PUBLIC MEETING, VILLAGE HALL. TUESDAY, 16TH JANUARY. -

The Gazette has been informed that a critical stage has been reached in the paper's financial affairs. The Village Council's recent appeal for contributions to be made in envelopes, as an alternative to the usual annual door-to-door collection, met with a poor response. The amount received, in spite of some generous individual contributions, is insufficient to meet the cost of printing the Gazette.

A public meeting has now been called for January 16th with a view to discovering whether the failure is due to an inconvenient arrangement for the collection of your money; or because you no longer want the Gazette. The meeting seeks an answer and readers are warned that it may be assumed that the Gazette is not wanted if they fail to attend. In that case this January issue may prove to be the last!

The Gazette is more than 30 years old and Naphill recently received the congratulations of the B.B.C. Its programme of events at the Village Hall and the arrangements of the various Societies, Institutes and Clubs forms a vital link in village life. It stimulates sport, scouting and leisure activities. It helps new residents to find friends easily and to feel at home here. It costs the price of one or two cigarettes.

BUT; it can only be produced if, in addition to paying its way, it receives generous voluntary help. The second object of the meeting therefore is to find out if there are people in Naphill, particularly young people, who are

GARDENING NOTES

Now that we have broken the back of the seasonal festivities it will soon be time to bend our backs garden wise. With the catalogues arriving by almost

every post, we can spend a few pleasant evenings sorting our requirements of flower and vegetable seeds. Should the weather be favourable, shallots can be planted and for those with greenhouses and cloches sewings of onions, broad beans, brussels, cabbage and lettuce. In fact there are quite a few jobs to be done in the greenhouse, taking cuttings of chrysanthemums, heliotrope verbenas and carnations. Fuchsias can be started into growth. Sweet peas can also been sewn for planting out in April.

Take advantage of any open weather to catch up with digging but be careful not to disturb the roots of growing plants.

Should the ground be hard with frost this will be a good opportunity to cut down old flower stems and clean up fallen leaves from brussels and other greenstuff and also to wheel any manure or compost onto the plot ready for digging in when the time comes.

Don't forget dahlias, gladioli, potatoes and other things in store. Remove any that show signs of decay.

Potatoes can be put into trays in a light frost-proof place so that they can produce some nice sturdy shoots at planting out time.

Water all plants in pots carefully, giving more when they are coming into flower and less when they have finished flowering. One or two good soakings each week is better than giving daily dribbles.

HELP FOR THE GAZETTE.

The presence of 75 residents at the meeting in the Village Hall on January 16th to decide the future of the Gazette proved that it is very much valued. The Chairman of the Village Hall Council, Mr. Harold Tweedale, after a brief statement of the meeting's object asked for anyone who wished to state their views.

The responce was gratifying in the extreme, the following being generously offered:-

The Youth Organisations volunteered to make a house to house collection. Messrs. Lawrence offered to duplicate the Gazette : all that the Gazette will have to do is to pay for the paper.


Mrs Stevenson offered to type and prepare stencils ready for duplication. There were other offers to do the typing which have been noted for future needs if necessary.

The Social Club's offer at the end of the meeting to make good the deficiency of £.49. or last years Gazette came in for an especial round of applause.

So the Gazette goes on to fulfil a very essential need in the village and may we finish this announce ent by saying that the result of the recent request for contributions by envelopes resulted in our Treasurer receiving £.27. from 148 envelopes out of the 550 envelopes sent out. This is really a very poor proportion and it is hoped that the collection planned later in the year will meet with response from all the 550 households and make the continuation of the Gazette a certainty for as far as thought can reach.

The Chairman thanked Mr. Holmes for excellent work in the past as Editor and hoped he would continue for many years to come. These sentiments were given hearty applause by all present.

HUGHENDEN PARISH CHURCH.

