### MR. LEN BROWN

It was with great regret that we heard of the death of Mr. Len Brown. His many contributions to the Gazette have been appreciated by us all.

The news of Mr. Len Brown's death at the age of 83 will have been received with deep regret; for Mr. Brown was a very gentle man and his sincerity, his kindliness, his patience in adversity and thought for others endeared him to us all. He loved the simple things, and a walk in the woods, listening to the birds, was one of his great delights.

A true countryman, Mr. Brown had lived in the village all his life except during his period of service as a volunteer in the First World War. With his father, he helped to found the Brickfields at Walters Ash some sixty years ago and the fabric of many fine buildings is a permanent memorial to the skill and industry of the Brown family.

Serious illness forced Mr. Brown to give up active work in his chosen craft, but in retirement he was never idle. Year by year he cultivated his garden and produced a fine crop of vegetables which, with characteristic genorosity he shared with friends and neighbours.

He dearly loved a chat and indeed he had much of value to impart, for his was a richly stored mind, and on local history and folk lore, he had no equal; moreover he was a man of varied interests, and having read widely and being gifted with a clear reflective memory, he always had a story to tell.

Over the years his life was shadowed by many personal sorrows but he accepted them with undaunted courage, and when failing sight deprived him of the solace of books, he did not complain, he turned his attention to radio.

Mr. Brown had a wonderful understanding of children, and delighted in their company, and between him and his young twin nephews there was a real bond of sympathy.

As we bid farewell to our old friend, we think of John Bunyan's lines "So he passed over, and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side".

a cemetary for the Parish would be needed. Nothing has been accomplished so far. The charges in Wycombe Cemetary for a new double grave are £22. 10. 6 for the ground £6. 2. 6. for excavation, 10s. 0d to the minister, £1. O. O. for turfing, 15s. Od per annum for half a dozen trimmings, Total £30. 2. O. plus 15s. Od per annum. The charges in Hughenden Church yard are: - nothing for the ground, £6. 2. 6. to the grave digger (and if the relatives prefer they could dig the grave themselves) los. Od to the minister, 5s. Od to the verger, 5s. Od to the Sexton, £1. 0. 0. to the Parochial Church Council for turfing and it is left to the relatives to maintain the grave or pay for it to be done, Total £8. 2. 6. Just compare and you will see how very very fortunate There is not a single Church in this district my parishioners are. other than Hughenden where there is a skilled sexton in residence. nowhere where the fees are more modest. The real trouble is that monuments are erected and then the grave is neglected sometimes after a few years. Even turfed graves are forgotten. There is nothing mo forlorn than a neglected grave. Better no mound and a flat mown turf don't you agree? In the old days the Vicars sheep kept the grass down.

This more detailed factual explanation I trust will smooth ruffled feelings. Just try to count your blessings and be realistic. can the congregation alone keep the Church yard tidy? All those who use it surely are responsible - even the Burial Act says so.

Another little bird tells me Naphill will get cats eyes down that dangerous main road. Yet another blessing!

# GARDENING NOTES

The days are slowly getting longer and it won't be long before we begin to get busy once again in the garden. The limiting factor at the moment is the weather and if we get any frost free spells roses and other shrubs can be planted and herbaceous plants lifted and divided. As soon as the soil can be get into the right condition shallots can be planted, broad beans, early peas, a row of onions and parsnips. course if you have a greenhouse, cold frame or cloches, seeds of brussels, cauliflower and early carrots can be sown under this protection and should grow in fine style. cont....

I know many of you have not ordered your seeds yet, why not do it now and make sure that you have got all the fertilisers you need and that the spray and insecticides are all ready, because there will be plenty of pests about again this year.

One final reminder, the next five or six weeks are the most dangerous for things in store such as gladioli, potatoes, dahlias, begonias and many others, so don't forget to look over such things and make sure that damp mildew, rot or other diseases are not taking possession and that frost is not taking its toll.

Well we have now arrived at the time when we can make a start in the garden, weather permitting.

cont. . . .

### Gardening Notes cont...

On looking around some of your gardens and allotments, including my own, it would seem that there is quite a bit of cleaning up and digging to be done before any sowing and planting can be started. Where things are really bad it means going over some of the patches with a reaping hook, taking out a trench at one end and carting the soil to the opposite end, then skim the weeds and rubbish off with a spade. This can be buried in the trench as work proceeds except of course such perennial weeds as dandelions, docks, couch grass and bindweed. Having done that you can plant those shallots, broad beans, an early variety of peas, some parsnips, a row of early carrots and a little patch of lettuce and risk a few early potatoes.

There is still time to plant or transplant most of those type of plants that come up every year in the herbaceous border and a little slug bait around delphiniums, gypsophils, lupins and the like, because slugs can seriously damage the young shoots that are now starting into growth.

Look over that lawn mower, it will soon be time to cut that grass again.

