentary Select Committee.

Bradenham Parish Council's objections are based on:

- * the unsuitability of the road
- * the danger to residents because of the potential delay to emergency vehicles
- * the low bridge that carries the Chiltern Line and the danger of collision with the bridge and with oncoming traffic.

One further twist to the procedure is that the Petitioner has to suggest alternatives and/or other remedies. In agreement with other neighbouring Councils our proposal is that construction traffic use Junction 2 of the M40 and proceeds along a specially constructed Beaconsfield bypass to join the A413 at Amersham.

Bradenham Parish Council's Petition was delivered to Parliament on the 14th May. We await developments.

From Our Local Methodist Minister

As I write to you, Honduras and France are battling it out in World Cup Football in Brazil. I watched the opening minutes on tv, but then the pressure of our editor Sonia's deadline got the better of me, and I'll have to discover the match result later!

As the players prepared to kick off, one of the Honduran team was busy saying his prayers in the middle of the pitch. The cynics among you would

say he needed to say his prayers and probably that would still not be sufficient for the underdog team! Others might say it was not appropriate in such a public place: he could have said his prayers privately in the dressing room, or indeed quietly under his breath. But the tv cameras zoomed in, and if you were any good at lip-reading his language, you were close enough to do so. Apparently the player praying was more interesting than the other players warming-up!

It's only a game, of course: 22 men chasing a bag of wind around a field! Yet it's a measure of humanity's peculiar priorities, that this tournament is worth many billions of dollars/euros/pounds, and clearly there is temptation for financial irregularities, such as are being claimed against Qatar for 2022. And the career prospects for players and managers are made or destroyed in 90 minutes on such a stage. It's all desperately important to the fans.

As I write to you, others are battling it out in less civilised manner in Syria, Ukraine, Iraq, and a host of other places. The cost again is billions of dollars/euros/pounds, and there is much to be gained or lost by arms manufacturers and by governments, and by terror groups.

But whereas the prima donnas of the turf are stretchered off with a twisted ankle and brought back to match fitness by a host of medics and high-tech treatments, the poor of the earth suffer indefinitely: families killed, loved ones raped, belongings stolen or destroyed, and little prospect of a return to normality.

In such scenario, there is no zoom-lens camera to beam the images of their desperate praying to adoring fans around the world. Such are humanity's peculiar priorities.

In mid-July when the World Cup is settled, we can get back to normal, and for many of us that means a holiday abroad, somewhere sunny and safe. Few of us have been to Brazil, and even fewer will go to Syria, Iraq, Ukraine. It's not that we don't care about the people there, but we don't feel we can do much about their situation, and anyway we need a holiday. Such are humanity's peculiar priorities.

Some of us pray often: maybe in thankfulness for our own situation, maybe for help in our next tricky situation, maybe for something that is desperately important to us: or for someone we know and love: probably quietly and privately, but sometimes it's helpful for that someone to know you're praying for them.

Others pray less often, but when life gets very difficult, it's no surprise if people pray more!

I hope you all have a great summer, and can relax after the stresses of Brazil. Now I wonder how Honduras are doing.....

I notice in June's Gazette that Deirdre Hanson commented that in order to encourage users to reduce speed the centre white line on the carriageway to Bradenham Woods Lane will not be replaced when the road is resurfaced.

I do not believe that removing the centre white line will in any way reduce speeding: in fact it will make the road more dangerous as motorists rely on this visible aid to assess the width of the lane available to them, particularly at night, bearing in mind that there are no kerbs delineating the edge of the road.

I consider that not only is the centre white line essential but in addition we need cats eyes provided on all the bends. If speeding is a problem, perhaps it would make more sense if that part of the road presently restricted to 60 mph were reduced to 40mph as this speed, in my opinion, is quite fast enough on this road.

Friends of Naphill Common

I know that the impending felling on the Common is causing concern and it will certainly make a huge difference. The friends of Naphill Common cannot stop the felling but we have been trying to influence what form it takes and ensure that it gives the maximum benefit and does the minimum harm. At last the plans are becoming clearer. The felling will be done in phases. Phase 1 will start in September and end at Christmas, when the results will be assessed and the next phase planned.

Phase 1 will be restricted to a strip along the edge of the Common where it abuts The Coppice (i.e. Bradenham Woods owned by the National Trust). It will extend from (but not include) The Clumps to the boundary with The Piggery and the allotment gardens. Its width will taper from the corner of the field at Bradenham Farm (where the little shop used to be) and widen out to include Heyshams and over to the end of Forge Road. In addition Phase 1 will include working along three major paths. One is the path H12/BW84 that runs parallel with the village edge of the Common about 100 yards in from the boundary, from the end of Forge Road to The Plain. The second is the Broad Path H21 running from The Plain to Dew Pond. The third is the section of H2/BW85 which runs from Dew Pond towards The Clumps. The area and paths include six of our seven ponds and one of our four remaining juniper bushes.

FONC has been asked to mark both the significant trees that we want to save (with a green band) and any that we would like removed (with a red cross). As you may have noticed, we have already put red crosses and numbers on several trees around the ponds. These will be felled to let in more light and so allow the ponds to recover. Over the coming months we will put green bands on significant trees throughout the Phase 1 area. The result will be a bit of an eyesore but we are using special paint which, we are assured, washes off eventually. If anyone has a favourite tree please tell one of the FONC committee members.

We are told that the felling will remove about 20% of the trees and the work along the paths will clear back the holly and scrub. The result will be more open woodland, wider paths and less smothered ponds, so there should be definite benefits. We may even have an open area in which to reintroduce our juniper cuttings. We are negotiating with Natural England about a long-term management plan including a detailed programme for the ponds.

Our Bird-song Walk went ahead despite the rain and we managed to hear and identify 21 species. It would be well worth repeating the event or perhaps a dawn chorus walk, preferably on a dry day. At the time of writing our 'Naphill in 1913' walk has not taken place but I would like to thank Marian Miller for leading it and the property owners for their cooperation. Similarly, I don't know how the Fete Day went, but suspect that it will have been glorious sunshine, given that we have the shelter of a marquee. Please join Ron Collins at 9.30am at Naphill Village Hall on the third

Monday of each month for a long walk (5-6 miles), and/or join Chris Miller at 10.30am at the Village Hall for a short walk (2-3 miles) on the first Wednesday each month – but please note that the walk on 2nd July is CANCELLED. Both walks are free and open to anyone. Go to our website or our posters for more information. There will be another bat walk on Friday September 12th starting from the Village hall at 7.30pm. It will be led by the bat expert Bridget Parslow. The Fungus Foray will be on Sunday 26th October starting from Forge Road at 10am and will also be led by experts.

Thoughts from the past and hopes for the future

It is some little time since I last wrote for the Gazette in fact about a year to be exact.

Many people have asked me if I am enjoying retirement from Council work and I have to reply that I have not noticed too much difference so far with the many voluntary organisations with which I am associated, some as the continuing county council representative for example, on the South East Reserve Forces and Cadets Association, The Chiltern Woodland Project and the County Heritage Champion, to name but a few.

I thought that from time to time, and with the Editor's permission, I might make readers aware of those charities peculiar to Buckinghamshire.

One Charity, of which I was originally a Trustee but now a Vice President, is the Buckinghamshire Community Foundation. At the Community Foundation we have invested £5 million in 1,600 local community projects in the last 15 years through grants and loans. This money has been given to us by private individuals, businesses, trusts, schools and other bodies and, amongst many other projects, we have used it to help set up or sustain credit unions, day centres, Dial-A-Ride car schemes, foodbanks, sports clubs and youth centres. Donors can use us to give to whatever is their particular area of interest, which can save them the hassle of setting up and maintaining their own charity or trust.

Fortunately, one of the things that make Buckinghamshire such a special place for us to live and work is that our local communities are thriving. We have twice as many charities per head of population than the national average. Buckinghamshire is a wealthy county in terms of average household income, it is the third wealthiest county in the country. But the wealth in Buckinghamshire also camouflages the poverty and deprivation that exists on our doorstep. Did you know that 35% of children in Micklefield in High Wycombe

live in poverty whereas, just 10 minutes up the road in Penn the child poverty rate is as low as 5%? And on the Elmhurst estate in Aylesbury life expectancy at birth is 13 years lower than in Gerrards Cross South!

One of the reasons why people choose to give through the Foundation is because we have unique access to the government's Community First Endowment Match Scheme which can increase the value of donations by an extra 50%. What's more, the ratio of our total costs to total income is less than 20%. Well done girls and welcome to Young Reporters!

From the Girls

We get changed into waterproof suits and our wellies. Then we get into partners and walk to the forest. When we get to the end of the road we hold hands and get into a big line and the teacher goes in the middle.

We cross the road and after that we silently go and watch the chipmunks at Pete's house.

We get into a circle under the oak tree at the entrance to the woods and do the safety rules. We have eight safety rules like 'Twigs bounce back' and 'hands out of pockets'.

A HERO IN NAPHILL

At 10.00 on 6th June 1944 Ron Crutchfield of Naphill stepped from a landing craft into the sea off Sword beach in Normandy. He was in the second wave of British soldiers on D-Day. He carried a 0.303 rifle, 50 rounds of ammunition, two Bren gun magazines and a few grenades. He was an infantryman of the Shropshire Regiment. He went on to participate in the attack on Caen, which took six weeks (it was defended by a Panzer division). His regiment then fought the German army through northern France, Belgium and Holland then



into Germany. He finished up at the end of the war in Bremen in north Germany. He was aged 19 years 7 months when he stepped ashore. He will be 90 on 4th November.