During the month of February candidates for confirmation will be presented to the Bishop of Buckingham at Lane End Church on Wednesday 20th February at 8.pm. as a part of the policy of linking up with parishes like our own. In our Church there will be no visiting preachers, but the usual services are available. should like to draw attention to the Sunday Schools. They are not intended to be a substitute for Church Services. The teaching given is not an alternative to the religious instruction received in day schools but a supplement. The nation is slowly awakening to the vital place religion plays in our lives and a growing realisation that the amount of instruction on this vital matter in the schools, though useful, is not enough. It is of little worth for people young or old to have merely slight acquaintance with the Scriptures. The teaching of Christ must be put into practise. That is what a Sunday School endeavours to do for the young. It would be infinately more effective if the principles were put into practise in homes as well. It is in the homes of England that the battle for the souls of her people is being fought. Even a casual survey must show that the battle is being lost because so many parents have ceased to be interested, or committed, followeres of Christ Jesus, Our Lord and Saviour.

In Naphill there is a Sunday School held in the School at 2.30.pm. to give instruction according to the principles of the Established Church and the full Gospel. Of all the children in Naphill what proportion attend the three Sunday Schools.? The answer is proof that there is need for honest soul searching thoughts by all.

GARDEN NOTES

As soon as soil conditions are right, there are a few jobs we can get on with in the open garden, including the planting of shallots, garlic and jerusalem artichokes. It is also a good time to lift and divide chives.

I find that the transplanting of lupins, delphiniums and pyrethrums, particularly the two latter, when they are split up to increase stock, re-established themselves much quicker in our Naphill clay if the job is done this month, rather than in the autumn.

Still bearing in mind the opening paragraph - sowing of onion, parsnip, lettuce, brussels and early cabbage can be made. Also broad beans, and despite what some people say, anenomes can be planted and thrive in our Naphill soil.

Now is a good time to cut back hedges of beech, hornbeam, tamarisk and cotoneaster simonsii. This is the time of year when a greenhouse, cold frame or cloches can be very useful because many of the seeds and plants already mentioned can be started off whatever the outside conditions.

For instance shallots, broad beans, early peas, onion, brussels and cauliflower can be put into boxes and require little or no heat to start growing, and they can then be transplanted into the open garden when conditions out there improve.

GARDENING NOTES. contd.

Where heat is available other seeds such a salvia, lobelia, antirrhinum, tomatoes and sweet peas can be sown.

Put begonias and gloxinias into peat leaf soil or other loose medium and water to start them into growth.

Re-pot and prune fuchias and increase their water supply, also box up dahlias in peat or other loose material to provide cuttings if you want to increase your stock.

GARDENING NOTES

Its time now, if and when the soil is not too wet, to go over any of those parts that were dug and manured during early winter and get them ready for sowing and planting.

First sprinkle over with a good general fertiliser, (bonfire ash, compost, peat, or similar material), then lightly fork over and break up the large lumps. Follow this with a good raking to get it down to a fine tilth.

All will then be ready, for onion seed or sets, (not plants yet), broad beans and shallots, if not already in, peas, brussels, early cabbage, some lettuce and a row of early carrots.

Some of the hardy annual flowers can also be sown out of doors during the month: sweet peas, clarkia, godetia and candytuft. Complete the planting of roses and other shrubs. Evergreens can still be planted next month. Spray peaches with lime sulphur as a precaution against leaf curl. Prune roses.

Brush and rake off all rubbish and worm cast from the lawn ready for the contd.

first cut, but don't forget to set the knives high and gradually lower with each succeeding cut.

Almost all kinds of seeds can now be sown in the greenhouse but leave asters, zinnias, marrows, cucumbers, and other half hardy kinds till the end of the month, or next month.

Begonias, gloxinias, fuchias and geraniums should be encouraged into growth, Yes, you can start planting gladioli now.

GARDENING NOTES.

Spring is here, and Easter is not far away. The clocks have been altered to give us an extra hour of daylight. Now all we want is some reasonable weather and it will be full steam ahead in the garden.

This doesn't mean that the whole garden should be planted at once, especially the vegetable plot. Leave room for the successional crops. There are early mid-season and late peas and if these are sown at two or three weekly intervals you can have them over a long period; likewise lettuce and radish.

Broad beans, beetroot and many other crops give an extended season of gathering if second and even third sowings are made.

So for now sow some, peas, cauliflower, stump-rooted carrots, lettuce, savoys, cabbage, turnips, and beet. Plant potatoes, asparagus, artichokes and onion plants and prepare ground for runner beans and celery.

Mulch newly-planted trees and shrubs, and complete the planting of herbacious perrenials.

