

County Councillor's Report

The New Year has had a very mixed start. The economic crisis and the arctic weather have both driven home the difficulties which will confront many of us and our families this coming year. Financial difficulties face us all including the county council and

already plans are in place to make dramatic changes to the way we work and the services we provide. Despite this we are making every effort to maintain and improve services with reduced costs by improving efficiency. We aim to reduce Council spending by £22 million a year by March 2012 in order to live within our income. This could mean the loss of nearly 400 full time equivalent staff posts. It is hoped these posts will

be lost mainly through natural wastage or redeployment. This will be coupled with improvements in the service which will involve workers in the community, such as care workers, being able to access council systems from places such as libraries around the county so that they can spend as much time as possible with clients and reduce their need to travel.

The dumping of waste is not only illegal but it disfigures our countryside. The following case illustrates how the county council will prosecute those who dump. Lauren Charlotte Speck, 22 years, of Kent pleaded guilty and was convicted at Wycombe Magistrates Court on 3rd December 2008 for an offence of knowingly causing the illegal dumping of controlled waste. The court heard that early on Tuesday 27th May 2008 a member of the public at Greenwood, Walter's Ash, High Wycombe saw a woman take several carrier bags of what appeared to be rubbish from the boot of a car and place them to the side of the vehicle. The woman got into the front passenger seat and the car drove quickly off. The witness reported the matter to the RAF Military Police. The carriers were found to contain plastic and glass bottles, newspapers and magazines. The owner of the car explained that she had been driving on the day and had been visiting people in the area. She said that there was a rattling noise coming from the boot of the car and that her friend had told her to stop the car. She claimed that when she stopped the car, her friend had got out, opened the boot and removed carrier bags placing them beside the car. She said that having seen that the friend's action had been witnessed; she had panicked and driven off quickly. She said she later realised that the carrier bags contained waste materials that she had been intending to take to a recycling bank. The Magistrates ordered Ms Speck to pay £1,555 in fines and costs.

To date the Partnership has secured 120 convictions against individuals and companies for illegal dumping and related offences. This has resulted in a significant reduction in reported incidents and a saving to the Buckinghamshire tax payer of over £250,000, principally through reducing removal and disposal costs. If you see anyone dumping waste illegally in Buckinghamshire please report it on the illegal dumping hotline at 0845 330 1856.

My congratulations to the Hughenden Valley Community Shop group who have secured planning permission for a temporary building at Hughenden Village Hall which will sell essential food and household items.

I am trying to prevent heavy coaches and lorries from accessing Stocking Lane from Main Road but this is proving difficult to implement because of the existing right of access. Signage will be erected in High Wycombe centre to direct heavy traffic travelling to Aylesbury onto the A4010 to try and stop it from coming into Hughenden Valley as a result of satellite navigation directions.

The white lining and cats-eye replacement is still taking place along Main Road, Naphill. I am sure residents will agree that Coombe Hill Lane is now much improved for night driving.

District Councillor's Report

Happy New Year!

I am sure you feel that Christmas seems such a long time ago because of the ever-changing economic conditions. But, I am optimistic for 2009. The District Council are proposing a number of cost reductions that are vital in order to keep the Council Tax at the agreed percentage and to maintain/enhance the essential services. This will inevitably lead to job losses. The decisions are necessary because we have standards to meet. I do believe that the district is looking good as a whole and I for one feel proud to be amongst determined people who care about our environment. You can attend the Council meeting at 6.30pm on 26 February. This will be when the annual council tax is set.

I spoke at the Development Control Committee in January when the Hughenden Valley temporary shop at the village hall was approved. This has taken nearly 18 months. This shows what spirit people have. I have also asked Co-Op to monitor the "yellow label" reduced items pricing. The Manager, Lyn, has said she will look into this.

I also attended a difficult Licensing Panel hearing to review a current licence, an informal cabinet meeting and a briefing from barristers regarding the Hoppers Farm appeal for 36 extra houses. I am also planning a surgery in the spring and will announce a date in the next issue.

Finally, before Christmas, I was pleased to allocate from my community budget £350 to Hughenden Parish Council covering a willow tunnel and/or landscaping for the Naphill play area on the Crick, and £200 for the Christmas tree lights at the village hall.

Good news! The Parish Council has decided to keep the precept at the same level as this year (£155,000). Services will be maintained through careful budgeting and the use of about £7,800 of reserves. The Council considers that, in the current financial climate, it should do what it can to keep the Council Tax down. As you probably know, the procedure is for the Parish Council to set its precept and for Wycombe District Council to include this amount in the overall Tax it collects from residents.

Support for village halls will continue to be provided through annual grants as well as by major grants on request. Playground maintenance will be funded at the present level of about £10,000 pa, with another £20,000 included for major refurbishments. Naphill Crick playground had about £10,000 spent on its toddler multiplay so funding will go to other playgrounds in the Parish this year. It is still hoped to be able to update the junior end of the Crick playground; grants continue to be sought.

Bucks County Council is seeking to devolve some of its current activities to town and parish councils. The Parish Council is exploring the possibility of sharing some of these responsibilities provided financial arrangements are satisfactory. For example, it might make sense for the Parish to add some of the hedge and grass cutting done at present by BCC to its own schedules.

This year's Parish Meeting will take place on May 19th at a venue in Naphill and Walter's Ash. It is our turn. Please put the date in your diary. Further information about the venue, and a keynote speaker, will be provided nearer the time.

Our glorious countryside is free! Let us enjoy that!

Hughenden Parish Council Results from Youth Questionnaire

Congratulations to Aidan Roberts (pictured below with all his swimming medals) who won the £25 gift voucher in the Prize Draw!



The first thing to report is that the survey did not get a great response, with only 12 replies received. I was disappointed as there is a genuine commitment by the Parish Council to reach the young people of the local villages and to try and shape the future with their needs in mind. It may be that the gazette/internet was not the most appropriate method of communication, so if you have alternative suggestions then I really would like to hear from you. Of course the other conclusion that we might reach is that our young people are content with their lives here and did not see the need to respond. I don't know the right answer to this at present but I do know that with such a small response we must be very cautious about the conclusion we draw from it. However I found the replies very interesting and I thought you might too, so here they are.

Of the young people that responded, 58% lived in Naphill, 17% in Walter's Ash and the remainder lived elsewhere or did not respond to this question. More boys than girls replied. 25% were aged 9-11, 58% aged 12 - 15 and 16% were 17 and over. All except one went to school locally and one respondent was already out at work. 67% of those that responded had lived in Naphill & Walter's Ash all their lives. Those who had not lived here all their lives rated living here much better than where they used to live.

The things that the young people liked best about living here were:

Smooth roads
Fireworks/bonfire night/annual fete
Walkways through woods
Lots of friends from the RAF
Safe, friendly community
No violence/drugs/gangs

Good friends
Lots of things to do
The Crick
Proximity to Wycombe
Peaceful and not too built up
Good pub

The things they liked less were:

Don't like the reputation us youths have Lack of social facilities for older teens Not much to do Having to go to school somewhere else Speed of cars on Main Road The staff in the Co-op
Not many young people live here
Not allowed out in the evening as no street lights
No cycle path
Nowhere for teens to meet up

Our young people feel less safe in the following places:

Kilnwood
Woods (only because I don't like woods)
RAF base – personnel not letting you go through the gate and they have guns
Sometimes by the Co-op in the dark
On the Crick – as there is never anyone around at night
Clappins and Stocking Lane (no pavements)

The local clubs that people were members of ranged from scouts/guides, to sport (football, tennis, cricket, hockey) to youth and dance clubs and the Air Training Corps. In their spare time they do sports, watch TV meet up with friends, spend time with the family, go to the park and go on the computer. Time was also spent on homework and going in to town.

The local facilities they would like to see improved are:

Scout hut Tennis courts/floodlights Football pitch Pavements – more needed Cycle path Street lights The play area – monkey bars – something for the older children The floor in the village hall – to make it better to dance on Bus stops – more and clearer

When it came to the question "If money was available for something in the village especially for teenagers, what do you think it should be?" there was no shortage of answers!

Theme park Beach Long slide through the woods Golf driving range Internet café Monster truck rally course

Swimming pool Sweet shop Doctors

Wireless everywhere Paintball centre More local leisure activities
Cricket club Cinema Multi-use games area

Driving courses First aid courses Skate park

Graffiti wall Bank open all day Train station – because everywhere is down hill

Local youth centre for young people to enjoy, meet and relax in a safe environment

Suggestions as to how the money could be raised for this included an "eatathon", lottery funding, sponsored events, local authority funding, car boot sale, sponsorship by local organisations

The most important issues they saw facing young people today were:

Lack of time to have fun Bullying

Anti-social behaviour Being able to afford to buy a house

Choosing a career Diet and fitness
Gangs and gang culture Knife crime
Exam pressure Getting a job

Fights/safety Adults not listening to young people's ideas/views

Probability of prejudice against activities of young people from other villagers

The help they would most like was:

Reassurance that youths can belong in a close community such as this village Help with career options Sexual guidance

64% thought that a youth council would be a good forum to discuss these issues and ideas and four people expressed an interest in getting involved with this.

The Parish Council Youth Working Party will be meeting shortly to discuss these results and we will of course keep you informed. Meanwhile the discussion topic remains open so please feel free to contact your local Parish Council representatives with ideas and comments.

He was ably assisted up the tree by Kelly Fountain of Hughenden Valley, Mark Christian from "The Wheel" and Robin Stubbs from Amersham. The team on the ground consisted of Gary Putnam of Holmer Green and his son Ben, Stephen Fountain of Widmer End and his daughters Millie and Gabbie, John Harris, Ron Collins, Terry Aldridge, Peter Brown, Glenn Gavin, Peter Davis and myself. Ben, Millie and Gabbie were very useful, enthusiastically helping to put the lamps in the holders as the 900 foot cable went up, making sure the colour sequence was correct.

However, despite having more people up the tree and more people on the ground than ever before, putting

Ted Chapman (563034) or John Harris (562099) up the lights did not go smoothly. We hit many snags at the beginning where the lamp sockets became caught in the branches and the whole operation took 3 hours rather than 2 ½ hours – very tiring for those up the tree. We also had difficulties taking down the lights – snagging resulted in three cable breaks and the operation took about 50% longer. We took down the lights in what we believe were the coldest conditions yet – minus 5 degrees C. The bulbs were covered with hoar frost and some had icicles an inch or two long.

I have already reported on the very strong winds which wreaked havoc the previous winter. The final bill for the damage came when the lamps were tested in November 2008. Over 50% had to be replaced, and that was a first.

I must take this opportunity to thank Daisy Leek who has taken on the task of organising the collection tins in the village shops, Brenda and Jack Bates for the use of their long drive for the testing and repair of the cable, and Marlène Mason for assisting with the testing and repair and for the provision of the essential mince pies and coffee for the team. Thank you also to the members of the public who donated generously in the collection tins and via village organisations.

Various circumstances have combined to cause us to change completely the lights for the coming winter 2009/2010. Firstly, and very importantly, we are hitting more and more problems putting up and taking down the lights. In the past, when the sockets became lodged in branches, we could pull hard and either small branches broke or bent. Now the branches are much stronger and when the sockets are caught it is a real problem to free them. Secondly, our cable, the sockets and sleeves are outmoded. They ceased to be sold about five years ago after changes in electrical regulations and we have run out of our stock of spares. Thirdly, it will not be possible to purchase filament lamps in a couple of years as the Government wants all filament lamps to be replaced with low-energy light bulbs. So we will be forced to change. So a decision has been made, for all those three reasons, to go for low-energy light bulbs this coming winter. It is anticipated that, rather than having a single 900-foot cable we shall have a series of shorter cables radiating from the top of the tree. That would entail a complete change to our time-honoured method of putting up the lights. It will also involve considerable capital expenditure. The team will be coming up with proposals for the Village Hall Council later this year.

Mike Leggett has been a member of the team for 33 years and has been the lead climber for the past 18 years. He will be 60 in February and has decided to hand over the job of lead climber to a keen young person with a head for heights, great arm strength and an immunity to cold. Mike intends to be a support member up the tree to give advice and assistance. I am sure everyone in the village will wish to thank Mike for his splendid work over such a great number of years.

Friends of Naphill Common

www.naphillcommon.org.uk

Naphill has one of the finest commons in the Chilterns but one which has problems and is not as inviting as it might be. On 2nd December 2008 a "Friends of Naphill Common" group was formed to help conserve and enhance what is valuable about our common and to make its treats more accessible. We have begun with a steering committee but hope to attract as large a membership as possible to help undertake practical work, historical research, studies of the wildlife and other projects that members favour. Whether you just want to walk on the common or want to explore some of its many interesting features in more detail, you might consider joining us. If enough join we hope to organise walks, talks, events and activities that will interest people in the common and help safeguard its welfare.

The common is a Site of Special Scientific Interest but its natural history remains waiting to be properly explored. There are still some glorious ancient pollard trees surviving from when it was open wood pasture but we are slowly losing them. Amongst the existing trees we have some unusual specimens, including one common oak that thinks it's an evergreen. There are still some remnants of what was once a remarkable forest of juniper; there are fragments of other heathland plant communities and, of course, there may still be specimens of the famous star-fruit lurking in the ponds. The common has many sorts of fungi including at least two notable rarities.

Woodland birds abound, including nuthatches, green and great spotted – and reports of lesser spotted - woodpeckers, and even hawfinches, plus chiff-chaffs, willow warblers, blackcaps and other visitors in their season. Red kites regularly roost on the common and ravens have recently made an appearance.

There are muntjac, roe deer and perhaps fallow deer, hares, and foxes, but are there any badgers? Frogs and newts breed in the ponds; grass snakes and common lizards have been seen, but do adders still survive from the heath-land days? The ancient trees attract rare beetles and in 1940 fairy shrimps were found – now a very rare species – but they might be re-discovered if we search. Could there be purple

emperor butterflies flying over the crowns of the oaks? If not, could we find ways of attracting them?

There is plenty of scope for amateur historians to explore. It seems likely that the common began as two commons, Moseley and Naphill, but its origins are, as yet, largely a mystery. There are stories of drovers, a ghostly lady and a Kibbo-Kift site. There is archaeological evidence of the original common boundary; a registered ancient monument, a Romano-British farmstead; evidence of iron smelting; WWII tank tracks, and numerous other features, all waiting to be investigated.

The common is big enough and quiet enough to welcome many more local people without being spoiled, but its qualities needs to be better known and its paths need improving. Energy Saving Light Bulb Myth Buster

Why use them?

Compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) use 80% less electricity, save you about £3 a year each, and last up to 12 times longer than old fashioned tungsten bulbs.

What are they?

Think of them as compact versions of the strip lights in work places since the 1950s.

Have they improved?

You can now get all shapes and sizes, fittings and levels of brightness, including 150W equivalent and dimmable options. A recent blind test of 761 shoppers, found that 64% preferred the light from them.

Is it better to leave them running?

No, switching them on uses the equivalent electricity as leaving them on for a few minutes. Most now light

instantaneously.

How should I dispose of them?

Use the service your municipal tip provides for the safe disposal of fluorescent tubes.

Is mercury an issue?

Ironically, installing CFLs ought to help reduce the need for coal-fired electricity production - a major cause of global mercury emissions. CFLs contain mercury - about 5mg. Locked into its tube, this is harmless.

What should I do if I smash one?

Ventilate the room for 15 minutes. Put on your rubber gloves, brush the bits into a bag, seal it and drop it at the tip next time you go.

Are tungsten bulbs banned?

No. Manufacturers have agreed to withdraw them for sale, starting with 100W this year, 60W in 2010 and 40W in 2011.

Genetically-Modified Food – The Score So Far

The Case For

I have always maintained a strictly neutral stance on genetically-modified food. This may seem out-of-character since, for over 35 years, I have been a grower of purely organic fruit and vegetables in my garden and on my allotment. The reason I have been neutral is because of the awful statistic that around 40,000 people die every day because of starvation or because of a greater susceptibility to disease caused by inadequate nutrition. I did say 40,000 people per day. That is so awful that mankind must look at every means to provide more food for those without. When genetically-modified (GM) food was launched about 12 years ago there was a lot of publicity about the potential to increase food supplies.

