Plant out Brussels, Broccoli, cucumbers, marrows and tomatoes during the latter half od the month. Sow main crop beet and carrotts. Flowers: Still time to plant Gladioli and sweet peas, but wait till danger of frost is past, say the middle of the month before planting out bedding plants.

GARDENING NOTES.

Now that the danger of frost is past complete the planting of summer bedding plants, also Marrows, ridge cucumbers and the like. In spite of the cool conditions during the last month growth had been fairly active particularly among the perennials and the weeds. This suggests two jobs, the staking or otherwise supporting of all tall growing plants and the continual use of the hoe to keep down weeds: Watch out for aphis and other pests, the greenfly are already on the roses. Spray with a good insecticide or at least with soapy water. A dusting of Derris powder will kill those maggets that get into the raspberries. do this when the fruit starts to form. Plant out brussels, broccoli, kales, tomatoes, leeks and celery.

Lift and divide Pinks. Plant Madonna Lilies, Showdrops and Anemones, also Peonies, and new Strawberry Plants, make sure that these are later planted firmly. Lift and store late potatoes and where needed give the hedges a final clipping. September is a good time for making a new lawn or re-seeding bare patches in existing ones. Pot up Hyacinth, Daffodil, Tulip and other bulbs for winter flowering indoors. The pots should be plunged up to their rims outdoors in a cool spot and left there for about three months.



GARDENING NOTES

Damaging frosts can be expected at any time now which will put an end to the summer annuals, so perhaps it would be as well to anticipate this and clean up the borders and prepare for the spring display. Tulips, daffodils, anemones, scillas. snowdrops, crocus and why not try a few ixias (african corn lily), ranunculus and ixiolorion. It is also time to plant wallflowers, sweet williams and polyanthus, also spring . catbages. With these latter, see that the ground is quite hard and that the stems are buried right up to the bottom leaves, this will prevent them being blown about and help them to build up a good root system, and don't forget to keep the lawn mower going as long as the grass keeps growing.