Autumn-sown sweetpeas can be planted out; also border carnations and summer flowering bulbs such as gladioli, Give established lawns a top dressing of good lawn fertiliser followed in a few weeks time by a selective week killer.

In the greenhouse sow the remaining annual seeds - prick out seedlings before they become too crowded - pot up chrysanthemums and continue taking dahlia cuttings.

Water plants regularly and shade when periods of sunshine cause drooping or burning.

Don't neglect plants in pots that have finished blooming. Keep them watered and allow them to die down naturally.

CARDENING NOTES

Our gardening like the cow's tail is all behind, but with improving conditions things are now growing apace, Remembering last year and those late frosts will make some of us a little wary about getting those bedding out plants too early, although our English climate is so unpredictable we may escape them this year. However there are plenty of jobs to be done this month after catching up with last months work. Another sowing of peas lettuce and radish, savoys, broccoli and sweet corn, runner beans, french beans, and marrows can all be sown in the open during this month, we can also plant out onion, cabbage, celery and brussel sprout plants, and of course the rest of the potatoes.

Any newly planted fruits and shrubs will benefit by a mulch of manure, compost or even grass mowings. Thin out any unwanted raspberry suckers as soon as they appear.

Clean up the strawberry bed placing litter or mats around the plants to keep the fruit clean, and if you are interested take cuttings of azalea, heathseytisus and hydrangea.

Thin out hardy annuals sown in the open last month and sow others that are still in the packet. Half hardy annuals such as zinnias, asters, marigolds etc., can be sown in the open during this next week or two.

If you have any stuff in the green house orcold frame make sure they are hardened off before planting in the open garden, by giving them all the light and air possible by taking of the lights or standing outside during the day time but cover up if frost threatens.

FARMING NOTES

Lichuckled when I heard it said the other day that anyone who claims to be a gentleman-farmer is probably neither! How true this is I wouldn't know but it reminded me of some figures I saw recently which showed that the percentage of owner occupiers is now 60 as against 40 a few years ago. You may think it is a good thing that the yeomen of England should own their own farms; but I doubt if this is the whole story. True many estates have been broken up and the tenants have somehow found the money to buy their own farms, like Dan Archer of Brookfield, but in many cases the reverse is happening. On the Dashwood estate at West Wycombe and the Hampden estate to the north of Naphill sons who have been running farms for years on behalf of an aged father, and expecting to take over the tenancy on the old man's death, have been turned out, and bull-dozers have knocked down buildings and hedges turning three farms into one, to be run by the owner. "Vertical Integration" and "Big Business" have taken over.

In this connection I hear that the new owner of North Dean House has made a takeover bir also. In this case the tenant of Home Farm North Dean is very much alive as anyone can see who looks over his well-trimmed hedges. So the owner has paid him to give up his tenancy. But it makes you think! Is the small farmer really doomed?

GARDENING NOTES.

Following the recent rains things have been coming along nicely this last week or so, (I hope there have been no frosts between the time of writing this and its appearance in the Gazette), and it is now possible to get out the summer bedding plants, the marrow, runner beans, tomatoes and all the less hardy stuff, including the dahlias. Then of course all kinds of greenstuffs can be planted out as they become available. Continue to sow batches of lettuce and radish to keep up the supply, with another row of peas, beetroot and carrots for winter store. Earth up potatoes before they get too tall. Stake and tie all tall growing plants as needed and don't wait until they get knocked over by strong winds or heavy rain. Thin out seedlings of all kinds before they get too large - but if they are weed seedlings aim at total destruction. Sow wallflower, sweet william and similar seeds to provide plants for next spring. Put out azaleas, pot and all, in a shady part of the garden and don't forget to water them as needed.

GARDENING NOTES.

. Well: Well! Thous late frosts seem to be getting later each year but the damage done seemed to vary from garden to garden.

The sun and drying winds this last month has made watering a number one priority and weather the topic of the moment.

Any shrubs and trees that were newly planted during last winter should be watched carefully. If growing then let well alone, but if standing still an occasional good scaking and a mulch of straw fern or grass mowings will help. Now is your last chance to now wallflowers, sweet williams etc., for next years display. Continue to thin out seedlings and be careful with dry fertiliser. Water it in if those rains don't come along.