There is another reason for my neutral stance. The world's population was about 2.5 billion in 1948. Sixty years later in 2008 it is about 6.5 billion. By 2050, only 42 years from now, the forecast is for 9 billion. Can we feed everybody? Between 1948 and 2008 there was a massive improvement in farmers' productivity, with the use of artificial fertilisers, pesticides, herbicides, fungicides and better crops being created through hybridisation. More land was also brought under the plough. By these means enough food was grown for 6.5 billion people. However, by all accounts, further such improvements in productivity are not possible. There will be some minor improvements – better availability of chemicals to third-world farmers, a little

more land coming under the plough and so on – but there is nothing on the horizon to feed an additional 2.5 billion people. The rate of increase of World crop yields from 1970 to 1990 was 2% per year but dropped to 1.1% per year from 1990 to 2007. For the same periods the rate of increase in the demand on the land for food, feed and fuel went from about 1.5% to about 1.8% per year so already we are surviving only by running down stocks. We have reached crossover (a term I have just invented), where the increase in food demand exceeds the increase in food supply. Crisis is on us. Can GM crops provide the answer to feed the 2.5 billion?

At the end of the Second World War food accounted for 50% of the average family's weekly expenditure. It is now only 12% because of the benefits of a very large increase in agricultural productivity – and the increase in productivity in the economy as a whole. A shortage of food causes prices to rise. Following "crossover", from mid-2007 to mid-2008 food prices in the UK went up by 12%. Could food prices rise to the extent of accounting for 50% of the average family's weekly expenditure in the future? Possibly. We had a period of very high inflation in 1976 and I remember the shock-horror of the £5 cabbage. The demand for allotments went through the roof. The waiting list for my allotment gardens was estimated at three years. There was a move for those with multiple plots to give them up to those on the waiting list. Such times could return – and people could be urged once more to "Dig for Victory", by digging up their lawns as they were in the Second World War when the German naval blockade reduced our ability to import food.

Now to my attitude to GM crops. I am not a Luddite when it comes to adopting new ideas for my crops. I do not use artificial fertilisers since my plants find all the nutrients they need from the manure I apply. My plants are healthy - and healthy plants are less liable to disease. I hand-weed and use physical barriers to keep out some pests. I am purely organic - and a nodig gardener as well since the year 2000. I scan seed catalogues with great interest, looking for new varieties of my favourite fruit and vegetables. Improved varieties become available to the amateur gardener every year and I try them. If they work I then discard the previous variety. Over the years there have been great changes to what I grow and my crops are so much better these days. I welcome conventional innovation.

The Case Against

But when it comes to GM food I hesitate. It now appears that we have had two stages of GM crops. The first stage benefited the farmers, since they were able to use pesticides and herbicides in a more efficient manner. For example, GM seeds were sold to farmers with the assurance that the crops which resulted would not be affected by glyphosate weed killer – so the farmers simply sprayed their crops with that devastating chemical which eliminated all weeds. As well as the farmers, the first stage also benefited the companies which sold the GM seed and the

accompanying glyphosate. But there was no significant increase in the amount of crops harvested.

The second stage of GM food is now on us, with the promise of greater crops. One example is the fabrication of salt-tolerant plants which will grow in increasingly saline soil brought about by irrigation using water from aguifers, as in Australia. Another example is the fabrication of drought-tolerant plants. The latter could be vital in those countries adversely affected by global warming and ever-reducing rainfall. However, no breakthroughs have been announced so far regarding salt- and drought-tolerant plants. So again, GM crops have not increased the amount of food produced on any significant scale. Current developments are to extend the main list of GM crops of soyabeans, cotton, maize and rape to include rice, wheat, papaya, tomatoes, sweet peppers and other vegetables. As for GM animals, there is a lot of resistance but the Enviropig has been developed in Canada and the AquAdvantge salmon in the USA. About 8% of the World's cultivated land is now being sown with GM crops. Although Europe in general is reluctant to grow GM crops, GM maize is grown in Spain - and the European Union is considering two new types of maize which make their own pesticide and a potato engineered to produce starch for the paper industry. The EU has already approved about 20 GM substances for importation.

Now for the health effects. I remember the UK government reassuring the public about the safety of the drug thalidomide – and thousands of deformed babies were the result. I remember the UK government reassuring the public about BSE in cattle - yet over 160 people have subsequently died from the human form of the disease, CJD. Notes of a 1956 cabinet meeting have just been released from the national archive. The then minister of health proposed a campaign to emphasise the damaging effects of smoking on health – but was overruled by the then chancellor of the exchequer because the tax revenue from cigarettes was too important to be put at risk. How many people have subsequently died of cancer? No, time and again the government have lined up with vested interests rather than do their duty regarding the health of the public. So I look with a jaundiced eye at those who now say that GM food is safe. The World has been eating such food for only 12 years and that may not be long enough for health effects to become apparent.

Another example of the conspiracy of "them" against the public comes from the fooling of consumers over whether they are already eating GM food. From January 2009 "organic" food in the European Union can still be labelled "organic" if it contains less than 0.9% GM organisms. What does "organic" food contain now? And what percentage of GM organisms will the other 98% of food not labelled as "organic" contain? Much of our food and animal feed is imported from countries outside the European Union so, although GM crops are largely banned here that does not mean that the food in the supermarkets is GM-free. Can you imagine what sales would be like if

the supermarkets told the truth and put labels on food stating "This item contains genetically-modified ingredients". The public on the whole would not wish to take part knowingly in this vast experiment with human health going on elsewhere in the World (but are they already?).

This tug of war between vested interests on one hand and those responsible for public health on the other goes on and on. The latest example, although not about GM aspects, shows the motivations of people. The European Union has been conducting a review of farmers' chemicals since 1991 and has taken off the market more than half of the then available 952 products on safety grounds. The vested interests are now up in arms over the proposed withdrawal of a further batch of products. They say that the unavailability of these chemicals would make the growing of grapes, fresh fruit and vegetables in Europe problematic or uncompetitive. The EU would lose its self-sufficiency in wheat, potatoes, wine and cereals. Wheat and potato yields would drop by a third. Crops such as apples and hops could no longer be grown. Yet the vested interests seem to ignore the fact that these chemicals are to be withdrawn on safety grounds. The vested interests are guite willing to put their profits before the health of consumers. Can we believe their assurances regarding the safety of GM food?

Summary

The World is not managing to feed all of its citizens at present, with 40,000 people dying per day of starvation or disease brought on by inadequate nutrition. With the World population forecast to rise by another 2.5 billion in the next 42 years, and with a significant increase in food production above current levels looking unlikely, we appear to be in a very difficult situation. Already, food prices are rising – between 2007 and 2008 the World price of several cereal crops increased by 50 – 100% because of shortages. We have reached "crossover" in that the rate of increase in food demand has now exceeded the rate of increase of food supply. GM crops are seen as the answer to boost food production. But after 12 years of GM crops in various parts of the World the result so far is no significant increase in food production. The safety of GM food is unproven. The World is at a dangerous crossroads. On the one hand we seem to be faced with mass starvation of up to 2.5 billion people and on the other hand GM food does not appear to hold out the promise of a big increase in the production of food - and its long-term effects on health are not known. Help!



Mortgage Market and waited for it to double in value swiftly. County Councillor's Report

Road conditions in February had not been seen since the winter of 1962/63, when snow remained in the hedgerows until May and the village was cut off from Wycombe for two days or more. My bedside glass of water froze during the night and we heated the house with just two paraffin heaters! Now, our tolerance of such situations is far less, as indicated by the numerous complaints received by the county council, regarding the lack of gritting, breakdown of the bus services and school closures. The facts are that the capital investment required to cover all eventualities cannot be justified for a situation which fortunately occurs only every five or ten years. My

main concern is the aftermath of the winter weather and the resultant pot holes and broken road surfaces which have multiplied out of all proportion and will take many weeks to repair. I fear that our reduced budgets will be sorely tested.

Care of our older citizens during these Arctic conditions, (now called resilience activity in Adult Social care) has been exemplary, all essential services to the County's most vulnerable residents have been maintained throughout. Our own home care services and contracted domiciliary care were maintained every day.• There were a reduced number of visits where clients were known to be safe and receiving essential support.• As always community resilience has been good and family and neighbours have stepped up to the mark to allow the professional services to focus their resources on those in greatest need.• We are indeed fortunate to live in such an area where community support is always forthcoming and immediate.

25th February saw the launch of the Buckinghamshire Local Involvement Network [LINk]. This is a new way for the public to get involved with the NHS and social care services. This is an independent statutory organisation run by service users for service users. It will listen to and consult users and pass on general views and opinions to the NHS and the county council as the provider of social services. More information can be obtained from the website www.buckinghamshirelink.co.uk .

The Station Commander of RAF High Wycombe has written to me and requested that I inform as many residents as possible that, subsequent to the receiving of planning permission, work has started on the building of two residential blocks at the Officers' Mess site at Walter's Ash. The building programme, in three stages, will take around 54 weeks to complete. It is hoped that the build phase will be completed by the autumn and the rooms occupied next March. The contractor's entrance will be off Bradenham Woods Lane, south of the present entrance to the Mess. The RAF have apologised in advance for the inevitable noise and dust that will be created. The contractors have

undertaken to keep any inconvenience to the minimum and this will be closely monitored. The noisy phase of pile driving will be completed during March and with the exception of one day; work will be restricted to normal hours. The Station Commander has indicated the wish of the RAF to remain a good neighbour, and asks me to seek the forbearance of residents during this construction period.

Since the last report, at Council on the 26th, the Council Tax was set at the same percentage increase, despite the difficult conditions in balancing the books and the reduction in revenues from land charges and planning associated with the housing market. More initiatives will be implemented going forward. Our job is to govern and make decisions that are necessary to maintain the expected services.

I was pleased to attend Pam Smith's exhibition on the 14th;it was very busy right up to closing. I would have got there before, had I not been canvassing with County Council candidates in Aylesbury. I think the event could have merited a weekend rather than just the Saturday.

I attended the Civic Service on the 15th in Wycombe and the February Licensing Committee on the 19th.

Finally, two public dates for your diary are the Licensing Committee on 19 March with Council on 30 March.

It has been a number of months since I have been able to find time to write an article in the Gazette so my I start by wishing you a belated Happy New Year.


There are and have been a number of changes taking place at The Father's House which I will hopefully tell you about over the coming months.

lan Kelloway has always been our milkman since we moved to Naphill in 1985. When once he was one of a few that delivered in this area now he delivers to everyone in Naphill and Walter's Ash, as the majority of people prefer to buy their milk from a supermarket. Book Review - "We Want Real Food"

by Graham Harvey, published by Constable in 2006, £9.99, 234 pages, ISBN-10: 1-84529-267-7; ISBN-13: 978-1-84529-267-6.

This is a blockbuster of a book. For those who care about their food (and that should include all of us) this book lays it all on the line – fact after fact of the way our food has been impoverished and adulterated over the past 60 years. Everyone should read this book – and then pressurise our politicians into doing something about the truly horrific situation.

The author (who has worked on farms and grew up in a "grow your own" environment) points out that until 1946 farming in the UK was mixed farming. In other words, the farmer grew crops and raised livestock, returning the manure to the land and using few artificial fertilisers. The returning of the manure to the land ensured that the soil was not denuded of its vital trace elements - and this method of agriculture was proven to be the best, over thousands of years. Then, in 1946, by a combination of Government and EU diktats, plus commercial pressures from the producers of artificial chemicals, everything changed. Farmers were persuaded to change to monoculture, where they specialised in growing just one crop per year or raised livestock in sheds rather than on pasture – with vast amounts of artificial fertiliser to massively increase the quantity of crops and vast amounts of herbicide/pesticide/fungicide/livestock medicines that were not necessary before. And the result? To quote "Today's fresh produce has little in common with the nutrient-rich foods of pre-industrial societies. Years of chemical farming and soil mismanagement have robbed them of health-giving minerals and antioxidants".

The depletion of minerals since 1946 has been dramatic and caused largely by the failure to return manure to the land. The UK Ministry of Agriculture estimated that over the period 1940 – 1991 farmland had lost 40% of its trace elements (24% of magnesium, 46% of iron, 75% of copper, etc). A dramatic example of this is the tomato – you would need to eat ten tomatoes of the 1991 variety to obtain the same amount of copper that one tomato contained in 1940 – that is why supermarket tomatoes are often tasteless waterbags. And of course the depletion of farmland goes on relentlessly, year after year.

The effects of modern farming on human health have been dramatic. For example, in 1900 Americans were the healthiest on the planet. By the late 1970s the Americans were close to the bottom of the 100 healthiest countries. One third of the British population is believed to be suffering from malnutrition.

The author is extremely meticulous in quoting the sources of the facts he throws at the reader. Scientific report after scientific report is listed, often with the page number of the quoted statistic. But this book is not a dry scientific tome. It is fluently written and most readable.

Some of the facts quoted are truly horrible. Take the example of wheat, which receives on average 2 types of weedkiller, 6 different fungicides, 4 growth hormones and 1 insecticide. Pesticides are then applied to the wheat grains in the silos. In the early 1950s wheat yields were 3 tonnes per hectare, now the figure is 8 tonnes per hectare. Progress? The author comments "Industrial agriculture is designed to produce large amounts of second-rate foods. It is impossible for traditional farmers to compete. Wheat growers no longer grow a food: they are producing a raw material for an industrial manufacturing operation. They must squeeze ever more production from their overworked soils."

Of course, pesticides from the crops leak into drinking water. Water companies in the UK spend £120M per year removing pesticides. But they don't remove them all – just enough to comply with legal limits. Thus, if you want to live on bread and water, be warned!

This book is dynamite. It should be required reading for every MP so that our legislators can do something about the situation. It is a fascinating read. Once you have read it you will probably rush out, buy some seeds and start growing your own in your garden or on an allotment. Buy the book, grow your own, change your life!



County Councillor's Report

The Audit Commission has announced that the County Council has regained its top performing '4 star' status. This achievement directly reflects the hard work and commitment of all Members and Staff to deliver excellent services to local residents. The

Comprehensive Performance Assessment (CPA) is the process which the Government uses to rate all Councils in England. CPA is an independent assessment carried out by the Audit Commission in their role as the Government's "Watchdog" responsible for local government performance.

In terms of the future, the Commission recommended just one action for the Council. This related to managing our budget shortfall and protecting core services in the face of the recession, particularly for those residents made vulnerable by their circumstances. This is, of course, our single biggest challenge for the foreseeable future, which is why initiatives like our Transformation programme and Pathfinder are so critical to deliver. Our predicted future financial gap is well known and being honest it's why we are taking action now – to ensure the organisation is in the best possible position to respond.

I write this in the full knowledge that many readers have complained to me about the poor state of our roads, especially after the winter snow and rain. Steps have been taken to increase our maintenance teams and gradually the roads are improving. However, we have been complimented on social care and education and keeping safe our looked after children, that is, those who are in care. Overall, Bucks is rated as a good place in which to live and I hope we can all agree with that.

Recently I have been made aware of the organisation known as PALS, standing for Patient Advice and Liaison Service. They provide a wide range of information on local health services and can act as a "friend within the system" to patients, relatives and carers, helping them to deal with any difficulties arising in their primary health care. They can be contacted on 0800 328 5640 or by Email pals@buckspct.nhs.uk

As part of the county council's policy on "Because Every Adult Matters" (BEAM) the "In-Touch" service helps people to access and keep in touch with community services and local voluntary groups on a regular basis. To establish this contact a phone call to 0845 3708090 will enable a person to speak in confidence with a member of the Adult Social Care Team.

The mystery of the traffic cones placed on the bend of Main Road where it adjoins Chapel Lane is now solved. They originated from Thames Water who were proposing works on the Main Road since early in January. The cones re-appeared in the road mid March for work to start on Monday 16th March. By the time this is read the work should be underway.

