

It is just over a year ago that the we were plunged into the first LOCKDOWN, an experience which none of us would have chosen but one we have been forced to adapt to along with so many other things which change and impact upon our lives. It also has given some of us an opportunity to reflect upon the things which are most import to us in our lives as well as the changing world we live in.

A zoom meeting of the committee was held on the 1st. March and 18 members of the committee took part.

The committee was told that a working party had met to discuss the proposed leases for the Tennis Club, Scouts and Guides and the Men's Club. A solicitor would be contacted and instructions would be given to them to draw up the leases. It was recommended that the leases would be for a substantial number of years.

Linda Cole outlined the plans for Napfest and confirmed the date as the August bank holiday for this event. The Fireworks are arranged to take place on Saturday 6th. November, and the Christmas Fayre will be held on the 3rd. December. These events are all subject to the current Government rules and restrictions being lifted. We have a quote for cutting back the ash tree on the border with Vincents Way and are awaiting another 2 quotes before the work can be done. On the subject of quotes the renewal of the boiler is still ongoing as quotes have not yet been received.

As the village hall is still closed there is less to report this month. The AGM will have taken place on the 29th. March via a zoom meeting. Hopefully the village hall will start to reopen in April and many of the activities will pick up again, and by mid June the hall will be fully open.



Deadline to submit candidate nomination papers 4pm on Thursday 8 April 2021.

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) is calling on people to stand for election to form parish councils for the period May 2021 – April 2025.

About Hughenden Parish Council

Our Council consists of 15 elected members representing 4 wards within Hughenden Parish. These wards are:

- Hughenden Valley Ward (including Bryants Bottom & lower North Dean) x 4 councillors
- Naphill & Walters Ash Ward x 4 councillors
- Widmer End Ward x 4 councillors
- Great Kingshill Ward (including Cryers Hill & Four Ashes) x 3 councillors

There are approximately 3,500 households and 9,000 people in Hughenden Parish

The term of office of current councillors ends before the election the 6 May 2021 elections.

The last uncontested election was held in 2015, the last contested election was held in 2011.

What do councillors do?

Councillors invest time in local projects and issues to the benefit of residents and the neighbourhood. They represent the local community and collaborate with county councillors. They deliver services to meet local needs, improve quality of life and work to enhance the environment and increase biodiversity. Council work including attending meetings, engaging with residents, local groups and representing the council on local bodies and organisations. A NALC survey found that councillors spend on average three hours per week on council work.

What do councils do?

Councils lead on community services such as allotments; leisure facilities; bus shelters; litter bins; car parks; local illuminations; community centres; local youth projects; community safety schemes; parks and open spaces; community transport schemes; planning; public lavatories; crime reduction measures; street cleaning; street lighting; cycle paths; tourism activities; festivals and celebrations; traffic calming measures; and much more.

Who can stand for election?

- You need to be a British citizen, or citizen of the Commonwealth or the European Union
- · You must be 18 years of age or older
- · You must live in an area that is served by the council

If you would like to be a member of this tierform of local government you will need to submit a nomination form which can be found at https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/candidate-or-agent/parish-and-community-council-elections-england select 2a or 2b and click on the +icon to reveal nomination papers.

For Parishes within the Wycombe area, nomination papers should be hand delivered to a Deputy Returning Officer at Council Office, Queen Victoria Road, High Wycombe HP14 1BB. The deadline for submissions of the nomination papers is 4pm on Thursday 8th April. The earliest that nominations can be formally submitted is Monday 22nd March, when the notice of election will be published.

We are due to have some vacancies. You can get more information from existing councillors and the clerk.

Because of Covid restrictions, none of our regular FoNC activities are taking place at present. If the current government timetable is adhered to, we will be able to recommence guided walks from May 17th, so watch this space. Meanwhile, we can still enjoy the attractions of our Common, whether walking, cycling or riding.

At the time of writing, a spell of dry weather is just ending, but it has been enough to make a substantial improvement to the footpaths and bridleways, which had become even more muddy than is usual during wintertime. The Naphill terrain – mainly clay over chalk – means that rainwater stays near the surface, giving rise to very muddy conditions that soon improve when the rain stops, particularly with a drying wind. I can't recall seeing so many frogs mating in the ponds, and hearing them – all the individual calls building to a noise resembling a small car idling.