Remove dead flower heads from lilac and similar flowering shrubs and also from plants in the border.

If you are going on holiday see that pot plants have plenty of water, the lawns cut nice and short before you go, but better still get a kind neighbour to keep an eye on things while you are away.

FARMING NOTES.

A symptom of this aggravating season which you may have noticed, is that what we call the Mayflower, has been blooming gaily all through June. Spring started a month late and has not cought up yet. The late frosts held back the grass, made the corn look sick and yellow and prevented the seeds from germinating. Most of these things will recover except some fields that were sown with grass seeds in March. Many farmers are presented with a problem, whether to leave it and hope, or rip it up and start again. If you have ever sown even a small lawn, you can guess what this must cost.

Now Wycombes cattle market is in danger. The Council want the site, but they will not provide an alternative one in the town. They are suggesting putting the cattle market two or three miles out of the town, a suggestion which seems to please nobody. A Ministry decision on this point is due very shortly.

The airborne arrival of Air Vice Marshal and Wrs. Dwyer and the spectacular display by the belicopter undoubtedly assured the success of the Fete. We offer grateful thanks to the R.A.F. for their magnificent contribution. Nonetheless, we remember the solid backing provided by the numerous other items which supplied nonstop variety and entertainment through at the afternoon. To the Tug-of-War teams, the stall-holders, the children, the Firms and traders who donated gifts, the ladies who were so overworked supplying teas, and to everyone else who spared time, labour or money for the occasion, the Fete Committee record their appreciation. Finally, a special mention is due to the faithful few who stayed behind late into the evening to clear the field and tidy up.

GARDENING NOTES.

There are a few useful sowings to make this month including onions for over-wintering where they are sown and then transplanted into a prepared bed next spring(better than onion sets), Spring cabbage, turnips, and endive, also later in the month lettuce, Arctic or Imperial for standing the winter.

If you want blooms for Christmas plant prepared hyacinths and for paper-white narcissus now.

Black currents should have all this years fruiting wood cut out as soon as the crop is gathered, this applies also to raspberries all the fruiting canes should be cut out to allow the new ones to develop.

Now is a good time to take cuttings of outdoor carnations and pinks, also violas, aubretias and other rockery plants, and don't forget those cyclamen

laying dry in their bots in some odd corner.

Shake them out of their old soul, re-pt and water regularly till growth restarts.

Dahlias need staking and tying and all fading blooms taken off regularly. Gladioli in exposed positions also need cames to avoid crooked stems and that drunken look after these summer storms.

Before earthing up celery take away all side-shoots, and order those bulbs for next Springs display.

EIGH WYCOMBE'S NEW MUSEUM

The nearest way from the Town centre is by way of Castle Street and them up Castle Place and across the railway bridge. After turning right in Priory Way the entrance to the Ruseum is about 100 yards on the left. The gateway is rather inconspicuous and the notice board is partly hidden under trees. The building, which has been in the past a public house, a farm and an attractive residence, stands on grassy slopes with terraced beds of flowers and trees. From the front door there is a spacious view across the wooded valley with no sigh of High Wycombe's High Street hidden between.

The three rooms on the ground floor display many intriguing objects, pictures and furniture in addition to those formerly shown at the Library. Thereis an authentic "Bodger's Shack" with an etching of Naphill's Famous Mr. Goodchild by Stanley Anderson, a delightful (usen Anne corner cupboard in pine-wood, paintings including one of Lord Shelburne attributed to Sir Joshua Reynolds, a small collection of Staffordshire pottery, pillow lace; and straw plait work. One treasure is a Jacobean "Ladies Companion"; a casket covered with drawn silk-work of fine colouring.

It is very pleasant to walk round the house and to rest on a monumental stone seat in a charming setting. The more adventurous may scramble to the top of a pointed hillock where there is a romantic "castle". There are said to be plans for a Folk Museum in the stable buildings and the upper front floor will provide space for exhibitions.

The hours of opening are from 6-8pm. on Mon. Tues. and Thursday and from 10-6.pm. on Fri. and Sat. The grounds remain open during daylight hours. Mycombe is fortunate in having such an inviting rendezvous for interest and refreshment.

