

County Councillor's Report

These notes are written whilst Naphill and the surrounding villages are covered in snow and the access roads are again impassable. The initial falls of snow engendered the old community spirit which although sometimes latent, remains strong in our rural settlements. Along with other readers I am reminded of the winter of 1962/3 which in my opinion was more severe than this year. I well remember trying to heat our house with two paraffin heaters and my bedside glass of water freezing during the night!

There has been much criticism of the county highways road snow clearance, especially because of the difficulties on the hills at Coombe Lane and Bradenham Woods Lane. I do know that our gritting crews worked ceaselessly through the snow period to get their lorries out onto the agreed primary salting routes. In many instances their progress was hindered by parked cars who had attempted to drive on impacted snow and consequently had to abandon their cars along the roadside. I am aware that many drivers under 40 years of age have probably not driven in such conditions and do not have the necessary experience which engenders caution when driving on snow or ice. Hopefully, by the time this Edition is delivered, our winter snow will be but a memory. There are however, lessons to be learned from these past difficulties. One could be the provision of salt bins at strategic points on the hills where volunteers can add to the mechanical spreading by treating specific patches of ice. These bins cost around £400 each and I am proposing to fund one of these from my community funds. Perhaps the parish council and another organisation might be prepared to provide others. Once in situation the county highways will keep them filled with grit and salt specifically for the use on roads and not for private use.

I would also congratulate our waste collection teams, who under very difficult circumstances did manage to maintain some form of refuse collection over the extended holiday period.

Our schools have again achieved high results in the National league tables and congratulations to our hard working students. This year, as county chairman, I have been privileged to see many of our young people at awards ceremonies and I have been encouraged by many of their achievements in serving their communities. Unfortunately the press tend to dwell on bad news but I am confident that the great majority of our young people make a very worthwhile contribution to society.

There has been an increase in incidents of offenders posing as plain clothes police officers in order to gain entry into victim's homes. The offenders inform the victim that they have seen someone breaking into their house and need to get in to arrest the fictional burglar, or variations on this theme in order to gain entry to the property. Readers are urged not to allow anyone reporting to be plain clothes Police Officers into their home without being totally confident with the identification shown. If any doubt exists, you are

encouraged to phone Thames Valley Police on 0845 8 505 505 to double check the Police officers identity.

District Councillor's Report

Happy New Year! Despite Christmas being long gone, the snow has been less keen to leave us of late, which I am sure you would not disagree with. However, spring is nearly here with a General Election to look forward to with both challenges, and I believe, optimism for 2010.

There have been obvious delays to the waste collections, of which I thank you for your patience and consideration. I do hope that the revised collections have not caused too much inconvenience, although the residents I have spoken too have taken it very much in their stride. I received only a couple of complaints, which astounded me, because the crews have worked hard. For example, during the last two Saturday mornings, they were ordered to collect in Naphill to look out for any missed collections or additional ones. Well done to the team.

Despite being under the auspices of County, I would also like to congratulate the gritting crews, who I believe have also done a good job. In one long day, I saw three trucks along Main Road.

I have received further correspondence regarding the land concerns at Clappins Lane and wait to hear the views and decisions from the neighbours and other stakeholders. I have also received concerns over the return of the Ambulances at Cryers Hill. I have referred this onto the planning officers who are now liasing with County and the Police, in particular the parking on the verges, which is unacceptable.

Finally, I have a small amount of community fund left for local initiatives. I would like people to contact me by the end of February latest with their requirements.

There is a special Council on 21 January with the full Council, where the Council tax rate will be set on 25 February. I will also be canvassing with my ward colleagues and David Lidington, MP, on 11 February.

Hughenden Parish Council

The end of December and the beginning of January are quiet times for the Parish Council. It has been particularly quiet this year due to the hazardous weather conditions which have led to the postponement of the January Council meeting and also the Planning Committee meeting scheduled for January 7th. Moving the dates is a bit of a nightmare due to busy diaries. However, we are getting there, which is more than can be said for those of us in side roads!

Construction of the new play areas at Great Kingshill

has begun but progress is slow due to rain, snow and ice. We hope both areas will be ready for the spring.

Parish Council contracts for hedge and grass cutting are due for renewal and letters and specifications were dispatched in December inviting tenders. These are large contracts costing upwards of £15,000 per annum. In addition, the Council has several local firms working for it on an ad hoc basis.

The newly constituted Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) has held its initial meeting and the second is scheduled for January 14th. Local residents will be consulted formerly about priorities for action in due course. Now that the NAG area has the same boundaries as the Parish we anticipate greater participation and relevance to our needs. PC Lee Turnham, as the designated local officer, is working very hard to promote the NAG's success; he nearly always attends meetings of the Parish Council and is well known to us all. Parish Councillors from each ward now attend NAG meetings as a matter of course.

I hear dripping! The thaw has started at last! It will be wonderful to get out and about again in our lovely area, and to see friendly faces once more! Best wishes to you all.



Hughenden Parish NAG (Neighbourhood Action Group)

At the end of March 2008 Thames Valley Police went live with the rollout of Neighbourhood Policing, Hughenden Parish became joined with 2 other Parishes, Chepping Wycombe and Hazlemere, thus creating the largest NAG in Thames Valley Police, and possibly the Country. The area covered a population in excess of 36,000 people. These 3 parishes all had slightly different demographics, but the 3 main priorities that came from the initial public consultation were along the same vein, speeding motorists, anti-social behaviour and parking issues. The Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) was formed with representatives from all 3 parishes, but a large contingent from the Great Kingshill Ward became one of the driving forces of the NAG.

Following consultation in September 2009 with the District Councils and the Hughenden Parish Council it was decided that Hughenden was to break away from the established group and allowing 2 NAGs to run side by side. Stan Jones, the Chairman of the established NAG stood down at the October meeting and a replacement was found immediately.

On 26th November after 2 months of intense organisation the first Hughenden NAG meeting was held at the Parish Council Offices, Great Kingshill. The attendance was excellent with the meeting being opened by Inspector Ray Wilks, the Neighbourhood Inspector for High Wycombe Rural. There was a short introduction and Stan Jones was elected as the Chairman, he was praised for his ability and



determination to succeed within the old NAG.

Numerous subjects were raised, one being the intentions of this new NAG. My main emphasis on Neighbourhood Policing is to listen to the public and engage with them on issues that concern them and the community in which they live. How do we do this? There will be a survey sent out to all Parishioners with a return envelope so that your views can be relayed to the team here at the Hazlemere Police office. Once this is done the top 3 priorities for the NAG can be set and the group can work on strategies to address the concerns. Working groups within the NAG will be set up to address specific topics.

The NAG is <u>NOT</u> driven by the Police. It has a driving force from the public through already established channels. This is grass roots driven, public upwards. We the Police will work with our Partnerships to address issues on your behalf, with monthly/6 weekly meetings as well as publications showing progress and results.

Weren't the lights spectacular this year? A huge thank you goes to the team, led by Mike Mason, who brave the elements each year to bring us all such joy, and cheer up the dark evenings.

Thanks also go to everyone who contributed towards the lights by putting a donation in one of the boxes that were in all the local pubs and businesses. The total in the boxes this year was a fantastic £337.56, which helps towards the running costs and insurance for Mike and his team.

I think we can safely say that our tree's future is bright!

Naphill Village Hall Christmas Tree Lights

Well, what a surprise! The new lights were so different to the previous filament ones – which we had used for about 50 years. From afar the tree had a purplish glow. People who gave me their opinion said the new lights were better. Instead of having 280 filament bulbs we had 800 LED bulbs, each having 6 individual LEDs, so we had 4,800 LEDs on the tree. The LEDs (Light Emitting Devices) consumed in total about one-seventh of the electrical power of the previous filament bulbs, so we did our bit to counter global warming as well as saving on electricity bills.