I have been invited to the official opening of @3 Cafe Facility at RAF Air Command on 16th March. This will be on the site of what was formerly the OSCARS Club. This cafe will be open to all personnel and their families as well as civilians, including the local community.

The District Council has recently been applauded for its community efforts in the last year. This is an important aspect from the latest audit commission report. The same report praised the opening of Eden in March 2008. However, we are minded of our need to improve the Customer Service Centre. The issue is a simple one. More people have applied for assistance and claims to the Council for housing benefit and Council Tax benefit. Demand has outstripped supply, although we are working on this.

Since my last report, Hon Alderman David Fieldhouse has died. David was a District Councillor from 1970-2007 (70-74 as Wycombe Borough Council). David was a hard working, decent and dedicated Councillor who served his ward without complaint and ease, despite battling illness for over 35 years.

I attended the opening of the new World War 2 war room at Hughenden Manor on 10 March and was very fortunate to be introduced to Victor Gregory, one of the original cartographers deployed in 1941. It is well worth a visit to appreciate the secret map-making and intricate work undertaken in respect of the planned D-Day invasion, implemented right here in our ward. I am also hoping to attend the Spring Fayre in March.

Hughenden Parish Council

The Parish Council has facilitated the planting of a living willow structure in the children's playground on the Crick. It has been made possible by donations from the Community Funds of Councillor Richard Pushman and Councillor John Gibbs; I know the Village Hall Council is very appreciative of this funding.

The site has been very well prepared. A durable rubber mat floor has been laid to avoid erosion and the mats have been well secured to a stabilising mesh pinned below ground. Willow will do well in most soil conditions but, for best results, the site was dug over and fertiliser/manure added. Whips for living willow structures are pushed about 6 to 9 inches into the ground; they must be planted before the end of March. Ties are used for extra firmness and should, long term, result in pressure grafting of the willow stems together. The vertical whips will tend to sprout fresh growth only from the top, whereas the diagonally planted whips should sprout along the full length giving a denser

growth to the structure. (I have cribbed these notes as I wouldn't have a clue how to enable a willow structure to develop!! I may be seen over there with a watering can if we have a dry spring!)

We hope the children will enjoy having a living structure to explore. The Parish and Village Hall Councils will continue to seek funds to improve the "junior" end of the playground.

The Village Design Statement has reached the stage of being submitted formally to Wycombe District Council. We have consulted WDC at various stages during the process of compilation and have tried to incorporate all their suggestions. We are therefore hoping that the document can be sent out to residents for final consultation soon. This will be done through local groups, and will be available to individuals on request. It has been a long haul!

The Annual Parish meeting is to be held in Naphill and Walter's Ash School hall on Tuesday May 19th at 7.30pm. This year we have a keynote speaker to add interest to the meeting. John Morris, Manager of the Chilterns Woodland Project, will give an illustrated talk on aspects of woodland management, history and preservation. We hope many residents will be able to join us for the talk, official business, and, of course, for refreshments and the opportunity to meet and question Parish Councillors.

Bradenham Parish Council

Bradenham Parish Council is very grateful to PCSO Clair Davis who with a colleague came out to Bradenham with a speed gun at the end of January. She was amazed by the number of people who exceeded the 30mph speed limit through the village. All persons caught exceeding the speed limit will have received a warning letter from Thames Valley Police. She plans to come back again in the next few months. Buckinghamshire County Council has put a temporary speed indicating device by the church; hopefully this will remind people to reduce their speed through the village.

The Parish Council had requested a reduction of the speed limit through the woods from 60mph to 40mph, but this has been declined by the County Council.

We had received a request from a serving member of the RAF to install street lighting on Bradenham Woods Lane from the entrance of No 2 site (Officer's Mess) to the junction with New Road. The Parish Council is not in favour of street lightening, this is a rural area within the Chilterns AONB and street lighting would detract from the enjoyment f the AONB. The cost is also a prohibitive factor. The Street lighting on Main Road is provided, maintained and paid for by the RAF.

The Parish Council reviewed its risk, which are minimal for this small Parish Council.

Friends of Naphill Common

By the time this appears we will have held our first open meeting, 'Talking about the Common' and, hopefully, our membership will have substantially increased. Thank you to all who attended and all who helped, and especially our speakers, Neil Harris and Dr Alan Showler. Welcome to all new members.

One of the motives for forming a 'Friends' group is to help conserve some of the more precious features of the common, including its rare plants. Juniper is one of these. It was once plentiful along much of the Chilterns but has now almost disappeared, and plans are afoot to save the last remaining specimens and even re-introduce it at suitable sites.

Naphill Common was once renowned for its juniper. In 1911, G. Eland wrote that: 'Among scattered and misshapen oaks and scrubby beech rise great bushes of juniper and gorse, eight or ten feet high.' Wilfred Smith recalled that around the turn of the Century: 'Some parts were covered with natural juniper forests, many so closely growing that it would be difficult to force a way through, many beautifully symmetrical columns of verdure 15 or 20 ft high.' Writing in 1948 he adds: 'Alas! Both gorse and juniper were the natural prey of the fire-raising vandal and have almost disappeared.'

Sadly, we now have only one healthy bush and about four more in various stages of decline, while another died three years ago. Perhaps one of our projects could be to help the juniper to prosper. One problem with Juniper is that the sexes appear on different bushes and this makes matters worse as scarcity increases. For example, there is a single female shrub on West Wycombe Hill and it struggles to produce berries, but can you blame her when the nearest male is at Bradenham!

Today we have few uses for juniper berries but they were once highly prized. The 17th Century diarist John Evelyn called them 'one of the most universal remedies in the world to our crazy forester; the Theriacle or Electuary I have often made for my poor neighbours, and may well be termed the Forester's Panacea against the Stone, Rheum, Pthysic, Dropsie, Jaundies, inward Imposthumes, nay Palsie, Gout and Plague itself.' Clearly, if we can save the juniper we can halve the Nation's bill for the Health Service.

Don't forget our future events – open to all. Last September's Heritage Open Day walk on the Common will be repeated on Sunday 19th April (2.30 pm at the Village Hall), and Ron Collins will lead a Health Walk on Monday 18th May (10.30 at the Village Hall). More events and projects are being planned.

Wycombe Beach

In the February Gazette the editor gave the results of the youth questionnaire. One request was for a beach. In the March Gazette the editor, wearing her parish councillor hat, said "we could not find an affordable and practical way to bring a beach to Naphill". Never fear, help is at hand. Global Warming to the rescue!

According to a BBC World programme on 7th March, once all of the ice in Greenland, Antarctica and various glaciers has melted, the rise in sea level will be about 200 feet, ie 61 metres. I got out my Ordnance Survey map and traced the contour line of 61 metres above Mean Sea Level. It goes through The Rye in the centre of High Wycombe. So the youth of Naphill and Walter's Ash will have their beach — in the middle of High Wycombe. Perhaps our various councillors will now arrange for a prominent sign to be erected on The Rye "Site for Future Beach".

According to my nautical almanac, the Highest Astronomical Tide for London Bridge is 4.7 metres above the Ordnance Survey Mean Sea Level. If we assume that the tidal range at High Wycombe in the future will be the same as experienced by London Bridge today, that means there will be 4.7 metres of sea water over The Rye from time to time – and the high water mark will be at the western end of The Rye. Our councillors should therefore plan for the beach

huts to be no lower than the "magic roundabout" at the bottom of Marlow Hill. The climate would be much warmer than it is today and the residents of Maidenhead, for example, at 50 metres above today's Mean Sea Level, would have tropical fish in their living rooms without the need for fish tanks.

But when will all this happen? When will the youth of Naphill and Walter's Ash get their beach? According to an article I dug out of the Financial Times of 11th August 2006, the sea level was rising at 2.5 mm per vear in 2006. At that rate it would take 24.400 years to reach The Rye, which would be rather a long wait. But do not despair, help is at hand. The same article stated that satellite measurements had shown that the speed of ice sheet melting had trebled in the past two years compared with the average for the previous five years. Acceleration is to be expected since, when the surface covering of snow melts, the sun's rays are no longer reflected back into space and so the earth receives even more heat from the sun (including the Arctic's ice which is due to completely disappear in a few years). A frightening example was reported in the Financial Times of 6th March, of the Amazon turning from an absorber to an emitter of carbon dioxide. There was an unusual drought in the Amazon in 2005. Normally the Amazon absorbs 2 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide per year yet it emitted more than 3 billion tonnes instead. The total change amounted to an extra 5 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere - which exceeded the annual carbon emissions of Europe and Japan combined. So, what if the trebling of the rate of rise of sea level in two years continued, ie trebling every two years. Well, the whole lot would melt by 2024 (2.5 mm per year x3x3x3x3x3x3x3x3x3 and summed – try it out on your calculator). So we have only 15 years to wait for our very own beach, if ice sheet melting continues to treble every three years.

Just imagine it! Going down to The Rye, swimming costume in hand, ready for a plunge into the warm, luxurious waters of the great ocean. The weather would be very warm. There might be a small problem of salt-water crocodiles and great-white sharks, but who cares? The odd tropical typhoon would blast

through from time to time, causing waves of up to 30 metres, but we in Naphill and Walter's Ash would be above all that. There would be plenty of work building 50-storey blocks of flats to re-house about 15 million people from the London area in the Chilterns. Land prices would go through the roof. On my allotment I could grow mangoes, papayas, bananas and avocados. On the allotment I would be watching African vultures circling overhead rather than red kites. Our various councillors would be hard at it rejecting planning applications from developers anxious to build on land protected by our Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty status, surrounded by the Green Belt. I can hardly wait for the better weather.

The Twelve Foot Worm

I walked into the police station. A hatch opened and a uniformed police officer appeared. "I am looking for a twelve-foot worm" I said. His eyes glazed a little and he had the kind of look as if to say "another one has walked out of that place down the road". But I persevered. "The guide book says that somewhere near here is a tourist venue where giant worms are on

display, some up to twelve-feet long and some with a diameter of over six inches". At that he began to recall something. He used to patrol up and down the coast road from Melbourne going east, and he recalled that there used to be a display of giant worms near the village of Bass, but he believed that it was now a second-hand shop or something. (1)

So I was frustrated, unable to see the giant worms found in the area of South-West Gippsland, near Melbourne, Australia. I would have welcomed the opportunity of having my photograph taken with a giant worm, to give this article credibility, and to jest "you should have seen the size of blackbird which carried this one off". However, my plans came to nothing so you will just have to take my word for it – giant worms up to twelve feet long do exist in that part of Australia. They are called "megascolides australis" and are the World's largest earthworms. (Reference: "Down Under" by Bill Bryson, ISBN 0385 40817X.)

I am fascinated by worms because they dig my allotment for me. Nowadays I spread a three-inch layer of well-rotted farmyard (ie cow) manure on a third of my allotment every year and then grow crops in it. Over three years the worms pull the manure down into the soil until it is completely mixed and I can then sow small seeds such as carrots. (In year 2 the second third of my allotment receives the manure, and so on.) The worms create vertical holes, allowing oxygen from the air to enter and be available to the bacteria etc in the soil. I therefore do not have to dig to achieve aeration of the soil. In nature nothing digs. Leaves fall, grasses die and the worms drag the debris down into the soil, thus aerating it. There is no need to dig or plough. It is wasted effort, and counterproductive because of damage to the soil ecosystem.

I do not know how large my worms are after the application of manure every year since 1973. Since the year 2000 I have just left the manure on the surface of the soil, following the no-dig method. When I used to dig I found a few worms that were twelve inches in length, but not twelve feet. When I empty my compost heaps I tip out hundreds of "compost worms", ie the short (3 inches) red ones that seem to specialise in breaking down material in compost heaps. They seem able to detect compost heaps at a hundred paces and make a beeline for that lovely grub.

A very important benefit of having lots of worms is their worm-casts. The worms bring up all sorts of nutrients from deep in the soil and leave the nutrients in worm-casts which considerably enrich the top layer of soil. The no-dig method, of course, leaves the worm-cast-enriched layer on the surface of the soil rather that mixing it with much deeper soil. My top layer, a mixture of soil, compost or farmyard manure and worm-casts, is a fantastic growing medium for vegetables and fruit. It is full of trace elements.

The top layer of soil in which plants are grown is by no means a static medium. In the top 6-12 inches of soil there are millions of organisms, living their lives and doing what comes naturally. However, and most

seriously, there is the constant leaching of essential trace elements. (To be able to be absorbed by the roots of plants, the trace elements have to be in a form which is water-soluble.) Unfortunately, rain takes these water-soluble elements down into the subsoil below, where they cannot be taken up by plants, apart from a few very deeply-rooted vegetables such as parsnips. (My parsnips have roots up to 2.5 feet in length.) Thus, left to itself, the top layer of soil in which crops are grown would be devoid of the essential elements for plant growth - and essential for our health. Happily, we have the worms. They retrieve the valuable trace elements from the depths and deposit them on the surface of the soil, where they can be accessed by our vegetables. This situation can be considerably enhanced by the application of a layer of compost or manure on the surface of the soil. Apart from the worms then taking the compost or manure into the soil and mixing it in, rain will wash nutrients out of the compost or manure into the soil, thus providing our vegetables with more of the valuable trace elements they need. In effect, the roots of the vegetables "catch" the trace elements as they pass by on their way to the subsoil, carried down by the rain.

Interestingly, there is another method which gardeners can use to extract valuable trace elements from the subsoil. One can grow (inedible) perennial comfrey. This plant has very deep roots and sources trace elements in the subsoil. One then cuts off all the above-ground comfrey and adds it to the compost heap, to ensure that the compost which results will be rich in trace elements. The comfrey can be left to grow

year after year and crops taken at regular intervals for the compost heap.

And where is the payback for all of these attempts to give the crops we grow access to trace elements? There are three benefits – healthier plants, healthier people, and taste. If plants are grown in soil which is deficient in nutrients they grow weakly and are more susceptible to all kinds of plant diseases. If we do not consume adequate amounts of trace elements every day we can suffer from malnutrition and be more susceptible to many life-threatening or debilitating diseases (about one-third of people in the UK suffer from malnutrition). Now for the third benefit. One of the most apparent benefits of growing plants in nutrient-rich soil is taste. The taste of many of my vegetables is so different to supermarket vegetables that it is hard to believe that they are the same plants. I am convinced that the enhanced taste comes from the increase in the amount of trace elements in my vegetables. To illustrate the point, I shall let you in on a little secret. I used to think that the wonderful, delicious, mouth-watering taste of my greenhouse tomatoes (grown in farmyard manure and soil) was because of their freshness. I picked them just before eating them. But when I went away on holiday I took many tomatoes with me – red ones, orange ones just about to turn red, light green ones and hard green ones. During the following four weeks they all ripened off. It then dawned on me that the taste was the same as before - wonderful, delicious and mouth-watering. So the superb taste was not because of their freshness - it must have come from the vital trace elements they had taken up from the soil. It may be

sacrilege to say what I have just said about freshness, but that is what I have found and that is the conclusion I have reached.

So there we have the benefits of growing plants in soil full of vital trace elements. The worms are key here. They break down compost and manure and they retrieve vital trace elements from the depths and deposit them on the surface of the soil in their wormcasts. And they dig my allotment for me. A toast to the worm!

County Councillor's Report

The observant will have noticed the newly installed roadside white gates which have now appeared around the area. These came about after a long period of discussion and consultation with parish councils and the public, to implement traffic calming

under the Tranquil Roads scheme in the rural areas of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It was to make drivers aware that they were entering residential areas and should take extra care. National research has indicated that such schemes overall, do increase driver awareness and reduce traffic speed by one or two miles per hour. Public

reaction has been mixed, my phone and e-mails have indicated concern at the gates positioning, their effectiveness and cost. Overall, the majority feel that the gates do identify settlements and define communities in an acceptable way. As for speed reduction – we must wait and see!

