


Village Hall Christmas Tree Lights






Unfortunately, we had to cancel our annual carol service, and all leader and exec meetings have been online via Zoom.

Friends of Naphill Common

Events

On Sunday 10th October the Bucks Fungus Group held their annual walk around the Common. This had been so popular in previous years that it was felt to be interfering with the serious main purpose of the walk, which is a survey of species to be found on the Common. The BFG have decided that these events will in future be restricted to members only, with a limit on overall numbers.

News

The posts formerly 'guarding' the entrance to Ladies' Mile at the bottom of Downley Road (near Pickup's Pond) had rotted away. We had hoped that the estate might assist in their replacement, but this has not proved possible, so we have installed a new set. The posts have come from invasive holly trees felled by our working parties (real recycling!), and thanks are due to Keith Denning and his team for help in erecting them. The only expense to the Friends was the provision of concrete, but if you like what we consider to be an improved look of the common as a result of our working parties, then do please become a member – it only costs £5 a year and the income helps pay the costs of undertaking this work.

The information boards at each of the five main entrances to the common were installed some 10 years ago and, inevitably, there has been some deterioration in their condition, particularly in the plywood backing material. We have been in discussion with local craftsman Tim Bird of Merlin Signs (he made the new 'pub-style' sign for the Village Hall) and have agreed for them to be restored to their original condition. This will cost a few hundred pounds for each board, so we are in contact with local councils, organisations and businesses in the hope that they will contribute to these expenses, which would otherwise take a significant part of our savings. There has been no change in the plans for the next phase of felling on the Common, which is still expected to start in the next few months.

The Common

Despite some recent rain (at time of writing), the Common remains relatively free from mud – wellington boots are not yet required on most of the tracks – but we can be sure that the mud will return. As they did last year, our working parties will spread wood chip (obtained from local tree surgery activities) to alleviate the worst-affected areas.

Activities

Our guided walks are again taking place, with longer walks (around two hours, finishing with optional lunch at a local hostelry when possible) being led by Ron Collins and Neil McMinn, and usually held on the third Monday of each month, starting at 9:25am prompt from the Village Hall. Shorter walks (around an hour, finishing with optional coffee and cakes at the Bon Ami) are led by Chris Miller and are generally on the first Wednesday of each month, starting at 10:30am from the Village Hall. The walks are free, and all are welcome.

Our working parties are also in full swing and take place on most Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Because they are dependent on the weather, it's best to check our web site for details (where our walking and other activities are also listed):

When my daughters were at primary school, we were blessed with having a share in a family pony. 'Jock' was a grey, section A Welsh Mountain pony who loved children and was the perfect childhood companion for my girls. We shared him with two other families, meaning we had a pony for a third the cost and a third the looking after. With busy lifestyle schedules, being able to ride two days a week was no hardship since each family engaged in different after school activities and a thoroughly amicable arrangement was reached where everyone had access to 'Jock' on the days they wanted to ride.

We always knew winter was on its way when Jock started to grow his winter coat, and this heralded the down side of owning a horse – the winter care. He could stay out all summer long, but as the nights got colder and the weather worsened, twice a week the girls and I would trek down to his field to bring him in and stable him for the night.

I clearly remember it getting to November and stabling 'Jock' in pitch darkness before we went home for tea. 'Crikey!' I would think – 'it's only the beginning of November! How much darker can it get? And Christmas is still weeks away!'

My daughters and I often talk about those days and I smile now as I reflect on them.

As the clocks go back and we enter November, I wonder how many of us will be thinking 'Crikey! It's only the beginning of November! How much darker can it get? And Christmas is still weeks away!' The start of November always seems to see a dip in mood. The weather is worsening, nights are long and dark. The fun of Bonfire Night quickly gives way to a period of nothing as we wait for Christmas. Even the name of this month begins with a negative – *NOvember*.

For the Church, this month sees the end of the Ecclesiastical year, the new year beginning on the first Sunday of Advent. Dig a little deeper and you will see that the church goes out with guite an Ecclesiastical bang. This is the season of saints, beginning with All Saint's day on November 1st and ending with the feast of Saint Andrew the Apostle on 30th November. We often think of Christian Saints as those who have suffered a grisly end because of their faith, and sure enough, there are a good few of those commemorated throughout the month, but there are many others. St Martin who shared his cloak with a beggar is celebrated on the 11th, Queen Margaret of Scotland on the 16th with St Hugh of Lincoln being celebrated on the 17th and St Hilda of Whitby on the 19th. Richard Hooker, William Temple and hymn write Isaac Watts are all remembered on various days throughout this month. Theirs are stories of faith, courage, persistence, love and hope. Some are stranger than fiction. All provide an inspiring moment of enlightenment during this dark time of year.