As part three of a short series on the problems caused in the Chilterns by invasive species, we will move on to consider three invasive plants. First, Himalayan Balsam – a relative of the "Busy Lizzie", which it resembles, it's the largest annual plant in

Britain, growing up to 2.5m (8 feet) high from seed in a single season. Introduced in 1839 and first cultivated as a greenhouse annual by gardeners, it spreads quickly, as it can project its seeds up to four metres from its spring-loaded seed pods, popping of which is almost irresistible to children. It typically grows on riverbanks and wet woodlands. The best treatment is to pull the plant up (it is quite shallow rooted), before it sets seed.

We may not think of Rhododendron as an invasive species, as it was introduced (via Gibraltar, though originating in China) as long ago as 1763. It's the largest member of the Heath family (Ericaceae) of plants, which includes the blueberry as well as our heather, growing up to 8m (25 feet) tall. It can spread to fill the space available to it, outcompeting and displacing all other vegetation and local fauna. Toxins in its leaves have been known to poison sheep, cattle, goats and dogs, and its nectar is poisonous to bees. Fortunately, we do not have any on our Common, but it has spread through neighbouring National Trust woods at Hughenden, and eradication is costly – the cost of clearing Snowdonia National Park has been estimated at over £30 million.

Finally, and most notoriously, comes Japanese Knotweed, listed by the World Conservation Union as one of the world's worst invasive species, as its root system and strong growth can damage concrete foundations, roads and retaining walls, as well as ecological damage by crowding out other plants. Introduced from its native Japan to Leiden in the Netherlands, by 1850 a specimen from this plant was donated to the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew – all European plants are clones of this female specimen, and so it rarely sets seed, but spreads rapidly through its rhizomes (creeping, underground stems) and can readily sprout from very small pieces of plant. An affected area was discovered on the Common a few years ago, near the end of Downley Road, and is being treated with applications of approved herbicide, by the Estate and by FoNC, but these will need to be continued over several years to achieve complete eradication.

Wild about Naphill

First the depressing bit. Everyone must be aware of the appalling decline in the quality of our natural environment. Official studies show that almost all wild species of both flora and fauna have declined in number and variety over the last few decades. Some declines have been dramatic: we have lost 97% of our wildflower meadows and, along with them, pollinating insects such as butterflies (down 76%) and moths (88%) together with many beetle and bee species. Our mammals, reptiles and amphibians have all suffered and both farmland and woodland birds have plummeted dramatically. According to the Common Bird Census between 1970 and 1999 tree sparrows declined by 95%, corn buntings by 88%; spotted flycatchers 77%; starlings 71%; turtle dove 71%; song thrush 56%; bullfinch 53 %; skylark 52% and the cuckoo by 33% - just a few examples. But many do not need official surveys to tell them of the tragic changes. When did you last hear a skylark or a song thrush singing near our village, let alone a nightingale? Familiar species such as yellowhammers, chiffchaffs and even the humble greenfinch have become an unusual sight. When did you last see a hedgehog, wild violets, or a grey partridge?

The causes of this catastrophe are generally well known. Chief among them are the excessive use of insecticides and "weed" killers, which kill and poison the foundation of all life that rests upon them. Then habitat loss: whether the grubbing out of hedges, the felling of woodland or the growing of houses. Other

factors such as climate change, new agricultural practices such as the autumn sowing of corn crops, increased disturbance by people and their pets etc., are of increasing significance.

What can be done about it? Despair at the failure of small-scale measures has fostered an interest in "rewilding": the process of returning an area, as near as possible to its original ecology. This involves creating the earlier vegetation and re-introducing lost species of animal, from mice and shrews to large herbivores and their predators. In America and on the continent of Europe this can involve huge areas of land, wild cattle, horses, pigs and deer, together with bears, lynx and even wolves. In these islands our projects have to be more modest and amount to "wilding" rather rewilding: that is trying to return to a natural system as wild as is compatible with the pressures of our human population. There are several projects underway, including on the Knepp Castle Estate in West Sussex. (See 'Wilding' by Isabella Tree.)

