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

The cctv system was further discussed and a new higher spec camera will replace the main view of the car park so we will be able to identify cars and people more easily.

Bradenham Parish Council

At our July meeting, still socially distanced in a chilly cricket club, the council discussed the request from the RAF for support for a pedestrian crossing at the junction of New/Main Road and Bradenham Wood Lane. The council had agreed in May to support this request, as it is a dangerous junction.

We have been in touch with Hughenden Parish Council as the boundary between the two parishes runs down the middle of the roads. We have had a short report done on the junction, the layout of the road and possible options which we shared with Hughenden PC.

There are a great number of technical problems with the junction as well as serious cost implications. The costs are outside both parishes remit. We would both have to save for many years. Bradenham PC saved for several years to put speed reduction measures in place in Bradenham, but those were a drop in the ocean compared to the numbers that are being talked about now. We have shared our knowledge with the RAF, who will look into the case further.

Some councillors are looking at providing information boards for visitors in Bradenham village. We are chasing the National Trust on the planned flood prevention measures for Rectory Lane.

Our next meeting will be Monday 6th September @7pm at Bradenham cricket club, all welcome.

Summary of the Involvement of Parish Councils in the Planning Process following updates by Buckinghamshire Council

Parish and Town Councils are statutory consultees in the process of considering planning applications. Hughenden Parish Council is not required to comment on every application but where it does we raise issues for the attention of Buckinghamshire Council Officers, that are focused on material planning considerations.

We are not required to have the knowledge to quote specific policies or references, highlighting the issue to the Bucks Council Planning Officer will enable them to apply the right reference.

The power to determine Planning Applications rests with either the relevant Buckinghamshire Council Area Committee (of which there are 5) or the Strategic Sites Committee. 96% of applications, in line with best practice, are determined under delegated authority by the Senior Planning Officers and Chair of the Planning Committee.

The purpose of a Buckinghamshire Council Planning Committee is to review recommendations where the weighing and balancing of issues is considered to be finely balanced.

The Buckinghamshire Council Strategic Sites Committee has responsibility for Wider strategic development, sites which have a significant impact beyond the specific local area or sites which are fundamental to the implementation of an adopted or emerging local Plan. As examples these include major infrastructure projects, large scale developments such as building 400 new homes, an employment opportunity occupying space of 1000 sq meters or 2 hectares or more or retail opportunities of the same size.


The Area Planning Committees have responsibility for determining those planning Applications which have been called in or referred to committee for decision but do not fall within the remit of Strategic Sites Committee.

From the 1st July 2021, Town and Parish Councils have the power to "Call in" applications to committee. The request must be based on material reasons and the Parish Council must commit to attend and speak at the meeting.

The decision to accept our application to call an application in will be determined by Buckinghamshire Council.

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ROB BUTLER MP: PRESS RELEASE

Since I last wrote for the Naphill Gazette much has changed for the better in the fight against Covid. Yet as we finally reached Step 4 of the roadmap to recovery, I know that many people had mixed emotions: immense gratitude that the vaccination programme has created a wall of defence that dramatically weakens the link between contracting the virus and severe illness, yet concern that infections are rising and large numbers of people are being required to self-isolate.



The stark truth is that Covid-19 is still very much with us, and we all need to play our part as individuals to reduce its

impact on our families, friends, neighbours and colleagues. The laws introduced earlier in the pandemic were always intended as emergency measures, so it is right that we removed as many of them as possible, and shifted to a focus on personal responsibility. It is now imperative that we all treat that responsibility seriously – whether that's wearing a mask in crowded places, self- isolating when told to do so, or ensuring we get both jabs as soon as invited.

In recent months MPs have been able to do much more of our work back in Westminster, where we can talk directly to ministers to raise local residents' concerns. I have been able to discuss worries about planning reforms, protecting our cherished green spaces and improving rural infrastructure – whether broadband or buses.

Many constituents have written to me about the environment, and I was pleased to participate in a meeting with several ministers about how the UK is preparing for the COP 26 conference in Glasgow later this year. The Government is already working extremely hard to reach net-zero emissions by 2050 as well as helping to drive action on climate change internationally.

Back in the constituency, I was pleased to hear that Buckinghamshire Council distributed nearly 100 per cent of the £21 million of additional restrictions funds provided by the Government, making it one of the best in the country at getting money to businesses that needed it most. I've spoken with firms and organisations that benefited from this help and it is good to see many companies are now building back better.