Perhaps as the days grow darker, you can take inspiration from some of these stories of light.

May you be blessed with the light of God's presence this November.

A Message from Padre Lacey ⁻ What's in a date?

Last month I went over to Albania to preside at a funeral. I had been asked to do it way back in May this year...this is unusual when being booked for a funeral! But, this was a special kind of funeral, and, it would turn out, the date which it was set for, 20th



want to pause for Sgt Twiddy. Or perhaps it's someone else you are more closely linked to... or perhaps it's a story you read recently about someone...whoever it is for, pause for a moment to pay your respects and to then dream the dreams that

October 2021 would have a very profound impact.

On the night of 19 October 1943, Sgt Twiddy was onboard Halifax HR674, which was allocated to carry out Special Operations Executive Operation (SOE) in the skies of Albania. The crew of 7 were joined by two passengers, both attached to the SOE; the purpose of the mission was to drop supplies and the two SOE personnel. Sgt Twiddy was serving as an Air Gunner but was also the reserve pilot. In the early hours of October 20th 1943 the Halifax crashed and all on board lost their lives.


The crash site of the Halifax has recently been discovered and through some amazing work on the side of the military, it meant we could arrange a remembrance and funeral service for Sgt Twiddywhich brings me up to 20th October 2021.

On the 78th anniversary of the fatal crash we gathered to remember and commit Sgt Twiddy's body to the ground. The 20th October 1943 was also Sgt Twiddy's 22nd birthday, so he was committed to his final resting place on what would have been his 100th birthday...got goose-bumps yet!?

Normally I make a link here to a wellbeing or spiritual point for you to take away and ponder on or put into practice, but this time, I want to invite you, wherever you are reading this, to pause. November is a month of remembering, reflecting and taking stock of what we have, because of what so many gave up for us. Perhaps you we can have tomorrow, because someone gave their today.

A Visit to Oradour sur Glane

November sees the observance of Remembrance Sunday. The day we gather throughout the UK and Commonwealth to observe a two-minute silence, acknowledging all those who have lost their lives in conflict around the world. So this month we thought we would try to be a bit topical.

My wife and I love to tour around Europe, particularly old cities and places of historic interest. During this summer we were beetling around France on our way to the south coast when my wife commented "Oh, Oradour is just a few miles away off the next motorway junction". Not being quite as well read as her, my reply was "So, what's there then". She explained its significance in WW2 history.

Oradour sur Glane is a little town about 13 miles north west of Limoges in the Nouvelle Aquitaine region of France. These days the area is predominantly noted for its green, rolling farmland and rich country cooking. However, on the afternoon of June 10th 1944, it was subjected to one of the worst Nazi atrocities committed on French soil. The SS "Das Reich" division surrounded the town and ordered the entire population into the market square. The men were split into groups, corralled into the towns barns and subsequently shot. The women and children were placed in the church, which was then torched. The rest of the town buildings were laid to waste. By the time the SS had finished six hundred and forty two men, women and children had been killed. There were only six survivors.

To this day no one knows the motivation for this barbaric act. The D Day landings had taken place only four days earlier. There is speculation that the Germans were panicking about the direction the war was going and this was a knee jerk reaction. Two days after D Day there had been some sabotage raids by the french around the town of Tulle, about 60 miles south east of Oradour. As a reprisal the SS lynched ninety-nine French resistance collaborators and put the bodies on display as a warning. Maybe something similar was the catalyst here.


Since the events of that day, the entire town has been left almost untouched, as a memorial to the victims. Everything is exactly the same as the Germans left it. The carcasses of rusting cars and bicycles are still in the streets. Shops signs still depict the names of their owners of the day.

Entrance to the village is via the Centre de la Memoire, and is free. There is a small charge for the exhibition.

Which brings us back to the original theme...... Remembrance, the reason why the French sustain the wreckage and memory of Oradour sur Glane.

A Message from the Vicarage



November is traditionally a month of bonfires and fireworks, poppies and remembrance, and for the church the beginning of Advent (Sunday 28th). Significantly for 2021, also the month in which the UK hosts the 26th UN Climate Change Conference (COP26) in Glasgow: 31st October – 12th November.