The team this year was larger than previously, because with 800 bulbs to put into sockets rather that 280 we needed many more pairs of hands. The lead climber, for the 19th year, was Mike Leggett and he was assisted up the tree by Stephen Fountain of Widmer End. Arbourtech Services Ltd of Downley Road kindly lent us a cherry-picker this year, which was driven by Mark Blamey of High Wycombe. Gary Putnam of Homer Green and Mark Christian took turns to accompany Mark Blamey on high. The team on the ground consisted of Robin Stubbs of Amersham, Greg Swordy of Hughenden Valley, John Harris, Ron Collins, Peter Brown, Glenn Gavin, Peter Davis, Kevin Oxnard, Tom Oxnard, Henry Oxnard and myself. Ron Collins showed extreme devotion to duty in assisting with the lights - he had had a hip replacement only weeks earlier.

We had to use a completely new method to put up the lights this year, so we were all learning. With the old method Mike Leggett would have been up the tree for 2 ½ hours. This time it was 5 ½ hours - quite a feat of endurance for Mike. It was cold and Mike said it was about the windiest he had known. The tree is about 70 feet high. The cherry-picker went up to 50 feet and enabled the 20 garlands to be placed rather than being pulled up through the branches, which reduced the strain on Mike and reduced the potential damage to the garlands. The team on the ground were freezing for 6 hours. Mark Christian distributed chocolate bars at one point and then Claire from The Wheel brought out rounds of sandwiches which were much appreciated – and devoured rather than simply eaten.

What a response from the public to the appeal for funds! £2,963,97 was spent on the new equipment (the tax man would not let us off the VAT, despite the work being for charity). The WI, led by Juliet Shortall, raised an amazing amount at their auction. The Lamphouse Singers, in a superb concert arranged by Beryl Gossage, raised an enormous amount. Village organisations made donations, individuals purchased garlands and the public gave generously in the collection boxes. Thank you everyone; your generosity was overwhelming. The total raised was more than sufficient to cover the cost of the new equipment, the insurance and the cost of electricity, so the Village Hall treasurer is opening a separate account for the lights so we can keep track of the finances. The big unknown at this stage is the reliability of the new equipment and thus how much we shall need to spend next time. I must thank Gary Putnam for his generous donation of about 800 feet of rope. Thank you also to Marlène Mason who supplied fresh mince pies, coffee and tea for the team at the completion of the work.

The old cable, 900 feet long, was only our second one and lasted 26 years.

We hope everyone liked the lights, which are such an important part of life in Naphill.

This was approved and Mike made the purchase. Work did not, however, stop there as a new socket outlet system had to be designed and constructed for location at the top of the tree in order to

allow for the twenty new pendants to be plugged in. Mike did this work along with another member of the team Each of the pendants then had to be tested before they were ready for display.

Mike has been responsible for managing the entire process of displaying the Christmas tree lights for more years than I care to remember and this year I know was particularly difficult and indeed worrying as we were all concerned as to how the new lights would look. The result has been a tribute to Mike and we owe him a debt of gratitude for all he does on our behalf. Due thanks are also due to the other members of the team particularly Mick Leggett who spent some five hours at the top of the tree this year - double that normally spent on the exercise. Well done to the team on an excellent result. Finally one should not forget Marlene - Mike's wife - who kindly prepares coffee and homemade mince pies for the entire team.

09/07213/FUL Naphill & Walter's Ash Combined School, Kilnwood, Walter's Ash. Erection of Tensile fabric canopies over the reception class playground for outside activities. (Pending Decision).

Erection of 3 x 3 bed terraced houses with associated car parking and landscaping and alteration to existing access following demolition of existing dwelling (Alternative scheme to pp **01/05178/FUL**) (Pending consideration)

Land for a Lay-by near Co-op, Main Rd, Walter's Ash. The Defence Estates, with the agreement of the RAF, have generously offered to make a narrow strip of land available for a lay-by in front of MoD Building 5 adjacent to the Co-op. The Team Leader for Transport Development Control (BCC) will contact us as to the technical feasibility of the lay-by facility, once he has received a site plan and examined the area. We hope for further progress in the near future.

Obstruction of Pavements We have received reports that several householders have cleared their drives of large quantities of snow and heaped the snow on pavements, rather than within their own properties. This has forced pedestrians, including children, to walk in the road through slush or on ice, putting themselves at risk from passing vehicles. These large piles of snow take a long time to melt so continue to cause a hazard well after a general thaw is underway. We are being urged to bear this in mind when we next experience a prolonged snowy spell.

We have now completed our first year and by the time this appears we will have held our AGM, and the new committee will be formulating our programme of events for 2010. If anyone has some suggestions there is sill time to let us know. Many thanks to all those involved throughout 2009 – both the organisers and those who attended. Overall it was a very successful year – more so than we could have predicted. We have over a hundred members and managed to arrange a series of events that attracted a goodly number of people.

Again by the time this appears the snow will have melted away and we will be approaching spring. However, thinking back to the long snowy period each side of Christmas it may be worth recording an instructive incident. It concerns our poor remnant

juniper bushes. As I have mentioned before, in the early 1900s, Naphill Common was renowned for its forest of huge junipers. Since then the inexorable march of the trees has killed all but five specimens, because juniper cannot survive being over-shaded. There is one healthy bush on path H2/bridleway BW 85, over towards the Clumps, and four struggling remnants near the centre of the common.

This decline mirrors what has happened all over the country. England has lost over 46% of its juniper since the 1970s, and the Chilterns have seen an even worse decline: 84% of its juniper bushes have disappeared over the last 30 years. When a species is under threat in this way we are left with isolated individuals or small groups and they become very vulnerable. What happened over Christmas illustrates just how vulnerable.

The one healthy specimen was flattened by the snow prior to Christmas. It has been propped up again but we have to wait to see if there has been any permanent damage. The struggling remnant junipers in the centre of the common are badly over-shaded by the surrounding trees. After Christmas the weight of snow brought down a large oak bow which fell, with fiendish precision, along a row of three specimens, crushing them. At the time of writing we hope to remove the bow using a chain saw, but what the damage has been done remains to be discovered. That is four out of five specimens damaged.



We will be collecting items for the sale around the village on the morning of the sale, and would also welcome any items you wish to bring to the Village Hall.

No furniture or electrical goods please.

This sad tale illustrates how important it is that there is a scheme for taking cuttings from the remaining junipers and growing them on in a nursery for eventual re-planting in the Chilterns. The County Countryside Officer, Andy McVeigh, who led our tour of the junipers, is to take cuttings from our struggling specimens because it is important to preserve the local genetic stock which is adapted to the acid soil of the common.

The experience also illustrates how important it is for the Friends of Naphill Common to organise working parties to care for the remaining junipers and clear around them in the hope of keeping them alive. We must also consider making new clearings where the species can be re-introduced when plants are available. All this is not merely to preserve the historic vegetation, it is also to encourage a more diverse ecology in the future. All this explains why it is so unfortunate that we cannot get permission to proceed: but we will prevail.

A new programme of events will be published as soon as possible on the web site and in the next Gazette. Meanwhile we can announce that Ron Collins will lead the first Walk for Health of the year on Monday 15th February 2010, starting from the Village Hall at 10 am. The walk will last between 2 and 2½ hours.

Village History

Back in the October Naphill & Walter's Ash Gazette I wrote an article about our local cricket team who in 1946 held a benefit match against the Middlesex team. I included the photos of Bill Edrich and Leslie Compton who took part in it. Mr Stan Morris was our village team captain. His son Tony Monks came over from

Australia on holiday and came to visit me. Since returning home he has kindly sent me a letter giving me his Dad's achievements and a photo of his trophy he was awarded. I thought you would like to read this as I think it outstanding.