There may be others in Naphill and Walter's Ash who landed in Normandy 70 years ago on D-Day, but I am unaware of them. All I can say is "Well done Ron, you are a hero"

Hughenden Parish Council Report

First of all, huge congratulations to the Napfest organising committee for the extremely successful three day event this year. The marquee concept certainly proved itself and as always, it is the tireless efforts of so many volunteers that allow the rest of us to have such a good time, so thank you to all those that made it possible.

We would also like to congratulate Ben Pease, a pupil at Naphill and Walters Ash School who featured in the BFP recently. As you will see from the photo, he has achieved the amazing distinction of being the first Cub in recent District history to have been awarded every badge – a future Chief Scout in the making!

We have previously mentioned that we have set up a liaison group with the RAF. This led to a tour of their site facilities at the beginning of June, some of which are open to the wider community such as their coffee shop and children's soft play area, the outside play area and the sports fields. Although some of these are not accessible by car, they are by foot and the RAF is keen to ensure that villagers are aware of them. They are also seeking funding to create more parking opposite the school entrance which will have a huge benefit for parents. In the meantime, we would ask that parents respect the parking restrictions both by the school

and by the sports fields as there have been completely unwarranted cases of RAF staff being abused when trying to point out some of the very poor parking instances.

I decided to be a bit of an Henri Cartier-Bresson - with a name like that you might think it should have been on sale at the Fete Bar - but he's really a photographer, famous for capturing 'the decisive moment'. I combined my Cartier-Bresson with a bit of Martin Parr, a photographer famous for very colourful photographs of 'the English'. Have a look on the web to see some of their work - inspirational stuff.

The cover pictures were all made at the Fete. Once-loved toys from the bric-a-brac stall are the background. I did get a few funny looks as I arranged Looby Lou and Tigger but I thought to myself, 'who cares, live on the edge, this is fete day!' The other pictures were taken by permission; in other words, I asked if I could take the pictures. People's enthusiasm to join in allowed us to create some great pictures together. At first, the Green 2CV was a bit aloof, but it is French - I mean, look at those eyelashes.

Rather than 'Hints and Tips', I thought I'd give you my approach to this sort of photography. If it's people you're photographing, you need to talk to them, get them to join in and guide them to 'squeeze in closer'; and you need to get in close. On your camera, you need to be able to choose a large lens aperture - it's those 'f-stops' again - so that backgrounds go fuzzy. For cars, look out for details such as shiny headlights with droopy eyelids, or badges and engine bits. Get in close and look for strong compositions. I asked a Jaguar owner if I could photograph his wheel-nuts and he was tickled that I wanted to. Asking if I could

photograph his set of shiny spanners finished him off! They made great pictures.

By the time you get to read this it will be very old news, - but I need to get this written while the contents of our meeting are still fresh in my memory. Memory isn't what it was unfortunately. Some of you can empathize.

Claire and Ian from the fete committee came over to report back to us about Napfest. What a wonderful weekend, and what a great addition the concert and classic car event were. As with any new venture lessons have been learnt, but the decision to have the marquee really came into its own as soon as the procession arrived and the heavens opened. Our thanks do go to all the committee for all their hard work and I know that plans are underway for next year. Can't wait. It is sad that the procession is now only composed of two floats with the rest being walking tableaux. Friends of Naphill Common

Following a meeting with those involved, things are now much clearer about the impending felling on the Common. Because the Common is an SSSI Grade 1, the landowner, Sir Edward Dashwood (West Wycombe Estate) has had to gain permission from English Nature to fell up to 30% of the trees. The work will be carried out by Wessex Woodland Management (WWM) in a series of phases and the first phase is intended to begin in early September of this year and be completed by Christmas.

As the map on the opposite page shows, phase 1 will include an area along the boundary with Bradenham Woods (The Coppice), extending out as far as Heyshams, together with work on some of the main paths and bridleways: a triangle formed by H12/BW84, H21, part of H2/BW85 and H18/BW. On these paths

or rides they will widen and clear them by cutting back the small trees, scrub and especially the invasive holly. They intend to do the work on the rides first before starting on the main area of felling. The timber will be piled up beside the track near the end of Forge Road and will remain there for up to a year before being removed. Most of the work will be done by a two-man team with experience of the kind of sensitive approach required on Sites of Special Scientific Interest.

We were asked to mark with (temporary) green paint those trees that we wanted to preserve and WWM have accepted our choices. We also marked a few trees around some of the ponds with red paint and WWM will remove those. Of course, they will not cut down all of the unmarked trees but will select up to 30%; choosing those that are saleable and which give the remaining trees the best chance to grow. They have agreed to consult us and keep us informed during the felling, and the Forestry Commission representative will also keep an eye on what is going on.

There will be a meeting at the end of phase 1, at which we have been invited, to discuss how the project has gone and resolve any problems. It is intended to start phase 2 after a year-long gap, in September 2016. It is likely to cover a similar area of the Common and we will be asked to mark the trees to be preserved as before. This will be followed by other phases at similar intervals, until the whole Common has been covered. As you can see, the felling is going to take many years to complete.

Obviously, there are mixed opinions about all this. Some will not want the Common touched but, given that permission has been granted by Natural England, it is important that we get the best possible outcome for the Common and for those who enjoy it. There are several positive aspects: we will have wider, more open rides; the fine trees will be saved and relieved of competition from the smaller specimens; the ponds will be opened up and should prosper with more light, and the few remaining junipers will be given a chance to survive. We should achieve a healthier, more bio-diverse common with an open area for the return of the juniper cuttings taken from the surviving old bushes. There are worries: we want to ensure that there is an enduring management plan that stops the rides reverting to scrub once more and which keeps the holly in check, and we want permission from Natural England to allow us to return the ponds to health.

Over all, it is a positive picture. If all goes well Naphill Common will emerge from years of neglect and will be cared for in a way that preserves its ecology and ensures that we can enjoy it into the future.



From Our Methodist Minister

“What if God had not been on our side?” begins Psalm 124. And reminds the reader of the narrow escape of their ancestors across the miraculously dried-up Red Sea, when being pursued by Pharaoh’s mighty army. If God had not been on our side, we would have been cut to pieces by the enemy, or drowned in the returning seawaters.

Life is full of “what ifs”. If our past circumstances had been only slightly different, we might not have been in anything like our present situation. “Luck of the draw!”, say some. “Kismet, Hardy” said the dying Nelson (but probably mis-quoted). “Tough!” we might say today, or “You lucky so-and-so!”

If we’ve had a lucky escape, or maybe a near miss, or we’ve been let off from the expected consequences of our actions, naturally we’re relieved and thankful. It’s easy to empathise with the sentiments in Psalm

124 “We’ve escaped like a bird from the hunter’s trap! Thank God!”

We’ve heard a lot this year about World War 1, and although some good came out of it, the cost in terms of human suffering was utterly dreadful. No doubt there were some who thought God was on their side, others who hoped so, and others who prayed so. And that would include combatants and civilians in every country involved. In the hell of battle, many would wonder that God could allow such carnage, let alone be on anybody’s side. And afterwards there would be much pontificating by pundits and people as to whether it had been a “just war”, and who had been “right”, and whether that was proven by the outcome. One could speak similarly of every war ever since, and never has there been total agreement.

The ancient Israelites of bible times were people who in principle wanted to do what was right before God, but like most people before and since, they sometimes got things badly wrong. They’d then see the disasters

of life (and wars) as God's punishment, designed to steer them back to right ways, but any unexpected or undeserved good fortune, they saw as God affirming His love for them, in spite of their ungodly actions.

In our increasingly litigious society, we are keen to apportion blame, and declare one person (usually oneself!) as right and another as in the wrong, whereas any neutral observer would see a complicated mixture of motives: lots of shades grey, and any verdict less clear-cut.

In the current horrors in Gaza, the descendants of the Psalm-writers, are no doubt hoping that God is still on their side, but onlooking nations are less convinced. Certainly as with WW1 and every conflict, there will be immense relief when it is over, but then the pontificating will take its place.

The bible gives much valuable advice and commandment about rights and wrongs, but perhaps more valuable still is the perception that God loves and cares, in spite of our shortcomings, and demonstrates restraint rather than immediate reaction. And that is valid for the individual as well as for tribes and nations.

Obituary - Dennis Edward Brown

10 January 1920 – 25 June 2014



Dennis was born in Naphill in 1920 and continued to live in the village all his life. During the last 90 of his 94 years he lived in Downley Road in four different houses. His life in Naphill was interrupted by six years in the armed services during the Second World War when he worked in radar. He spent three years in Italy and was demobbed in 1946.

In 1947 Dennis joined Hamnett Raffety in High Wycombe which in later years was known as Raffety Buckland. He enjoyed 43 years of his working life at this successful estate agency and was a commercial surveyor responsible for planning applications.

He married Celia Smith from High Wycombe in 1949 and they celebrated 60 years of marriage in 2009, the year before Celia passed away. They had two children, Roger and Sue.

He was an active sportsman and played cricket and football for Naphill. He enjoyed meeting people and was very social.

He was an active freemason and was a member of Shelburne Lodge which he joined in 1963 and held the office of Worshipful Master in 1975.

Dennis lived in his own home until the end of May when he went into hospital and passed away after a

short illness. He was very lucky to have enjoyed such a long and healthy life and he remained interested in everything that happened in the world. He always had an opinion and liked to tell a story.