What can we do around Naphill? Wilding enthusiasts claim that three Cs are essential: cores, corridors and carnivores. There needs to be a core area which is large and as rich in species as possible. This must be connected by corridors of relatively clear land to allow animals and plants to migrate and spread to other suitable habitats nearby, thus ensuring gene flow. The carnivores are needed to control the numbers of large herbivores and stop them reducing the vegetation to monotonous grassland.

For Naphill the obvious core area would be the Common – already a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and a Special Area of Conservation (SAC), but it has its drawbacks. It is not a very varied habitat, being almost entirely woodland. More significant is its popularity. Of course, it is a real asset and visitors are to be welcomed, but they have a severe impact on the wildlife. This is especially so with dog walkers which ensure that the Common could never support a variety of deer, cattle or horses, let alone wild boar, while host to so many dogs. This also applies to the ponds: if dogs that have been dusted for fleas go in the ponds, they do serious damage to the daphnia and other minute organisms at the base of the food chain for such things as newts, frogs and fish. Another problem with the Common is that there is a constant danger that it will lose its corridors connecting it to the surrounding countryside, as has happened with the development in Clappins Lane. If the Council and developers pick on Great and Little Mosely Farms or the meadows behind the Wheel pub, the village will constitute an impenetrable barrier to the movement of species.

So what practically can be done? On the Common we could conserve the ancient pollards and encourage the spread of undergrowth: the brambles, juniper and gorse so necessary for birds to nest and mammals to shelter. We could see the line of woodland and meadows on the other side of the village, from Courns Wood, Stocking lane Woods, across to Chalkpit Wood and Coombe Lane as a second core area and encourage a richer, more varied pattern of environments, from chalk meadows to scrub and woodland. We might even see "wild" cattle, horses and pigs. Above all we must defend the few remaining connecting corridors against spreading suburbia.

Perhaps these are just dreams, but why not set some targets? Imagine: it is possible within a decade that we could stand on the Common in the evening and hear a nightingale sing.

Growing Your Own

A few years ago I read that we had about 30 manmade chemicals in our bodies. That revelation inspired me to extol the virtues of growing-yourown as a way of avoiding some of the man-made chemicals. I have now learned of something far more frightening, which might induce more readers to grow their own.

Every child born today is "precontaminated" with hundreds of chemicals. Not 30, but hundreds this time. Many of the chemicals interfere with brain development. Some, including mixtures to which we are all exposed, lead to IQ loss and other neurocognitive and behavioural disabilities. Chemical contamination of amniotic fluid is affecting the brain development of future generations. These horrible developments are not yet fully taken on board by regulators and policymakers dealing with chemical regulation.

This man-made chemical pollution reaches us from a variety of sources. Some is airborne. I have mentioned before how my leeks capture the fallout of black dust from the atmosphere (in pockets where the leaves meet the stem). That is dust which has been washed into the leeks by rain. We are fortunate here in Naphill and Walter's Ash in being to the north-west of London and the prevailing wind is from the south-west. We rarely have a south-easterly wind so we are spared most of the polluted air from London. But even so my leeks capture a lot. Some chemicals are in tap water,

especially chlorine which is added to kill bacteria. But some pollution is ingested with our food, and that is something we can do something about by carefully choosing what we eat – and growing our own fruit and vegetables which, hopefully, will be free of man-made chemicals.

I have written before about genetically-modified (GM) fruit and vegetables. Our farmers are prohibited from growing GM crops and so are farmers in the EU (apart from "bt maize" which is grown in Spain and a few other countries). But that does not mean that our food is GM-free. Many GM varieties are in food imported from areas of the world where the growing of GM crops is permitted. I am not flatly against GM crops. I am keeping an open mind, especially as people in the USA do not seem to be suffering, despite having eaten GM for years. But I think GM food in the UK should be labelled as such, so that the consumer can make an informed choice. The regulations do not require such labelling, so if you want to avoid GM crops you should avoid sauces, cooking oils, margarine, butter, prepared meals, cheeses and milk to name a few. Over 40% of our food is imported, so we have little control of what we eat in the absence of comprehensive food labelling. So, grow your own - and demand comprehensive food labelling!

appearances, asking the amazed disciples if they had any grub and subsequently tucking in to broiled fish.