Readers may or may not be aware that Naphill & Walter's Ash are in the Risborough area of the county council's "Getting Closer to Communities" scheme known as GC2C. This local forum brings together parish councils in the area of greater Risborough, the district councillors and the three county councillors whose divisions make up the area. The meetings held quarterly, are open to the public and deal with matters that affect the communities in which we live. These can range from highways, bus services, school catchment, social services and environmental matters. The police do attend the Risborough Forum and it is hoped that in due time the boundaries will be coterminus with the police's own "neighbourhood action groups". The next meeting will be on 23rd September, at Longwick Village Hall commencing at 7.00 pm.

A review of the Speed Limits is taking place and one adjustment in this area will be the extension of the 30 mph limit down Cryers Hill Road. Over the next two months new directional signs will be placed at road junctions in the Tranquil Area of the AONB. These will be the traditional finger posts and replace the existing pressed steel type. The residents of Stocking Lane should have been notified of an intended road closure for one week from 8th May. Traffic will be re-directed but pedestrians will still have access to Main Road. Early in May the road work gang will be working in our community area.

There is a new cooking oil recycling facility at the Bledlow Waste Recycling Centre. This oil will be used for electric energy generation and routed to the National Grid. This service is free of charge to householders only.

Finally, I would like to thank Group Captain Judith Good, the RAF Station Commander for her help and consideration. I am sure we all wish her well on her leaving the RAF and at the same time welcome her successor, Group Captain Tony Radcliffe.

Furthermore, what do you do if there is a potential breach in regulations or a situation that requires enforcement? Again, you can contact Planning, or go online and complete the form. Finally, Annual Council is on 11 May and I am attending two Licensing panel hearings on 14 May.

Hughenden Parish Council

You may know that the Parish Council owns a number of Community Assets, including 8 allotment gardens totalling about 25 acres. In addition there are 12 acres of land at Cockshoot Wood and recreation ground, 10 acres at Hatches Lane field, and the Common at Great Kingshill. The Garden of Rest at Four Ashes covers 4 acres; this cemetery is beautifully maintained by local contractors. Vincents Meadow is currently being grazed by sheep in order to comply with the requirements of the stewardship scheme under which some grants are received.

In addition to the care, maintenance and improvement of the 60 plus acres of land identified above, the Parish also tries to enhance the Parish by planting trees and bulbs. Every year each ward receives a large bag of bulbs; these have been planted in recent years at the corner of Bradenham Woods Lane, Chapel Lane corner, and also by pupils in the grounds of Naphill and Walter's Ash School. The Village Hall Council has requested some daffodils from next year"s allocation.

Moseley Road has recently had its avenue of trees restored. Seven of the original trees had been taken down and these have now been replaced by quite mature young trees which should enhance the wide

green vista in this cul-de-sac. A new tree has also been placed at the corner of Vincents Way where there is a wide verge. Any other ideas for placing more trees next year? Please get in touch.

Other areas in Hughenden Parish have also benefited; the 4 ashes at Four Ashes were replaced last year, and some more trees have also been planted recently on verges in Widmer End. There have also been some replacements on Cryers Hill.

Naphill is fortunate to have a large area of woodland "on its doorstep" but it is good, too, to enhance the roads where possible. The permission of Bucks County Council Highways department always has to be sought.

This year's annual Parish Meeting takes place on May 19th at Naphill and Walter's Ash School. Do join your local councillors to hear more about the ways in which the Parish Council tries to serve its residents. The meeting commences at 7.30pm. The formal part of the meeting will be followed by a talk from John Morris, the Manager of the Chilterns Woodland Project, on aspects of woodland management, history, and preservation. Followed by refreshments!

Your local councillors hope to see you on the 19th.

Hughenden Parish Council

What is a Parish Council? What does it do?

Under recent local government re-organisation Buckinghamshire County Council opted for a continuation of the three tier system of County, District, and Parish councils, Parish being the third level close to the grass roots.

A parish council is an elected body, and is reelected every four years. Hughenden Parish Council is divided into four wards; Great Kingshill (3 councillors), Hughenden, including North Dean and Bryants Bottom (4), Naphill, including Walter's Ash (4), Widmer End (4), making a total of 15 councillors.

The elections of the Chairman and Vice Chairman, and appointment of committee members, take place annually at the Annual General Meeting prior to the May Council meeting. A Parish Meeting also takes place during May and is held in each of the four wards on a rotation basis. This provides an opportunity to meet Councillors, to discuss the recent work of the Council, and to make suggestions.

The Council meets each month, with the exception of August, on the second Tuesday of the month. The Council has three main committees which look in detail at all matters within their particular remit and bring recommendations to Full Council; Finance and Administration, Services and Planning.

The Finance and Administration Committee deals with all administrative matters and recommends the annual budget. The Council's main income is from the annual precept which is submitted to Wycombe District Council and then included in the Council Tax. This year-2009/10- Hughenden is one of the few councils to have kept its budget at the same level as the previous year, ie. £155,000. This Committee usually meets four times a year.

Hughenden Parish Council tries to spend its income to the benefit of the whole community. For example, administrative expenses about £56,000, Garden of Rest and other open spaces £35,000, play areas £30,000, grants £14,000.

The Parish owns and maintains two children's play areas, and maintains four others owned by the Village Halls. Three areas of land are used, mainly by young people, for football and cricket. Other land assets include a number of conservation areas such as woodlands at Widmer End and Vincents Meadow in Naphill, all open to the public, allotment gardens, and the Garden of Rest at Four Ashes. All are maintained using local contractors.

Annual grants are made to all the Village Halls to assist with their running costs, and the Council considers making further grants to assist with major projects when requested. The Council also makes annual grants to help defray the cost of village newsletters.

Why does the Council spend money in this way? If the villages did not provide these facilities the Council would have a moral obligation to do so. With an area as diverse as ours this would be an impossible drain on resources. Therefore the activities of Village Hall Councils make a very important contribution.

The Services Committee meets four times a year and deals with all aspects of the Parish's assets, as indicated above.

The Planning Committee meets every three weeks. Hughenden Parish Council is consulted in an advisory capacity by Wycombe District Council on all planning applications within the Parish. The final decisions on all applications are made at District level.

The monthly Council meetings, and all Committee meetings, are open to the public. The date and times of meetings, together with the agendas, are posted on the Council notice board at the Parish office at least three working days before the meetings.

The Hughenden Parish Council website is up and running and contains much information about the Council's activities. It may be viewed at www. hughendenparishcouncil.org.uk.

8pm Thursday 14th May 2009 Third Public Meeting. Traffic Hazards at Main Road, Walter's Ash. Naphill Village Hall.

As a community we are continuing to press for effective ways of improving road safety and regulating parking around the Co-op in Walter's Ash. On 14th May we have another chance to consider how much real progress has been made since the meetings in May and November 2008. To bring you up to date:

- (1) Of the measures agreed at the November meeting we still await:
 - (a) Marked parking bays on Main Road opposite the parade of shops near the garage.
 - (b) A white access protection line on the road adjacent to the parade of shops.
- (2) A proposal is to be made to the RAF to sell a strip of land in front of the RAF building south of the Co-op to provide several parking spaces.
- (3) Speeding. The idea of installing a TSID to register vehicle speeds is not now an option, since the available TSIDs in Wycombe District no longer carry the necessary recording equipment.
- (4) Agreement is yet to be reached on double yellow, no-parking lines.

Our local Councillors and other official representatives, including Ms Si Khan, Bucks County Council Highways' representative, will be at the meeting on the 14th May. This will give local people the opportunity (1) to say what they think about the steps already taken to ease the traffic problems around the Co-op and (2) to reach agreement with the decision makers on further action to be taken.

Since our meeting **Talking about the Common** on 20th March our membership has risen to over seventy, so we can now start to plan various events and activities. In my brief opening session I may have given the impression that those who joined would be expected to take on various forms of hard labour or exacting research. I am sorry if I did and must stress that members can get as involved to whatever extent suits them: from everything to nothing. Thanks to the efforts of our treasurer, Peggy Ewart, we now have a bank account, so progress is possible. What the committee would like are suggestions for a programme of activity. Any ideas?

A couple of things caught my attention from the talks we had. Neil Harris showed a copy of the 1847 Tithe Map of Bradenham. This clearly showed that the open area on Bradenham Hill, which includes the Umbrella Tree and the "Clumps", was part of Naphill Common. Present-day maps of the common exclude this area. I suspect that the apparent loss of this space was due to the fact that it was, and is, under different ownership from the rest of the common. None-the-less, I feel we should welcome it back! For one thing, it will allow us to investigate the enigmatic Clumps and find out if the persistent

rumour that they were drover's enclosures is true, or if they were just rings of trees.

I was struck by the figures Dr Alan Showler gave about the rare starfruit Damasonium alisma, he first discovered in Manning's Pond in 1989. They had previously been recorded in 1864, 1897 and 1902 but no one had recorded them since. Yet, with careful work on the ponds the numbers soared. For example, in 1992 there were 300 plants in Daisy Pond and 30 in Manning's. Unfortunately, they have not been seen for several years, but this remains a striking illustration of what might be achieved if conservation work could be carried out. not just on the ponds but in other locations on the common. Who knows what other rarities could be found? A look at Wilfred Smith's map of 1948 (on the web site) gives some hints at what might be waiting there.

Thank you to all those who came on the walk on April 19th. (As I write I assume it happened.) Don't forget the "Walk for Health" on Monday 18th. May, with Ron Collins, starting from the Village Hall at 10.30 am. We are committed to another, but different, Heritage Open Day tour in September. Other events will be announced.

Some Interesting Numbers


<u>150,000</u>. BBC 1 News recently stated that there were over 150,000 people on waiting lists for allotments in the UK.

1,000. The National Trust have announced that they are to create a further 1,000 allotments in the next 3 years on 40 National Trust properties. The National Trust already has allotments and active kitchen gardens on 50 properties. They include a walled garden created in 2005 at Hughenden Manor.

- 6. Councils have a statutory duty to provide allotments to those who want one. If 6 people on the electoral roll request an allotment the council have to provide it. Therefore, if there are no allotments in your area or the waiting list is frightfully long, find 5 other people of like mind and make a formal request to your council.
- <u>94</u>. In 1988 80% of the fruit consumed in the UK was imported. That has now risen to 94%. The reason for this appallingly-high figure is that labour

costs are lower overseas – and some fruit cannot be grown in our climate.

- 61. For food as a whole, there has been a decline in the UK over the past 10 years in food selfsufficiency from 68 to 61%. The latter figure is 74% if one considers only food which can be grown in our climate. The cause of the decline in selfsufficiency is that our supermarkets choose what to buy on price, and often foreign farmers offer a lower price. However, the damage to the Earth's climate from burning fossil fuels in the transportation of foreign food is not allowed-for in the price. In my opinion, for each ton of imported food the importer should pay a "climate change" levy of a few pence per food-mile, whether the food is imported by lorry, ship or aircraft. That would make UK-grown food more competitive and, hopefully over time, lead to greater self-sufficiency. Such a measure would be unpopular with vested interests in our supermarkets and would raise prices in the shops, but it would ensure that the real cost of producing food was taken account of.
- <u>54</u>. In the UK, 54% of sewage is spread on farmland. Bon appétit!
- <u>050292</u>. The first genetically-modified food went on sale in the UK on 5th February 1992. The genetic modification was to stop natural decay of the food, prolonging shelf-life.
- <u>22</u>. The European Union (EU) has authorised 22 genetically-modified items for import into the EU.
- <u>80</u>. In the USA, 80% of food in supermarkets now contains genetically-modified ingredients.
- <u>25</u>. The number of countries now planting genetically-modified crops is 25 and the number of farmers growing them is 13,300,000. There were 114 million hectares planted in 2007; that rose to 125,000 hectares in 2008. Only one genetically-modified crop is authorised to be grown in the EU Bt maize, which is grown in 7 EU countries. The most widely-grown GM crop in the World is soya beans, mostly for export to the UK and the rest of the EU for use as animal feed.
- <u>95</u>. Of food consumed in the UK, 95% has been grown with artificial fertiliser.
- <u>6,000,000,000</u>. In a handful of soil there are about 6 billion species of micro-organism, working away, helping our crops access the trace elements they, and we, need.
- <u>26</u>. There are 26 species of earthworm in the UK. On my no-dig allotment they are working away, doing my digging for me.

- 3.75. A trailer-load of well-rotted farmyard (ie cow) manure weighs about 3.75 tons. I have at least one load each year and shifting it keeps me out of trouble for a while.
- <u>30</u>. It has been reported that seed merchants in the UK have experienced an increase in vegetable seed sales of about 30% over normal levels. Many more people must be growing their own.
- 1,000,000,000. Scientist James Lovelock, an expert on global warming, has predicted that the rise in average temperatures by the end of this century will be about 5 degrees Centigrade. Whereas this prediction agrees with forecasts made by other bodies, including the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, where he differs is that he reckons that with such a rise the Earth will be able to support only 1 billion people. The World population is currently around 6.5 billion and growing at about 1.5% each year. The United Nations predicts that by 2015 the World population will be 7.2 billion and will reach 9.2 billion by 2050. If it then declines to 1 billion by the end of the century one wonders what will happen to the other 8.2 billion people. James Lovelock predicts that the UK will continue to have adequate rainfall, but the only other areas able to grow crops by the end of this century will be northern Europe, Siberia and Canada. He says that carbon emissions into the atmosphere are only half the story – taking land for farming is the other half of

causing global warming (because the trees which previously grew on the farmland are no longer absorbing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere). Another aspect of global warming is unexpected – increasing temperature reduces crops since photosynthesis slows as temperature rises. As to whether doom awaits 8.2 billion people, economists have a saying that "the only certain thing about a trend is that it will end". Let us hope that the trend will end, that mankind will curb damaging emissions into the atmosphere, and we shall all be saved.

RECOMMENDATION - Grow your own!



County Councillor's Report

The Councillor's Report is suspended until after the Election on June 4th.

New direction signs are appearing on the quieter lanes in the area. These finger posts are thought to

be more environmentally pleasing that the larger, more intrusive signage used on main routes.

Concern regarding parking congestion at the school start and finish times in Kilnwood, Walter's Ash is being addressed by both the RAF and the School. Road traffic has increased in recent months and more parents appear to be driving their children to and from school. Possible solutions may include a re-instatement of the "walking crocodile" and the parking of cars away from the school site.

A similar situation exists outside the shops in Walter's Ash and although some measures have been adopted by the county council there needs to be re-enforcement of parking controls to prevent obstruction and the possible safety of pedestrians whose visibility is obstructed by parked vehicles.

Fly tipping appears to be on the increase, especially by unregistered waste disposal services. Several householders and small businesses have been prosecuted in recent months for using the services of unregistered operators. Their names and addresses have been on correspondence found in illegally dumped rubbish. Every home owner has a duty of care and should establish that any contractor acting on their behalf is a bona fide registered operator. Otherwise they are responsible for the action and they pay the fine which, in several cases exceeds £1,000.

District Councillor's Report

Firstly, I am not writing my usual report for this month owing to the "Purdah" period. In essence, this means that owing to the Current County and European elections, I am not permitted to publicise the Council or my party.

On a personal issue, I would like to express my gratitude to the Co-Op. Several weeks ago, I foolishly left the cash I had withdrawn at the ATM! Luckily It was handed in by a member of the Coop staff. Having written separately to the Management to express my appreciation, I wanted to say that all credit must go to the honesty and integrity shown, despite very difficult times.

Vincents Pond

Many of you will know of Vincents pond, which is situated off Downley Road in Naphill. However, you may not know that this land is owned and managed by Hughenden Parish Council.

A lot of work has gone into the management of the

pond over the last few years. Overgrown hornbeams were coppiced (on the left, backing on to the orchard) as they were drinking the pond dry. With replanting and trimming, a more manageable hedge has been established.

We are lucky enough to have **great crested newts** in the pond and these are a <u>protected species</u>. In order to keep them safe, we need to keep <u>all fish and ducks out</u>. To maintain the integrity of the ecology of this pond, the Council follows a strict regime, in line with the Countryside Stewardship guidance.

I am afraid that we have received reports that some people have been interfering with the pond and someone has introduced goldfish to the pond in recent weeks. There is also evidence that dogs have been allowed to swim in the pond. These undermine the pond's ecology and a great deal of work will have to be done over the next few weeks to bring the pond back into correct management and the area will have to be closed while this takes place.

