Naphill Village Hall & Playing Fields Council Chairman's Report

The village hall committee held a meeting on 4th. July and 14 members were present. Bon Ami and the tennis club leases were discussed and we are waiting on the solicitor to move forward with Bon Ami lease, the tennis club lease is still under review.

A tree survey was taken of the trees on the crick and a report should be with us shortly, the ash tree was looked at from the ground but was not climbed as the ivy is too dense so see all the relevant areas, so the ivy was severed at the base of the tree and a full climbing survey will be taken when it has died back. The copper beech on the Downley Road side was cordoned off as the trunk has a split and we will be advised in the survey as to what remedial work will be required.

The fire alarm was beeping and the engineer came and corrected it. The work on the fire damage is waiting on new door and window, and the tarmac will be done shortly.

The village hall council re-organisation was discussed and it was agreed by a vote of 11 for, 2 abstentions and 1 against that responsibility for every aspect of managing the village hall would be delegated to eight trustees.



- 1. Take delivery of Gazette magazines from the printer every month generally on the last Friday of the month (10 months per year only)
- 2. Bag up the magazines for each volunteer distributor in accordance with their current quantity needs
- 3. Deliver the individual bags to each distributor
- 4. Arrange cover for any distributor who may occasionally be unavailable many of the other distributors will always help cover

- 6. Small amount of general admin work

Each month should take up no more than 4/5 hours of your time for the Gazette sorting and distributing and also typically allow for another 2 hours per month for admin.


Please be aware that without a distribution coordinator and more volunteers to distribute the Gazette it will not be possible to print the Gazette, it would have to become an online only publication!

Thoughts on VOLUNTEERING!



As a volunteer led community group Hughenden Street Association runs on the minimal number of resources and is very much seen as a community benefit. The principal resource has been peoples' time and what an asset that has been! It is of course not just time in the sense of hours but really the skills, knowledge and experiences offered by individuals. We all have talents and most of us are very modest about this and often quite self-effacing. It is true nonetheless that our individual contributions make a real and positive difference. The Association has seen this particularly around events such as the successful pub lunches taking place on the 3rd Wednesday of the month at the Black Lion pub in Naphill and at the Harrow in Hughenden Valley. The chance to catch up with friends and get to know new ones are very positive benefits from these events. Both lunches are organised by two very able Association members: Susan Bickerstaffe (Naphill & Walter's Ash) and Anne Smart (Hughenden Valley). Peace of mind whilst you're away: Secure your home before you travel!

Everyone needs a holiday, but we want you to come home and find everything as you left it. Almost half of all burglaries happen when a home is left empty. By following the tips set out below you can help to make your home more secure while you are away. Why not tick them off before you go?

- Make sure your home looks occupied. Ideally, ask a trusted neighbour or friend to look after it. Let them have a spare set of keys, but don't put your name or address on them.
- Don't leave your curtains closed during the daytime, as this shows the house is empty.
- Use automatic timer-switches to turn your lights on at dusk.
- Cancel any regular deliveries such as newspapers and milk.
- Cut the lawn before you go and trim back any plants that burglars could hide behind.
- Uncollected mail is a sign that you're away. The Royal Mail's 'Keepsafe' service will keep your mail for up to two months while you're away.
- Avoid putting your home address on your luggage when you are travelling to your holiday destination. Put this only on the inside of your cases.
- Make sure that you have up-to-date contents and buildings insurance.
- Keep tools and ladders that can be used to break in locked away.

- If you aren't leaving your car at home, why not ask a neighbour or a friend to park their car on your drive.
- Don't publish your absence on the social media. Status updates, comments and photos can all give away that your home is empty.
- Is there a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme where you live? Visit www.ourwatch.org.uk and enter your postcode to check to see if there are any schemes set up in your area, or alternatively speak with us via our 'office' email address.
- Finally, don't forget to lock all external doors and windows. If you've got a burglar alarm, make sure it is set.
- And just before you set off, it's worth spending a couple minutes checking you've done all you had to do and taken everything you need with you. Don't forget your passport and tickets!