He is survived by his brother John, son Roger, daughter-in-law Sue, granddaughter Mel, daughter Sue and son-in-law Roger.



For each of the last two years I've been especially busy throughout August, and particularly so just 12 months ago when we were selecting our new Clerk to Hughenden Parish Council (HPC) and trying to fairly respond to requests for information on a number of matters, which involved many additional meetings, and scrutiny of a mountain of email messages. This year, however, at least at the time of writing this article, circumstances are allowing most of us to enjoy the weather, and have a mental break from Parish affairs. The exception is that of HPC's Planning Committee, which continues to keep an eye on proposed business or residential developments in the area on a regular basis, whatever the time of year.

The next Full Council meeting is on 9th September, and it's worth mentioning that any Parishioner can attend that, or indeed any of our various Committee meetings. If you haven't previously come to see what goes on then please think about coming!

In the autumn a number of important topics will be further discussed, which might have long-term implications for the local community. In particular, you may have seen comments relating to the initiative by Bucks County Council (BCC) to transfer the provision of various services from them to Parish and Town Councils. We are still waiting for detailed information from BCC before coming to any conclusion. The services being discussed include cutting back grass verges, keeping road signs visible, and so on. The longer we wait for the additional details the more likely it is that the decision about whether HPC should take on the responsibility for such services will not occur until after the elections in May 2015.

If you might want to put your name forward to be a Parish Councillor, I'd suggest that you contact one or more existing HPC Councillors, to get a realistic view of what it entails. There is no doubt that for some the energy and time involvement can conflict with business, social or domestic commitments. The driving force, however, is almost always that we can do things 'for the benefit of the community', but it's still been nice to have that break over the last few weeks!

Picture This

A few years ago, driving down Coombe Lane, I saw across the valley the most stunning fields of poppies. An explosion of rich red poppy fields stretched the full length of Valley Road. More beautiful than being simply awesome, this was autious*. I knew that within a few days, the poppies would be gone. Seeing something so dramatic, it's easy to grab the camera and start shooting. Sometimes that urgency works; sometimes it's essential. But mostly, thinking and responding to what's in front of you works best of all.

I needed a plan. For landscapes, soft light works best; so for me, that means early morning or evening. These fields face west so mornings wouldn't work as the hill behind the poppies would block the rising sun. So, I judged that 19.00 would be the best time. As the sun was setting, I wanted to watch the shadow of Naphill creep up the poppy-field so that I could judge when to press the shutter. I also needed insect repellent and bite-proof clothing. Horseflies as big as bats need industrial strength repellent. Small dogs and children bounce off the stuff I use and I covered up well. I went to the field for 5 evenings and on one, a breathtaking sky appeared. I had to work fast; the sky was constantly changing and the hill's shadow was bolting up the hill. Changing films every 12 pictures - yes films still - meant keeping Horseflies posing for 'selfies' out of the camera. Over the 5 evenings I probably made just 100 pictures. This month's cover is one of them.

So my first tip this month is use DEET. Without it, I

couldn't have made those 100 pictures. I apologise to the residents of Cryers Hill for any influx of Horseflies which were driven out of the fields.

My second tip is go to exhibitions. In August I went to a London exhibition - Silent Exchange - by Charlie Waite, one of the great landscape photographers. His words accompanied the exhibition.

Some days ago, the hazy pre-dawn found me on the edge of a field waiting for the strengthening light to develop and provide contrast; it was one of the loveliest waiting periods I have known. During the hour or so, and remaining in the same position, I entered into what felt like a heightened world of closeness to everything. Observing the sky and its capricious nature is par for the course for me but, on that morning, my sky was full of misty continents and beautiful drifting cloud. Below, hares, pheasants, foxes and a thousand conversations from birds filled me to the brim with silent joy in which all the questioning disappeared. I remained there, smiling, transported away from my concerns and myself. I knew in my core that the need to no longer be so dislocated from the natural world is of paramount importance for all of us." Enjoy your photography.

A Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Having moved to Naphill from an area of London where dog fouling in public areas was an all-too-common occurrence, I have been disappointed to find lazy and selfish dog owners at large in this community, too.

I live alongside the common and had envisaged that the woods would be a wonderful playground for my young son and his friends. In fact, they are a minefield of dog excrement with a significant number of dog walkers routinely failing to pick up after their animals.

Several owners have volunteered to me that they 'allow' their dogs to foul in the 'undergrowth' and evidently don't even come prepared with bags should their animals be caught short on the paths or tracks. I can literally count on the fingers of one hand the number of times I have seen a dog walker carrying a poo bag over the past two years. Conversely, just about every single walk or cycle ride I have been on in the woods has been marred by dog excrement on the path.

I have seen innumerable instances of dog walkers busily chatting to companions or on their mobile phone, mindless of what their charge is doing. A teenager walking a dog put herself at such a distance from her pet's evidently deeply embarrassing toilet in the long grass that she couldn't have a hope of finding the results. I've seen a woman pick up in the lane only to later fling the poop into the bushes. People walking several dogs at once merrily let them off the lead as soon as they are safe from traffic and can't possibly keep an eye on them all at once – they don't even try, in my experience.

I cannot understand why people seek out a beauty spot (an AONB and an SSSI, to boot) only to spoil it for themselves as well as everybody else.

The presence of a dog waste bin doesn't seem to make any difference with the track to the woods from the allotments regularly despoiled even though there is a bin for dog waste right next to the gate.

A number of times our garden has even been fouled

by other people's dogs. Recently, we were there to witness a particularly unpleasant instance and when the negligent owner was asked to pick up after his pet, he couldn't, as he didn't carry a bag – "not in the woods". We provided him with one and found it later thrown into the trees by the edge of the track alongside our house – the contents spilling out – a stone's throw from the homes of four young children.

Apart from being harmful to the ecology, and downright unpleasant to anyone with the misfortune to come into contact with it, dog excrement is, of course, a serious health hazard. My husband works with someone who lost the sight in one eye as a child as a result of toxocariasis.

I am sure the vast majority of these dog owners would never consider allowing their animals to foul The Crick (or the pavement or verge outside theirs or their neighbours' houses) yet evidently don't consider the woods (and the fields and lanes beyond) to be our children's rightful playground. Shame on them.

The Village Hall Council resumed after the summer break apparently sooner than many of our members. We had several apologies with folks still enjoying the holiday period so were not able to cover as much as usual but it did mean that we got home a bit earlier.

The fete committee have managed to finalise their accounts and so were able to present us with a very welcome cheque from the proceeds of Napfest. We are reliant on the fete and the fireworks as the two main fund-raisers during the year to boost our funds and so were very grateful to them for all their hard work. The Hall is in constant need of repair and improvements which are costly so we do rely on these sources for income. 

At our meeting on Monday, September 8th, we were fortunate to have Rosalind Wates to give us an

illustrated talk on 'Mosaics'. Rosalind very kindly stepped in at the eleventh hour when our scheduled speaker cancelled. She explained a little about the history of mosaic and ran through some slides of Greek and Roman examples of mosaic, the art of creating images with small pieces of coloured glass, stone and other materials. Most mosaics are created by using small, flat, roughly square, pieces of stone or glass of different colours, known as 'tesserae'. Rosalind herself has accomplished a substantial amount of commissioned work but now mainly works with children at schools and offers mosaic courses engaging with both beginners and experienced mosaicists. Slides of examples of her work were beautiful and she also brought along some smaller pieces so that we could see first-hand how they were all put together. Resident in Buckinghamshire, she has a few courses planned near Thame, Great Missenden and Didcot, which may give those artistic types among us food for thought. An interesting and talented lady.

Friends of Naphill Common

We have been alerted to a patch of Japanese Knotweed on the South West end of the Common, about 35 yards out from Bee Hive Cottage. On inspection it proved to be a larger patch than we thought – about half a tennis court in size. This alien weed is a serious pest and needs to be eliminated wherever it appears. We have contacted the landowner, Sir Edward Dashwood, and he has agreed to spray it next year, as he thinks it is too late this season. In the meantime we have cleared around the patch and are treating some by injecting a weed-killer into the stems. Many thanks to those who have helped.

By the time this appears, Wessex Woodland management will probably have started their programme of felling and clearing scrub along some of the paths. In the initial area to be felled we have marked those trees that we want to preserve and a few around the ponds that we would like to see felled. For more information, see our website and village notice boards. They will eventually fell up to 30% of the trees over the next decade and, as each new area is identified, we (or the youngsters amongst us) will again mark the trees to be saved.

Our short walks (2 to 3 miles) led by Chris Miller continue as usual. Meet at the Village Hall at 10.30am on the first

Wednesday of the month. For a longer walk (4 to 6 miles) led by Ron Collins, meet at the Village Hall at 9.30am on the third Monday of the month. They are advertised on our notice boards.

Ron reports that an addition to our normal schedule was made on 12 August. John Adsetts escorted a group of FONC members around the City of London to see some of the 52 churches designed by Sir Christopher Wren. John gave a very informative and interesting talk on each of the churches visited. As we were in the area we also visited The Postman's Park which was not scheduled to be part of the itinerary. The park contains plaques dedicated to those who have heroically lost their lives trying to save others. It was a moving experience to read the plaques detailing the lengths individuals went to, including children, in order to try and save others. If anyone has ideas about what we should be doing or criticisms of what we have done, please come along and speak up, and if you would like to join the working parties or the committee, please don't be shy.