In order to ensure that the pond can be enjoyed for many years to come, the Council asks that everyone remembers that the pond is for quiet enjoyment, not to take the place of a garden pond, where goldfish can be encouraged. If you notice anyone interfering with the pond, please let the Council know as soon as possible on HW 715296. Thank you for your co-operation in this matter.

Raleigh International is a registered charity and this year they have expeditions in Borneo, Costa Rica and Nicaragua, and India. The expeditions are for young people aged between 17 and 25 to develop themselves, becoming part of a team and undertaking a project that will benefit the host country. Many of the young people come from Britain, pay to take part and raise their own personal contributions. There are other underprivileged young people from Britain who also take part and also underprivileged young people from the host country. They are put into teams of about 12 youngsters with 3 managers to take part in the expeditions.

I will be part of the field base team in Mysore, Karnalaska in the Western Ghats region of India undertaking the duties of the Logistics Co-Coordinator. My job will be to ensure that the teams on project sites have all the food, materials and equipment that they need. (Easy then!)

Last year a team went into a village to help build 10 composting toilets, one for each family in the village. The team was housed in the local school and helped by the villagers to build the brick structures. When they left the village three weeks later they were given flower necklaces and there were many tears on both sides. The team then went on to undertake a 10 day trek through Kerala; with 2 days mountain biking and 3 days kayaking in the peaceful back waters. They then went on to the Nagarahol National Park where they repaired elephant trenches, which stopped the marauding elephants raiding the sugarcane fields, and so stopped the angry farmers from trying to shoot the elephants. This was very hard physical work but very rewarding for the team.

Without mature volunteers the young people would be unable to take part in theses activities, which provide life-changing experiences for people from all walks in life.

Jack Bates, 1934 - 2009

Jack had a brilliant brain; he was a real intellectual. He was brought up in Portsmouth. His initial training was at the Royal Naval Dockyard College then he went to Durham University, where he met Brenda. His subsequent profession was that of a control systems engineer, surely the most difficult branch of engineering to master. After he came to Naphill 29 years ago, already a paraplegic, he tried to carry on working for a while but it was just too difficult. Nevertheless he took on complex technical challenges at home with his computer, patiently using a pointer to operate the keys one by one. In the early days of computer games he invented and produced the software for several games. He also delighted in puzzles with which to confound his friends and neighbours. Nobody could compete with Jack's logic and very broad general knowledge.

His computer was his chief distraction but he also enjoyed painting despite his difficulty in controlling his hand movements. He produced some very delicate watercolours to a high standard. Brenda and Jack have a very nice garden. Jack did the design on his computer and supervised the work, driving Brenda mad at times. One of the best memories is that of the wedding of Brenda and Jack's daughter Carole to Bill. The sight of Jack in his wheelchair coming down the aisle dressed in a light grey morning suit and top hat, to give away Carole, will live with us forever. Jack was so happy that day.

He also had a very good sense of humour and would enjoy a good laugh. There was a famous incident when his neighbour, namely myself, released hundreds of large frogs into my garden. The frogs had been collected from his ponds by Frank Ridgley, who has the house at the back of my allotment. Frogs like to return to where they were born to procreate, hence Frank's problem with hundreds of frogs in his ponds. Frank usually deposited large drums of frogs in the countryside far away from his ponds, but on this occasion I wanted them for my garden to decimate the slugs. Now, when I tipped the frogs out, instead of hopping in all directions they made a beeline for the then rickety log-lap fence adjoining Jack' garden. It seems that frogs have a homing instinct similar to a racing pigeon's - and Jack's house lay on a direct path to Frank's garden. There were holes in the fence.....

Jack was in his wheelchair, in front of his large picture window, facing the fence when he saw a large frog advancing across the lawn towards him, then another, then another. He called Brenda. In no time there were tens, then hundreds of frogs coming at him. It was like a biblical plague. Jack used to recount this tale frequently, hardly able to speak while laughing about the frogs. He certainly had a great sense of humour and that is how we shall remember Jack - laughing despite all his problems.

One must pay a tribute to Brenda for her devotion and sheer hard work in looking after Jack following his car accident 29 years ago (they were married for almost 50 years). The burden grew as Jack's condition deteriorated. It was sheer unremitting toil. She deserves a medal.



County Councillor's Report

First of all I must thank all those readers who took the opportunity of recording their vote at the recent County Council Elections. 44.1% of the Electors of Greater Hughenden voted in person or by postal vote. For those who have not seen the full result it was as follows:

Richard Pushman, Conservative 1,877 votes 65.7% Kevin Peters, Lib Dem 426 votes 14.9% Mike Slack, UKIP 381 votes 13.3% William Cass, Labour 172 votes 6.0%

Whether your vote was for me, or another candidate, I will continue to work for the benefit of the community as a whole.

We have a challenging 4 years before us, with reduced funding and a strict limit on council tax increases. All councils must work with greater efficiency and already plans have been made to change the way we supply services to our communities. Building on the successful programme that was carried out last year, Buckinghamshire County Council has this year committed £4.2 million to carry on the good work of transportation including road improvements.

This year there will be several strands to this work. Community gangs will be visiting Parishes on a regular basis throughout the year carrying out work as requested by both Parish and County Councillors to improve the local environment. The work typically includes the cleaning of road signs, cutting back of vegetation both at junctions and alongside footways and the clearance of roadside drainage channels and gullies.

The second strand of work involves carriageway patching work. County Councillors, together with officers of the county council, have identified roads in their respective divisions that will benefit from patching work. This work is in addition to the normal patching programmes that are operated by our area teams. The programme of work has commenced. As with last year's programme an additional gang will be dealing with vegetation issues and a 'lining gang' will be following on refreshing line markings in the area.

On the 1st April 2009, Transport for Buckinghamshire was formed to deliver the transportation services on behalf of Buckinghamshire County Council. As a consequence of the cost savings that this new organisation is able to generate, the patching programme has increased from 57,000m² in 2008/09 to a target of 84,000m² in 2009/10 for the same cost.

Such arrangements for the delivery of efficient services will follow on in other areas of the councils work with cost benefits to all council tax payers. Challenging times but with exiting prospects.

Firstly, well done to Richard Pushman in being returned as our County Councillor for the Greater Hughenden Division. He will also be the Chairman of the County Council for 2009-2010. The energy and enthusiasm that he possesses, never ceases to amaze me. Congratulations, Richard!

I do hope you enjoyed the Fete? Despite the awful weather, I was optimistic that the weather would improve, and so it did. The Council is certainly getting tough on the licensing and sale of alcohol; particularly to younger people. We are also prepared to suspend or revoke a licence if necessary.

Looking ahead, we have full Council on 6 July with a reminder of the Residents Association meeting in the village hall on 9 July as an update to the last two meetings.

I mentioned about surgeries in the April edition. What are your thoughts? Would you prefer other ways to communicate? Do let me know. With that in mind and having conducted research, it was clear to me that people do want to communicate in new ways, embracing new media including email, blogs and micro-blogs, such as "Linkedin" or "Twitter." I decided some time ago to start both my own blog and "Twitter" entries. Only time will tell if this additional medium will be effective. I believe it is and will continue to be. I really am an advocate of an integrated approach encompassing a mix of both traditional and new media methods. I will persevere with surgeries and letters, public meetings and so on. Furthermore, the use of Social media is a growing phenomenon with sites as such as Myspace, Facebook, MSN and so on growing at a dramatic rate. From the Vicarage - July 2009

Whilst listening to the car radio I recently heard a part of a phone in talk show. The subject was redundancy and the lengths people will go to to keep their jobs. One caller said that he had in fact been made redundant twice in the last twelve months. He was asked the question "would you seek to undermine someone else to make them look more expendable than you in order to keep your job?", he replied that he wouldn't, in fact he said that with one of his redundancies he had offered to "take the hit" because he felt that he was better able to do so than a vounger man who had a young family to support. The other caller was then brought in and his comment was "are you mad?" When asked to expand he said that he would stop at nothing to maintain his job. His policy was to make himself look essential but to make his colleagues look expendable. He would think nothing of mounting a dirty tricks campaign to show up others in front of his employers and would do his best to subtly undermine them. He thought this was unavoidable behaviour. Bring in the first caller again whose comment was "well I"m glad I have never had to work with you?"

I reflected whether these were extreme examples. one man who would take the redundancy instead of someone whose need he felt to be greater, and another who would stop at nothing to keep his job. however savage he had to be with others to do so. Now, I have to confess that the life of the clergy can seem very divorced from what goes on in the "real" world, I just don't work in that sort of environment and so I freely confess that I am probably naive about the realities of the modern workplace. However I do try and listen to those whose lives daily take them to places which can be aggressive and negatively competitive. Year ago I did some work about management theory and how good practice would be well used within the church. I really believe in teams in the church and they can be sources of great creativity and energy. I believe that good teams bring out the best in people and most effective use of their gifts. I believe that those who are lucky enough in their workplace to be a part of such a team are far more likely to develop a

"brand" loyalty and feel a sense of worth as s significant contributors to something bigger than themselves.

However it would seem that I am rather a dinosaur. For many the workplace, rather than creating a positive environment of loyalty trust and respect of others in "the team" is in reality a negative environment in which people are deliberately set against each other. This form of competition has of course been used as a management tool for many years now. Add to this very aggressive work practice the sort of economic uncertainty we are facing at the moment and the language of "dog eat dog" and "looking after number one" becomes even more commonplace.

Back to the phone in - and forgive me my musings but it had me reflecting that behaviour that lends itself to the sort of social cohesion that I am sure we would all like to see, is only a veneer and it doesn't take much for far more primal instincts to take over. "It"s a tough world out there" is the cry of the moment, and yes it is tough and for many increasingly ruthless. There is nothing new in this of course, it is a reflection on how human society has always been, we've simply emerged from a period of great prosperity and growth into a very rude and stark awakening. It also had me musing just how hard it is to maintain a stance which exhibits truly Christian standards in all of this. It is very easy for the vicar on a Sunday to pontificate about our calling to "live as citizens of God's kingdom" but it is very hard for his or her congregation to go to work on a Monday and do just that. Jesus challenged his followers with the commandment "do to others as you would have them do to you", but how does this work itself out in the face of ruthless competition and aggression that will have others undermine us if we don't first undermine them? The church consistently offer prayers for people who are obviously in the "caring professions", doctors, nurses, teachers and so on. They need our prayers of course, and their workplaces are tough as well, but we need to be equally praying for Christians in business and commerce, for those in companies which encourages aggressive competition between colleagues, and yes we need to be praying for Christians working in the world of finance and banking. It is a tough world out there at the moment, but it doesn't change the call: Followers of Jesus are to shine out as a clear light, "a city set on a hill which cannot be hidden" (Matthew 5:14), we need to pray now as never before for the integrity of all those who are followers of Jesus in these hard places to live by this call and show by their examples that there is another way to do things.

County Councillor's Report

The County Council returns from the summer break to a full workload for the next 6 months. Apart from the financial challenge of the budget there are several local issues which need resolving. A recent public meeting regarding the parking difficulties at Walter's Ash was organised by the residents

association and attended by 50 plus interested people. They have undertaken to conduct a survey of readers as to the desirability of marking part of the footway, outside the RAF store building, for identified parking spaces. This would allow cars to park, part on the footway and part on the road, whilst protecting the path width for pedestrians with push or wheel chairs. This would be achieved by

white lining along the path marking the extent to which the nearside of cars could encroach. At the present time drivers are parking without consideration of pedestrians and blocking the path. Examples of this shared use of roadside path parking can be seen outside Great Kingshill Village Hall and along the London Road at Wycombe Marsh. This would be a temporary measure until the possibility of acquiring land from the RAF, for a parking lay-by, is further explored.

With the help of the parish council and other colleagues using our community leader's fund, we hope to install temporary speed indicator displays along selected sites on Main Road. This will visually inform drivers when they exceed the 30 mph limit.

The use of a private dwelling on Cryers Hill for the parking of emergency vehicles whilst their drivers are on call has caused serious concern as to the suitability of these premises for this commercial operation. The company supplying this emergency service is operating out of London and is not for local hospitals.

The parking of heavy lorries along Warrendine Road is causing much distress to local residents as they suffer their drives being blocked and engine noise, whilst the vehicles are parked up awaiting entry to the site at the junction with Bryants Bottom Road. There are no easy answers to this dilemma as the operator is acting within the site permissions granted at Appeal. This is no comfort to those who suffer from the deprivation of tranquillity, caused by these heavy vehicles delivering to the site. I am exploring all possible solutions with council officers and the police, as to how we might help.

At a cabinet meeting in June members from Buckinghamshire County Council agreed the way forward to changes in the way social care will be delivered in the future. Over the past year adult social care has been developing the new model for helping vulnerable people which is being tested out and will be implemented from next April (2010).

The new model, called self directed support, is aimed at giving people, who need social care, more choice over what services they use, and control over where and how they are purchased. Under the new system people will know how much money can be used to fund their care and will then be able to work through a plan to support their needs with the funding available. It is envisaged the new system will allow people to purchase their care in many different ways, for example by paying someone to help them live independently.

District Councillor's Report

Since my last report, I have remained optimistic about a change in our weather fortunes and either way, hoping you had a pleasant summer break, irrespective of whether you stayed at home or went away.

Many thanks to the Naphill & Walter's Ash Residents Association for organising the Co-Op follow up meeting on 9 July. It is obvious that progress has been made and that most of the stakeholders, including the RAF and Co-Op, were in attendance. Obviously, I do not want to duplicate the reports of either NAWARA or Richard Pushman in respect of actions, except that I have committed some of my community budget for the two-week installation of a TSID (Temporary speed indicator Device) along the Main Road following the school holidays. I really want to work towards speed reduction and the use of alternative means to get around our village. It is obvious to me and others, that speeding is both a problem and commonplace in the Village. I forwarded the original Co-Op planning decision to Gloria Leflaive. It was interesting to note that the assumption would be for cycle use rather than heavy car use. Of course, no one could predict the demise of both the Country Store and Coombe Lane Store.

Have you noticed more adults cycling on the pavements? I have. There should be no reason why this should happen. In one instance, a lady rushed passed me, whilst on a mobile telephone! It looked funny at the time, although an accident could have been imminent. Please think of other people i.e. the people on foot!

Additional attended meetings included Council on 6 July and an informal cabinet on 9 July. I also chaired a Licensing Panel hearing on 30 July.

Finally, I have allocated £400 from my community budget to the Naphill & Walter's Ash Pre-School for the provision of outside equipment for the play area and a very important space for a "Quiet" area for the children.

Naphill & Walter's Ash Residents Association

Report on Third Traffic Hazard Public Meeting A well attended public meeting took place On July 9th 2009 attended by Councillors, School Governors, senior Co-op management and RAF representatives. The purpose was to continue to seek ways of reducing traffic hazard near the Co-op in Walter's Ash, and speeding through the village. The Residents Association had progressed Cllr Richard Pushman's idea for a lay-by near the Co-op by asking the Defence Estates if it could release a strip of land for that purpose. Wing Commander Neil Sturtridge reported that in 1957 a Deed of Dedication was made handing over a strip of land for highway use, and this land may include the proposed lay-by area. If this is confirmed, funding and planning permission will be sought for the layby.

Cllr Pushman suggested a continuous white "no parking" line to prevent parking between the Co-op and blind bend north of the Co-op, agreed a "Slow" sign approaching the blind bend, and sought support for half-pavement parking bays south of the Co-op as an interim measure.

There continues to be a difference in opinion between the Highways Department and local residents on the amount of speeding in the vicinity of the site. Cllr John Gibbs agreed to have a Temporary Speed Indicating Device installed on Main Road for a fortnight twice a year. At present, we are told, a permanent SID would be too expensive.

An alternative proposal is to designate one half of the pavement as an allowed parking area with the rest of the space being marked on the road. 