For me, Advent and COP26 go hand in hand, which I will explain – but first, my thoughts on how we arrived at this critical climate moment:

The Bible tells the story of God, beginning with creation. God created our amazing planet, and all that it contains, with the icing on the cake being humankind. God created us to love. Love God, one another and God gave us specific instructions to look after the world in which we live together. Love is not love if it is forced, God has always given us the choice to love. History shows that we often make bad choices, preferring to choose greed and selfishness over love. There is much goodness in the world, but there is also brokenness.

'Advent' means 'the arrival/coming of something/ someone', it is a season both of looking back and looking forward.

Can you think of a film that you have really enjoyed, where there has been, or you are waiting for, a sequel? For me it is 'Bridget Jones's Diary', with the sequels: 'Edge of Reason' and 'Bridget Jones's Baby'. Perhaps for you, it is a Bond film (have you seen the latest?), or one of the 'Bourne' series? or 'Mad Max', 'Paddington' or 'Frozen'. Did the sequel live up to your expectations? Was it better than the original film?

Advent is a time when we look back to the first film, the story of Jesus' birth. It is set in a broken and messy world, with people living in fear. Fear from the Roman occupation, from indiscriminate tax collectors, from food shortages. At that time God broke into human history in a new and personal way. Jesus grew up alongside ordinary people, teaching the truth about God's love, and in dying, demonstrating the depth of God's love for us all. It is the most incredible original story!

During Advent, we also look forward to the most amazing sequel. God has promised that Jesus will return. His return will be an extraordinary and unprecedented moment in history, very different to his first arrival as a vulnerable baby in Bethlehem. The Bible gives us clues about what it will be like but doesn't say when it will happen – all we are told is the importance of being prepared.

I suggest we are best prepared by going back to God's original instructions, to love God, one another and to look after creation. The Climate Crisis we face affects the most vulnerable in society disproportionately, to show them love we need to take it seriously and play our part.

Can I encourage those of you who pray, to pray for our world leaders as they engage with one another throughout COP26, that they would make courageous decision on our behalf.

Growing Your Own

The latest figures are out. The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs has reported that in the UK we produce only 18% of the fruit and 55% of the fresh vegetables we eat. Even meat comes from animals fed on a lot of imported feed, especially soyabeans. I find the latest figures shocking, and there are reports that farmers are reducing their crops for next year because they cannot recruit workers to pick fruit and vegetables. There seems to be little emphasis in this country on the need for food self-sufficiency. All the more reason for growing your own. It is so easy to grow fruit. Purchase a young bush, plant or tree in mid autumn, put it in, and three years later it should be bearing fruit every year with little maintenance. There will be an awkward gap between November and April when fresh fruit will not be available, but hopefully fruit in the freezer, apples wrapped in newspaper and bottled fruit will help. As for vegetables, if one eats seasonally there should be no need to resort to supermarket produce.

Of course, we like to eat out-of-season vegetables, and fruit which cannot be grown in the UK because our climate is not warm enough. Nevertheless, one day I may be able to grow bananas on my allotment! Global warming is already here and I had evidence of that this year. My strawberry crop usually lasts from May until July. This year, at the end of August, my strawberry plants were simply covered with flowers again, and strawberries appeared. I covered the plot with plastic netting to keep off the birds and harvested strawberries at the end of September. Amazing. I have had the odd flower on the plants in autumn before, but never fruit. As I write the plants are covered with green strawberries and I shall put fleece over them shortly to produce warmth to help them to ripen.

There are believed to be about 317,000 allotment plots in the UK and the waiting list is estimated to be 90,000. My plot is a 10-pole plot and measures 38 feet by 75 feet. We have received notice that the rent will rise next September to £60. When I took on the plot in 1973 the rent was 30 pence per annum. So the rent next year will be 200 times what I used to pay. Quite an inflationary increase! (From RPI data, £1 in 1973 is equivalent to £13.50 in 2021, not £200.) I am not really objecting. The allotments at £60 per annum for a full plot represent amazing value for money. As building land my plot would be worth over £80,000. Paying rent of £60 per annum on something worth £80,000 is a real bargain! Phone the parish clerk on 01494 715296 and stake your claim!


Naphill Tennis Club

Functional Fitness – What is it and how can I measure mine?

There is increasing focus on functional fitness, which quite simply can be considered as being fit for the life you want to lead, and being able to do the activities that you want to do, adeptly.

There are several simple tests you can try at home to assess your general functional fitness and strength, I have described 3 below. Why not give them a go and see how you get on?

6 minute walk test – This is a test of cardio-vascular fitness and, as the name suggests, involves walking on a flat hard surface for 6 minutes and measuring the distance you cover in that time. A healthy mobile adult should be able to cover between 400-700 metres. The test can be taken and retaken over time, to measure improvements and requires no specialist equipment, other than a means of measuring the distance covered (Maybe a Fitbit or Strava app). Alternatively, you can measure out a 10m length marked at each end and can and walk from point to point for the 6 mins.