Although this is another unusual summer, I hope it gives you the opportunity to take a break and perhaps enjoy some of our wonderful Buckinghamshire countryside, attractions and hospitality as we cautiously continue our road to recovery.

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Hughenden Community Support Trust (HCST)

(Previously Allotments for the Labouring Poor)

Dear Residents,

The following areas of land within Hughenden Parish belong to the above charity:

Windmill Lane allotments, Widmer End Naphill allotments, Walters Ash allotments North Dean allotments Great Kingshill amenity land

The charity goes back to the 19th century and the land has belonged continuously to the charity since that time. In recent years Hughenden Parish Council effectively acted as holding trustees and managed the land on behalf of the charity. Due to the passage of time, some years ago the original structure was overlooked and the Parish Council inadvertently merged the charity's assets with its own, which has caused the confusion we see today. To redress this there has been a lengthy legal action which has clarified the continuity of ownership of the charity's assets. Also, the Charity Commission had recommended that trustees were appointed to manage the charity. Subsequently, the following residents are our current independent trustees.

John Russell, Stan Jones, Neil McMinn and John Moorby.

The objects of the charity are:

The relief of persons in the area of benefit who are in need, hardship or distress by:

- o Making grants of money to them, or
- o Providing or paying for goods, services or facilities for them, or
- o Making grants of money to other persons of bodies who provide goods, services or facilities to those in need.

We have recently become aware of some unfounded rumours being circulated that HCST intends to sell the land and that allotment holders will lose their allotments. We would like to confirm that this is fundamentally untrue.

To achieve our objects, HCST has leased the land to Hughenden Parish Council for 99 years thus assisting them in fulfilling their legal requirement to provide allotments. We have also leased part of Great Kingshill Common and an area of land off Common Road to HPC as amenity land for the benefit of the community. In addition to complying with the purpose of the charity to invest the rental income to provide grants/donations to those in need within Hughenden Parish, by placing the land within a charity, gives some extra protection against development, (notwithstanding government changes to law which could obviously affect the Parish Council or HCST).

The allotments and amenity land will continue to be managed by HPC on behalf of HCST. HCST trustees will always be available to discuss any concerns from residents. Contact can be made through the Hon. Secretary (details below).

In the meantime, we would like to invite applications for small grant funding from residents of Hughenden Parish, applications to be made through the Hon Secretary.

We sincerely hope that this letter will allay the false rumours which are being spread.

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
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Zero Waste Week 2021

Hughenden Street Association is holding a Round Table Discussion at 7.00pm on Tuesday 3rd August in support of Zero Waste Week 2021. This annual online campaign seeks to reach a community of like-minded people who want to reduce residential and commercial waste, reuse materials and recycle as much as possible. The aim is to help householders, businesses, schools, and community groups increase recycling, reduce landfill waste, and participate in the circular economy.

A key element of the campaign is to demonstrate means and methods to reduce waste, foster community support and bring awareness to the increasing problem of environmental waste and pollution.

The campaign recognises that it may be unrealistic to reach the goal of 'zero' waste however it is possible to significantly reduce the amount of waste that is produced.

Zero Waste Week recognises the need to use natural compost from organic food waste to provide a useful plant nutrient product as opposed to putting food in landfill where it produces methane, a global warming greenhouse gas. The campaign also tackles the problem of disposal of many non-organic synthetic materials, such as plastic material packaging and non-biodegradable man-made products, that are producing a global problem to the environment in both volume and toxicity.

Zero Waste Week actively encourages people to reduce the use of synthetic materials and plastic packaging and seek alternative methods of transporting and storing food. As part of the growing trend for Sustainability many foods can now be purchased unpackaged, or loose from shop shelves. Due to the ubiquitous use of plastics that cannot be avoided, The Week also demonstrates methods of plastic reuse, as well as conscientious recycling to reduce the burden on landfill, incineration, and environmental contamination. Zero Waste Week adopts the adage "there's no such place as away" meaning when we throw something away, it goes somewhere else, often causing harm or toxicity to the eco-system. The campaign's main directive is to bring awareness to people that we are all individually and collectively responsible for what we consume and that the short time of usefulness is only a small part of the overall life cycle of any product.

Like many grass roots campaigns, Zero Waste Week has a high-end goal working from the bottom up to influence consumer awareness and habits. In so doing the long-term goal is to generate more demand for sustainable products, by creating a significant change in shopping trends. Also, to lobby producers, governmental decision makers and bring awareness for the need of good custodianship to the upcoming generation.