"Stan Monks was born in Rochdale, Lancs in 1909. He was very good at soccer and cricket. He developed his cricketing skills in his back alley where he and his friends would spend hours bowling at wickets painted on a brick wall. At the age of 16 he joined the RAF as an apprentice and served for about nine years. For five years he served in the Middle East, in Jordan, Palestine and Egypt. During this period he played a great deal of sport; athletics, tennis, soccer and cricket, a sport in which he excelled.

On 3rd and 4th August 1931, at Chezireh, Cairo, he played for the Royal Air Force Middle East against the Army in Egypt. This was a very high standard of cricket. In the first innings of that match he took eight wickets for 24 runs. This included two hat tricks and the taking of four wickets in four balls. All the hat trick wickets were clean bowled. His trophy is proudly displayed in my snooker room, surmounted by the ball that did the damage.



After leaving the RAF he considered playing cricket professionally but in those days such a path was not easy for a married man. He was unable to play for a season on account of injury so he turned to another career. I am sure that in another era, with reasonable luck, he would have played County cricket and even for England.

After settling in Naphill, he played cricket for the village. He was captain for many years and played well into his 50s. He twice took all ten wickets in a match. Against Booker on August 27th 1949 he took 10 wickets for 14 runs and against Reading Old Boys on 14th May 1951 he took 10 wickets for five runs.

There has not been a cricket team in Naphill for many years. When visiting the village I always walk across the Crick. Until the last couple of years it was possible to identify the site of the old wicket. The grass was finer there. Over the last couple of years the area has become a football pitch and the old wicket area is no longer identifiable. I think back to those halcyon days

of the 50s and 60s. On a Saturday and often on a Sunday afternoon eleven good men and true would battle away. The standard of cricket was quite reasonable and the matches keenly contested. On a sunny day there would often be 40 or 50 spectators enjoying the game. It is sad that a village the size of Naphill no longer fields a cricket team. I enclose a photo of my Dad's "Three Hat Tricks" trophy and hope that this information may be of some interest to you."

In the same article I mentioned how I met a relative of mine who was tracing Joseph George Newell (died 1870) and his wife Sarah who in 1861/1871 were living in Hunts Hill Lane, Naphill and happened to be my great, great grandparents who she also shared. She has since been to visit me three times and with the help of Arthur Johnson the Hughenden Church Verger we have traced their gravestone perfectly preserved, hidden under the grass three feet down in Hughenden Churchyard.

County Councillor's Report

Winter seems to have been inordinately long this year, we can only hope that Spring is not too far away. The snow and ice have played havoc with the county's salt and grit stocks and readers are well aware of the damage done to our roads. Hopefully by the time this article is published we will have got up to date with the pothole repairs. A more serious problem is how do we prevent a similar situation arising next year without considerable expenditure? Although we have increased the budget for 2010/11 it is nowhere near the amounts required for overall road maintenance.

During my year of office as chairman of the county council, I have had the additional honour of being the President of the Buckinghamshire Ambassadors, whose remit is to support and encourage the economic well-being of the county. Readers may be surprised to learn that Bucks has the largest number of start-up companies in the

country. It has the largest group of small manufacturing enterprises in the south east and is in the largest three authorities for gross domestic product in England. Our economic health is good and appears to be withstanding the recession better than most counties. Having said that it will be no comfort to the increasing numbers of unemployed in some areas of Aylesbury and High Wycombe, although their chances of getting new employment are better than elsewhere in the UK. I recently attended an awards ceremony and was impressed with the level of entrepreneurial activity in our county.

It is to be hoped that a new government will address the problems of planning. Both main parties claim that garden development will be curtailed, this is long overdue. I just hope that the centralised direction of housing numbers will be left to local decision rather that Regional dictation. Enforced large scale housing development, without the provision of proper infrastructure of roads and

services, are a recipe for increased congestion and transport frustrations.

The decision regarding the routing of High Speed Two, the rail link between London and Birmingham and the North, should be known by the end of March. All four route options pass through the Chilterns AONB, some having greater impact than others. Let us hope that the route chosen will not be along the Bradenham Valley but I fear that wherever it is proposed, it will attract much public anxiety and protest.

District Councillor's Report

At last the bin collections have returned to normal. Do remember that material from the green bins is being composted again.

The expected District Council Tax increase for 2010/2011 has been set at 1.75%. This is down from 3.2% in 2009/2010. At the time of writing, this was subject to full Council ratification.

The Council has decided to opt out of the shared support services between the Councils, which formed part of the Pathfinder scheme. The risks and costs outweighed the savings and we are now looking at implementing our own outsourcing systems, either singularly or with the other Councils. Good work is in progress with the sharing of Building Control and Waste.

The Council is now looking at the Stadium project to accommodate the needs of Wasps and Wycombe Wanderers and we are near the end of the consultation period regarding the running track.

Wycombe District Council's Skillscentre has launched an executive network club to help unemployed local professionals, executives, graduates and self-employed people who are looking for new and future career ideas and opportunities.

The Executive Careers Network is free to join and offers local people a valuable mix of meeting and networking with fellow professionals and offers free training which is tailored to the professional workplace.

There are no charges or costs for attending, all that is required is enthusiasm and commitment to help yourself and others. Each week, people meet from 08.30 - 10.00 for an informal breakfast where they can network and make contacts. The breakfast is followed by a free training session. 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Hughenden Parish Council

The Parish Council continues to maintain and improve facilities for the young. Work on the new 'teen' area at Great Kingshill nears completion, and the refurbished and extended playground for young children will be finished when weather permits. The Parish is providing much of the funding for, and organizing, a new item of equipment for the play area on the Crick. The old 'sleepers and slide' has been removed; this was nearing the end of its working life. It will be replaced by a 'control' tower, bridge and slide in a style which reflects the village's association with the RAF. Grant funding of £2500 is coming from Bucks County Council, £2000 from the Village Hall, and the balance from the Parish. The new structure may be in place by the time you read this. In half term week the climbing wall will be back for the use of teenagers in the area.

It is hoped to assist with the housing requirements of members in our community. The need for affordable homes was identified in the Parish Appraisal and also in a housing needs survey. The Parish is now working in partnership with the English Rural Housing Association to provide ten two and three bedroom homes for rent and shared ownership. These will be built in the Hughenden Valley because, after exhaustive enquiries, this site was deemed to be the most suitable for the purpose. An information day will take place March 10th from 3pm to 8pm in the Parish office at which draft plans will be

displayed, comments received and questions answered. This will also be an opportunity for people with a strong, provable, local connection to register for the properties. These homes are for the benefit of all the villages in the Hughenden Parish. More detail will be provided on the Parish website: www.hughendenparishcouncil.org.uk

We shall be hand delivering flyers throughout the Parish providing more information, and advertising the arrangements for the open day. Please treat as useful information, not junk mail! Personally I am hoping for more warmth before my delivery round starts!

Burglary

Great Kingshill and Widmer End has recently had a number of house burglaries and shed & outhouse breaks in the last few weeks. Patrols by the NHPT will be increased in the area and crime prevention literature will be delivered to neighbouring properties to try and prevent further offences occurring.

If you are elderly, disabled or vulnerable Anchor Staying Put in conjunction with the Police and Fire Services are running a "SAFER HOMES" project, offering advice and FREE essential security equipment including installation. The project will run until March 2010 and will be free of charge to those residents who meet the necessary criteria. Please call 01628 526367 for information.

Recently a male from the High Wycombe area has admitted to a Burglary on the Parish and is now being dealt with via the Criminal Justice System.