Food for Thought

Many years ago when I was struggling to grasp slightly more advanced physics than I'd been used to at school, they introduced me to quantum physics, and then all those ideas that seemed normal and obvious suddenly became rather elusive when working at a very small scale.

A favourite example is Heisenberg's Uncertainty Principle. Now this is nothing to do with exams and not being sure how to answer the question. This Uncertainty Principle says that if you know exactly where the thing is, you cannot know how fast it is travelling, and if you know how fast it's going you can't know exactly where it is.

For those of you think you might now get let off your speeding offence, because if they know how fast you were going they can't know where you were at the time: Hard luck! It only works at very small scale (smaller than an atom, say).



Schrödinger imagined a cat locked in a sealed room with a canister of cyanide which would be triggered to burst open by a single click from a Geiger counter, and the clicks come randomly from a radioactive source, on average about once an hour, but could be shorter or longer times, completely randomly. After an hour, is the cat alive or dead?

Clearly the cat cannot be both dead and alive! The experimenter can hold both possibilities in mind until the room is opened, but the poor cat can be in only one state or the other!

But it seems the equivalent tiny particle at the quantum scale can be in two different states at the same time, except if you so much as look at it, it can flip to the other state, so you can't actually tell! Crazy! Counter-intuitive! But such uncertainty is a fundamental feature of the universe.

I'm writing this to you before the Scottish independence referendum. The outcome will be historic and important (though maybe not so world-shattering as some pundits would have it!). At the moment it is difficult to predict, and the outcome uncertain, but in a few days' time and before you get to read this, the votes will have been counted, and some people will be delighted and others disappointed. And some might say Crazy!

At the moment I could take a guess and write as though the vote will go one way, and risk looking silly if it goes the other way. Or else I must live with that uncertainty, and not be too specific! No doubt the politicians will have two speeches prepared: one for victory and one for defeat, though they might not admit to having the latter, and will keep it well tucked up their sleeve.

The bible says a lot about faith, for example: "Faith is being sure of the things we hope for, and certain of things we cannot see". (Hebrews 11 verse 1). Some of us are very sure about matters where others are doubtful or totally disbelieving. If you believe something, then you will live as though it is true. If it actually is not true, all the believing in the world will not make it true, but those who believe it (mistakenly) may well continue to believe until they see (and accept) evidence to the contrary. On the other hand, if you believe something and live life to the full believing it, and it turns out to be true, then you have had the very best in life.

This is how it is with faith in Christ (or I suppose some believe with other faiths too): certainty is not provable during this lifetime, and afterwards is too late! One can live in faith and hope, in the face of some uncertainty, but one can certainly live!

Picture This

Smalldean in late summer with autumn just around the corner is the cover picture this month. A tranquil, restful and very English scene. You can sense the warmth of the sun and hear the delicate hum of bees foraging in the purple knapweed. But don't get too comfortable because we are going to get technical.

Last month's cover attracted lots of comment and an email requesting information about the technicalities involved in making the picture. It said:

'I have just bought a new camera with a few extra lenses. I'm playing around with it as a basic amateur. I want to ask you what settings you took the picture on, what aperture and did you have to adjust the ISO or anything else as I was seriously impressed with the picture. If it's a trade secret, don't worry, just curious.'

There is no trade secret - just a blend of art and science and so this month I thought I'd let those two very English characters, Holmes and Watson, sleuth their way through the technicalities of this month's cover.

What have we here, Holmes? A very normal scene I think.'

Watson peered through his magnifying glass.

"See here, Holmes. Everything is in focus from the grass in the foreground to the cows in the distance. A small aperture must have been used. Yet some of the flower heads are blurred suggesting they moved. That means a long shutter speed and that means.... a tripod was at work!"

All of Watson's deductions were correct; f16.3 for 1 second and a tripod.

Watson continued. "And Holmes, if a long shutter speed was needed on such a sunny day, the ISO of the film must have been very low".

"Brilliant, Watson. In fact, I suspect an effective ISO of 11. But there's more tricky stuff here. Look how balanced the brightness of the late summer sky and the shaded grasses and flowers appear. This is the work of an artist, Watson, and one who has managed to dim down the brightest parts."

"I don't understand Holmes, first you say the work of an artist and then say 'dumb down'"

"Dim down, Watson"

"Sorry, Holmes. So our photographer has dimmed down the brightest parts using something like sunglasses for a camera."

"Correct, Watson. He or she used a Neutral Density filter on the sky and, I have my suspicions, another on the crop field."

"You mean 2 ND filters were used, Holmes? Surely this alchemy is the devil's work"

"No Watson, science. He or she must have measured the brightness carefully with a light measuring device and chosen the strength of the 2 ND filters"

Holmes was right. A light meter was used and a 0.6 ND chosen for the sky and a 0.45 ND for the crop field.

"Look at the sky, Holmes, the clouds stand out and the sky is so blue. What does that suggest?"

"Are you clueless, Watson?"

"No dear boy, I'm Doctor Watson. You're confusing me with my cousin from Norfolk!"

"Mmmmh. Yes, it's a clue. It looks like a sky seen through polarising sunglasses. Which means he used a polariser Watson. And don't mention your cousin from Alaska!"

"You're a genius, Holmes"

"Elementary art and science, my dear Watson. Pass my pipe, I want to die early"

So, my first tip for this month is look carefully for technical clues. But remember: the light will never be the same twice nor will the strength of the breeze nor the many other aspects of the natural scene. Don't let your search for technical information blind you to the beauty of the picture nor your artistic interpretation of what you see before you.

My second tip is to visit a once in a lifetime exhibition of photographs by Horst P Horst showing at the Victoria & Albert Museum until February 2015. If you don't know who Horst P Horst is, get your magnifying glass. An amazing photographer.

Where does the time go? The summer break now seems long behind us and with the evenings drawing in and the leaves beginning to fall, autumn seems to be here already.

We have some key issues for the Council to resolve over the next couple of months. The first is the completion of the transfer of most of our allotments to the Allotments for the Labouring Poor (AfLP) charity. Some of you may have seen a notice posted onto the Council website: if you have not, we would urge you to read it if you have access to the internet as it fully explains the situation. The allotments run by the Council have, it appears, been in the wrong hands for many years as they were originally set up under a charity – the AfLP. Despite the fact that the Council has maintained these since time immemorial, the Charities Commission has insisted they must be handed back to the AfLP for management by the Trustees, a position supported by legal advice we have obtained from a leading barrister. We have therefore been going through a torturous negotiation process for the last couple of years to enable this to happen whilst ensuring that allotment holders see no change in their provision. At times acrimonious, the negotiations seem to be reaching a conclusion and all further debate between the AfLP Trustees and the Council will now be held on an open and transparent basis rather than in the confidential manner in which they have been held until now. The Council's primary aim is to ensure that the provision of allotments is not in any way affected by this transition to AfLP ownership and we believe that we are on course to achieve this.

The second issue is the re-distribution of the Parish

Plan questionnaire. As we have previously mentioned, the large proportion of non-deliveries earlier this year by the Bucks Free Press has led to a need to try again. We felt it was best to wait until after the summer break so you can expect a new questionnaire to be delivered sometime soon – this time by hand under Council control! The questions will be the same, albeit laid out a more clearly, and we would urge you to complete and return in the envelope provided UNLESS you completed and returned the previous version.

Our work continues to try and resolve the parking issues around the Coop. This is a slow process but has seen some recent success due to the efforts of Peter Williams who has now managed to at least get the Coop delivery lorries to avoid parking across the pavement under threat from PC Lee Turnham of the consequences if they continued. However, safety continues to be a problem not helped by some appalling parking by Coop shoppers who feel they have a right to park any way they wish despite the dangers and obstructions they cause. PLEASE park with consideration and think in particular about pedestrians with pushchairs and other motorists trying to reverse out or drive past.

Finally, we are sad to announce the resignation of Emma Marsden, our long standing Deputy Clerk who has secured the position of Clerk with Little Marlow Parish Council and will therefore be leaving us in October. Emma has a wealth of experience and knowledge of the Parish and will be greatly missed and I am sure you will join us in thanking her for her contribution to the Parish over the years and wish her well for the future.

Bradenham Parish Council

Buckinghamshire County Council is devolving certain powers next year to Town and Parish Councils, in particular, grass cutting and hedge cutting (in the 30mph zones) and Rights of Way maintenance. The parish council decided to enter into a cluster led by Princes Risborough Town Council who will take on these services and carry them out for us at a reasonable cost.

Traffic calming in Bradenham village was discussed again following a meeting with Transport for Buckinghamshire. The additional work to encourage speed reduction is costly and it will require deep pockets to pay for this. Some work has been carried out, but TfB are being chased to replace the centre white line on the 60 mph zone of Bradenham Woods Lane. The council is very grateful to Country Supplies who have started fining lorry drivers who arrive at Shana outside the agreed opening times and are passing the fines on to the Parish Council, which will


help with the funding of our traffic calming scheme and hopefully stop lorries turning up at unscheduled times!

It was noted that the Travellers in Walter's Ash appeal to the Secretary of State was dismissed in connection with Walter's Ash. They were given four months leave to stay and then they have to move to Flackwell Heath.

We have not yet been notified when the Parish Council may have to appear before the House of Commons Select Committee in connection with the construction route for HS2.

We achieved a certificate of merit in the Best Kept Village competition: the pond area let us down.