As a community-centric association, HSA is keen to find out about groups and the work of individuals seeking to reduce waste in all its forms within the parish. The Round Table Discussion is the first stage in identifying what already is being done thereby reducing duplication and facilitating co-operation leading to a celebration during Zero Waste Week, 6th - 10th September 2021. It is also hoped that this becomes an annual event in Hughenden. If you are a member of such a group and/or are already trying to keep your waste to a minimum do join us at the Discussion. Not forgetting you might be interested in getting actively involved in local schemes. The Discussion will be summarised in the HSA Newsletter which appears on the NAWA website each week.

On Friday 13th of August, our local bat expert, Julie Hopton, will once again be leading a walk around the Common to see and hear some of our bats – bat detectors that can scale down their ultrasonic chirps to be within range of human hearing will be provided. Meet at the Village Hall at 7:30pm. This walk is weather dependent – heavy rain means no flying insects, which means no flying bats – so check the Naphill Facebook pages, or use your discretion.

With regret, we've decided not to have a stall at this year's Napfest. Our financial position is healthy, particularly after our 'windfall' as a result of switching our account to a different bank (half of which we have donated to the Village Hall funds). There's therefore less need to repeat our popular 'Silent Auction', which has proved so successful in previous years in the capable hands of Ron Collins and Neil McMinn, and we're reluctant to importune local businesses for auction lots after they have experienced so many difficulties following the pandemic. We intend to be back again next year – bigger and better than ever!

Our guided walks are again taking place, with longer walks (around two hours, finishing with optional lunch at a local hostelry when possible) being led by Ron Collins and Neil McMinn, and usually held on the third Monday of each month, starting at 9:25am prompt from the Village Hall. Shorter walks (around an hour, finishing with optional coffee and cakes at the Bon Ami) are led by Chris Miller and are generally on the first Wednesday of each month, starting at 10:30am from the Village Hall. The walks are free, and all are welcome. Our working parties are also in full swing and take place on most Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Our 'mechanised' working parties (on Thursdays) have been impeded recently by the loss (theft!) of our trailer for the ride-on mower, which has been used to transport the wood chip to repair the paths on the Common. Thanks to a very generous donation from Mary Heald, we now have another, even better, trailer. Mary refused any payment, but we've donated £100 to Brain Tumour Research, in memory of her husband, Nic.

Our wild cherry trees – survivors of the many cherry orchards that used to be common around the Chilterns – should be laden with fruit, but this year has been a disappointing one. I think the pronounced cold snap in late spring may have damaged the blossom. On the positive side, it has been a good year for Chiltern orchids, although they may have largely finished flowering by the time this newsletter appears. Our chalk downlands are home to a number of orchids, with common spotted orchid, pyramidal orchid and bee orchid easily seen. They are all typically about 15cm (6") in height, but can grow up to 60cm (though I've never encountered one so tall in the Chilterns).


The common spotted orchid is, as its name suggests, the most frequently found species. It gets the other part of its name from its leaves, which are green with many purple, oval spots. The flowers range from white and pale pink, through to purple, but have distinctive darker pink spots and stripes and are densely packed in short, cone-shaped clusters. The pyramidal orchid lives up to its name - look for a bright pinky-purple, densely packed pyramid of flowers atop a green stem.

The Bee orchid is a much more spectacular plant, resembling the commercial orchids we see in supermarkets. It is rarer than the other two species, and gets its name from its main pollinator – a type of bee – which is thought to have driven the evolution of the flowers. To attract the bees that will pollinate the plant, it has flowers that mimic their appearance. Drawing them in with the promise of love, the bees attempt a mating. As they land on the velvet-textured lip of the flower, the pollen is transferred and the poor bee is left frustrated. Sadly, the right species of bee is no longer found in the UK, so bee orchids are self-pollinated here.

Each of these orchids can 'spontaneously' appear on roadside verges and patches of ground that are left unmown, I recommend Plantlife's 'No Mow May' campaign! All the accompanying photos were taken on the roadside verge outside our house on Stocking Lane. A good local spot to find orchids in June and July is the 'wild' area immediately above the playing field outside Hughenden Valley Village Hall, with common spotted and pyramidal orchids there in profusion.

A Message from Padre Lacey - Another hippo moment?



A while back I wrote about how every now and then we need a hippo moment, when we wallow a bit and give ourselves the permission to do so. I kind of want to touch on that again...because as we move through this pandemic and journey through summer, sometimes we can rush too soon into the ahead, without acknowledging what we have been through.