Finally, please record the make, model and serial numbers of any electrical items that you have at home, in your car or at work on the www.immobilise.com website. This is a website that

the police have access to, so if any property comes into the police's possession, it can be checked to see if it has been stolen, help secure evidence and convictions against a suspect and reunited the property with its lawful owner.

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB)

The team are continuing to focus upon ASB problems within the area.

The Common Road car park at Great Kingshill is still attracting ASB driving in the evenings where car drivers are congregating and using the area as a mini racetrack. Any vehicle details can be sent to Pc TURNHAM and warning letters will be sent to the registered owner, continuance will result in action being taken against the owner and driver with the possibility of the vehicle being seized and disposed of, using the **POLICE REFORM ACT 2002**

Even though ASB at specific locations may have been reduced, the NHPT do not want the problem to then materialise itself elsewhere, so the team will continue to focus its efforts to reduce the ongoing issues associated with the problem when and where it arises.

The HNPT and the representatives from the Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) are currently trying to look at creating local initiatives to try and resolve ASB which has been associated with the local "Young People". We are therefore open to suggestions from the community regarding the arrangement of any locally run events, but more importantly we would also looking volunteers to become involved and arrange and run such events.

Speeding

The new NAG has setup of a speed-working group, this will concentrate on specific locations and then allow Officers and the Speed Enforcement Team to target and enforce limits. PCSO HALL will be the Police representative on the working group.

The team is trying to obtain speeding data from all of Thames Valley Police Departments regarding speed enforcement and education that has occurred upon the area and will provide any updates in the forthcoming news letters.

The team also now have access to a Speed Indication Device (SID) which will allow my staff to collate current and accurate speeding data from a location whilst also providing a visible deterrent at the same time.

Planned speed enforcement information will be updated in the March newsletter.

Another issue

"COP Cards" – Thames Valley Police have been running a sticker collecting scheme, called "COP Cards" in other force areas, which is aimed at year 6

school pupils. The scheme is to be extend to Hazlemere & Chepping Wycombe areas and will be rolled out in the near future. The idea of the scheme is for the children to collect stickers (24 in total) and fill up their "COP Card". Each sticker can be collected by completing a different task or challenge, or by attending an event. Every officer from the local policing team will have a sticker which the children must collect by finding and speaking with them. For the sticker to be issued y the officer the "Cop Card" holder must have their card with them. The other stickers to be collected are designed to encourage children to try out new activities and learn about their community. For example, stickers involve attending a sporting event, helping in a community clear up day and learning about road safety.

The scheme is centred upon getting the best out of young people and encouraging them to be aware of their responsibilities and the opportunities in their local community. The police hop the scheme will enhance communication and familiarisation between local children, local police teams and partnership agencies. The police hope that the collection of the stickers will encourage children to try something different in the community. To help children find the stickers a clues page can be located on the TVP website, http//www.chilterncopcards.co.uk. This site has information about "Cop Cards" and will also give the children tips as to where police team members will be in the forth coming weeks, where activities and events are taking place and where they get help to achieve the stickers.

The HNPT hope that this scheme will be another way of making contact with local young people and make them aware of local policing and community issues and also provide them with the opportunity to voice their opinions and concerns.

The Parish Council met on the 18th January. The recent bad weather was a big feature on the agenda. The Parish Council thanked the RAF for all the support they had offered and given the community. They had not only cleared Bradenham Wood Lane of stranded cars, but had offered to bring supplies down the hill to local residents who were not able to leave their homes. The National Trust warden was also thanked for all the support he had given local residents during the severe weather conditions. The weather has caused some serious potholes, which are slowly being filled.

The Parish Council had hoped to "adopt" the red phone box opposite the Red Lion pub, but this is a listed building and Wycombe District Council opposed the removal of the telephony. They felt the building would lose its function.

Speeding through the village is a major problem, which the Parish Council is trying to address. They have reviewed the County Council's Traffic Calming Portfolio and are searching for the best solution for the village. The National Trust is providing assistance and a public meeting was held on the 24th of February to which local residents were invited to give their views on the problem and possible solutions. The police have not been able to assist. The RAF also sent representatives.

A group of residents have volunteered to tidy up the pond and take on the maintenance of the pond area.

HOUSING FOR LOCAL PEOPLE

The Parish Council, in partnership with the English Rural Housing Association, is considering the provision of ten affordable homes for local people. There would be a mix of two and three bedroom homes in both rented and shared ownership. The need for such homes has been identified through surveys and in the Parish Appraisal.

After an exhaustive search, a small area of land has been identified in Warrendene Road, Hughenden Valley, as being suitable for building such homes. Draft scheme layouts and basic sketch designs have been produced, which are acceptable to Wycombe District Council planners, the Parish Council, and the landowner. It is intended that this will be a small, attractive development (see similar examples below), provided in perpetuity for the use of parishioners with a strong, provable, local connection. The Parish would have ownership of, and manage, the surrounding land; there would be no further built development.

The properties would be for the benefit of parishioners in all the villages within Hughenden Parish.

Planning Appeal Naphill

Hunts Hill Farm, Hunts Hill Lane. Erection of 3 Pylons to Provide Lighting to Manege - horse exercise area - (6 lamps in total) until 8pm each evening. AONB/GREEN BELT

WDC rejected this Application for floodlighting after opposition by Chilterns Conservation Board (AONB), Hughenden Parish Council, Naphill & Walter's Ash Res Assn, and more than 90 residents including horse owners. Objections were raised against the pylons, and light pollution in the AONB/GB adversely affecting wildlife, the special night time character of the village, the visibility of the night sky, and the valued amenities of Naphill residents, also the setting of a precedent.

WDC cited seven Local Plan policies (GB2, L1, G3, RT17, CS9, CS17,CS19), which this scheme contravenes, and the AONB officer cited several more.

Hunts Hill Farm argues that (a) the 5 livery horse owners can only care for their horses in the evening during the week but exercising and moving the horses in the dark is unsafe (b) that lighting, equivalent to 641 x 100 watt bulbs at an elevation over 600 ft in the unlit AONB, would be less than a local football ground, less than the Handy Cross sports ground, and would not be conspicuous when residents draw their curtains, (c) they say lighting

has been allowed at sports grounds in London, Surbiton, Marlow and Brentwood, and that Naphill is not a rural hamlet but a "substantial" residential village with "many facilities" (These places are in no way comparable. Naphill is not lit at night. Facilities are a chapel, village hall, small shop, estate agent, take-away, **unlit** playing field and no street lights.)

At top of Application Case Reference box, type 09/06395/FUL then click Search at the bottom. Click To View, then Associated Documents (top right), then View Associated Documents. The Appeal material is dated 11th February. See pp 4&5 before the two black pages. Ring or e-mail me if you have a problem.

The Appeal is not decided by WDC but by the Planning Inspectorate at Bristol.

This is a time when every household who is concerned about creeping urbanisation of the Chilterns AONB and Green Belt, light pollution, and loss of amenity, can write asap to say you wish to oppose the floodlighting and support the objections made by Chilterns Conservation Board (AONB office), Hughenden Parish Council, and Naphill & Walter's Ash Res. Assn, and that you support Wycombe District Council's decision to refuse consent.

We start the new year in buoyant mood after a successful AGM and with a membership of over 120. It is particularly gratifying to see such a high proportion of our members renewing their membership. Thank you.

Mollie desperately wanted to receive her letter from the Queen, but unfortunately she developed a chest infection soon after Christmas and never really recovered. However the care she received during those last few weeks was exceptional and our sincere thanks go to all at Rock House.

Thanks also to all those in the village who have maintained contact with Mollie and to the Naphill Methodist Church and Christians in the Community for their kind wishes and sympathy.