The next meeting of the parish council will be Monday 17th November at 7pm at Bradenham Cricket Club. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

As Councillors, our diaries are quickly filling up. Apart from the regular meetings, various 'Working Groups' are starting up after the break, which do much of the hard work of discussing things prior to presenting a view to one or other of the committees, or directly to Full Council. Among the various working groups are those handling discussions with the Allotments for the Labouring Poor trustees (AflP); looking at our overall

strategy, especially what broad approach on things might be implemented after the elections in May; how communications across the Parish might be enhanced; and what road safety improvements are feasible in various parts of the Parish.

Computer Programming for the Young and Young at Heart - Part 1

Finally after 34 years in the IT Industry, it is great to see products like the Raspberry PI encouraging the young to get into software programming and not just

using the available programs. When the invasion of Microsoft technology came about originally in the 80s, more emphasis was given to using the Office products in education, which were easier to master than some of their other products. What a pity, I wished Microsoft had pushed the learning of their Visual Studio product line and programming as the first piece of the software development jigsaw. Sadly, multimedia and creativity belonged to the Apple camp.

A whole generation grew up using applications like Office, but not really understanding or appreciating how software was built. The Americans, Indians and Chinese understood this clearly and spent vast amounts of resources training their young people to develop these new skills. We need a bigger push in the UK to ensure that all people benefit from this concept. Other countries have made great strides and have had much success in pushing the technological frontiers to the masses. Although, to be fair, Dundee was recently the biggest hub for modern IT and startup culture in the UK. This has now changed and Shoreditch in London has now become the hub to have an IT startup or new business.

With the advent of the Raspberry PI, smartphones and tablets such as iPhone and Android, more children have access to great technology in a simple way and so begin to learn the fundamentals of programming. There is so much FREE resource and advice on forums and internet sites like Youtube to enable youngsters to self motivate and make the best of these opportunities.

I made the best of what the Conservative Government offered on a Youth Opportunities Programme in 1980 and managed to do 6 months at The Economist and a further 6 months at Wang UK, just to get my foot in the door. No one will do it for you, it is up to oneself to pull his or her socks up and learn.

Programming will use all the skills from your other subjects at school. Mathematics, to calculate formulas. Screen size for look and feel. Design skills for apps on mobiles for example. Physics and physics engines for games playing. English language skills are essential to communicate your ideas to your peers and the people who can test what you produce. Some form of project management skills are required to ensure what you build has a structure and timeline.

Youngsters have a great imagination in which design, programming and creativity can fuel their desire to build or make technology. It is also fun. It is sad to say that girls often drop out of this subject as they get older. It would be good to see this trend reversed. In Eastern countries like China and India, there is a fair mix.

Apart from pure programming, there is work based around dealing with the person who wants the app. What are their requirements and services for this new application? Which person will project manage or test the application before showing it to the person who requested it?

The programming side of things must be the focus. How does software work? What problems can it

solve? Has anyone attempted to build a solution, but then stopped because of an issue? Can I get around this issue or change the program to work differently? Can I start programming from scratch or use existing repositories where I am free to edit and create new versions, which have excellent functionality? Yes, you can, Github is a good source, and many other open source areas on the web are also available.

Programming can be done during lunchtimes, after work and after your homework is completed. On this link for example in Youtube - <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=uGfZeJR0Apl> you will see Robert Nay, aged 14 at the time, who built 'Bubble Ball'. He would come home, finish his homework, have his dinner and then work on his app. What a success it was at such a young age. So imagine what any child at a young age is capable of doing? Fibre broadband has arrived and coverage is promised in the whole of the UK soon, so tap in and enjoy!

Programming is the building blocks of a piece of software, which can drive applications to perform a variety of tasks in a company or specific functionality in an app. Today, mobile apps and technology are spreading rapidly. Smartphones like iPhone or Android, are enabling normal functionality to be channeled through one device. For example using a camera, torch, banking, games, utilities, Facebook or Twitter can be nicely delivered and interacted by people very quickly.

The children of today are often the drivers of technology amongst households (unless their parent(s) are computer techies). Youngsters are the technology natives and parents are the technology immigrants as written by Marc Prensky (<http://www.marcprensky.com/writing/Prensky%20-%20Digital%20Natives,%20Digital%20Immigrants%20-%20Part1.pdf>). Paper usage is out of fashion for most youngsters: it is all digital. Spend a little time playing games and lots of time programming. Imagine, if you started at the

age of 10 by the time you were 20 you would have gained 10 years of computing skills and experience in building software.

There are so many languages children can learn, Python, Lua, PHP, C, C++, Java, C# (pronounced C sharp). There are tools that don't require programming, but work in a different way to produce an app or game. Even though these languages maybe difficult for older folk to learn, to children, these are much easier as they love learning. Anyone, if they choose, can learn to program, design and produce a product either as a hobby or for commercial purposes. Go on have a go.

Friends of Naphill Common

The Gazette often goes out by the last weekend of the previous month. In this case, if you would like a walk on the Common alongside some experts, please join our Fungus Foray on Sunday 26th October, starting from the Village Hall at 10am. The Common is rich in fungi, some of which are quite rare. Children are welcome to help us in the hunt. Let's hope it is a dry day this time.

Our short walks (2 to 3 miles) led by Chris Miller continue as usual. Meet at the Village Hall at 10.30am on the first Wednesday of the month. For a longer walk (4 to 6 miles) led by Ron Collins, meet at the Village Hall at 9.30am on the third Monday of the month. They are advertised on our notice boards.

West Wycombe estate has agreed to treat the Japanese Knotweed on the Common next year. However, a group of us worked around the boundary of the clump, meticulously injecting a weed-killer into the larger stems. This is a lengthy procedure which makes it less practical with large areas of the weed, but we understand that this is the most effective way of killing this deep-rooted plant. Recent inspection shows that those plants we treated are dying, so we may have prevented the clump from growing any larger.

The felling by Wessex Woodland Management (WWM) is well underway and they assure us that they will soon start clearing the rides. Several people have contacted FONC asking whether we can get the company to fell particular trees. Of course, FONC has no authority to ensure that the problem is attended to, but in each case we have passed on the request to WWM. As you will have seen from the maps on our noticeboards and in the Gazette, this year the felling is restricted to an area along the boundary with Bradenham Woods (The Coppice) so it is unlikely that WWM will agree to felling elsewhere unless the trees are considered dangerous.

The summer is over and autumn is upon us, but one consolation is the brilliant colours before the trees shed their leaves. The oaks cannot compete with the beech and birch trees for brilliance but they have a subtle beauty of their own. Being a self-generated wood there is great genetic variety, and one oak keeps its leaves until after Christmas, many remaining green. See if you can spot it. Our fine common is there for all to enjoy.

Our open meeting (with a speaker) and AGM will be on Friday 13th February 2015 at 7.30pm Please come along: we hope to see a full village hall as usual. If anyone has ideas about what we should be doing or criticisms of what we have done, please come along and speak up, and if you would like to join the working parties or the committee, please put your name forward.



Remembrance Sunday 9th November 2014

This year 2014 marks the centenary of the commencement of the First World War.

On 4th August this year, Poppy Wreaths were laid at many War Memorials throughout the County to mark the Declaration of War against Germany, Britain's involvement being hastened by the invasion of Belgium on that fateful day. Many young men from this and neighbouring villages signed up with the armed forces, ten of them from Naphill failed to return and we are reminded of their sacrifice every year at the War Memorial on the corner of Downley Road. They are still in the memory of older residents who would have been familiar with the veterans of that war, indeed there were few families who did not have a close relative who had been on active service. Naphill's unusual war memorial was constructed from Denner Hill stone and built in the form of a cairn. It was largely the idea of Sydney Piercy who favoured a secular monument; its present well kept appearance is a tribute, not only to those whom it commemorates but also to the village itself.

Unfortunately, the 'war to end wars' did not stop with the Armistice in 1918, and 21 years later we were at war again with Germany, where Naphill & Waters Ash lost another two of its sons. We still have several local veterans of the 39-45 War amongst us and we owe them all a great debt of gratitude for keeping this country free from servitude. Even today, we have local RAF men and women who have served, and still serve, in Iraq and Afghanistan and who put their lives at risk in the service of their country.

On 9th November we will remember the 1.7 million Commonwealth Service men and women who died in both world wars, at 23,000 locations in 153 countries (figures supplied by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission).

The first Two Minute Silence took place in London and was reported in the Manchester Guardian with the following statement:

"The first stroke of eleven produced a magical effect. The tram cars glided into stillness, motors ceased to cough and fume, and stopped dead, and the mighty-limbed dray horses hunched back upon their loads and stopped also, seeming to do it of their own volition. Someone took off his hat, and with a nervous hesitancy the rest of the men bowed their heads also. Here and there an old soldier could be detected slipping unconsciously into the posture of 'attention'. An elderly woman, not far away, wiped her eyes, and the man beside her looked white and stern. Everyone stood very still ... The hush deepened. It had spread over the whole city and become so pronounced as to impress one with a sense of audibility. It was a silence which was almost pain ... And the spirit of memory brooded over it all."

When we stand at our Memorial Stone on the 9th November we should think of those who so selflessly gave their lives so that we can live in freedom.