Top Left - *Dawn Delight* Over 18 - Sandra Spicer







The restrictions we've all been living under have meant that many people have had to grieve without the comfort of having friends and family around them.

Marie Curie, a charity which supports people around the event of a terminal diagnosis, organised a National Day of Reflection to acknowledge grief and loss over the last year. The national Church of England is one of several organisations supported this important initiative.

As we bid farewell to the final few days of March, we will all welcome April, with fresh hope and optimism. Children returned to school several weeks ago, and slowly the promise of the easing of restrictions gives us things to look forward to – a haircut, meeting with a couple of friends outside, and in time a small social gathering in a pub garden.

Tentatively we begin to make plans for the rest of this year and beyond. Postponed weddings and birthday are rescheduled, and we can look forward to meeting friends and family again in the flesh, and not just through a phone or computer screen.

As we begin to adjust to this new norm, we will no

doubt experience a wide range of emotions. Some can't wait to pick up their social lives, or to make that journey across the country to visit an elderly family member, and hoping that they won't have to wait too long. For others, the thought of mixing with others raises concerns about health and well-being. We are complicated beings, and it is important to acknowledge that we are likely to react to the easing of lockdown in different ways.

The beginning of April also brings with it Holy Week – the week during which we remember the last few days of our Lord on earth, during which he shared a final meal with his friends, was arrested, and sentenced to death and died on a cross on the day we call Good Friday, before triumphantly rising from the grave on the third day.

As a Christian I find Good Friday an important day for sober reflection. By recalling Christ's sacrificial death on a cross, I am able to give God all my burdens, weaknesses and pain in prayer, and through his death and resurrection, I am given a fresh start, the slate is wiped clean, and I can live in the light of his love and forgiveness.

I do hope that you too will experience hope this year.
Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Hallelujah!

Lifecycles

As the days start to warm and brighten the children have been busy spotting all of the changes in the world around them whilst out on our welly walks. They have been eagerly awaiting the arrival of the daffodils and are still keeping a keen eye open for the first few bluebells.

Last year, our beautiful Nursery community were all saying good-bye, and heading in to our first lockdown just as Spring arrived. Here at the Nursery, we handed out sunflower seeds to the children so that we could all keep in contact with a shared project at home. I also filmed the lifecycle of a butterfly, and we shared the journey on our Facebook page. This year, we are so pleased to be able to come together and watch our sunflowers grow both at home and in our Nursery garden. The children also have 5 caterpillars that they are watching grow. The caterpillars are yet to form their signature 'J' shape before creating their own chrysalis. The children all feel that they are so big they are almost ready to start their metamorphosis. Today, they have all made predictions as to how many days there are remaining before the first caterpillar spins their chrysalis. Our excited children have guessed from 1 day all the way up to 10 more days! We can't wait to see who has guessed correctly.

It is important for the children to be given the new vocabulary to support these new experiences. Language is such a beautiful tool to add colour and greater depth to a child's early years journey.

We are introducing a new song this Spring to help the children learn to count backwards:

Five flowers tall in the flower shop (hold up 5 fingers)

Blooming brightly, with their petals on the top.

Along came (child's name) with a penny one day.

Bought a (child names a colour) flower and took it away (put one finger down).

As the HSA Mission states:

Naphill & Walter's Ash is fortunate to have an active community - just look at the fantastic work of the NAWA Gazette Facebook group together with its Covid19 team! The recent Freecycle weekend is only one example of a community coming together. No doubt the Bon Ami Café will be open when it is safe to do so and continue its role as an important community meeting place.

Some of the groups created in response to the pandemic may no longer be active, however, some group members may wish to continue to play a part in keeping the community spirit going. We must accept that as people return to their jobs and resume their lives some may feel that they do not have time to get involved. That is fine, and we know that if they were called upon again, they would rise to the challenge. However, there will be some who not only enjoyed getting involved but also found it gave them a new purpose. They may be part of the older community however there will also be younger people - from teenagers upwards - who want to remain involved. Many friendships will have been made and for some being involved was good for their own well-being. Again, that is fine. What is important is that we all do what we can. After all, without us there is no community!