Early Days in Gardening

It is hard to remember one's first experience of gardening, especially where it is as far back as the 1940s. I was aged 10 months when my father, knowing war was inevitable, joined the army as a territorial soldier in April 1939. He became a fulltime soldier three months later and we saw very little of him for nearly 7 years (he was out of the UK for over 4 years, and hundreds of miles from where we lived when he was in the UK). My mother had had to give up her job when she married in September 1936, as was the convention until the Second World War. So there she was in 1939, not allowed to work, with a baby to look after (and another in 1942), hardly ever seeing her husband and not knowing whether he would ever come back. The Germans had mounted a sea blockade to stop our

imports of food - they tried to starve us out. Food was rationed so there was every incentive to "grow your own". My mother grew vegetables in the back garden. My grandfather, who died before I was born, had had an allotment and I believe my mother acquired her skills from him – and passed some of them on to me. I like to think I have "allotment genes"!

As one might expect, as a youngster I was an enthusiastic helper in growing vegetables. I was very curious, wanting to experiment. I wondered what would be the result if I crossed a potato with a pea. So I made a hole right to the centre of a potato, popped a pea inside, and planted the potato. Both vegetables grew, firstly the pea, then the potato. Soon the potato swamped the pea and my experiment was over. I had failed to hybridise the potato and the pea. I don't recall how old I was at the time, maybe 6 or 7. But I do remember one crucial thing in those very early days when food was short – I feel sure that one of the reasons for those growing their own fruit and vegetables today must be the concept of free food. As I grew up I continued to help my mother grow vegetables until I left home.

My next experience of growing vegetables was in Norfolk, where my wife and I lived in a caravan in an orchard with no neighbours – somewhat idyllic. The owner of the orchard had kept free-range hens in the orchard for years so the soil was very rich. The nettles were up to 8 feet high. I cleared the nettles and planted potatoes, many potatoes. I knew that potatoes were the best to clear the soil of weeds. The crop was simply massive. As soon as the crop was harvested we had to move to Lincolnshire.

After 9 months in Lincolnshire we moved to Singapore. Most days there the temperature was 95°F, the relative humidity was 95% and the heavens opened at about 4.0 pm each afternoon for about 20 minutes. I thought, what an ideal climate for rapid growth! I cleared a small patch of lawn for an experiment. I sowed French beans and cauliflowers. Within 5 days the beans were a foot high and about to flower. The cauliflowers also had very rapid growth. Then, disaster. As soon as the beans flowered the plants collapsed and died. A similar fate befell the cauliflowers. They just could not take the climate. I had thought that since the seeds were on sale locally they would grow locally – Neat, Plausible, and Wrong!

A subsequent gardening experience was in the suburbs of Paris, where we had a small garden. For a few years I successfully grew outdoor tomatoes (variety Marmande). I also contacted the main nurseryman in France for asparagus, Le Blevenec, and bought several plants. They were of the variety "asperge d'Argenteuil" – a real winner. They grew very well in our garden in Paris. A few

years later we moved to Norfolk in the depths of winter and I took my asparagus plants with me. They were huge monsters – imagine giant spiders a yard or so across each with a hundred legs. I planted them in the sandy soil of Norfolk where they grew very well indeed for a few years. Having more space in Norfolk I also grew a range of the more common vegetables. Then came a move to Buckinghamshire in August. I took my precious asparagus plants but.....they all died. They did not take kindly to being transplanted in August. That was in 1973, when we acquired our present house and I acquired my allotment. The latter had been left derelict for at least 10 years, chock-full of couch grass, with nettles and brambles to keep the couch grass company. I scythed down the weeds, raked them up into 10 huge piles and put a match to them. It was August, everything was extremely dry and I thought the gigantic flames would result in little smoke. However, I had not reckoned with some moisture still being in the straw, and vast clouds of water vapour and smoke enveloped that part of the village. For several hours I was not very popular.....

I then tried to dig my allotment, to turn over the soil to a spade's depth to bury the couch grass roots. Even jumping on the spade with all my weight I could make no impression on the earth, which was a mat of couch grass roots in soil hardened by an August drought. So I hired a large commercial rotovator and went up and down for 12 hours. Even with that mechanical aid I penetrated the soil only to a depth of 2 inches, but that was enough to get me through the couch grass roots, then I could dig. It took me 3 years to dig the whole plot, growing crops progressively as I cleared the ground. The soil was excellent – a foot of clay loam on top of clay. I have always been completely organic, using no chemicals whatsoever, so my allotment soil has been completely organic since at least 1963.

In the year 2000 I was introduced to no-dig gardening by the Good Gardeners' Association (www.goodgardeners.org.uk) and have not dug since. My crops have been better and there do not seem to be any drawbacks to the no-dig method – apart from ever-proliferating chickweed. Since acquiring my allotment in 1973 I am able to experiment to my heart's content. I have even gone back to "asperge d'Argenteuil", acquiring some seed in 1987. Most of those plants are still growing, producing large quantities of the most tasty asparagus you can imagine. I continue to experiment. Perhaps one day I will hybridise the potato and the pea! Good gardening!

I hope they are not looking for signs of animal life because I think it's a bit cold and their dulcet tones will have scared most things away. Year 6 had some first aid training this week and so if you find yourself injured in the village they will know how to put a bandage on you. Year 4 are off to Dorset soon for a week's residential visit and Year 6 are going to North Wales at the end of the term. These trips, although being exhausting for everyone, are a vital part of the children's' education and it gives the staff a chance to see some of the children in a totally different light. Year 1 have performed a circus show to their parents following on from a visit they had earlier in the term from a circus performer. Year 5 went to the 'Living Rainforest' as they are currently studying this as their topic. At least they were warm.

The school uniform is going to change from September. The children will have to wear shirts or blouses with collars as they are going to wear ties. Apparently someone thought I'd mentioned wearing blazers. That hadn't crossed my mind but thinking about it . . . straw boaters for the girls, caps for the boys . . . capes and mortar boards for the staff!

Well I am going to go and have yet another Strepsil and some flu and cold stuff as otherwise my half term will be fun. Decorating is on the plan as is visiting my dad who lives in Norfolk. He is very kind and insists on feeding me up whenever I go which is brilliant; he is a very good cook so no doubt I'll return a few pounds heavier.

County Councillor's Report

Recently I witnessed the driver of a Porsche driving along Main Road at a speed well in advance of 30 mph probably, in my estimation, nearer fifty. It rather proved that drivers with a certain mentality will break the law whatever signed speeds are in place. I mention this because I have received many letters requesting speed limits where there is the belief that the placing of a sign will limit the speed of cars. I am afraid that the Porsche driver proves this is not the case.

The much awaited publication of the government's preferred route for a new high speed rail line will now be known to most readers. It will run along the Misbourne Valley through the Chalfonts, Amersham, Great Missenden and Wendover, through some of our most beautiful Chiltern countryside. Although we can be thankful that the Bradenham Valley was spared, our thoughts and sympathy must be with the residents at Great Missenden and Wendover, who will have many uncertain years fighting these proposals.

Some road surfaces are in a dreadful state particularly near to the top of Coombe Hill Lane. I have requested that this is treated as a major work and not just the case of pot hole filling. The gang who carry out this work may well have visited by the time this Gazette is read, if not then the work will be imminent. The costs of this last winter's ravages to our county road surfaces is enormous at a time when public finances are under pressure to meet efficiency cuts and by the competing needs of community care.

I have now distributed my community leadership fund with grants to Widmer End for its sports field and play area gates. To the Guides for safety aids to canoeists, to the school for outdoor activities. A grant for Naphill play area and a salt bin for Widmer End. I received very few requests from village based organisations this year, perhaps next year will see a better take up by our village organisations.