To avoid further loss of good land what about the Glebe, I suppose the answer is that this belongs to the church and it is no longer a church school.

# HUGHENDEN PARISH CHURCH

About the Glebe, I can give a few facts. Vicar of Hughenden and his successors in law. the Bishop of Buckingham found rather more than £200. 0. 0. to put water borne sanitation into this school and Mr. Herbert Jones offered the School Managers the Glebe for £100. O. O.

It does belong to the In the early thirties They refused it unless cont.....

Hughenden Parish Church cont.... the Diocese found another £100. O. O. and gave them this money wherewith to buy the Glebe! It was enjoyed rent free by the school for many years for gardens. To regularise the position 1s. Od a year rent was asked for it, and it was very difficult to get the Managers to pay even that. There was no uncome or endowment for the school other than the rent of the Teachers House and folk were unwilling to support the school financially. Under the 1944 Act plans the Glabe was offered the County Education Authority - the Authority turned it down out of hand as hopelessly inadequate. The Glebe was leased to the Education Committee on reasonable terms when the school attained Controlled Status soon after 1951 - especially in view of the fact that the buildings on it had lapsed to the ground landlord. The lease was extended without any difficulties being made when the terrapins were erected, and at the same rent by me, although the lease has expired. There was an assurance given me that the area would be tidied up and the hedges repaired! The rent is counted in, of course, by the ecclesiastical authorities as part of the benefice income. Councillors tell me "The Church is fifty years behind the times" . Harsh Counsel! I do hope Naphill will come to realise gradually that the Church of England did try to do something for this hamlet over the course of a century through the school. Is it true that about 1936 a school was offered for this area to cost about £6,000.0.0 and was opposed locally on the grounds of expense?

I am really grateful to the two Naphill subscribers to our Lay Workers Fund and for the £2. 5. 0. they contributed last year, please continue your support.

The Sunday School continues, and the visiting also, though not so fervently. There are other portions of the Farish asking for Pastoral care as you all know.

# GARDENING NOTES

The weather has not allowed us to do very much seed sowing in the garden yet, but although it is very nice to gather fresh vegetables from the garden as early as possible it is not easy at Naphill with our cold clay soil and the high altitude from sea level. As long as the ground is already prepared it won't take long to get the various seeds in. now that the soil is beginning to warm up and the prospects of better weather are improving.

As the first sowings of peas, lettuce, radishes and similar crops come through further sowings should be made to keep up a succession. Don't be too eager with the beetroot, the end of the month is quite soon enough, but you can try a small sowing of early carrots during the next week or so, also some early potatoes. Get the site ready for runner and dwarf beans, but of course don't sow 'till next month.

Gladioli and sweet peas can go out when the weather is suitable and a start can be made with cauliflower, brussels and other green stuff and remember we may expect frosts till the middle of May at least.

The weather has not been too kind for getting small seeds in or in fact for catching up on those gardening jobs, but cheer up, better weather is bound to come.

May can be a bit tricky with the possibility of late frosts, but potato planting can now be completed and runner and kidney beans planted any time after the 7th. Prepare the site for the marrow bed and the ridge cucumbers and why not make an early start with leeks and celery.

Tomatoes can now be planted in the cold greenhouse but it is safer to leave outdoor planting until the beginning of next month, this also applies to Dahlias. When polyanthus have finished blooming, split up the large clumps and plant out in a reserve border until the autumn. Seeds of most annuals can be sown in the open garden. Shirly Poppies, Candytuft, Cornflower and Linum or Toad Flax are a few of the easy ones. Watch out for pests above and below ground and keep the hoe going.

### GARDENING NOTES

Here we are in June and we hope free from frosts for a few months, but it would be nice to have some warm nights, less wind, and some nice warm showers.

However, we must now get on with the planting of marrows, cucumbers and tomatoes and of course all the summer bedding plants and the runner beans. Don't forget to sow more carrots, peas, lettuce adish, beetroot and spinach and of course canterbury bells, wallflowers, forget-me-nots and sweet williams for next spring. Look around your roses, some are already in bloom and most of the shoots have a bud at the end, but others end up with nothing, or what is known as a blind shoot, these should be shortened by about two thirds their length, this will encourage a new bud to grow which should result in flowers. Watch out for those greenfly, there are plenty of good insecticides on the market.

## IS IT "TOO LATE" ?

"You can't stop Progress", as the lady said at the bus-stop; and it seems only too true: In the name of progress the beauties of Lancashire were exchanged for slag heaps, slums and soot and in its name our villages in Bucks are being turned into monotonous dormitory suburbs, our lanes into racing tracks for cars and our fields are cut up to make arterial speedways.

All the more reason, then, to honour "Agricultural Correspondent" and to consider carefully his protest in the last "Gazette". He instances, particularly, the extension of the R.A.F. camp area. It is all too easy to forget that the soldier cannot fight without food and that every fruitful field made barren makes us more dependant cont.....

upon imported food in times of crisis.