Friends of Naphill Common

Following up the 1847 Tithe Map of Bradenham we can now confirm that the true boundary of Naphill Common extends on to National Trust land to include the open area around the Umbrella Tree and the woodland sloping down towards Bradenham, making the wall of Bradenham Manor the Eastern edge of the common. See the shaded area on the map.



Our programme of events continues to be a success. On Monday 20 July Ron Collins led the third Walk for Health. He writes: as on previous occasions the walk commenced from the Village Hall. A total of 13 people took part of varying ages the eldest being 82! The walk was approximately three miles long and the group made their way through Naphill woods into Bradenham woods via "the umbrella tree" Having emerged onto Bradenham cricket green by the church we then crossed the road and entered the fields behind what was the youth hostel. Here we saw numerous Argentinean polo horses grazing in several of the fields. We then proceeded to climb up the right hand section of fields where we were able to look across towards the Risborough road and beyond - a beautiful view. Whilst waiting for some of the slower walkers to catch up the question was posed as to whether there was anyone present who was prepared to volunteer their services as membership secretary for FONC. To my great surprise a hand went up and Stephanie Morgan was immediately invited to the next committee meeting! So a very big thank you to her. Having reassembled we then made our way back to Naphill via Bradenham woods behind the officers' quarters, crossed the road and emerged on the track in front of the houses by Forge Road. The walk took about two hours and was enjoyed by all - many of whom have participated in all three of our walks and appear to have made it quite a social event (much female chatter all the way round!) I look forward to

leading more walks in the future - details will be announced in due course.

Dr Showler also pointed out the small group of oak trees, home to a colony of the elusive Purple Hairstreak butterfly. Two ponds were visited including the one were Dr Showler first discovered the even more elusive and exceptionally rare Starfruit. Another rarity - a warm evening, made interesting.







Criminal Damage, Naphill.

My wife was briefly parked along the main road through Naphill on a Friday night in late July, about 19.30pm, delivering a birthday card when a very aggressive chap walked past, objected to her parking and smashed her wing mirror off with his hand! Sadly, she was in the house at the time, so she didn't see him do it. However, her 14 year-old nephew and his younger cousins, along with their father, did see it and they were somewhat frightened by the experience. By the time my wife was told, the chap was long gone. I did drive around to look for him but by the time I did that, another 15 minutes had elapsed and the coward was nowhere to be seen.

He is male, grey hair, about 50-ish with a black Labrador. He came from the direction of 'The Wheel' public house, on that side of the road, heading towards Wycombe direction.

The smashed mirror glass cost £55 to replace.

The assailant must have a very bad temper indeed but that still doesn't give him the right to go round smashing others' cars. I would imagine that he has done it before, so if anyone else has suffered a similar fate, then perhaps it will help identify the perpetrator. I think he needs to be stopped before he attacks someone, he was clearly spoiling for a fight. I just don't expect this kind of behavior in Naphill.

We hear so many negative things about the "youth of today", yet this was a man in 50's, frightening children and committing acts of criminal damage. Hardly an example to follow.

The Hungry Gap

(Editor's comment - due to space constraints this month I have included an abbreviated version of Mike's article, however the full version is available on the Naphill Horticultural Society web site)

It grieves me sometimes, in late autumn or winter, to see whole allotments, or parts of allotments, dug over for the winter. My grief is not just because I am a no-dig gardener. Those allotmenteers will be missing out on all the produce which could be harvested during the winter months. Some crops such as overwintering onions, shallots and garlic are much better if planted out on the first of October then left to grow throughout the winter. Since plants generally will continue to grow if the temperature is above 42°F (5°C), and since our winters seem to be getting warmer, then winter should be increasingly regarded as a growing season for many types of

crops. However, I said "my grief is not just because I am a no-dig gardener", so what is the other aspect? It is the hungry gap.

The hungry gap is that part of the year after winter, from about the end of March to the end of June, where there is nothing much around to eat. The winter crops have finished and the spring sowings have not yet produced their crops. So how do we fill that gap? What can we grow in that period to provide the fruit and vegetables we need?

The first thing we can do is to prolong the cropping season of the traditional winter vegetables. Carrots, underground beetroot, swedes and parsnips can be left in the ground and cropped into April. Sprouts and purple sprouting broccoli should crop well into April, and there are some varieties of winter broccoli and winter cauliflower which will crop into May. Red cabbage should be available until May and is delicious raw in salads. Chinese mustard "green in snow" seems to survive any amount of frost, as do salad leaves (polycress), winter purslane (claytonia), wild garlic and perennials salad burnet and lovage. Watercress and lamb's lettuce can be grown overwinter in the greenhouse and cropped in the hungry gap. Radishes and delicious early turnips should be available from mid-May. A few crops can be stored, such as garlic cloves which will keep well into July. As for spring onions, one of my

favourites is ciboule, a perennial spring onion which is available all year round but is especially nice in spring. Spring cabbage is a must – but sow only a few! My spring cabbage plants this year measure up to three feet across and have been available from early June. Leeks can be cropped from autumn until early June.

The second thing we can do is to advance crops sown in, say, March, by covering them with fleece, so that they will crop early, such as various types of lettuce and radishes. This also applies to early potatoes – I plant them under fleece in mid-March and am eating my first early potatoes at the beginning of June.

The third thing we can do is to grow perennial vegetables and cover them with fleece to bring them on early, such as asparagus (available from early April), seakale (covered with impermeable black polythene sheet and cropped from April onwards) and Good King Henry.

And what about fruit? Rhubarb can be brought on under black plastic sheeting and should be available from March. Strawberries can be hastened under fleece – I pick my first strawberries in early May. However, for other fruit one has to rely on the freezer. Raspberries freeze extremely well, as do gooseberries and cherries. Pears and plums can be bottled and consumed in the hungry gap.

What about exotics? I have developed techniques for growing chicory and so that I can crop it right through the winter and seakale from March. See the full article for further details. Another winning vegetable is Swiss chard, variety silver chard. Silver chard produces a crop in the autumn – broad white stems which are prepared like asparagus and surrounding green leaves which can be prepared like spinach. However, silver chard comes into its own in the spring when fresh leaves appear which can be cropped from early March to mid-June. Silver chard is a real winner and a wonderful filler of the hungry gap.

The overwintering onions should be available from mid-May, as should early, immature garlic. Perennial Welsh onions should be available from mid-April. As for herbs, perennials marjoram, tarragon, sorrel, thyme, rosemary and sage should be available throughout the hungry gap and the first sowings of parsley should be available from mid-May. Basil, parsley and dill can also be grown on a windowsill and be available in the hungry gap.

So you see, the hungry gap does not really exist. One can eat from one's garden or allotment all year round.

Community First Responders

Do you want to make a difference and give something back to the people in your local community when they need you the most? You could make a difference by providing emergency life saving skills to a member of your community until an emergency ambulance arrives.



Community First Responders are volunteers who are trained and equipped by the ambulance service to answer certain types of medical emergencies in their local communities while the ambulance is on its way.

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is the UK's single biggest killer. On average, 150,000 people suffer a SCA every year. Every minute that passes after someone has suffered SCA the chance of a successful resuscitation reduces by about 10%. The UK national average chance of survival is 4% in some areas where the first responder scheme has been running this has increased to 16%. average time for an ambulance to drive from the High Wycombe ambulance station to Naphill and Walter's Ash is eight minutes, with heavy traffic or poor road conditions it could be even longer. Eight minutes after suffering a SCA without any medical intervention, there is an 80% probability that the casualty will not survive. If a first responder can arrive at the scene within two minutes (which I personally have managed to several calls) the casualty has an 80% chance of surviving.

When the ambulance service receives a call in an area where there is a responder available and if the call is suitable for a volunteer to attend, the responder will receive a message on a mobile phone alerting them to the call. Responders are not sent to all 999 calls in their area, only the life threatening calls where time can make a difference. Also, their safety is our priority, so they won't be sent to fights or car accidents for example.

The initial training is done over 2 days, normally a weekend, and gives the responder the skills to use in real life situations, as well as training on the equipment used. There are monthly update and refresher courses that responders can attend to keep their skills and confidence at the highest level.

Most responder schemes work in groups with a volunteer coordinator to arrange an "on call" rota so all the responders within that scheme do as much time on call as they want to commit to, without affecting their work and family life and their other commitments. The personal rewards are great and the knowledge that you have helped save a life is almost indescribable. In order to remain an active responder, all that is asked, is that you attend a short refresher course and assessment in performing

resuscitation and using a defibrillator every six months, although most of the existing responders do a lot more.

All you need to join is to be over 18, have a full driving licence, pass an enhanced criminal records bureau check and be willing and able to give up some free time to help your community.

There is currently only one responder group in the Naphill and Walter's Ash area, and that is me! We desperately need more volunteers so that we can provide cover for more of the time. Whatever time you can commit, however small will help. If you don't fancy the idea of attending an incident personally, we need volunteers to help organise the rotas and help raise funds and awareness of the scheme, there are lots of ways that you can get involved and help, so if you are interested please do get in touch.

If anyone would like more information, feel free to drop me an email or give me a call, you would be very welcome to pop round for a chat over a coffee, take a look at the kit we use and ask any questions. I can also put you in touch with the correct person at the South Central Ambulance Service so you can apply to become a responder.

County Councillor's Report

The darker evenings and shorter days are not always welcomed by our more vulnerable residents, especially those who live alone or in isolated communities. That is why I have been particularly interested in Telecare, a system which links to a local call centre that can arrange for immediate reassurance or assistance to those who live alone or in vulnerable circumstances. Telecare equipment links to a call centre in High Wycombe. If an incident occurs, an instant message is sent via the phone line and help can be called quickly. The simplest form of accessing the system is by a small pendant button which can be pressed to call for help. It operates for up to 50 yards from the unit so will operate in the average garden, and can be worn on a cord or as a wristband. It is waterproof and can be used in a shower or bath.

Any reader who is already in touch with Adult Social Care can speak to their care manager or occupational therapist about the scheme. If you would like more information on Telecare please contact 01296 383774 or you can phone me on 01494 564152. There is an easy application form to fill in and this will be followed by a visit to explain the quarterly cost, or outright purchase scheme, that is available and what financial help might be available to those applicants of limited means.

The county council's Cabinet has selected Covanta Energy as the preferred bidder to treat the county's residual waste for the next 25 years. The Americanowned company proposes to build and operate an energy from waste (EfW) and materials recovery facility at Rookery South Pit, near Stewartby, Bedfordshire. Covanta already operates 40 EfW plants in the United States. The disposal of household waste is a major cost to our council tax payers and penalties for disposal in land fill sites are set to increase year on year. The energy from waste option is the most practical solution in the circumstances. Re-cycling targets are being increased in line with good practice and Buckinghamshire residents are already ahead of targets.

Parking issues and speeding cars are two concerns that dominate my postbag and I suspect will continue to do so, as there is no immediate solution available until all drivers drive within the limits. A recent speed check in Warrendine Road and Valley Road, Hughenden found a high level of speeding, in some cases, well above the indicated limit of 30 mph. Perhaps the related police prosecutions and resultant publicity might make drivers more aware.

On parking issues at Walters Ash, I am awaiting the results of the residents' survey, to see if a part solution might be found in allowing limited roadside parking by recognising "part on and part off" use of

the footpath, alongside the stores building, towards Woodcock Avenue.

Congratulations to Naphill as runner-up in the Village of the Year competition. This competition, sponsored by Calor, looks for community effort in the provision of local facilities and clubs. We are indeed lucky to live in such an active community with so much provided by a loyal band of volunteers.

District Councillor's Report

Since my last report, I have had contact regarding the proposed temporary speed advice and have received good support regarding the concerns over speed. And in particular the attention of the adults amongst us, cycling on our pavements.

The Council has now appointed a new Cabinet member responsible for Finance. We are under pressure to deliver both cost savings, due mainly to the ever decreasing national Government support, and our pledge to maintain or even freeze Council Tax. Naturally, we are working hard for sharing services in particular the waste and procurement areas. Of course, the many Government initiatives, that while initially appear attractive, often require heavy scrutiny to both understand and deliver, with no money to deliver. The Council is left with both communicating the incorrect and/or disappointing news and worse still, unable to implement the socalled initiatives. However, there is lots of work to do. The Council does need to reduce overhead and certainly improve upon its customer service response rates, both initially and on going.

As usual, I am confident. We are working on further programs, that include the relocation of the running track, updating the memorial at the All Saints Church, which incidentally is tilting, and providing much needed impetus for people looking for work or returning. We are also in the process of the joint waste programme between all the Councils.

Within the ward, the situation at Cryers Hill, with the parking of the Ambulances, appears to have calmed, and I am confident there will be a satisfactory conclusion for all concerned.

Hughenden Parish Council

There is a nip in the air as I write and doubtless our 'barbecue summer' will have been forgotten by the time you read this!

The Planning Committee of the Parish Council continues to meet every three weeks throughout the

year. As you probably know, the Parish is a consultee in the planning process, making representations to Wycombe District Council. Very often the comments of WDC and Hughenden Parish Council are similar. When WDC officers recommend that an application be permitted, contrary to the opinion of the Parish, then a councillor will go to the District Planning Committee meeting and express the Parish views.

Recent applications to which the Parish Council has objected include a proposal to extend 5 Cherrycroft Drive; the new dormers would be out of keeping with the symmetry of other houses in the Drive and the proposed extension would overdevelop the site. The decision of the District Council is awaited. A decision is also awaited on the application for lighting of a manege at Hunts Hill Farm, to which the Parish has strongly objected.

The Parish objected to the proposed major alterations of 19, Battingswood Gardens on the grounds that the height, scale and bulk would be out of keeping with other bungalows in the cul de sac. I am pleased to report that this application has subsequently been refused by the District Council.

We are still waiting for comments from Wycombe District Council on our Village Design Statement which the Parish submitted for consideration six months ago. It is understood the planning department is overstretched.

The Parish is holding its second public meeting of the year at Great Kingshill School on November 4th at 8pm. The main topic on this occasion is Planning and we have a senior officer from Wycombe District Council coming to give a presentation on the application process, the criteria used to judge applications, etc. I have been present on a similar occasion and can recommend the content and quality of the information provided. We hope to see many residents from Naphill and Walters Ash.

News from our Local Historian

Back in August I had a call and a visit from Tony Monks who was brought up in Naphill. He married an Australian girl and emigrated to Australia but was back in England for a holiday staying in Naphill. He was interested in tracing his old friends in the area. Someone said go and see Pam Smith.

We had a long afternoon together and I was able to show him some things from my exhibition of Naphill and Walter's Ash. He was excited on the cricket photos as his father Stan Monks was the Captain of our well known cricket team (which we have no more).

Mr. And Mrs. Monks lived for sometime in a cottage at the end of Forge Road (was called Short Lane at the time until Pam asked for a road name to be put up when building our bungalow there and was told it should be Forge Road). From there Mr. And Mrs.

Monks moved to a bungalow on the corner of Clappins Lane and Stonefield Road. Mr. Monks worked in the office of Smith & Sons, Walter's Ash. I thought people in the village would be interested in a 1946 photo of Middlesex versus Naphill at a Leslie Compton benefit match at Naphill Crick. In this photo is Leslie Compton and Bill Edrich with many of the village folk including Stan Monks (father of Tony Monks).

The same week of Tony's visit I had a phone call from a lady was was travelling from an Aylesbury meeting through our village tracing some of her relatives who lived in Hunts Hill. She had stopped a couple of people to ask about them and was given my phone number to ask questions. I was surprised when she said their name was Newell and we were both so excited as our family line was the same. I said was it Joseph George and his wife Sarah and daughter Ellen because they are my great great Grandparents living there back in 1861 time and were also hers.

Joseph George died aged 71 years (born in 1797) and Sarah aged 81 years (born in 1794) and both are buried in Hughenden churchyard. Their daughter Ellen was a Sunday School teacher at Hughenden Church. She died in 1912. She has a gravestone near the old almshouses now used as tea rooms and at other occasions by the church and in the 1901 census she is a teacher of music in Hunts Hill Lane. I keep the gravestone tidy. She must have been at the church when Benjamin Disraeli was at Hughenden.