The Parish Council is very grateful to the Gazette for publishing its notices about the possible provision of rural housing in the Parish. This saved a great deal of 'leg work' and ensured that most households were aware of the Open Day on March 10th. Anyone who missed the day is welcome to visit the Parish Office, view the draft plans and write comments and suggestions. The Parish website www.hughendenparishcouncil.org.uk will contain updates on the process in due course.

The Open Day created a great deal of interest; from people wishing to register an interest, those opposed to any development in Warrendene Road, and some just interested and supportive. It is acknowledged that some people are very much against the proposals. This is fair enough but it is a pity that parish councillors are being criticized by some people because it is thought they are politicians. They are not.

The work of parish councils is voluntary and non political. Parish councils are very different from

residents' associations in that they are elected every four years, and publicly accountable. There is a Code of Conduct to which all councillors agree to conform. We are a group of unremunerated local people whose service to the community costs each of us more than the £40 pa of printing cost reimbursement! We have collective responsibility and do not act alone. Once a decision is taken by the full Council then even those opposed to it have to abide by that decision. In the case of Rural Housing, the vote to continue the process of consultation was unanimous. The Council is well aware that the issue is controversial but has a duty to try and serve the whole of the local community. The next step is to consider the information gathered on the Open Day. Once the data is available the continuation of the process will be considered.

On a lighter note, the climbing wall was used in the Village Hall car park and enjoyed by over a dozen intrepid teenagers on a very cold day in half term. A similar number used the facility in the Great Kingshill car park on the same day.

The new piece of equipment on the Crick play area, replacing the old metal slide, is almost finished as I write. It has been funded by the Parish Council, with donations from the Village Hall Council, Bucks County Council, and our County Councillor's Community Fund covering about half the cost. The new youth area and the refurbished children's playground at Great Kingshill are to be formally opened on April 8th by the High Sheriff of Buckinghamshire, Mr Allan Westray.

Burglary

There has been a reduction in burglaries and other crime in general since the last newsletter. Of those isolated incidents that have been reported, tools from sheds or garages are used to commit the crimes. Local DIY stores have a large range of shed and garage alarms which are cheap to purchase, and very easy to fit. Alternatively you can contact your local Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator, who will in turn contact Geoff PEGG and he can advise and supply, if needed an alarm that would be suitable for your requirement.

Finally, mark and record the make, model and serial numbers of any electrical items that you have at home. UV pens and literature are available from the NHPT. Please call us and we can supply them direct to you. Please note that, the more people who mark their items and if then fall victim of a crime, the chance of the items being returned to its lawful owner are increased.

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB)

Anti-social behaviour has also been very low but with the evenings becoming lighter, more and more people will be out and about. Should you see any ASB please call the team on the above number.

Speeding

The new NAG speed-working group will concentrate on specific locations allowing Officers and the Speed Enforcement Team to target and enforce limits. PCSO HALL is the Police representative on the working group.

The team did have access to the Speed Indication Device (SID), but due to software problems this has ceased to work and is currently with the suppliers. My staff will collate current and accurate speeding data from identified locations whilst also providing a visible deterrent at the same time.

Planned locations have been identified by the NHPT but unfortunately, like February, been affected by the adverse weather conditions.

Dates have been planned for March and by the return of the SID will allow a further High Visibility presence.

Good News

A young male from the Flackwell Heath area has been arrested following the theft of scrap metal from a premise in Binders Yard. Many thanks to the owners of the metal who sat and waited every night until the male came to carry out his act. They informed the Police who shortly afterwards attended and made the arrest. Working together in the community provides results.

A young male has been arrested following the damage to a water mains pipe in the Walters Ash area. The youth is being dealt with via the Criminal Justice System.

Following telephone intimidation to a resident in the Great Kingshill area, a male has been arrested and is currently on Police bail.

A Warrant under the Wildlife Act has been executed, in conjunction with the RSPCA. The resident from Widmer End had been trapping and keeping wild birds. Also at the same premise firearms were seized due to non compliance to the storage of the licensed weapons.

Two further weapons have been seized from a property in Walter's Ash. The weapons, although old, were not licenced and therefore have been seized. The owner wishes the items back, this can only be done if the weapons are either de-commissioned or a licence is applied for in the correct manner.

Other Matters

The first HAVE YOUR SAY meeting was held at the café on the RAF base with a few returns bringing positive and negative feedback. There was a low turnout at the meeting but the issues raised were constructive and are being assessed. The main reason for holding the meeting at the RAF café was to try and engage with the non serving personnel from the two large housing quarters that are within the parish. This is an initiative that has been implemented throughout the Thames Valley Policing area, enabling members of the public to come and address Police officers of concerns and any issues that may affect them on a daily basis.

Bradenham Parish Council

Bradenham Parish Council met on Monday 15/03/10 as usual in the Cricket Club. Ken Hale chaired the meeting.

The Parish Council had decided to enter the Best Kept Village Competition again. Once we know the timing of the inspections the church, residents and the National Trust will be informed. A lot of tidying up around the church has happened, which should make the village look better come the summer. The Parish Council will respond to Buckinghamshire County Council's "Winter Maintenance Survey for Parishes" on the whole the Parish Council had very few complaints about the way the County council had responded to the severe weather conditions. Of major concern had been that Bradenham Wood Lane is on County Council's gritting route, but had not been gritted causing some serious problems for the community and the RAF. We are also aware of the numerous potholes.

Traffic calming was discussed at length. The speed at which vehicles travel through Bradenham village is a long standing problem. The police had observed speeding vehicles and advised the Parish Council to consider Community Speed Watch, but this will require volunteers who are willing to be trained. Through the NAG we will get the use of a SID.

A public meeting had been held 24/02/10, which had been well attended. This provided the Parish Council with information as to what villagers wanted. A number of proposals are now being investigated with Transport for Buckinghamshire, the Police, the National Trust and outside transport consultants. We will also be collecting data on the number of vehicles travelling through the village and the speed they are travelling at.

It will take about 2½ hours to walk the 4½ miles. There will be a trip to visit Moorend Common on Sunday 6th June to see what they have done there and to admire the early marsh orchids. We will be at the Fete on 12th June and have a Midsummer picnic at the Umbrella Tree on Sunday 20th June, staring from the common end of Forge Road at 3 pm. We will have another Fungus Foray on Sunday 3rd October. (There may be some exciting news about the last one!)

Ron Collins' Walks for Health will be held on the following Mondays: 19th April; 17th May; 21st June; 19th July; 16th August; 20th September; 18th October; 15th November and 20th December. All will start from Naphill Village Hall at 10 am and will be of varying lengths and on different routes. If you would like more information please contact Ron on 01494 562240. All welcome but if you decide to join us you should understand that you walk at your own risk. If you wonder what the walks are like this is what Ron reports about the one in February.

Our first walk for health in 2010 was on Monday 15 February and was approximately 4 miles long. The walk commenced at the Village Hall and took us down Stocking Lane. We branched off left at the bottom of the first hill by the detached bungalow and made our way across two fields to some woods. We then entered another field and emerged on Clappins Lane from where we proceeded towards North Dean. A footpath between some houses took us up Piggotts Hill which was perfect for getting the blood circulated and certainly warmed us up! Stopping at the top Philip Hussey told us that the field in which we were present had been the location of a De Havilland Mosquito aircraft crash towards the end of the Second World War. Philip thought that the crew managed to bail out safely. He added that Edward Nuttgens, a worker in stained glass, lived in The Studio, a house located on the hill. He also remembered a fire at the studio towards the end of the war. The family still live there and have continued the craft to this day. Philip mentioned Piggotts Farm which is beyond The Studio and is occupied by Nick Wheeler-Robinson., and is the location of the celebrated music centre. Between 1928 and 1940 this was the home of Eric Gill, a sculptor who had a commune and his own resident priest. Gill amongst much else, designed Gill San-Serif lettering which is used on the London Underground. He is buried in Speen Chapel graveyard. Finally Philip mentioned a rule of thumb that his father used regarding banks running down steep hills between fields (at the time we were facing down Piggotts Hill). As we looked down he explained that the ground to the left of the bank would be higher than that to the right because ploughs from earlier times turned the soil to the right as they could only plough downhill on steep hills. Of course fields were ploughed across and this created lynchets running along the contours of the hill. Philip said that he had never found an exception to the rule and would be interested to learn of one.