Memories of Naphill C of E School

From Jean Lawrence-Mann

I was born in a cottage very near to the school, which was on the corner of Louches Lane, and started there just before my fourth birthday. The school bell rang loud and clear and we assembled on the front path, boys on one side and girls opposite. We were greeted by the head and marched into school. The three classrooms were divided by partitions, with a separate room for the infants, and the place was heated by 'Tortoise' stoves fed by wood and coke. One hour every morning was devoted to scripture, with an annual prize for the best scholar awarded by the Bishop of Oxford. Also each year Mrs Coningsby Disraeli came to judge the needlework and award prizes.



Once a year the girls went to the Village Hall for domestic science. That was great fun, especially the toffee-making. The boys had gardening: the plots were part of the school grounds, now The Glebe. My favourite lesson was sports. Every Friday afternoon there was netball, cricket, 'stall ball', hockey and football. The local farmer's wife sometimes supplied homemade ginger beer for the netball team. Quite a treat! Mid-morning we had a short break when we ran wild in the playground. Games included chasing, skipping, marbles, tops, leapfrog and sevens, which was a ball game against the wall.


Toilets were somewhat primitive! Each week a man called Happy West collected the buckets of excreta in a large barrel which he took away on a handcart. I'm not sure where he took it, possibly the local allotments.

I remember a new head being appointed, presumably to improve the discipline, and to our surprise it was a female. One boy exclaimed "It's a bloomin' woman!" which the new head overheard and replied "Yes, and I'll show you I'm in charge" and promptly marched him into the school and administered the cane along with a lecture on manners. Most of us were scared of her and I remember having a good shaking when I refused to divulge the names of some ex-pupils who had borrowed the cricket gear one evening without permission. (One of them was my brother!)

I shall never forget my years at the school and regret that such a lovely old building has been lost for future generations. I think Naphill has lost something of its character with the demolition.

In my old school album, I have a list of school attendances for 1905, during which year the school was open on 207 days [compared to today's 195 – ed]. Awards were given not only for the best attendances but also for good behaviour and diligence. The list is headed by Edgar Grimsdell who didn't miss a single day and the worst was Thomas West who was absent on 12 days. The records show that in 1911 the children collected money to buy a large Union flag to send to the state school in Hughenden, Queensland, Australia in exchange for a commonwealth flag.

Tarmac Driveway created on Naphill Common at Braeside

Great concern has been expressed that no approach to Wycombe District Council nor Natural England was made before this development was undertaken. Naphill Common is an SSSI and SAC. The surface used is oil bound and there are strict rules against soil pollution. The land was purchased by a Braeside householder from the Dashwood Estate, but the Estate does not have the authority to allow a designated site to be damaged. WDC Enforcement Department, the AONB Office, the Parish Council and Friends of Naphill Common have all been notified and are investigating the matter. The precedent set could be very damaging.

You will hopefully all have now had a Parish Plan Questionnaire through your letter box by the time you receive this Gazette. This time, we have relied on shank’s pony and have hand delivered to every household. If, for some reason, you have not received one, then please do contact one of the Councillors or the Council office using the numbers at the front of the magazine. If you have received one, then the more responses we get, the more robust the conclusions will be, so please do complete and return it UNLESS you previously received and returned one the first time. You will also see that the questionnaire can be completed online, but again, please only do one or the other if you have not previously completed one.

This last couple of weeks has not been easy for N&WA residents as Coombe Lane re-surfacing has led to severe restrictions on buses and general road movement. I think everyone will agree that these were desperately needed, but it is a shame that Transport for Bucks communication process has been so poor at keeping us all informed. This has been noted by the Council who have written to TfB requesting an urgent review of their procedures to ensure we are not left in a similar state again.

Although not in our Parish, we have been monitoring progress – or lack of it – on the vacation of the Hedgerows site. This was supposed to have taken place by 6th October under an Inspectorate decision, but at the time of writing, there is no sign of any movement. WDC Planning Department have said that they are giving the gypsy family more time to prepare the Flackwell Heath site but have applied no deadline, a state of affairs we do not believe is acceptable. If you have concerns about this, please do make sure you contact the Planning Department and let them know your views.

After an exceptionally balmy Autumn, winter now seems to be looming fast and we would therefore just remind people to be aware of anyone who might need extra support as the nights close in.

A Personal Perspective

Since the elections of May 2011 I've regularly tried to give a 'feel' for what it's like to be a Parish Councillor. Now we are about six months away from the 2015 elections I hope that extracts from earlier articles in the Gazette will be of interest, particularly to those who might like to consider standing for election.

June 2011 – work to be done by a prospective Councillor When confronted with the question 'why don't you stand for the Parish Council', and after looking into it and giving the matter due thought, I couldn't think of any really good reason to avoid putting myself forward! I was encouraged to find that locally there were three others in the same boat. The initial phase was straightforward – find a proposer and seconder, and get the paperwork to Wycombe District Council.

We shared the effort of distributing election leaflets (though we still had to pay for printing costs), and my thanks go to the 10 or so friends, family members and locals who gave their time freely. It was so much easier for one person to leave leaflets at 100 or so homes rather than at 1300 homes! If you haven't 'dropped leaflets' before, the main dangers are vicious metal letterboxes and jumping dogs, either of which can snap at the tips of your fingers as you push a leaflet through the letterbox!

I was also encouraged to knock on doors, and have met many of you who are reading this letter. Apologies to the greater number that were either not in when I happened to go to a particular road, or to those who live on the roads I didn't trudge. What was uplifting was the reception I got when I introduced myself. No-one was abusive, many were supportive, and nearly all had remembered the leaflets that had already been 'dropped'. Many intended voting, some using a 'postal vote'.

July 2011 - plenty of information to sift through It is extremely useful to have access to the Internet, especially for checking on the large number of email messages that appear most days, and so far at least it has been the main way to communicate with others.

Each new Councillor receives a file of paperwork from our Clerk to the Council, which contained helpful advice about how to behave in meetings (!), policies on using email and on other useful topics. We are all given a 'Register of Interests' form which we have to complete, to ensure that we declare in advance, any potential conflict between our Parish Council activities and any of our outside interests.

September 2011 – taking part in meetings Most Council meetings take place in the Parish Office, though we are looking at the possibility of holding one per year in each of the Wards, hopefully with a room large enough for both Councillors and anyone else to more conveniently see and hear what is going on. It is good to see 'the public' at council meetings, and around 15 minutes is given over for them to comment on issues they would like the Council to subsequently consider. To try to keep some kind of order, anyone

wanting to speak should catch the Chairman's eye and wait to be asked to speak! That process has similarities with school or college debates more than bidding at an auction, and usually starts by silently raising a hand and literally making eye to eye contact with the Chairman. The meetings typically last 2 hours or so, followed by a further 30 minutes or so of informal chatting.

All the new Councillors for our Ward were pleasantly surprised to be invited to the RAF's Annual Reception. Although we live only a short distance away I for one had not realised that it happens, or what takes place. It is the RAF's opportunity to say 'thank you' to people from the broad locality (people running a business, those involved in charities, or representing local 'services', like the fire service, together with some from various levels of local government, etc), and especially because we help them to feel part of the community.

This autumn the children from Naphill and Walter's Ash School have been busy planning outdoor learning areas for the year groups. WANSAs are sponsoring each year group to create an outdoor activity to enjoy in lessons and playtimes. These are the ideas we came up with:

Year 6 have decided to construct an open air stage. The stage is planned to be made of wood but they will have to put a plastic cover over it for wet days. Then they are going to write plays and design the scenery for their performances.

In the days when we engineers all wore ties at work, my colleague would occasionally find the thin dangly end and tie a simple knot in it. When he got home and took his tie off, this extra knot would get jammed in the main knot, and remind him that he had something important he must remember. Of course, sometimes he couldn't remember what it was he was supposed to remember! And sometimes it was only when he went to bed that he took his tie off, and then it was too late at night to deal with it!

I expect most of us have devised clever ways to remember, with greater or lesser success! Certainly remembering is a vital part of life, and our hearts go out to those whose memory is failing. I do applaud all who work with Alzheimer's patients, trying to stir memories of long ago, even if what they had for lunch is completely forgotten.

A few days ago Prof John O'Keefe was awarded a Nobel Prize for his discovery of cells in the hippocampus of the brain which sense our exact location. These are crucial to remembering where we were a few seconds ago, and what we were doing there. RAF High Wycombe - Guardians of the Gate

Recently RAF High Wycombe received a brand new Hawker Hurricane Gate Guardian to replace the 30-year-old weathered damaged one that has stood proudly at the entrance of Air Command for the past 8 years.

The new aircraft was installed, assembled and commissioned by Gateguards UK Ltd. The same company who built the Mark 11A Spitfire, Gateguards UK Ltd are manufacturers and suppliers of high-quality, full size replica aircraft for museums, collectors and film industries around the world. They are based at RAF St Mawgan and can only be commended on a fantastic job.

The new state of the art model is constructed from Glass Reinforced Plastic around a galvanized steel internal structure and will easily outlive the 30 year life of the previous airframe. The sheer distance from RAF St Mawgan to RAF High Wycombe made it a logistical nightmare; a 600 mile round trip for the team of engineers towing a 16ft fuselage and two 8-foot wings. As well as the distance, the fuselage is classed as a wide load and had to be brought up separately to the wings, with half of the team bringing the wings the day before and taking the opportunity to clean and repaint parts of the Spitfire.

As the Airframe came up in separate parts it needed to be constructed in situ which was no easy feat. After construction the Hurricane was lifted by a specialist team from M and M crane hire and GateGuards UK, and lowered onto the steel pins to hold it in place. All in all it was in a process that took 10 hours from start to finish, and that doesn't even include the travelling time!