It seems an odd thing to be thinking about as the sun is shining and we have the hopes and excitement of coming out of lockdowns and the worst of the pandemic, but I think it is important to pause for a moment and to grieve what has been. In the Bible there is a whole book dedicated to grief, sadness and hurt...it's called Lamentations (not a great read if you are feeling glum!). We've been looking at it in our services, and, I'm not going to lie, it's a tough read.

No-one likes hearing about hurt, sadness and grief...to the extent that sometimes we hide it. Perhaps out of

shame, perhaps to protect others, or perhaps because we don't know how to do it or show it. But, is it a good thing to hide it, ignore it or rush through it?

I've been challenged by the book of Lamentations, that, whether we have a faith or not, to process and embrace our emotions is an essential part of life. To celebrate when we are joyful and to grieve when we are hurting, or broken or desperately sad. Lamentations in the Bible does not shy away from lament. The writer is brutally honest and doesn't hold back on sharing with others and with God, and he expresses his grief in a way which doesn't rush too fast into the hope and the positive.

That's what I want to challenge us all about at the moment (and I massively include myself in this). As we move with joy into freedom from this pandemic, will we pause for a moment and grieve for a significant period of time that we have lost, people that we have lost, a lifestyle that has changed and a world which may never go back to 'normal'. How will we show our grief? Who will we become vulnerable with as we show our grief? And as we acknowledge our lament and grief, what impact will this have on accentuating the joy in the hopes of what's to come? Because, dawn is coming, there is hope, but it's always darkest just before the dawn.

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
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



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Chiltern Hills Arboriculture - Staycation Days Out

Following on from last month, I thought another "staycation day out" suggestion might be well received.

Stowe House is a National Trust property just north of Buckingham. The house is an impressive, grade 1 listed building, construction was completed in 1683. It a splendid example is of Palladian, Neoclassical, and English Baroque architecture. obvious For reasons the opportunities to visit the inside



of the building are currently limited, however don't let this put you off making the trip out there. Here's why.

The house is set in grounds of 250 acres. The gardens are laced with themed paths. The owner of the day, Lord Cobham, set the gardens out to reveal his beliefs about the politics and morality of the times. The question being asked is which path will you choose - Vice, Virtue or Liberty?

Greek mythology was well-known in the eighteenth century. The Paths of Vice and Virtue represent the Greek god, Hercules' struggle between these two choices. The Path of Vice takes place in the garden of love (designed by then head gardener, appropriately called Mr Love!). The temples in this area allude to stories of seductive women, sordid goings-on and partying to excess. Not unlike the history and reputation of the Hellfire Caves in West Wycombe.

The Path of Virtue takes you through gardens that represent heaven on earth. The temples here show

good values, such as the Temple of British Worthies showing the great and the good of Britain's history. Taking the virtuous path through life isn't always the easiest journey, there are many bridges to cross.

The Path of Liberty represents the political aspirations of Lord Cobham. It is the longest and hardest of all three walks. It's meant to show that the pursuit of politics is never easy. The temples along the way represent Britain's dominance in the eighteenth

century. Temple of Concord and Victory celebrates Britain's victory in the Seven Years' War between Britain and France. Lord Cobham's Pillar shows Cobham as a mighty Roman warrior. I suppose if you are going to fund and build epic gardens, a bit of "self-aggrandisement" is probably allowed.

So, after the history lesson, why would you want to visit Stowe this summer. Quite simply the gardens are the most spectacular location for a good walk and a picnic. The paths are all semi armoured so are suitable for pushchairs, wheelchairs, and mobility scooters. The grounds are vast, so keeping a good social distance is really not an issue, and the scenery around the lake is beautiful. There is a cafe at the car park, which is about a 15 minute stroll away from the gardens, or you can picnic in the grounds as we did. If you are not a National Trust member entry fees apply.

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Growing Your Own - Aphrodisiacs In Your Garden

Is there something growing in your garden which has unexpected properties?

The Encyclopaedia Britannica states that almost no scientific studies have been made into aphrodisiacs, so traditional, or folklore material is relied upon. But where to find that folklore material? I looked up "aphrodisiac foods" on Google and found 519,000 results. I started counting how frequently various vegetables and fruit were referenced. I assumed that these references were based upon folklore material. I counted up to 391 references, then analysed them. The results are given below.