We continued on our way by climbing a stile and entering woods where we walked below the ridge of the hill. At a cross point we descended through fields to join the road alongside the Beech Dean ice cream factory. We then climbed up the opposite hill

back towards Walters Ash and entered the woods. When we were behind the RAF living quarters we separated company with those wishing a slightly shorter walk turning left and returning to Clappins Lane whilst those taking advantage of a longer walk turned right and headed towards the Lacey Green direction. We emerged onto the lane where Coles and Blackwell are located and then crossed into Bradenham Hill Lane. Proceeding down the lane we turned left onto a public footpath – opposite the entrance to the RAF married quarters – leading into the woods and emerged by Forge Road. We then made our way back to the Village Hall via the footpath behind the houses.

This was a most pleasant walk and a good social occasion judging by the amount of chatter!

The group was set up to meet recommendations of good practice in April 2008. Since this time it has met on a regular basis to discuss and address issues from the community.

Three main issues highlighted from a resident survey last year were;

- Speeding motorists
- Anti-social behaviour
- Burglary

Speeding

Working with the Roads Policing Speed enforcement team and the Safer Roads Partnership, numerous checks throughout the area have resulted in education as well as prosecution of offenders. Financial penalties as well as licence endorsements have been issued.

Anti-social Behaviour

Many operations in all indicated areas have been addressed by Police Officers and Police Community Support Officers, added patrols at the indicated times, prevention and education, working with youths and engaging them with football and basketball tournaments have proven a success.

Burglary

This area has been, and will remain, a focus of Police patrols, we are fortunate within the Parish that Burglary has not been a large contributor to the Crime Statistics. Although a small amount have taken place, generally residents have taken measures to protect their properties. Neighbourhood Watch is very active within the area and this deters cold callers as well as individuals attempting to commit Crime within the Parish.

Consultation

We need to know what you think the three priorities are that your Neighbourhood Police Team and its partners need to address within the next year. The results of this consultation will provide the basis for the coming year's policing priorities.

We can only adopt what is reported to us and so participation by as many residents possible is crucial to the success we all wish to achieve.

One for the Roads

I suppose that we drivers tend to take it for granted that the roads we use to get to work and for pleasure will be properly maintained. We may occasionally feel that there are too many road signs, that some speed limit signs are poorly placed and that speed limits occasionally do not seem to have been correctly set. We are also acutely aware of the volume of traffic and the very heavy loading of many roads which, progressively over the years, have been forced to sustain traffic levels for which that were never designed.

Now a new factor has been introduced, with local councils cutting back on road maintenance to save money. Pressure on council services has led to money spent on the roads to be limited, with few re-surfacings and the filling of bad patches only. The aim, of course, was to catch up on road repairs when budgets were under less pressure. Sadly this is a specious theory because in such circumstances something unexpected will surely intervene. In this case it is the intervention of Mother Nature herself. She gives us the snowdrops and the daffodils and the niceties of early Spring but also the snow and ice of Winter. And this year in a vengeful mood, perhaps because councils have ignored her savage potential, she has decided to treat them a sharp lesson. Thus we now find ourselves with a road system that is dangerously below standard. I have been driving for over 65 years and I cannot remember roads suffering from pot holes and general decay to such an extent.

So how do we deal with this situation? In practical terms, if the traffic is light one can manoeuvre to an extent to avoid pot holes but if the traffic is heavy during the day, such action could be dangerous. At night, it is all too difficult. It seems to me that many cars will be damaged by pot holes, leading to legal action and that accident rates must rise. Councils will now be anxious to take urgent (but expensive) action to cope with this situation at the very time when they are forced to cut services because of the banking scandal. Furthermore the weather continues to inflict further adverse conditions on the roads, tending to delay appropriate action.

Looking back over the years, I well remember the severe winter of 1947 when in the company of a large number of junior aircrew officers, I was invited(?) to clear the snow (8 inches of it) from the main runway of RAF Lindholme. We laboured manfully for a day, only for the weather gods to deliver a further 6 inches overnight. At this stage a higher authority decided sensibly that Mother Nature had won and our backs were spared more agony. It was 6 weeks before we flew again. Today of course airfields are equipped with proper snow clearance equipment.

Free Fire Safety Checks

Free safety checks to help reduce the risk of a fire or other emergency in your home are available from Buckinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service. Free smoke alarms are fitted where required, and fire-fighters will also help you find out more about other useful local services if you are interested. The checks take about 30 minutes each, depending

The checks take about 30 minutes each, depending on the size of the house, and are usually carried out



by firefighters. The householder needs to be present to answer a few questions.

Firefighters will offer fire safety advice, based on any potential fire risks that they may have identified during the check, and answer questions.

They will then fit as many smoke alarms as they think necessary. Buckinghamshire Fire & Rescue Service currently fits British Standard smoke alarms

with a sealed battery that should last 10 years in normal use.

To book one of these free checks, ring 01296 744477 or email cs@bucksfire.gov.uk

Community safety manager Terry Ridgley said: "When fires break out, smoke alarms provide a vital early warning sign. If the fire happens at night, they are often your only warning."

Here are Terry's top tips to ensure you and your family stay safe from fire:

Fit and maintain a smoke alarm: You should have one on each level of your home and test it weekly. The ideal position is on the ceiling, in the middle of a room, or in the hallway and landing. Test it weekly.

Plan your escape route: Make sure you and your family know the quickest way out in the event of fire. Consider an alternative route in case your usual one is blocked.

In the event of a fire, get out, stay out and call 999: Don't delay for valuables, and don't investigate or try to tackle the fire. Use a mobile, a neighbour's phone or a phone box to call 999. If someone needs to be rescued wait safely outside for the firefighters who have the equipment and training to do it. Never go back in.

Check on others: When you visit relatives or friends, look out for safety hazards in the home. Offer to help test their alarm and plan escape routes together.

Keep internal doors shut: This will slow down the spread of fire.

Four key safety messages - Fit smoke alarms; Test them every week; Plan an escape route; Get out, stay out and call 999.

The Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association



The Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association, SSAFA Forces Help, the oldest of our military charities, reached its 125th anniversary on 13th February 2010. It was founded in 1885 to support the second expeditionary force to Egypt.. Over the course of more than a century SSAFA has adapted and evolved to meet the changing needs of

our armed forces and their families, not least in incorporating the RAF soon after the end of World War I.

As the number of fatalities and serious injuries sustained in Afghanistan, the latest of more than twenty military conflicts since WWII, continues to rise, SSAFA still plays a vital role in helping service families to come to terms with loss and life-changing injuries. Our two Norton Homes allow injured troops to spend time with their loved ones away from the hospital environment, giving them the chance to enjoy something akin to normal family life together -dining, watching films, short outings, talking and planning for the future.

,Other forms of support include teams of social workers and health professionals, respite homes for families in difficulty, a housing advice service, holidays for disabled children. Anyone with any length of military service, however long ago, and any of his or her dependants, qualifies for help throughout their lives.

SSAFA shares responsibility for this national provision with other military charities, including some, such as the Royal British Legion and Help for Heroes, with very high profiles SSAFA's unique, if lower, profile' contribution is in the direct contact between our volunteer caseworkers and individuals in difficulty. Caseworkers are expertly trained in the specific knowledge and skills needed to respond sensitively to a wide range of problems, whether practical, financial or emotional, and to secure appropriate help.