The Hurricane

The Hurricane gate guardian is actually a full size model and not as previously recorded a two thirds scale model. It is painted in the colours of No. 242 Squadron which was famously flown by Douglas Bader. The Hurricane aircraft that the model is based upon entered service in 1940, and completed fighter air operations in Northern France.

Douglas Bader's Hurricane

During the Battle of Britain, Bader used three Hawker Hurricanes. The first was P3061, in which he scored six air victories. The second aircraft was unknown, but Bader did score one victory and two damages in it on 9th September 1940. The third was V7467, in which he destroyed four more and added one probable and two damaged by the end of September. The machine was lost on 1st September 1941 while on a training exercise.

On 12th December 1940, Bader was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his services during the Battle of Britain. His unit No. 242 Squadron had claimed 62 aerial victories. Bader was gazetted on 7th January 1941. By this time, he was an acting Squadron Leader.

Journey of the Old Hurricane

The previous Hurricane started its life at RAF Coltishall and represented the base's vital role in the Battle of Britain. The fibreglass model, which was on display since 1989,

was positioned just behind the gatehouse to the base as a reminder of its glorious second world war past.

When Coltishall closed in 2006 the replica Hawker Hurricane was transferred to RAF High Wycombe to do 'gate duties' at the then Strike Command headquarters.

However this isn't the end for the 30-year-old Hurricane as it will be given a new lease of life! Post restoration it will stand proudly once more as RAF Cosford's new Gate Guardian.

The Spitfire

The restored and repainted replica Supermarine Spitfire Mk IIA, built by Gateguards UK is painted in the markings of No. 41(F) Squadron RAF. It is painted in the colours of the Observer Corps and bears the insignia of the aircraft flown by Squadron Leader Donald Osborne Finlay (later Group Captain, DFC AFC) when he commanded No 41(F) Squadron at RAF Hornchurch during the Battle of Britain.

The Spitfire cost the Royal Air Force the princely sum of £1 as its purchase was sponsored by British Aerospace.

Donald Finlay

During World War II Donald Osborne Finlay initially flew Spitfires with No. 54 Squadron during the Battle of Britain before being wounded and later commanding No. 41 Squadron. He was promoted to the rank of Wing Commander in August 1941, becoming 11 Group Engineering Officer. He received the Distinguished Flying Cross in June 1942. His victory tally flying fighters was 4 shared and 2 individually destroyed, 3 shared and 1 individually damaged. He then commanded 608 Squadron flying Lockheed Hudsons in the Middle East in 1943. In 1945 he commanded 906 Wing in Burma, being awarded an Air Force Cross. He became a Group Captain in 1950.

Before and during his career he ran for Great Britain in three Olympics, both pre and post-World War II. He first competed in the 1932 Summer Olympics held in Los Angeles in the 110 metre hurdles where he won the bronze medal. Four years later he returned as British Team Captain at the 1936 Summer Olympics held in Berlin, improving to win the silver medal. In 1948, aged 39, he was selected to take the oath at the London Olympics, but missed out on the final, catching a hurdle in an earlier round.

Donald Finlay's Spitfire (P7666)

The commandant of the Observer Corps Air Commodore Warrington Morris announced that the Corps would Purchase a Spitfire to be piloted by Squadron Leader Finlay. Built by Vickers-Armstrong (Castle Bromwich) Ltd, she was donated to the RAF and then passed to 8 Maintenance Unit on 15th November 1940.

She immediately entered active service with 41(F) Sqn with the code of EB-Z as "the legend of the Observer Corps". The aircraft was flown by Squadron Leader Finlay and on the first sortie shot down an ME 109 but suffered considerable damage.

So Why Have Gate Guardians?

Gate guardians are a reminder of the RAF's heritage and a symbol of the corporate image of the Royal Air Force. I would urge you all to visit the aircraft next time you pass by RAF High Wycombe and spend a few moments to remember 'the Few'

Seven-a-Day

Happy with "five-a-day"? Well, the nutrition and health experts now say "seven-a-day". Based upon the eating habits of 65,000 people in England from 2001 to 2013 the researchers found there was a reduction in risk of dying of cancer of 25% and of heart disease of 31% for seven-a-day. For the overall risk, eating 1 to 3 portions a day of fruit and vegetables a day reduced the risk by 14%, 5 to 7 portions a day reduced the risk by 36% and 7 or more reduced the risk by 42%.

The 7 portions are each of 80 grams, so that amounts to a lot of fruit and vegetables every day – 560 grams or one pound four ounces in real money. The 7 portions should be mainly vegetables, but fruit juice is no good and canned and frozen fruit have a negative effect. Potatoes don't count for the seven-a-day.

That's quite a lot of fruit and vegetables every day. If you would like an allotment please call the parish clerk on 01494 715296.

Well done to the 'Fireworks Team' and local residents who ensured that the Crick was cleared of litter, etc. after the event on November 8th. The care that is taken of our green space is very commendable and shows how much the Crick is valued.

Parking on Pavements

The law insists that at least 1m of pavement is left accessible for pedestrians, particularly wheelchairs & double buggies. Walking round the parish has made it clear to me that drivers are not always compliant with this rule.

When you are parking please will you ensure that all fellow residents can use the pavements and they are not forced into the road, possibly with young children.

Offenders might well have photos taken of their vehicle that can be passed on to our neighbourhood police officer for possible action.

Picture This

December, the last month of the year, the first day of winter, the winter solstice and the month with the shortest hours of daylight. With that amount of gloom around, it's little wonder that we feel like hibernating until spring. But December and winter is rather special – yes, there's Christmas, but more of that later.

In December, the sun rises at a civilised hour for photography and it also rises South of East; that means that some parts of the landscape are illuminated only by the rising sun of winter. With the sun low in the sky for most of the winter days, sunlight is usually warm (more orange/red) and this winter light can help you to create beautiful pictures. And there's more. The sky can be very clear and blue and there's photography magic in this too. Away from the light of the sun, shadows pick up the blue light from the sky.

The cover picture was made in January. I'd arrived at Hughenden well before the sun had risen and recall that the thermometer showed that it was minus10; luckily there was no biting wind. The sky was almost clear blue and almost clear blue skies are a bit boring for photographs. So I searched out a composition where tree branches filled in the blanks and stuck the tripod into the snow.

First, the rising winter sun lit up the trees surrounding the manor. Next, fingers of soft red sunlight wrapped around the old vicarage at the top of the hill; it looked stunning. Then sunlight began to creep down the field towards the church. Inwardly I told myself 'Wait for the light to hit the church', 'take a lightmeter reading', 'set the shutter speed and aperture', 'recheck the lightmeter' and 'press the shutter'.

The picture shows all that I described earlier; the warmth of the winter sun making the church glow against the cold blue sky while the snow in the

shadows picks up the blue light from the sky. I hope you enjoy the picture.

Christmas. Looking at pictures is a great way to learn what works and what doesn't. So I'm recommending 3 books for Santa's sack.

- 'First Light, a landscape photographer's art' by Joe Cornish
- 'Scotland's Mountains' again by Joe Cornish
- 'Images of the Seventh Day' by Michael Kenna

First Light' is now out of print but there are slightly use copies available on Amazon. Michael Kenner's book will probably become a sought-after collectors book. I wish you a very happy Christmas and a happy, peaceful New Year

At our last meeting we were delighted to welcome Ruth Daly and Toni Green from the Scout & Guide HQ.



Hughenden Parish Council Report

The last month has been dominated by the debate over the transfer of certain allotments to the Allotments for Labouring Poor charity (AfLP). Both the Walter's Ash and Louches Lane allotments are legally required by the Charities Commission to be transferred out of HPC ownership to the AfLP. This is a saga that has been running for the last decade and as we have previously reported, is summarised in a comprehensive document available on the HPC website. What has brought it to a head this month, however, is the publication of the proposed constitution for the AfLP which states as its objective 'the relief of poverty in the parish of Hughenden' with no requirement for the maintenance of allotments. Unfortunately, none of us has had much time to comment on this but hopefully the Charities Commission will have received enough responses to understand the strength of feeling and concern that is felt in the Parish over the potential risk that comes from this constitution. The Parish Council has been working tirelessly through its AfLP Working Group to ensure that the status quo is maintained and is moving towards agreement on a long lease – possibly 99 years – to ensure that all of the sites handed over to AfLP continue in their current form and hopefully by the time this is published, this will have happened. But please be assured, OUR objective is a transfer that will ensure that the best interests of both the allotment holders and the community as a whole are maintained.

Of course, whilst all this is happening, normal Council business must continue. We are still struggling with safety measures that will improve traffic and parking at both the Post Office and the Coop area. This is taking a frustratingly long time, but we are still trying to achieve solutions that are acceptable to all. We have agreed to support the Hughenden Valley Community Shop with a grant towards the installation of a temporary cabin-type building in the car park. This will give them meeting space and will greatly enhance the social aspects of the shop. We have also agreed to the replacement of 60+ streetlight bulbs with LEDs at a cost of £17k. Mainly in Widmer End, these are street lights that HPC has always had responsibility for and this investment will lead to significant savings in both energy use and maintenance.

The deadline for returns of the Parish Plan Questionnaire has now passed and we are pleased to say that we have had an excellent response. So thank you to all those who participated and we hope to have the results collated soon after Christmas.

Following the recent departure of our Assistant Clerk Emma, we have now appointed Jill Armshaw to the position. Jill was the Clerical Assistant and has risen to the challenge admirably and we are very grateful for her commitment.