He mentions other aspects of the destruction of the countryside which goes apace so rapdily that it may be too late for action unless country people realise what is at stake.

The man from the town is not likely to help. He continues to seek refreshment from it in his car and thereby destroys, unintentionally the very object of his visits. The original footpaths in the lanes were covered over, on the advent of the car, and became part of the road. Now that almost everyone has a car the lanes are On the grounds that a foot-path still too narrow for over-taking. is a necessity the lanes are widened. The hedgerows, the trees, the brambles and the wild flowers are cut down. The birds fly away. Petrol fumes replace the scent of honeysuckle and wild rose. village street is filled with lorries and tankers taking short cuts The pleasure motorist now strives to over-take from the main road. these in order to drive further afield to seek the narrow lanes where country delights still exist. Again he finds the more remote village "unsuitable for cars" and, in the name of progress, its lanes are widened in their turn and its attractions for him disappear.

It is not only that the countryman sees his native village destroyed. The tragedy is that the visitors in cars do not realise that they are rapidly depriving themselves of the very object of their outings and seem unaware of the small proportion of the area of England which remains "unspoilt"

If, on the other hand, the townsman settles in the country he usually brings the town with him. Brick walls and iron gates replace the hedges and trees and his dwellings are packed by the speculative builder into tight "ribbon development" which shuts off any view of the countryside from the road, and he is encouraged by vested interests and the popular press to ridicule "Town and Country Planners."

The English countryside is amongst the most precious things we may pass on to our children and every blade of grass is worth fighting for. Since the nineteenth century it has decreased in area and is now shrinking with incredible swiftness. It can never be replaced.

Ought we not to weigh up the cost of this sort of "Frogress" and, in particular, to ask whether the joys of "stepping on it" are worth the terrible toll of death and injury, the dreary By-passes and the spoliation of natural beauty now seen to be inevitable if we all claim the right to use cars whenever and where-ever we choose?

Are the people of Naphill prepared and willing to accept the responsibility of defending its rural characteristics; not only for themselves but for future generations?.

## GARDENING NOTES.

"Come ye thankful people come, raise the song of Harvest Home" The singing of the grand old hymn will be heard in places of worship all over the country during the next few weeks. Take all the leaves from tomatoes that are below the fruit trusses yet to be picked and stop feeding the plants giving water only. Plant out the first batch of spring cabbage, sow a variety of lettuce like Arctic King to stand the winter.

Don't let up on those weeds and dig over any vacant ground as soon as the crops have been gathered. Clean up that strawberry bed and plant out runners to make a new one.

Quick acting fertilisers, and water laid on to houses and fields, together with modern techniques, make those days an evil memory, but there were no loud speaker vans at elections. Progress has its price.

## GARDENING NOTES.

Sorry my notes did not appear last month owing to pressure of other work. However, I hope you have kept up to date with the seasonal work without my reminders.

First, a word about those lawns; before cleaning and storing the lawnmower, satisfy yourself that the grass is reasonably short and if not then raise the cutters slightly and give it one more mowing, you won't do it any harm and it will make things much easier next spring.

Now those dahlias, gladioli, begonias etc. all safely under cover? raspberry canes all tied up to their supports and the old fruiting canes removed? Wallflower, polyanthus, forget-me-nots,

sweet williams, daffodils, crocus, tulip and snowdrop bulbs all planted? Dead flower stems cut down in the herbaceous border? weeds removed and the whole lightly forked over to present a neat appearance? All vacant soil dug over and left rough to weather? strawberry bed and other soft fruits clear of weeds? I am sure you will not be able to answer yes: to all these questions, but they are all jobs that should be done as soon as possible.

Finally many bush roses have made excessive growth this year and although I am not in favour of complete pruning at this time it is advisable to shorten by about half any long growths to avoid wind damage during the winter.

## GARDEN NOTES.

Things are rather quiet in the garden just now, but of course there are always jobs to be done if one is sufficiently interested, and the most important is winter digging. If not already completed press on with this work during the next few weeks as after the turn of the year the weather may not be so kind.

Now is a good time for planting new roses and other shrubs and if you ordered them early they will be arriving about now. Watch for the soil mark round the base and use it as a guide for re-planting, spread out the roots as evenly as you can so that they are not buried cont...

Garden Notes cont.....

too deeply, remember that the nurseryman has to pull them together for ease of packing and despatch, and you must spread them out again when planting.

Clean and oil all tools not in use, car sump oil is quite suitable for this. Prume fruit trees as needed and spray with tar oil or D.N.C. Mr. Rivett has stocks of these - and follow the instructions on the container. Examine fruit and vegetables in store, also dahlias, gladioli etc., the warm damp spell may have started up mildew or rotting.