Balance – Do you still stand up whilst getting dressed and putting on underwear and socks? If you answered yes to this question then great, carry on doing so. If however, you find yourself sitting down, then it would be a good idea to test your balance. To do this time how long you can stand on one leg with eyes closed. If you are right handed, stand on your right leg and lift the left foot off the floor and vice versa. The average 50 year old can hold this for 9 seconds (compared with 28 seconds for a 25-30 year old). There are exercises which can help you improve balance.

Chair Sit to Stand test 30 seconds– This is a good test of leg strength, and involves seeing how many times you can sit down and fully stand up (without using the arms to help you) in 30 seconds. For reference the average for a 60-64 year old female would be 12-17 repetitions. To check that your chair has the correct seat height, the knees should be at right angles when seated.

Butterflies and Orchids

As with the birding year, the butterfly season started slowly and late with both species and numbers very low. So much so that by the end of July I had only recorded eleven species with three being represented by just one individual. All this changed on 15th August. The garden reminded me of my parents garden during the 1950s where during the summer holidays their garden always seemed to be full of butterflies.

I have seven Buddleja with borders and beds of Rudbeckia, Helenium, Sedums and Asters all of which were covered in butterflies, fourteen species and a hundred plus individuals which brought the species count to eighteen, this being about average but numbers were still well down.

The Holly Blue is normally common, first seen in April but this year not until the end of May. This is a bivoltine species which means that it produces two generations in a year. With the spring brood late it follows that the summer hatching was also that much later and I recorded few blues throughout August and September. This trend was not restricted to the Blues – Meadow Browns, Ringlet, Small Copper, Marbled White, Gatekeeper and Speckled Wood have also been recorded very few times.

I do not remember a better year for orchids. Walking down the valley from the Old School House to Loosely Row they seemed to be everywhere, this in part due to work done by The National Trust and Andrew over the last few years. Give nature a chance and she will respond!

Some people will be surprised to know there are over fifty cultivars found in the British Isles, some found at only one or two sites. The Chilterns are well represented with over twenty being recorded. I logged nine but could not find the Ghost Orchid that was reported at our location in the valley.

Toddle In Group nurturing curious minds Pumpkins & Poetry

Once upon a time, words began to vanish from the language of children. They disappeared so quietly that at first almost no one noticed - until one day they were gone.

But there is an old kind of magic for finding what is missing, and for summoning what has vanished. If the right kind of spells are spoken, the lost words might return...'

October the 7th was National poetry day. The children enjoyed some ditties and poems as a small group. The quote above has been taken from 'The Lost Words' by Robert Macfarlane and Jackie Morris. The book has beautiful A-Z of nature based acrostic poems, our favourites include the dandelion and the fern. Their other book is called 'The Lost Spells' and as the children have been learning all about owls, following on from an interest in the red kites flying overhead, they have loved to hear the poem 'Barn Owl'.

These books are special, and there are so many others similar to them. However, for our young children Nursery rhymes present the same qualities. They can hear a rhythm, possibly a rhyming string, or alliterative descriptions. We celebrate poetry and language in their many forms!

It would be remiss of me to get to this point in the season without a mention of pumpkins, hedgehogs and conkers! Our children have been drilling holes in, and threading conkers to create their own number line 1-10. It took them a few days, and a little trial and error and problem solving to get it to work, and it now hangs with pride in our Butterfly room. The children have been learning about owls and hedgehogs too. We are following on from a few children's interest in the beautiful red kites that fly over the villages. The group can now identify and name quite a few owls, and point out what their defining characteristics are.

We have been thoroughly enjoying exploring pumpkins! We have used them to paint, dripping colours carefully using pipettes and watching as the paint trickles down the sides, merging with other colours and finding it's path to the bottom. We have enjoyed scooping out the fibres and the seeds, creating a sensory tray, and pumpkin jelly. The children have their own mini pumpkin patch, where they dig and plant little objects, all the while practising their fine motor skills.

The children have begun to help us with our cooking. They enjoy cutting the vegetables, under the watchful eye of their key-person, and we have found that the children are far more likely to try the new Autumn flavours by being engaged in the process. Today, they enjoyed a roast butternut squash and pumpkin soup with bread rolls they made themselves.

It's such a beautiful time of year! We hope you are all able to get out in to the woods to find Autumn treasures such as conkers, pine cones, and the beautiful Autumn leaves.