Our new full-time Clerk, Emily Ranahan, started work at the end of June and after a series of acting and interim Clerks, we can now look forward to a more stable and productive period. We are very happy to have Emily on board. Emily, who lives just outside the Parish in High Wycombe, is the Parish's first American Clerk – I wonder what Coningsby Disraeli, our founding Chair, would have made of that. Nina Villa, our current Locum Clerk, will be staying with us until the end of August to support Emily.

Come September, Emily will have her feet firmly under the desk, and the Council will be turning to our goals for the rest of 2022 and 2023. For residents who aren't aware of our scope of services, the Parish Council maintains the Burial Ground on Four Ashes Road, playgrounds at Templewood and Great Kingshill, provides allotments on eight sites across the parish, responds to Bucks Council on planning applications, looks after certain verges and hedges on behalf of Bucks Council and makes grants to various associations, clubs and projects. We are welcoming grant applications, and if you feel you have a good case, please ask Emily for an application form.

There remains a backlog of issues from previous years that we are committed to dealing with in the coming weeks. These include our relationship with Hughenden Community Support Trust, the maintenance of a number of streetlights in Widmer End, our future lease arrangements with the Great Kingshill Cricket Club and the re-establishment of vandalised traffic calming equipment. During the Autumn and Winter, we anticipate that we will be able to start to address some important issues for the future. One of these will be to communicate the results of last autumn's residents' survey, which will influence our future priorities. It will be no surprise to you that traffic calming and road safety were the issues of greatest concern. We will be considering the next phase in our efforts to discourage high speed driving through our lanes. We have a number of initiatives to consider around playgrounds. We wish to promote tree-planting as part of the Queen's Green Canopy scheme. And we are considering the pros and cons of a possible Neighbourhood Plan for the parish, including consultations with Residents associations and other groups to get a sense of residents' appetite for such a plan.

We have room for an additional Councillor for Naphill and Walters Ash. A full Council will help keep up the momentum we've been building. If you have the appetite to contribute to the local area as a Parish Councillor, now is a great time to join the Council, as we're in a good place to welcome new forward-looking energy and ideas.

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Chiltern Hills Arboriculture - Local Houses and Gardens

What with the current state of the airline industry, combined with a continuing reluctance to travel via large transit terminals, I am sure a lot of people will be adopting a "stuff it, let's stay local" policy this summer.

This is completely understandable but it can throw up the question of what to do with several days of "Holiday Staycation" to fill. If you have already visited the usual sites of Hughenden Manor, Windsor, and Waddesdon Manor... let me suggest Dorneywood.

Dorneywood is a country house just north of the village of Burnham. It was the upland farm belonging to Dorney Court, which lies on the edge of scenic Dorney village some four miles south of the house. The oldest parts of Dorney Court are early Tudor dating back to about 1500.

The house and its 250 acre estate was bought in 1919 by Sir Courtauld Thompson, a successful businessman, a commissioner for the British Red Cross, and the son of Robert William Thompson, the inventor of the pneumatic tyre.

Thompson spent many years developing and decorating the property, also filling it with antiques and artefacts. From September 1940 the house was used as a leisure retreat for officers of the Commonwealth armed services, Sir Courtauld and his wife Winifred acting as hosts.

Being an extremely munificent and charitable man, Sir Courtauld donated the entire estate to the nation in 1949, in particular to the incumbent Prime Minister Winston Churchill, to be used by any Secretaries of State appointed by him, the Lord Mayor of London, or the American Ambassador. Residency of the house and grounds has been in the gift of the Prime Minister. From the mid 1950's to the mid 1970's it was the Foreign Secretary that received this favour. Since then it has become less regimented, moving between Home Secretaries, Deputy PM's and Chancellors of the Exchequer. At the time of writing the current incumbent is Rishi Sunak..... but I think that is about to change soon....

There are some wonderful exhibits to be seen within the public rooms of the house, including a magnificent antique Bechstein piano, and a bagatelle that Churchill played for over three hours just so that he could record his name in the "over 1000 points scored" winners book. Outside the house there are some splendid gardens to wander around, a walled garden with a decorative pond and a small hothouse with tropical plants and fruit trees. Rather scrumptious tea and cake are available from the shop next to the swimming pool.