So here is the challenge: what can you do to maintain the community spirit as 2021 moves forward? Here is one thing you can do if you have not done so already: become a Hughenden Street Association member. What does this involve? 




We all learn something each meeting which helps our photography.

We would like to thank everyone for their amazing support whilst we have been doing the Takeaways and The Pit Stop and promise to keep you all updated on our Facebook page.



A FANTASTIC IDEA!

Readers of the village Facebook page will be aware of the two major projects affecting our village and I thought the April Gazette would be an ideal opportunity to make more people aware of latest developments.

The first project was announced:-

"Now that it has started raining again I am announcing my new business venture, the Stocking Lane Flood Crossing Company. I'll start by renting wellies to walkers. The profits will buy a ball of string and a couple of lilos to be replaced later by a couple of pedalos. The final step was intended to be the purchase of a retiring cross channel ferry, floating it in on a spring tide and parking it so that we can drive or walk through it. However, Boris's Burrow has given me a better idea. When HS2 is finished they will be taking the tunnel boring machine up to Stranraer so let's slip the lorry driver a tenner and we'll borrow it for the weekend......"

I am finishing this on the day that TfB is draining the flood. That may give a feeling that this project is dead in the water, so to speak, but actually it is just an undercover operation carrying out enabling works for the tunnel.

There have been some difficulties along the way.

I received a shock visit from the Local Lying-on-a-Lilo

Licensing Authority. They tied me up for quite some time insisting that I had to ensure that each Lilo was fitted with a life raft and that there has to be a proper evacuation drill carried out before each sailing.

Join Forces NOW to Save our Our Magnificant Clappins Lane 100-year English Oak

NAWARA, along with many others have tried to persuade Bucks Council to safeguard this ecologically important 100-Year Oak from the Developer's chainsaws. To destroy this beautiful tree for 9.5 metres of flat, black tarmac footway for newcomers to the proposed estate in Clappins field, would amount to an ecological crime. The newcomers will be no different from the many thousands who, without a problem during the last 100 years, have moved back and forth past the Oak in Clappins Lane, walking, wheeling their babies, exercising dogs, running, cycling, and leading guided walks.

Our Clappins English Oak has supported more life forms than any other native tree species in the area. 326 species are completely dependent on Oaks. They are host to hundreds of insect species, an important food source for birds. The endangered Purple Hairstreak butterfly relies entirely on the Oak to survive. The Oak has perfect nesting spots for the Pied Flycatcher and Marsh Tit. The rich mould formed from the soft fallen leaves support invertebrates like the Stag Beetle, and fungi such as Oakbug Milkcap. Bats roost in Oaks and feed on their rich supply of insects. Mammals such as squirrels, badgers and deer feed on the acorns.

The Oak absorbs up to 100 gallons of water a day. Its wanton destruction will result in more surface water problems.

However, the Bucks Director of Planning and Enforcement, Mr S. Bambrick, makes it clear that Bucks Planning Authority has no intention of safeguarding our ecologically important OAK, even to the point of supporting the failure of the Planning Committee in Nov. 2020 to follow its own ruling in deciding 19/08031/FUL, for 63 dwellings on Clappins field and destruction of our OAK. They failed to take account of the number of brownfield sites which had become available for re-development during the pandemic.

"All planning decisions, whether made by officers or by the Committee, are bound by the same legal requirements to make decisions in accordance with current planning legislation and the development plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise."

"In my opinion, it appears that Bucks Planning Authority is bent on supporting Dandara's (the developers) application no matter what the consequences or current material considerations. We, therefore have no choice but to immediately impress on Bucks Council and MP Rob Butler, through sheer numbers, that N&WA people demand that our environmentally important 100-Year Clappins Lane OAK be wholly protected from wanton destruction through appn.19/08031/FUL, or for any other reason. Even a single sentence of strong objection will do."