ENGLAND IN MINIATURE.

At Long Wittenham in Berkshire, about a mile-and-a-half from Clifton Hampden on the Abin-don-Wallingford road, there is an old Public House known as "The Three Poplars" now used as a Youth Hostel. The Warden, Mr. Royk England, spends his spare time constructing a model village and railway system.

The period represented is circa 1930 and the intention is to build and preserve a typical English village for the benefit of future generations.

The models are exact in every letail and built to scale, the original building having been photographed from every angle and measured meticulously both inside and out. When finished each model is an exact replica even to the furnishing and exterior effects of weather and age. The thatch used is of human hair and is laid as far as possible in conformity with actual methods.

The model railway system includes, among other items, Walkham Viaduct (by Brunel) on the Tavistock and Launceston branch line. The locomotives and rolling stock are working models and accurate down to the smallest detail. A considerable amount of research has ensured that they truly represent the period reproduced.

Mr. England estimates that it will take him more than twenty years to complete his plan.

The models are on view to visitors at three o'clock every Saturday and Sunday all the year round (the Saturday after Easter excepted) and there is a small fee to help defray the heavy expenses incurred in the project.

HUGHENDEN PARISH CHURCH.

Just twenty years ago Naphill School put in a very strongly worded demand to the newly arrived incumbent for money to re-surface the playground. It was raised by the efforts of many within a twelvemonth. A long stream of demands followed. Little seemed to have been done in the way of Church repairs too over a long period. Church Schools, and for that matter most other Schools, throughout Bucks seemed to be needing attention. Widespread ignorance about the funds available led to some acrimony - it was quite a surprise to many to know that there was no endowment for schools in this parish - and no central pool of money. Local, self-help was the only channel which could be worked. Quite soon Naphill will have a new school paid for by public money. Which means, yours and mine. It makes one think!

On October 1st a Quiet Day for Mothers Union workers is being arranged at out Church. And a similar Retreat for Clergy on October 15th. The Rev.Fr. Bean S.S.J.E. is coming to take the day for the Clergy.

Our visiting preacher from the Missions to Seamen due to come on October 7th is in hospital. There is no one to take his place, so we must forego the pleasure of his visit.

I wonder if the public realise yet that a great shortage of ordained clergy confronts the Established Church and the Free Churches too. The obvious way of meeting the situation is to relieve the Clergy of all the jobs a layman can do - and let them do the work for which they were ordained, namely teaching, preaching visiting, administering the Sacraments & taking services. All too often ministers of religion are expected to raise money, organise social events, run clubs, edit papers sign forms and entertain generally. Their real work is far more vital to the community.

FIFTY YEARS AGO

The older members of the Village will remember an old railway carriage standing where the Terrapins now stand, next to Naphill School. About 1910/1911 the carriage was disused. Major Kentish, later Lt. Col. of Great Kingshill, asked Mr. Stacey to form a Scout Troop using the carriage as Scout Headquarters. This was very shortly after the famous Brownsea Island Camp which Lord Baden Powell himself led. Thus the first Naphill Scout Troop was formed over fifty years ago. The Troop played a great part in the Hughenden Valley Boy Scout Local Association of which Mr. Coningsby Disreali was the President.

The Bucks Free Press of 12th August, 1912 recalls a Church Parade at Hughenden Church. The Naphill and Kingshill Scout Troops attended, and were reviewed by the President and Major Kentish. Col. Tythe was the District Commissioner.

The First World War came, and by this time the Troop had made much progress under their Scoutmaster Mr. Stacey. A concert was given in Maphill to raise money for the Summer Camp Fund, and at the 1913 Annual General Meeting of the Hughenden District Local Association it was announced that Mr. Stacey was one of the only two warranted Scouters in the District. The Assistant Scoutmaster was Mr. Hussey. The Troop carried on during the War years under great difficulties and after the War Mr. Hussey became the Scoutmaster. During this time a Competition was held at Hounslow and the Troop won a Trek Cart.

Eventually the Group closed down and although it was revived from time to time it was eventually opened up again in 1941 by Fred Deane (at present Assistant County Commissioner for Rover Scouts) and Phil Bowell. Later, after another closed period Phil and Jim Strange opened up a Cub Pack, and the Scout Troop was re-opened by Messrs. Barlow and Chamberlain of the R.A.F. Maphill, to become the 19th High Wycombe (Maphill) Scout Group. Phil and Jim, (now District Cub Master) are still with us and others from the R.A.F. have taken over the Troop.