The estate is now owned by the National Trust and is leased to the Dorneywood Trust. Visiting is limited and pre booking an entry time is required.

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Friends of Naphill Common

We were delighted that nearly 40 people joined us for our Midsummer History Walk around Bradenham, led by Marian Miller in glorious weather. Starting at St. Botolph's church we walked around the green learning about the history of the village buildings. The church's lychgate is a memorial to the six men of Bradenham who went to war in 1914 and never returned. We discovered that two of those men, brothers Douglas and Albert Stephen, were cousins of Mrs Tempest, the lady of the manor, but had no other connection with Bradenham. As for the rest, Herbert Hickman had been a footman at the Manor but had returned to his native Shropshire to enlist in 1915. Leonard Brown's family lived at 15 The Green but Leonard was living in Hull with this wife and children when he was called-up in 1914. Horace Wooster, a stoker in the Royal Navy before the War and who had lived at Castle Cottage, married in 1913. He died in the last weeks of the war in October 1918 and tragically his wife died only five months later.

The only veteran who was still in the village at the outbreak of war was Cyril Haverly who died in 1916 at the age of 19. He worked at North's furniture factory and his father, Charles, was landlord of the Red Lion. At that time the Red Lion was part of the Public Refreshment Houses Association, a body founded by the Bishop of Chester and which was dedicated to the provision of food and drink, but not alcohol. Having gone through many different pub landlords over the years the Red Lion is now a (licensed) tea room. History repeating itself?

Meanwhile, on the Common, work has resumed on the refurbishment of our noticeboards, and the one at the end of Chapel Lane has been removed to the workshop. When it returns, the next board for treatment will be the one on Forge Road, leaving just the board at the Bradenham end of the Common to be done. One of the legs supporting the board on Hunts Hill Lane had rotted at ground level. Chris Wilson of the Timber Group has kindly donated a replacement post and Bob Bowern has used his carpentry skills to cut it to fit – we hope to have installed it before this issue appears in print.

Several people have asked me, now that the current phase of felling on the Common has finished, whether the numerous large piles of offcuts ('brash' or 'lops and tops') will be removed. The answer is that, as was done with previous phases of felling, the Estate will once more be bringing in a 'mulcher' – a large tractor mounted on caterpillar tracks, with a heavy-duty flail mounted on the front, which will chew through the majority of the brash and also deal with some of the holly clumps, reducing them to fragments a few inches in length. Some of the brash will be left as its an ideal habitat for many creatures. This work cannot start until late summer, after all the birds have finished nesting.

Meanwhile, our working parties continue in full swing and take place on most Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Because they are dependent on the weather – we've recently had to cancel a couple of working parties because of excessive heat, which has never happened before – it's best to check our web site for details (where our walking and other activities are also listed):

For the last few months, our Tuesday working parties have been tidying the Clumps, clearing brambles, nettles and bracken from inside the 'Rings' (as pictured in the postcard image), with the assistance of the National Trust's Bradenham Estate, who own the bottom end of the Common.

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
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News from RAF High Wycombe

The connection between Walter's Ash and the RAF goes back a long way. I don't know why they chose that little hamlet, but by the time of the Second World War "The Camp", as everyone called it, had become the home of nothing less than Bomber Command! They had built a huge underground bunker in which our bomber raids on Germany were planned in deep secrecy. We were not supposed to know it was there, although the enormous mound camouflaged by grass and trees was obviously not due to moles.

Village people were more impressed by the eventual building of a cinema in a Nissen hut nearby. This had a sloping floor, comfortable seats, a large screen and showed a different film every week. At a low charge, anyone could attend the "Camp Pictures" and if the film was an A or X, we children could always find a RAF chap to take us in.