My newly found relative has since travelled down from London to see me. We spent a long afternoon and evening time swapping all our family history and are planning another get together soon.

All family historians will appreciate what a wonderful surprise this has been for me.

Bradenham end of the Common, owned by the National Trust. As you walk along the footpath H2 towards the Umbrella Tree and Bradenham, they are on the right. Each is roughly oval and consists of a low bank with a slight ditch on the outside. The largest is 29 x 24.4 metres and the smallest is 14.9 x 12.7 metres. The questionable sixth one is 12.2 x 11.5 metres and may be the remains of a pond.

The Clumps are a mystery and have been the subject of speculation and debate for generations. By far the most popular explanation connects them with the drovers, who brought herds of cattle from Wales and the West across the country to the

London markets, in the years before the railways made them redundant. The drovers needed to pasture their cattle overnight and, according to the theory, they enclosed them in the Clumps for safety. This story has been repeated many times, including in Rex Leaver's admirable book *Naphill and Walters Ash: Looking Back at Village Life*, published in 1999 to celebrate the Second Millennium.

Unfortunately this romantic story is unlikely to be true. There are several facts that count against it. First, the Clumps are so small: even the largest would hold very few cattle and would certainly not provide a significant amount of grass. Second, the bank is very low – quite unlike those used for enclosing livestock – and the tiny ditch is on the outside which indicates that, if it had any function at all, it would be to keep animals out, rather than in. Third, while the banks have been worn down in places where paths cross them, there are no signs of entrances. Presumably, the entrances would have been as wide as a farm gate.

So what are the Clumps? There is a clue in the trees. The Clumps have trees on their perimeters and in their enclosures and these are of unusual kinds. There are limes, horse chestnuts and ash trees; all species that are either found nowhere else on the Common or, as in the case of ash, found very infrequently. There are some oaks but they may have invaded from the Common. I suggest that the Clumps, as the name suggests, are 18th Century groups of trees. It was very common for landowners to plant trees in small circular enclosures to mark the edge of their estates or screen off their tenants' humble dwellings.

But, what about the drovers? Just behind the Clumps there are two long meadows, now very overgrown, which they may have used, or they could have simply grazed their cattle on the Common itself which was, at that time, open meadow land with a few pollard trees, and with the necessary pond for livestock. Dare I add that we need evidence to support the folk stories that told of drovers using Naphill Common? As you can see, these are contentious issues and they underline the need for The Friends of Naphill Common to encourage some historians to do some detective work.

Our **Treasure Hunt** did not attract many participants, but four teams enjoyed a sunny afternoon and the Yellow Jelly Bellies from Chinnor won the champagne by completing the quiz and hitting the ape with the most wet sponges. The children found the buried treasure chest and emptied it of sweets in seconds.

As I write the **Heritage Open day walk** has not taken place but the weather prospects look good.

The **Fungus Foray** will be on **Wednesday 28**th **October** starting from Naphill Village Hall at 10 am. It will be led by two experts from the Bucks Fungus Group: Derek Schafer and Penny Cullingham.

The expedition to take cuttings from our few remaining junipers has been moved to a date which is thought to be the optimum for success. So Juniper Walk Sunday 17th January 2010. Our AGM (with speakers) will be on 22nd January 2010 in the Village Hall. Details of both to be announced.

Dear Editor.

Out On a Limb

Recently, several highly literate members of the village (!) enquired why I had not written a light-hearted article for the July/August Gazette. The answer was quite simple – lack of time. Why? It stems from an incident which occurred at 2.52 pm on 28th May.

June and I were visiting our younger daughter who now lives at Wing, near Oakham in Rutland. We had driven up on Friday morning, enjoyed lunch and

were chatting in the conservatory when a telephone call informed Clive and Alison that a swarm of bees was available for their second hive. A few minutes later it arrived by car, clustered around the cut branch on which the queen and her bees had settled.

We then stood up to walk down the garden to watch the transfer of the bees to their new home. Bees are curious insects and the transfer is quite remarkable. A plank is positioned with one end resting against the entrance to the hive and the other on the ground. The swarm is placed on the "ground" end and immediately the queen despatches a group of scouts who walk up the plank (incredibly bees prefer to walk up a slope), inspect what is there, in this case a custom built home for bees, like it and report back to the gueen. On hearing the good news that miraculously, their new accommodation is just a stroll away, the gueen orders the swarm to take up residence and up they go, in this case all 80,000 of them, and settle in the hive.

Alas, we did not see this highly interesting incident because when we stood up at 2.52 pm, June wricked her right ankle and fell heavily, thumping her right arm against a heavy coffee table and breaking the humerus. An ambulance appeared in good time and after temporary strapping of the arm by the emergency team and the administration of morphine, we travelled to Peterborough Hospital in the oldest ambulance in the country, a real bone shaker. After the usual examination and X-ray procedures, the decision to operate was made on Saturday morning.

By 10am we were back at the hospital only to find that at the last minute the surgeon had decided that the 1/2 inch gap between the two broken portions of the bone could best be left to heal itself. Thus to our surprise we returned to Naphill to see the specialist at Wycombe Hospital two weeks later, who immediately ruled that the 1/2 inch gap would take at least 9 months to heal, which was quite unacceptable and an operation was booked for 18th June at Stoke Mandeville. And so it came to pass and as I write it is 12 weeks since the two sections of bone were pinned together (straight down the middle, top to bottom) with minimal indications of access at both ends and no sling to wear.

So why do I write about this minor epic of surgery? First to point out how two medical experts can disagree totally on the appropriate action to be taken even over a relatively minor break. Second, June is and I use the technical term, right hand dominant and her right arm has been largely useless for some weeks. Thus another right arm has to be pressed into service, namely mine! Consequently I developed a fair degree of competence at hovering, washing up, preparing

vegetables, hanging up washing, ironing etc. Indeed there appears to be no limit to my (temporary) domestic capability.

As you may now, physiotherapy is not available on the NHS when you need it most. The current waiting time is three and half weeks. June therefore paid for a private session after ten days, which was a complete failure. It was too ambitious and resulted in three days and nights of misery. Clearly pushing the pace of recovery is risky particularly when dealing with the not so young.

Now 12 weeks after the operation the arm is fine but the shoulder is still a problem. Progress is good and the domestic pressures on me have reduced rapidly. Looking back my particular bête noirs involved bed making and some aspects of work in the kitchen. I find making a double bed on your own is a real chore as you have to go from side to side to complete a good tidy job. A badly made bed is an abomination.

The kitchen posed many problems and could provide the basis for an article on its own! I would make special mention of Sunday lunch which is a testing experience. The main problem is, of course, timing. There is plenty to prepare but getting the various elements of the Sunday lunch to "peak" at the right time is a nightmare for a newcomer, or in my case and old comer! And as for making gravy that is the last straw and quite an epic in its own right.

Now Madam has progressively taken back most of the vital roles in the running of the house, I can catch up on the depressing garden scene. The weather has improved and my extensive hedges are now under control, grass likewise. But above all I have someone who doesn't just share my bed but shares its making. Life is good!

SSAFA News

Week by week news of fatalities in Afghanistan hits the headlines - so many now that each report seems to have a a matter of fact quality which does not do justice to the enormous and tragic significance it has for each bereaved family. The wounded, however severe their injuries, get even less coverage, although there have been some stirring reports about the ways in which the victims are coping with the loss of limbs or other permanent disabilities

And then, largely hidden from the public gaze, there are the very many cases of combat stress, of bereavement broken relationships, and of difficulties in re-settling into civilian life, now aggravated by an ailing economy.

Government has responded and is under heavy pressure to enhance its support for military and civilian victims of contemporary warfare but a huge part is played by the charity sector. In Buckinghamshire, The Soldiers, Sailors Airmen and Families Association (SSAFA) is fully engaged in giving a wide range of practical, financial and emotional support to ex-service families.

Some 40 fully trained caseworkers are on hand to visit homes, consider very carefully the problems of the clients and arrange for appropriate support. We currently manage about 350 cases a year but want to reach out to more. Our charity provides for people of any age touched by any military experience in their lifetime. In Bucks it gains from a partnership with the Royal British Legion, which widens the sources of available caseworkers and financial resources.

We are now in a period of intense public awareness of the demands on our service families. If readers have been moved by recent events - perhaps reminded of the horrors of warfare by the passing of the last of our WWI veterans - there are three ways in which they might like to help:

- 1. by bringing SSAFA to the attention of anyone with military service connections who has fallen on hard times:
- by volunteering for work in one of a range of roles in SSAFA, whether caseworker, home visitor or in publicity and fund-raising;
- 3 by making a donation, or perhaps a legacy

Jumble sale on the 3rd Oct – always carried out with true Brownie-enthusiasm. Do come and support us.



County Councillor's Report

One of the more humbling experiences of being chairman of the county council is in meeting so many people in the voluntary services. There is no doubt that our society could not function without the untiring work of those volunteers who give freely of their time and effort looking after those less fortunate members of our communities. One such organisation is the "Young Carers", now recognised and better supported than was the case in the past. These young people. some as young as six, look after parents and siblings who are unable to care for themselves because of a physical or mental condition. These young people miss out on much of their youth, unable to have the usual parental help of the fetching and carrying enjoyed by most of our children. Now that "Young Carers" is recognised as a charity, it is able to seek grant funding to enable respite holidays and "days out" to be provided for these young people. It enables them to experience some normality in their otherwise very busy young lives.

On a similar vein I attended a presentation of "Canine Partners" at Chilton House, where I witnessed an amazing display of the help given, by trained dogs, to those confined to wheelchairs. It is easy to forget that pressing a pedestrian control button, or calling a lift, presents a problem to someone in a wheelchair. This is where dogs can be trained to carry out these tasks. They even assist their owners in taking off coats, pass credit cards to checkout operators at superstores, take washing out of machines and fetch the post and newspapers. They are truly remarkable animals that make their owners less dependent on carers, and give them a real sense of independence.

Pupils showed how much they care about their schools during a recent survey at local schools. Buckinghamshire County Council, working in partnership with the schools, asked pupils, parents, staff and the local community to comment on their schools. Over 1800 responses were received, including over 900 replies from pupils, commenting on

everything from the learning environment, the size of classrooms, dining facilities, toilets and changing rooms. The feedback will be used to help determine the priorities for investment in buildings and infrastructure, and should lead to significant improvements to school buildings in the future.

Since my last report, I attended full Council on 5 October, where members received a presentation on disability awareness. It is blatantly obvious that there is still a mismatch in understanding disability needs, in a world that seems to accommodate the able bodied. There is more we can do.

The Council is also battling hard with budgets and in particular, the relocation of the running track, which appears to be rather problematic.

I recently received a call regarding the collection times for the grey and green bins. The normal requirement is for you to place the bins outside **before 7am** on the day of collection. Apart from special circumstances and adverse weather conditions, there should not be any reasons for a change or cancellation. However, If your bin is not collected, you need to call the Waste Team by **4pm** on the day, on **01494 421415.** Alternatively, email wastecleansing@wycombe.gov.uk

Speaking of budgets, from 19 October, you will be able to access and take part in the Council's budget planner. An excellent application for **you** to decide your priorities for local service provision and spending. You will also be able to set your own budget that reflects your choices. In terms of additional meetings, I attended a Licensing Panel hearing on 22 October. Furthermore, did you know you can now apply online through the Council for a Licence, both long term and short term.

In November I plan to attend a Licensing committee on 5 November, followed by Remembrance Sunday events/services on the 8th. You will also receive a call soon from the Annual Poppy Appeal volunteers. Please give what you can. This would be much appreciated.

Hughenden Parish Council

The Parish Clerk has received calls regarding the closure of Vincents Meadow while sheep are grazing there. This land has to be grazed from time to time in order to keep it in good order and to qualify for grant under the Stewardship Scheme. The intention is to share the grazing with another field in the Parish, Little Burnhams. Unfortunately Vincents Meadow had to be

grazed for longer than anticipated because of fencing work required elsewhere. Sheep could escape through the kissing gate so the Meadow has been closed off.

The Council intends to install a stile, with a dog flap, so that in future residents can walk their dogs all the year round. However, dogs MUST be on a lead when sheep are present in the Meadow. It is a delightful place to walk and we understand why people are keen to continue to have access to it.

John Morris, Director of the Chilterns Woodland Project, has been advising the Parish on woodland management and there will be some felling in Cockshott Wood. He is to produce a long term plan to guide future work in the Parish's woodlands.

Some of you may be aware of the Neighbourhood Action Groups which are being formed throughout the area. These groups are led by Thames Valley Police, in consultation with parishes, village halls and residents associations. Hughenden Parish used to be included within a wider grouping extending beyond the Parish boundaries. We are pleased that it has now been decided to have one NAG covering just our Parish. The public are encouraged to attend meetings, and to help decide upon local policing priorities. Speeding, anti social behaviour and parking have been identified as areas to be tackled and all have been addressed to some extent and to good effect. The work needs to continue, of course, so becoming involved with your local NAG in order to identify

Our not-so-sunny summer is shuffling off to be replaced, I hope, with a dazzling autumn. Naphill Common is already changing. The birch trees are the first to let go their leaves and soon the beech, field maples and cherry trees should give us a blaze of colour. The oaks are too dignified to go in for such flashy displays and the solemn yews don't even try. Perhaps the hornbeams around the edge of the common are the most subtle: the outer leaves turn a bright lemon yellow while, for a time, the body of the canopy remains dark green, as if to show off its artistry. Of course, the holly ignores the whole carnival but, in most years and if they are not too overshaded, the female trees make up for it by a display of berries.



The bird population is changing too. The summer visitors are leaving. Sadly the list gets ever shorter. We lost the whitethroats, lesser whitethroats and linnets long ago as the last juniper and gorse scrub gave way to the march of the trees, but what explains the decline in woodland birds? This year there were plenty of blackcaps and a scattering of chiffchaffs but did anyone see or hear the once common willow warbler or a rarer wood warbler? There is a similar puzzle about the hirundines in the village: a few swallows remain but there are very few swifts and martins. Perhaps the decline of the farms from fourteen to none, together with the barn conversions, explains the loss of swallows and swifts, but why have the martins disappeared? Their nesting sites remain even the signs of their mud nests still mark the eaves of the post office.

There are some compensating gains. Red kites now roost on the common; there are buzzards regularly soaring over the village and even sightings of ravens. Our resident birds are preparing for winter. For example, the local robins have started their winter songs: cold and tinkling as if, like Hardy's thrush, they can see what is coming. At the turn of the year you will hear their songs change to a much more warm and mellow tone, which speaks of spring. Soon the flocks of fieldfares and redwings will arrive from the North and East. How many come and how hungry they are will determine whether there is holly with berries remaining for us at Christmas.

Once the leaves have fallen and our satellite positioning device can see the sky, we will resume our survey of the veteran trees. Over the last three years we have covered about a third of the common and recorded around 380 trees over 2.5 metres in circumference. Whatever your interest in the common we hope you will enjoy it though the coming months — mud and all. Thanks to some of our members, the paths are better marked with footpath numbers and there are maps available for those who need them.

Our Christmas Tree Lights - Dilly Knox of Bletchley Park

Back in 1937 the village had celebrations for the coronation of King George and Queen Elizabeth (see photo).

The village had a May Queen Phylis Smith who was the daughter of Frederick and Doll (was Hussey) Smith. She was crowned by Coningsby Disraeli's wife. Phylis had 6 attendants. Amongst them was her sister Freda, Betty Lawrence and Christine Jenkins.



On this day of celebrations Coningsby Disraeli's wife and Phylis planted our village hall tree which was given to us by Dilly (Dillwyn) Knox who lived at Cournswood, Walter's Ash. He took it from his own plantation which he planted with his two sons.

At the time of writing this article both on our tree and at Bletchley Park where Dilly worked with Alan Turing breaking the Enigma code are in the news.

Mike Mason and Mike Leggett who with our other volunteers decorate our tree for Christmas have had great problems needing many replacement bulbs which you will have learnt have now been phased out so alternative ways have been worked out by the two Mikes but the cost will be £2,400, a great amount to be raised.