It has been decided by all concerned with the Group that this year, over 50 years since the 1st Naphill Scout Troop was formed by Mr. Stacey, and 21 years since the formation of theTroop, a dinner should be held for all the past members of the Group and their wives. This has now been arranged, and if you have ever been a Scout or Scouter of the Group and Phil or Jim have not already contacted you, please see one of them, and if you have any old photos perhaps you could bring them too.

The month's news from the Group must of necessity be short but we would like you to remember these dates:-

October 6th. Jumble Sale at the Village Hall.

27th. Bazaar at the Village Hall.

November 2nd. Dinner for past Scouts and their wives.

This is a District Competition in cooking, map reading etc., A great effort, worthy of this 50th and 21st Anniversary Year.

GARDENING NOTES.

Harvest Home has already been celebrated at the Mission Hall and our Friends at the Chapel will be doing likewise this week-end.

What has the harvest been in your garden? Altogether not top bad a year with most crops, although I hear that in some gardens certain crops have been poor, whilst in others a similar crop has been good, such as for instance potatoes and runner beans.

There must be a reason for this and I know of one case where the runners were not good although they didnt show much sign of it, they were being attacked by slugs around the stems which was holding up growth.

However it is time to gather in the harvest and prepare for next spring: bulbs to be planted wallflowers and other spring subjects to be planted out.

Frosts can be expected at any time now so begonias, fuchias, gladioli and dahlias will have to be put in their winter quarters.

Give celery and leeks their final earthing up. Plant out spring cabbage. Clean up all spont crops and place all disease-free stuff on the compost heap. The rest will have to go on the bonfire.

Dig over all vacant plots and carry on with mowing the lawn while the grass is still growing.

GARDENING NOTES.

Please to remember on the fifth of Wovember that bunfire ash if collected when dry and stored in the shed is excellent stuff for the seed bed next spring, and also a valuable dressing for potatoes, roses, sweet peas and many other crops.

From now on much planting and replanting can be done. New roses, fruit trees and other shrubs can be planted, those overgrown clumps in the herbaceous border split

up and any new plants put in.

But first of all the border should be cleared of old flowering stems weeds and other rubbish and the whole forked over to present a neat appearance. All bulbs, spring bedding plants and spring cabbage should be in their permanant places by now, and the pruning of apples and pears can be attended to as soon as the leaves have fallen.

Dig all vacant ground and incorporate manure or compost leaving the surface rough to weather through the winter.

Gladioli and dahlias should now be taken up and stored away from frost.

Outdoor chrysanthemums should be cut down as soon as the blooms have finished and the stool's placed in a cold frame, or something similar where they can be protected from the frosts and heavy rains. Dont forget to put a few slug pellets around them



GARDEVING VOTES.

Christmas is coming and the end of the year is a good time for taking stock. Although it is impossible to grow and cook, all one's own food, it is surprizing how near one can get with the help of a good housewife.

You could have from your own garden and store: Fresh Fruit such as apples, pears, tomatoes, nuts etc.,

Vegetables - Potatoes, brussels, parsnips, onions, carrots, beet, celery & chicory. Preserves, could include tomatocs, plums, greengages, cherries, apples and pears also beet. Chutneys and Pickles containing cauliflower, red cabbage, onions and shallots.

Jams of many kinds of soft fruits including marmelade, strawberries, raspberries, red and black currents; even japonica jelly, to say nothing of the numerous fruit wines and of course home-baked bread.

Then for decoration a few chrysanthemums, a bowl of hyacinths even a few roses picked in the bud stage and preserved in an air tight tin, with some evergreen and berried shrubs.

Apart from the Christmas presents that Abesn't leave much for you to buy except milk. What about keeping a goat? For eggs get half a dozen hens, for meat a couple of cockerels, which will provide manure for the garden.

This is not a complete list and not all gardens can produce all these things, but many gardens could produce more than they do!

Why not make a party game of it and see how big a list you can make, but remember only Home-made or Home-grown.