The underground bunker was obviously one of the major military sites in the whole country. Very important people, including Winston Churchill, held meetings there with the legendry "Bomber Harris". All very hushhush. But that is where the puzzle comes in. Just a few hundred yards down the road there were several wooden huts nestling under the trees opposite Ash Place. (There were no houses there then, just two small meadows and a path over to The Coppice.) The huts housed about twenty German prisoners of war. There were no fences around the huts and the prisoners seemed free to wander where they liked. It was a puzzle why this was allowed so near the "secret" bunker. (Incidentally, something we kids knew was that if you put your ear to the ventilation shafts on top of the bunker, you could hear what was said down inside.)

Here I have to confess to something I have been ashamed of ever since. There were strings tied between the huts on which the prisoners hung their washing to dry. One day I took a fire extinguisher and squirted it all over their clothes! I did it because they were GERMANS! My only excuse is that I was just six years old, and they were still bombing us.

Perhaps the resolution of the puzzle lay in the type of prisoners there. They were obviously seen as harmless, possibly antifascist men who were simply waiting out the war. One of them made a beautiful chessboard for my cousin Lambert Wilson (see picture).




Another prisoner was a violinist, but his instrument lacked strings, so my brothers Rodney and Roger went to Wycombe and bought what he needed. (The lads were 14 years old.)

Several of the prisoners said they would love to see Oxford, which they heard was very beautiful, so my brothers got them bicycles and set off with them. Unfortunately, the prisoners were so weak from lack of food, that the party had to turn round half-way. However, months later Lambert got some bikes and they managed to get all the way to Oxford.

War is horrible, but sometimes tiny things can happen that soften the harsh memories.

NAWARA AGM 8th July proved to be a popular occasion with a good attendance of residents. On the night nine nominees, including the Hon Treasurer and Hon. Secretary, were elected to the Committee but we have room for up to 12 so if you are interested let me know. The Chairman reviewed the year including the committee's achievements. John reminded those present that NAWARA membership was free of charge and meetings were open to all residents.

Following the AGM our invited speaker Bernie Knill from the National Trust gave a fascinating account of the topsecret bomb target mapping at Hughenden Manor, code named "Hillside", during World War Two. Early in WW2 attempts to bomb enemy targets had limited success due to lack of accurate maps. To rectify the problem 100 skilled men and women were employed to hand-paint detailed bomb target maps from geographic features in aerial photographs of Germany and conquered Europe, taken by air crew based at RAF Benson. As the maps were completed, they were sent to Bomber Command HQ in Walter's Ash. The use of the accurate maps helped to alter the course of WW2 in our favour and possibly shortened it by 2 years. Only 3 of the 3,500



maps are now thought to exist. Two were unearthed by a navigator who used them in WW2 and can be seen at Hughenden Manor, the third was found by our own Philip Hussey as a boy outside the Royal Air Force base immediately after WW2. It is now exhibited in Bomber Harris's WW2 office in former Bomber Command HQ.



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


Sad News

It is with great sadness that I have to inform you that David Greenwood passed away peacefully on 13 July 2022. Una-Lynn was with him at the end.



Gordon the Bird Man

In 1912 the towns of Utrecht near Durban in South Africa and Cheadle in Staffordshire were shown to be connected in a way that would forever transform our understanding of bird migration. This was when the journal "British Birds" published news that a Swallow ringed in Cheadle had been found on a farm outside Utrecht. This was described as the most startling fact that the ringing of birds has yet produced. Swallows have been cherished as icons of long distance migration ever since but that could all be about to change. Records entered into Birdtrack showed that 12-15 Swallows remained in the Penzance area throughout last winter. This number may seem small but it is an extraordinary total given that the previous overwintering records (the first was in 2009) have concerned just the one odd bird. In most years most Swallows have left our shores by the end of October. Any stragglers that do remain tend not to stick around beyond November. Records in December are very rare and the idea that a Swallow could not only survive until Christmas and still be here at Easter and beyond would have seemed absurd.

Like many species that migrate long distances, swallows follow the availability of food, moving North as insects become available at higher latitudes, usually arriving here in April. As has been the case on previous occasions, last winter's Swallows were recorded in a part of the UK where their prey is most likely to be present through the colder months, the southwest, where the Gulfstream has a greater moderating impact on the climate. Winter is hardly a bumper time for insects anywhere in the UK but concentrations along tidelines and near water treatment plants appear to provide Swallows with an important source of food.