Finally, once again, we would like to congratulate the Village Hall for the magnificent fireworks and bonfire event. As always, the success of these sort of events is all down to lots of volunteers, both with the excellent organisation and help on the night and we would like to thank all who participated to give us a great evening.

Personal Perspective

Since the elections of May 2011 I've regularly tried to give a 'feel' for what it's like to be a Parish Councillor. Now we are about six months away from the 2015 elections I hope that further extracts from earlier articles in the Gazette will continue to be of interest, particularly to those who might in the end decide to stand for election.

October 2011 – working within and outside our Parish Sometimes we have to recognise that while we can suggest and even fund things (for instance, various initiatives to try to reduce the speed at which many cars career through our parish), other levels of government (like Bucks County Council) can block our path. We will keep persisting with initiatives we believe to be right, however.

We are all slowly getting used to the interplay of different levels of local government. Hugh McCarthy, for instance, is both an elected Parish Councillor for Widmer End Ward, and faced a contested election to become a Wycombe District Councillor for its ward of Hazlemere North. Three other district councillors, for Greater Hughenden Ward, however, did not have to face a contest in May, and were returned 'unopposed'. For the sake of democracy I hope that in the future, and at whatever level, there are always enough people prepared to stand for election. Perhaps it could be *you* the next time!

November 2011 – the Parish Council quietly gets on with lots of things. We were all very disappointed to be informed at our last Council meeting that there had been a large quantity of tyres fly-tipped at the Garden of Rest. Apart from the sad reflection on society that someone could do such a thing in a beautiful and dignified spot, the Council also had to pick up the cost of clearing this blight; and by 'Council money' remember that it comes from everyone in the Parish!

For nearly 30 years we lived in the Parish and I had no concept of how important the Parish Council is to all of us. So I hope you might also consider coming to one or more council or committee meetings, to see how we come to decisions or recommendations. Just contact the Parish Office for details of what's happening soon!

December 2011 – starting to make progress. Particularly for new Councillors such as myself we have spent much of the time since May getting used to what we can and cannot do, learning how we can improve the effectiveness of our various committees while encouraging discussion, selecting a new Clerk to the Council, and so on. All these have been essential, but don't expect all the ideas to be dealt with instantly!

One of several 'Working Parties' is being set up so that we can properly consider what to do to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee next year. We've already started to canvass ideas about where one or more trees might be planted in each Ward. If you have views, please let us know!

By the time you read this our Finance & Administration Committee will have held our 'Precept' meeting, roughly equivalent to other organisations working on their 'budgets' for the year to come, but there will not have been time for approval by our Full Council nor acceptance by Wycombe District Council, the next tier up in local government. This is a very important

meeting, since it will set the financial framework we have to bear in mind for the year that starts in April. By then we might be seeing 'green shoots' from a number of our committees, to supplement those that nature provides.

Friends of Naphill Common

Greetings to everyone. May you have a happy Christmas and enjoy the year ahead. To enhance that enjoyment why not come to our open meeting and AGM on Friday 13th February at the Village Hall? Doors open at 7.30pm. There will be a minimum of business but it will enable you to ask questions, make criticisms, offer advice, vote in a new committee and even offer your services on it if you would like to. We are delighted that this will be followed by a talk by local farmers, Jim and Gill Kent. What they do and the decisions they take are vital for our rural economy and for our local landscape.

At the time of writing the session of felling on the Common has finished. All that remains to do is finish working on the major rides, H12 (BW84), H2 (BW85) and H18 (BW) and to clear round some of the ponds. The rides are being widened and cleared of scrub. I am sure there is mixed feeling about the work, the churned up earth, the lost trees and the large piles of logs but, given that the felling was permitted, I suggest that the result is as good as it could be. The whole area is more open and the rides, once healed, will be wider and more sunlit. I am grateful to Wessex Woodland Management and the Forestry Commission for taking such care and being so willing to consult and cooperate. One man was injured during the tree felling and I am sure everyone will join in sending him our best wishes for a speedy healing of the wound. As I understand it, felling will start again in the autumn of 2016.

Talking of gratitude, I think those who walk on the Common will agree that we owe some to our working parties, led by Peter Davis. Each month they have worked to open up paths that were seriously restricted, mainly by holly. By widening them, walkers are able to avoid the mud and enjoy longer vistas. This work, together with the felling, should eventually lead to a great enrichment of the flora and fauna on the Common. We would especially like to see an increase in the number and variety of birds, but this will depend to some extent on the quality of the flora, especially the undergrowth. Of course, much depends on what long term management follows the felling.

Our walks will continue next year. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month, and has given the following list of dates: 19/1, 16/2, 16/3, 20/4, 18/5, 15/6, 20/7, 17/8, 21/9, 19/10, 16/11, 21/12. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month.

The fungus foray was a great success and over forty people joined the hunt, including some keen children. Thank you to those from the Bucks Fungus group who led the walk, to Peter Davis who organised it, and to all those who came along. In what, apparently, has not been a good year for fungi, we found 92 species – the most that the BFG has found on any site this season. Of these, 27 had not been found on Naphill Common

before and another 7 had not been seen there for thirteen years. Visit our website for details.

We hope you can come to our open meeting and the many walks, working parties and events that we organise next year.

One of my favourite Christmas Carols is Good King Wenceslas. A rousing tune, and particularly good for men to sing their part. It was a bit disappointing to find Wenceslas was not a British king, and to find his statue in the centre of Prague, where he is a local

hero and a saint, albeit from a 1000 years ago. But I still sing it with gusto!

The carol has no mention of the birth of Jesus, but is suitably wintry, and the story takes place on the Feast of Stephen, which most of us would know as Boxing Day. The king takes pity on a poor peasant gathering firewood, and sets off through the snow with his pageboy to take food and drink to the peasant's house. The pageboy is struggling, but finds it easier when he steps in the king's footprints. The implication is that we too should follow the good king, with acts of kindness.

The carol has been widely dismissed as trite doggerel, and church hymnbooks usually avoid it, but I still like it!

"Proper" Christmas carols sing about Jesus, (though we often throw in a few cows and asses, which are not mentioned in the bible!). These carols sing of complicated theological matters like "incarnation" and "redemption", and they certainly have their place, but the human kindness and generous giving in the Wenceslas story seem to me to express the very best of Christmas celebrations.

God has seen the desperate need of humanity for a Saviour, and we should see the desperate need of humanity for peace and dignity and justice and freedom, and Christmas is our opportunity to give via charities or do something practical.

I hope you will have chance to sing some carols this Christmas: the churches will be singing in some local pubs, and there is the Village Carol Service on Sunday 14th December 4pm in the Village Hall, but you can sing at home or down the street. And maybe Good King Wenceslas will be part of the repertoire!

The collection at the service amounted to £333.82p and donations for the wreaths amounted to £262.00p making a grand total of £595.82p which has been sent to the Royal British Legion, High Wycombe Branch.

Bradenham Parish Council

At its November meeting the Parish Council discussed requesting to change the 40mph speed limit on New Road Walter's Ash to 30mph up to where the speed limit

moves to the national speed limit, near the boundary with Lacey Green. The RAF had requested the Parish Council to pursue this some time ago, although the Council was fully supportive of this proposal, we had run into some problems. Transport for Buckinghamshire have now provided us with some helpful suggestions and the RAF have obtained funding to actively progress the change. The RAF will lead on this with parish council support. Once a formal request has been made, a survey will have to be carried out, followed by a consultation. This means all interested parties will have an opportunity to have their say, but it will, as always, take some time.

Cycling on the pavement at the junction New Road/ Bradenham Woods Lane was discussed, the parish council had received a complaint from a resident who had nearly been run over by a cyclist at this junction. Cyclists are not allowed to cycle on the pavement unless a shared path has been created with appropriate signage, as has happened along New Road from the zebra crossing to the entrance of the RAF No 1 site.

We had also been asked to look at the dangerous crossing at the top of Bradenham Woods Lane. This was discussed, but we are awaiting a report with recommendations, once we have received this, the various proposed options can be considered.

Following disappointing news on the various proposed traffic calming options in Bradenham village it was decided that we would install wooden village entry gates as you enter the village from Walter's Ash. With a grant from our County Councillor, Carl Etholen, we will also have dragon's teeth painted on the road. Further donations, due to Country Supplies charging their suppliers who arrived at Shana outside the permitted hours, will help pay for this work.

The Parish Council objected strongly to the planning application 14/07452/FUL for change of use of land for use of horses, erection of detached stables/washroom building and creation of hard standing at the Hedgerow, Parkwood, Walter's Ash. The Parish Council has objected to all applications on that site in the last 4 1/2 years. It is in the Green Belt and in the Chilterns AONB. The full objection will be available on the Wycombe District (WDC) Web site.

The Parish Council has also been questioning WDC on the progress of the removal of the occupants of the Hedgerow as they are now in breach of the conditions as laid out by the Secretary of State in their appeal (APP/Ko425/A/11/2159978) against the WDC refusal to grant permission to the change of use of the site to a traveller site, granting them temporary approval.

We discussed the frequent flooding on Rectory Lane Bradenham. Transport for Buckinghamshire has been to investigate and they are due to clear the grips and gullies. They will be considering the structural work in 2015.

The Parish Council election will be held in May 2015. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor, please contact the clerk or one of our councillors.

The next meeting will be Monday 12th January 2015 at 7.00pm at Bradenham Cricket Club.