We have in our village a great social community and at the time of writing this article the W.I. will have had a sausage and mash/apple pie and auction evening and on the 29th November the Lamphouse Singers are giving a concert at the village hall for raising funds. Other groups are also giving help to raise monies towards the cost. If you would like to donate monies for a strip of lights costing £40 plus or pop some money in the tins which will be around the village it will be gratefully received. People come many miles to see our wonderful tree decorated which has many historical connections.

I have in the past put up items in the gazette how it all started to be lit up. The President/Chairman of the Tennis Club Mr Don Ing who lived in our village with his family had an electrical shop in Desborough Road, High Wycombe and the Tennis Club used to have a Christmas Eve dance at our Village Hall and he started to decorate the tree for this occasion. Very sadly in 1964 he and his wife left their two small sons with Rose & Arthur Busby (relatives) to look after them while they took a Holiday in Switzerland but the plane went into the mountain at Innsbrook killing all on board. The tree continued to be decorated since then.

It is only recently that information is being released on the work which was carried out at Bletchley Park during WW2 when they worked endlessly to break the German codes with the Enigma machine which shortened the war by two years. I send posters to Bletchley Park before my last exhibition of Walter's Ash and Naphill and I received letters from Mavis Batey who was Dilly's personal assistant at the time.

Dilly was born in 1884 and died in 1943 when working with Alan Turing who came with him to his house at Walter's Ash some weekends. Mavis said they worked so hard not stopping for meals and sleep and she once watched Dilly feeding his pipe which he smoked with part of his sandwich. Mavis is writing her own auto biography which I helped her with photos etc which his family gave me. Dilly became very ill and returned home with Alan Turing visiting him when he died. His sons and wife said "he died while giving more of his work to England than he could really afford. Doing his secret work after the war Alan Turing committed suicide as it was leaked that he was gay. In 1915 Dilly joined the Admiralty Room 40 and in 1917 broke the U boat coding continued the work for his county up to his death a brilliant man we had in our village.

I have been asked if I would do my exhibition again. I could do if the village would like me to now I have everything in albums it is easier to do. If you would like me to let me know will think about it in the future.

Thank you all so much for your contributions. As I said at the beginning, Naphill is a wonderful village in which to live.



County Councillor's Report

Much concern has been expressed about the proposed sale of land in Clappins Lane at what is a speculative price, keeping in mind that as it is in the Green Belt its agricultural value would be approximately a fifth of the asking price. Adjacent residents and those nearby the site will certainly



consider their options and be right to do so. Unfortunately public meetings had to be arranged at short notice



Community is the new political "buzzword" and is being applied to many national and local programmes. It can be seen in "Community Policing" and "Community Leadership" amalgamated in Local Area Forums. The sense of community prevailing in our and other rural settlements has much to commend it and is brought about by a considerable effort from a dedicated band of volunteers. I am not so sure that it can be replicated in urban areas with their more transient populations. Deriving from the "community ideal" is consultation, the belief being that if the public are consulted, and there is no adverse comment, an intended governmental directive can and will be adopted. Such a situation has arisen with regard to local speed limits.

I have received several letters from residents in

Naphill and Hughenden Valley requesting that the entire length of Coombe Hill Lane be subject to a 30 mph limit. Unfortunately, these letters have come too late for immediate action to be taken. To explain why this should be so, would require too many pages of the Gazette, but briefly put, speed limits have to be published after a period of consultation and that period expired last June. After that the Highway Engineers confirm their recommendations, these are published in the Public Notices of the Local Papers and then are legally signed off. To be enforceable at law this legal procedure must be followed and adopted. Consequently the council is reluctant to re-open the debate until the next review takes place which could be in four or five years time. I will endeavour to see what can be done to re-consider this decision but I do not see an early resolution. The lesson to be learned from this episode is not to ignore consultations where they are applicable; the great temptation is always to leave it to others!

Remembrance Day services have been well attended this year, no doubt the involvement of our own brave servicemen and servicewomen in Afghanistan has made us all aware of the dangers they face on active service. As County chairman, I have been pleased to hold a series of receptions at County Hall for members of the armed forces and their families on their return from active duty. Letters I have received have all indicated that these civic recognitions are much appreciated by our service personnel.

On a local note I have received several requests for financial help from my Community Fund. I will need to allocate this by the end of February or sooner. If any local voluntary organisation requires financial assistance please write to me as soon as possible, setting out the scheme requiring support, including the cost, and I will be pleased to consider it.

Finally, may I take this opportunity of thanking all readers for their continued encouragement and support over the past year, especially at the county election last June. Next year will not be easy because of the financial difficulties which face the county council's budget but you are assured of my very best endeavours to meet the needs of residents in my Division of Greater Hughenden.

Wishing you all a very happy Christmas and healthy New Year.

District Councillor's Report

Since my last report, I attended a Licensing Committee on 5 November where we looked at the Gambling Act and its impact on the district. We do not appear to have had much of a problem and luckily for us, we have not engaged in the Super Casino era quite yet.

I also attended the Remembrance Sunday services in both High Wycombe and in Naphill. Again, the turnout was excellent and good to see so many people in the Village Hall, which I am sure, must have been a record turn out.

The meeting organised by Mike Pool at the Village Hall on 13 November was attended by over 100 residents in respect of the concerns over the potential sale of the land in Clappins Lane. A number of issues were raised and the investigation into a consortium to purchase was being followed up with residents expressing an interest or wishing for further information to be analysed. I committed to advise the Council's position by the 20 November. I suggested that we should ascertain if Hughenden Parish Council or Wycombe District Council could purchase it. A follow up meeting has been arranged for 27 November. By this time and with further stakeholder discussions, we should be in a better position.

I am also due to attend the Council's annual presentation from the Chief Constable of Thames Valley Police.

Finally, thank you for your continued support during 2009. Both Julie and I wish you and your families a very Happy Christmas and prosperous 2010.

It was a pleasure to welcome over 40 residents to the Parish Council's second public meeting of the year on November 2nd in Great Kingshill School. Alastair Nicholson gave a very informative presentation on the local planning system, explaining how applications are dealt with and what the District Council may and may not take into account when it considers applications. He also answered questions. The success of this evening has encouraged the Council to continue to host two public meetings per year, rotating the venues around our large parish. The next such occasion will be the Annual Parish Meeting on May 25th 2010.

We have recently had a response from WDC regarding the Village Design Statement. As previously reported, the goalposts have changed several times during our process. The VDS for Naphill and Walter's Ash will be the last such document to receive support from the District Council because of government changes and a lack of resources. The Parish has decided to complete the document without the protracted process of yet another consultation procedure. The final document will therefore be taken into account when planning

applications are determined despite not being formally adopted as a Supplementary Planning Document. This is made possible by WDC's commitment to community involvement. There is a little bit more discussion to do with WDC but we aim to print in the new year.

The Parish Council provides grants (from the precept to which you all contribute) to village halls, and for newsletters, on an annual basis. In addition, it gives grants for major projects on request. Grants have recently been approved for £2,246 for a replacement boiler and associated building works at Hughenden Valley village hall, and another £5,000 in principle for a replacement kitchen. The maximum grant the Parish provides is 20% of the total cost, up to a maximum of £5,000 per project. Such sums would, of course, be available to Naphill Village Hall at such time as the heating system is replaced/renovated. Forward planning is advisable so requests can be processed by the Parish prior to the precept setting meeting at the end of November.

A new youth area is to be constructed on the recreation ground in Great Kingshill, and the toddler area is to be updated. It has been possible to obtain grant funding for some of this work. Major works are being initiated in rotation so it may be Naphill's turn again soon; we would like to update the playground on the Crick.

Aphrodisiacs in Your Garden

Is there something growing in your garden which has unexpected properties? After reading this article you may look differently at some things which are growing.

The Encyclopaedia Britannica states that almost no scientific studies have been made into aphrodisiacs, so traditional, or folklore material is relied upon. But where to find that folklore material? I looked up "aphrodisiac foods" on Google and found 519,000 results. I started counting how frequently various vegetables and fruits were referenced. I assumed that these references were based upon folklore material. I counted up to 391 references, then stopped counting. The results are given below.

Thirteen fruits and vegetables were referenced only once, so perhaps they do not have much aphrodisiac power. The 13 were: apricots, bay leaves, cranberries, goji berries, mushrooms, capsicums, tarragon, lovage, sage, peas, quince, sweetcorn and oregano.

Nine were referenced twice. These were: lavender, mint, rosemary, leafy green vegetables, cabbage, parsley, watercress, Brussels sprouts and kiwi fruit.

Those mentioned three times were: coriander (cilantro), leeks, cauliflower and spinach. Even more popular, at four mentions, were: beetroot, cherries, broccoli and lettuce. There were three fruits and vegetables having five mentions: mustard greens, apples and grapes.

Cucumber and turnips had 6 mentions, radish and pomegranates 7, but aniseed and pumpkin seed had 8 mentions, which means that they were really popular.

Now we are on to the most frequently mentioned aphrodisiacs. With 9 references were raspberries and nuts. With 10 references were fennel and onions. With 11 references were almonds, arugula (rocket), peaches and artichokes.

Now for the "Top Ten". Joint 10th, with 12 references were tomatoes, chilli peppers and beans. At 7th was celery with 13 references. At 6th were figs with 17 references. At 5th were strawberries with 20 references. At 4th were carrots with 22 references and sweet basil was 3rd with 23 references. Garlic was 2nd with 26 references and the TOP OF THE POPS was asparagus with no fewer than 36 references.

With 58 fruits and vegetables being mentioned as aphrodisiacs it is clear that the folklore is imprecise. There were some mentions on Google that thousands of years ago nutrition could have been a problem and that a new fruit or vegetable eaten to overcome the nutritional problem caused an improvement in general health; thereafter that fruit or vegetable was considered to be an aphrodisiac.

From that it seems to me that the best policy nowadays is to have a varied diet with plenty of fruit and vegetables containing the vital nutrients and trace elements that we need to be healthy. The Good Gardeners' Association's logo is "Moving Beyond Organic". I quote as follows "Organic food is gaining in popularity but its focus is on what's left out – the chemicals, rather than what should be included naturally – essential nutrients. Growing food for nutrition goes beyond organic. It aims to cultivate a deeper understanding of nutrition and nature to help guarantee the food we grow and eat is positively healthy." See

www.goodgardeners.org.uk.

So how do we obtain fruit and vegetables which contain the essential trace elements? We need food which contains sufficient quantities of all the 19 trace elements which are believed to be essential for human health. Unfortunately it is unlikely that supermarket food contains sufficient quantities.

Crops from British farmland showed a drop of about 40% in trace elements between 1940 and 1991 and that catastrophic rate of decline must have continued since 1991. Trace elements are being removed with the harvested crops, but not replaced. It is like the extraction of oil and gas – when it is gone it is gone. There is no National Plan to replace lost trace elements in farmland.

What we can do as individuals in our own gardens or allotments? We can apply copious quantities of farmyard (ie cow) manure to our soil. In that way we enrich our soil with trace elements from the farmers' fields. Laboratory analyses showed that I have increased the 19 vital trace elements in my allotment soil by an average of 157% and all 19 are now at acceptable levels.

But it is not enough to have sufficient quantities of trace elements in the soil. We need soil microorganisms such as mycorrhizal fungi and bacteria to bring the vital trace elements to the roots of our vegetables and fruits. To provide the right conditions for the soil micro-organisms we need to avoid <u>all</u> artificial chemicals and also leave the soil undisturbed – ie we should not dig or plough the soil. No doubt, after this article, the "Top Ten" will become even more popular! Will this be accompanied by a change in gardening methods to those advocated by the Good Gardeners' Association? Food for thought!

Neighbourhood Watch Movement

This is a well established community movement to help prevent crime. In the territory covered by Wycombe District Neighbourhood Watch Association, there are over 600 schemes with nearly 1,200 people involved in running them. Since it is

generally estimated that around 80% of crime can be prevented, the aim of Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) is to get more people to be aware of what they can do to reduce their risk of becoming victims of crime.

Several areas in Naphill and Walter's Ash have a NHW scheme with a Co-ordinator who receives information via the Ringmaster message system to pass on to neighbours. This information includes warnings about possible criminal activity in Naphill and Walter's Ash, car crime, burglaries, and doorstep crime (bogus callers and distraction burglaries). The NHW movement also provides information and advice on violent crime, robberies (theft from the person), anti-social behaviour, ways to avoid falling victim to crimes, and the reporting of crimes. The sooner crimes are reported, the more likely the police to apprehend the criminals.

The NHW Chairman's records show that at least 26 roads or addresses in Naphill and Walter's Ash have no NHW scheme. The names are available to those who would like them.

The ideal number of households for any one Coordinator is between 10 and 15. However, some take on responsibility for less, and some for very many more. Those residents who would like to join the scheme should find a neighbour who is willing to act as Co-ordinator for their particular group of households. The work involved is socially useful but not very time consuming.

We have been given an award!

By the time this appears the Friends of Naphill Common group will be one year old. The idea was hatched during a conversation at the end of a Heritage Open Day walk on 13th September 2008 and, at a meeting on 2nd December, the existing Naphill Commons Committee was wound up and the Friends group inaugurated.

Our first year has been a great success. The committee proved to be enthusiastic and vigorous, and our membership passed 100 within eight months – which illustrates the concern and interest local people have about the Common. We were able to organise an ambitious programme of events: a crowded meeting with speakers; walks for health; exploration of the commons botany, insects and

fungi; guided tours; a treasure hunt and a picnic. We have produced a website, an information leaflet and two news letters: all highly praised. We have even begun to make practical advances on the Common by improving the path signs and producing a helpful map.

However, it has proved more difficult to undertake practical work on the Common. We have yet to gain permission, or even a response, from the tenant of the Dashwood Estate which owns the Common, to improve the paths and clear some of the invasive scrub. I am sure we will succeed eventually. Meanwhile, remember that, since the Countryside and Rights of Way (CROW) Act of 2000, we all enjoy the right to roam where we please on common land.

Our achievements have now been recognised by the **Chilterns Conservation Board**, which gives awards to organisations and individuals who make a notable contribution to the welfare of the Chilterns. The Friends of Naphill Common were given a **Highly Commended** award in the "Enjoyment and Understanding" category: a great surprise and very gratifying – but they have not seen anything yet!

The Chilterns Conservation Board is a remarkable official body that works to promote and conserve the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. With only a handful of officers they strive to care for all the natural features, from the woodland to the chalk streams; from the commons to the agricultural land. The officer with responsibility for the commons – and there are 187 of them in the Chilterns – has already been of help to us in our first year. A sister organisation, the Special Trees and Woodland Project, has managed to record hundreds of significant trees and the stories associated with them; including the Great Beech at Dew Pond and the Umbrella Tree, both on Naphill Common.

The Friends of Naphill Common group exists to conserve and improve Naphill Common, and make it a more accessible amenity for local people without spoiling its essential wildness and tranquillity. These are not easy goals to achieve and we would like **your** ideas and opinions for the year ahead.

Whatever your views – positive or negative – please come to our AGM in Naphill Village Hall on Friday 22nd January 2010, at 7.30 pm. You can have a cup of tea, listen to talks on red kites and local orchards and, if you want, express your opinions about what we have done and what we ought to do. Like our award, it is highly commended.

Local residents in Clappins Lane and Allen Drive have been invited, by agents acting for the Trustees, to submit an offer for the purchase of this area of land, some 5 acres in size. It is the express wish of the Trustees that this land is initially offered to local residents, at a price guide of £250,000.

It was the fear of some residents that, should they not be able to submit an offer, then this green belt land within the AONB might end up in the hands of an undesirable element of society. A meeting held in the Village Hall on Friday 13 November was very well attended by over 100 local residents and so far forty households have signed up with 'Intent to purchase a share', although this is not a final commitment at this stage, and many showed an 'Interest in helping'.

A considerable number of questions were raised and comments made which emphasised the concern of local people regarding the timing of the sale of this land and the high 'guide price' quoted by the agents.

The Action Group have now to consider ways of taking this matter forward, negotiating a more reasonable price and giving due consideration to possible use of the land in the future.