Neither Sandhoppers or sewage works are inventions of the 2000s but Met Office data show that average UK temperatures have risen by 1°C over the past 50 years, what's more, analysis suggests that temperatures below 0°C could be a thing of the past in southwest England in just 20 years time.

It takes six weeks for a Swallow covering 200 miles a day to reach South Africa, with the great expanse of the Sahara to cross. At 1000 miles and expanding, it is the greatest challenge faced by any migrating bird, rest is impossible and many Swallows perish during this stage of their journey. So, given the distances and risks involved it's unsurprising that some Swallows would chose a UK winter instead. Migration is always about weighing up chances of survival in one place against another and it may well be that the increasingly balmy prospect of a winter here soon begins to tip the scales further in our favour.

Not to everyone's tastes, but thank goodness we are all different and need different types of R&R otherwise the one dream destination would be overwhelmed.

Last year, we did get away. We had our first ever boating holiday on our own boat, 'Schöne Maid'. 'The Maid' as we like to call her, is basically a floating vintage caravan, built for family fun and comfort, not speed - a deliberate choice of vessel that would allow us to invite visitors aboard and share the pleasures of boating with them. We sailed up the Thames to Reading, meeting with various friends en-route and making excellent use of the various riverside pubs that offered mooring.

There is nothing that can compare with opening your eyes in the morning and seeing dappled sunlight reflecting off the water onto your cabin ceiling. Sailing through locks and mooring along banks was hard physical work, but a lot of fun too. We learnt who the grumpy lock keepers were and tried to cheer them up by praising them for their work; we learnt who the cheery lock keepers were and shared jokes with them. We also got to know a lot more about the community of river users. There is a real camaraderie amongst boaters, no matter how humble or grand your craft. The unwritten rule is you never pass someone who might need help and you share what you have with others.

Jesus knew well the camaraderie of boaters. There are many stories of him going out fishing with his friends on their boats, he often preached from a boat, using the bow as a makeshift pulpit, and he often used boats to travel from one place to another. Surprisingly few of his parables are about boats and seas, but a number of meaningful events in his ministry happen around boats and the sea (in this case, the Sea of Galilee, which is a huge lake regarded as an inland sea).

One of my absolute favourite images of Jesus shows him in a boat, holding on to the rigging, the wind in his hair and laughing. Sadly, I have been unable to find the picture in a format that can be reproduced here, but I do ask that you try to imagine the scene. Jesus, the Son of God, Creator of the Universe, quite simply having fun. It's an image that reminds me that Jesus, whilst divine, was also human, with all the thoughts, feelings and needs that we have. Hymn writers often focus on the sorrow that Jesus shares alongside us, but sharing in laughter and fun is essential to making him fully human.

The 1st of July saw the start of a new Rotary Club year and with it came some new initiatives. Near the end of June we were asked to support "Lighthouse", an event free for local children. It is a fun packed holiday club in a safe and secure environment for 2-4 year-olds, and primary and secondary school children, held during the week 25th to the 29th of July. To help ensure success the Club donated £1000 towards the cost of running the week. July also sees the end of Term for senior secondary school students and, consequently, a new group of Interact members stepping up for the new academic year. Interact is a junior form of Rotary with the same ethos of helping those in need locally, nationally and internationally. Members of our Club act as mentors to, and provide support for, the Interactors in High Wycombe and Princes Risborough. Both groups will begin their activities, including raising money, at the start of the Autumn Term.

Additonally, on the 24th of July a nephew of one of our members made a third attempt to complete a tandem parachute jump for charity (in the past having been hampered by weather) – to raise money to support the increasing needs of the Ukrainian refugees being hosted locally. Our Club has formed a partnership with a group, based in Lacey Green/Loosely Row, that has formed the charity "Ukraine2Chilterns" which is supporting over 100 households who are hosting Ukrainian families. The majority of the refugees arrive with only the clothes they stand-up in. Consequently, the Charity has established a "New2You" shop, providing a range of clothing, shoes, underwear and school uniforms. 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
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