Thirteen fruits and vegetables were referenced only once, so perhaps they do not have much aphrodisiac power. The 13 were: apricots, bay leaves, cranberries, goji berries, mushrooms, capsicums, tarragon, lovage, sage, peas, quince, sweetcorn and oregano.

Nine were referenced twice. These were: lavender, mint, rosemary, leafy green vegetables, cabbage, parsley, watercress, Brussels sprouts and kiwi fruit.

Those mentioned three times were: coriander (cilantro), leeks, cauliflower and spinach. Even more popular, at four mentions, were beetroot, cherries, broccoli and lettuce. There were three having five mentions: mustard greens, apples and grapes.

Cucumber and turnips had 6 mentions, radish and pomegranates 7, but aniseed and pumpkin seed had 8 mentions, which means that they were really popular.

Now we are on to the most frequently mentioned aphrodisiacs. With 9 references were raspberries and nuts. With 10 references were fennel and onions. With 11 references were almonds, arugula (rocket), peaches and artichokes. Now for the "Top Ten". Joint 10th, with 12 references were tomatoes, chilli peppers and beans. At 7th was celery with 13 references. At 6th were figs with 17 references. At 5th were strawberries with 20 references. At 4th were carrots with 22 references and sweet basil was 3rd with 23 references. Garlic was 2nd with 26 references and the TOP OF THE POPS was asparagus with no fewer than 36 references.

With 58 fruits and vegetables being mentioned as aphrodisiacs it is clear that the folklore is imprecise. There were some mentions on Google that thousands of years ago nutrition could have been a problem and that a new fruit or vegetable eaten to overcome the nutritional problem caused an improvement in general health; thereafter that fruit or vegetable was considered to be an aphrodisiac.

From that it seems that the best policy nowadays is to have a varied diet with plenty of fruit and vegetables containing the vital nutrients and trace elements that we need to be healthy.

What can we do in our own gardens or allotments? We can apply copious quantities of farmyard manure to our soil. In that way we enrich our soil with trace elements from the farmers' fields. We need soil micro-organisms such as mycorrhizal fungi and bacteria to bring the vital trace elements to the roots of our vegetables and fruit. To provide the right conditions for the soil micro-organisms we need to avoid all artificial chemicals and also leave the soil undisturbed – ie we should not dig or plough the soil.

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Gordon the Birdman - Bird Ringing

The alarm had gone off at an unearthly hour and I had driven just over one hundred miles and it was still dark. Already a team of volunteers had erected posts on which to drape mist nets. The nets will be checked every half hour to make sure birds flying into them do not stay there for too long. Skilled and supple fingers will deftly unknit claws and wings from the micro fine mesh. The bird is then placed into a soft cloth bag where it remains guiet and calm in the dark. Each bird is then taken to a processing table where it is weighed and fitted with a unique ring, the wing is fanned out and measured while experienced eyes judge the age, sex and state of plumage, noting the fluff of a juvenile. All this is taking place between May and September at more than a hundred and forty sites scattered across Britain, monitoring changes from year to year. Combining all the figures provides a reliable body of information. The migrating Nightingales, Redstarts and Flycatchers the teams would catch up until a decade or so ago are no more, a telling indicator of their complete disappearance from some sites.

But why, at a time when there are huge advances in tracking technology, is there still a need for ringing? Why, today, do 3000 volunteers ring about a million birds using a method of recording dating back to Edwardian times. The main reason is that it helps to gain information about numbers, changes in populations, breeding success and survival rates. With a bird in the hand it can be aged and you get an idea of how the breeding season is going. If a ringed bird is caught again at a later date it is known how old it is and how far it has travelled.

For a lot of species last year was a breeding disaster, first the "Beast From the East" was bad news for our resident birds, then later, in April, cold North winds held back migration, while the hot, dry summer scuppered the breeding of ground feeders.

Local Lace Makers News

Some time ago I met and worked with Rosemary Mortham, a resident of Lacey Green who has a keen interest in local history. Rosemary is also a lace-maker. She has combined these interests in the voluntary work she does for the Chalk, Cherries & Chairs Project. This project is an ambitious five-year scheme which aims to connect local people to the wildlife and cultural heritage of the Central Chilterns.

The scheme operates under three themes - wildlife, heritage and people but the projects which fall under these three themes are all designed with the Chilterns landscape in mind. No less than eighteen interweaving projects share common threads, including volunteering, learning and digital media. The scheme will also provide small grants to encourage community initiatives. 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
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