Teams of caseworkers are located in every county and city area in the United Kingdom. In Buckinghamshire, we currently have about 45 caseworkers who handle some 350 to 400 clients a year and probably help more than that because relief for one person very often means relief for other members of the family. SSAFA Bucks is here for Buckinghamshire people.

We need help - in three ways:

- More clients. Despite our constant publicity we suspect that there are more people in our communities who would qualify for help but who do not come forward. Any help from readers in bringing our service to the attention of potential clients would be much appreciated.
- More volunteers for casework or for other roles in publicity, fund-raising, counselling or general help as a home visitor - would be welcome.
- Donations supporting the work of the Bucks team would be gratefully received.

Planning Appeal @ Hunts Hill Farm, Application no. 10/00009/REF

I am writing to the gazette for the first time as I feel I need to put residents' minds as ease. It is only fair to have all the facts regarding the planning application and hear both sides of the story.

Firstly, it seems that most of the information that residents have had regarding the application at Hunts Hill Farm has been one sided and inaccurate. There have been many details omitted from the information, which has been in the form of flyers through the door and Chinese whispers. Unless residents have managed to access the information on the WDC web site, unravelled the jargon and had the time to sit down and go through it all, then they may not have had clear impartial information on the subject.

So here are some important points:

- The lights have been categorised under the term 'pylons' when in fact they are poles or lamp posts that are just 3" in diameter. A lot slimmer than telegraph poles.
- They are no taller than a telegraph pole.
- They were designed at this height to cause minimum light 'spill' and therefore minimum impact on wildlife and residents; they are capped and shine down to light only the floor area rather than anywhere outside the ménage fence.
- They face away from the residents in Louches Lane and there is thick scrub land between the ménage and the nearest house in Hunts Hill Lane, but they would not be shining into that area anyway due to the downward-facing design.
- They would only be used between the months of November and March. Before and after this time there is sufficient natural light in the evenings.
- The application implied they would be on each night until 8 o'clock. This would not be the case. It would be rare for them to be on until 8 o'clock in the evening; in fact it would be rare for them to be on after 7 o'clock. Don't forget this is a residential property too.
- Due to weather conditions in winter months i.e. frozen ground, heavy rain, high winds or snow it will be very unusual for them to be on every night.
- They would not be needed at weekends.
- Development in the area of Naphill and Walters Ash is unfortunately inevitable. This is the way of life. How many houses and other developments have popped up here in the last 30 years..? Wellhouse Way and other properties would have encroached on farmland when they were built. Just look at photographs of Naphill

the early 1900s. There were very few houses in Naphill compared to today. If it wasn't for development the village wouldn't be what it is today.

- There is absolutely no comparison to Handy Cross Sports Centre in size, number of lights, light output or usage. Handy Cross use older less efficient lighting methods.
- The lighting will have no effect on residents while in their homes, they would have to be sat in complete darkness by the window with the curtains open to be affected by it.
- Although there is no 'street lighting' in Naphill
 there are still hundreds of security lights that
 come on at all manner of times. You only have to
 walk down the main road at night to realise that it
 is actually quite a challenge to not set any off as
 you walk past!
- Hunts Hill Farm itself is overlooked by houses with bright security lights that illuminate much of the fields at dark.
- There are other lit areas locally. There are already ménages in small villages with lighting, i.e. in Speen, Bryants Bottom and Lacey Green that have little impact on locals.
- Downley village and Downley Common have lighting.
- The conference centre in Four Ashes Road is illuminated at night.
- Hughenden Valley, between the roundabouts, is still lit by streetlights at night.
- There is a football pitch at Cryers Hill that is illuminated at night in the winter.
- And don't forget the RAF base that is lit up like a small city at night...all night, every night and has a floodlit pitch.
- There is certainly room for compromise.
- The farm is in a lot better condition than it was some 8 years ago, it is maintained regularly and it looks better aesthetically. Diversification is the only option for farms of this size these days as they cannot be self-sufficient by 'farming the land'. Surely it is better to keep the land for some sort of countryside usage, albeit horses, for the use of local people.

County Councillor's Report

As part of the County's upgrade of village nameplates, both Naphill and Walter's Ash will benefit from new ones, which are about to be erected at the entrances to the villages. They will be smaller than the present oversized ones, green in colour and more in keeping with a rural settlement. Similar ones can be seen on Cryers Hill and Great Kingshill. There is now a greater awareness that too much road signage can be counter productive and we are taking steps to try and reduce its use where it does not affect safety issues.

My post box, both actual and electronic, has been inundated with concerns about the government's announcement of the High Speed rail routes through the Chilterns AONB. The preferred route along the Misbourne Valley will have a dramatic and damaging effect on the landscape appearance. Residents groups along the proposed route are already forming a formidable and strong opposition to the scheme. In joining the opposition to this route we must not lose sight of the government's alternative scheme HS2.5 which moves the route from Great Missenden to the Hughenden Valley. The suggested 220 metre viaduct from Hatches Lane to Bryants Bottom Road across Warrendene Road would have a disastrous effect on Hughenden Valley and all the villages that surround it. The upheaval of construction works and the ensuing heavy traffic does not bear thinking about.

The County Council and the Chilterns AONB Conservation Board both object to the routes HS2 and HS2.5 in that they violate the AONB, an area with a similar ranking to that of a National Park, a government designated area of protection because of its high scenic value. There are other alternatives which would reduce the impact of high speed rail on our Chilterns countryside. We must await the outcome of the Election to see if commonsense prevails. Consultation will not start until later in the summer and that will be the time to make constructive suggestions and co-ordinated objections. For my part, I would rather see the money invested in improvements to the existing intercity rail network from which we could all see a benefit.

Astute readers will note that I have not mentioned potholes in this article hopefully, by the time this is read all category 1 holes will have been filled. At the time of writing the road teams are working on Cat 2 and general road repairs.

District Councillor's Report

With the General Election called on 6 April, at District Council work continues as normal. You may have seen that the application for the running track in Hazlemere was refused at the recent planning committee. The work continues with the feasibility of the stadium. It is still early stages.

I have seen both repairs and improvements on the

potholes in the last couple of weeks, in particularly the top of Coombe Lane to approximately half way down. Richard Pushman will cover this separately.

People have continued to lobby me regarding the proposed affordable housing in Warrendene Road. Again, this is at early stages. No decision has been taken nor has a planning application been lodged with the Council. I will keep you posted.

Please note that from 6 April new guidelines are in place for HMO (Houses of Multiple Occupation). The law has changed for new tenancies granted where it is requires permission for three or more sharers whom are not related from the original five. The law forms part of Planning.

The proposed HS2 rail project is receiving a lot of publicity and concern. The proposed alternative route, HS 2.5 would have an even bigger impact for our ward, with a proposed 720M viaduct through Hughenden Valley. The proposal is just that. As yet, it is both unproven and uncosted. My own view is why can't we use the existing West Coast route via Watford Junction, Milton Keynes?

I attended Council on 12 April and whilst writing should be attending the Naphill Playground opening on 24 April on the Crick with a special Regulatory and Appeals committee on the 27th. On the 29th ward Councillors will be meeting with stakeholders regarding the lorries in Warrendene Road.

His responsibilities also include Bradenham and West Wycombe. Those of you who have visited the Manor recently may have noticed some of the improvements and innovations that have been made since Jim Foy's arrival in 2009. The meeting is on TUESDAY MAY 25th starting at 8pm; there will be some formalities to deal with in addition to Jim's talk. This is an opportunity to meet Parish Councillors and to ask questions. It would be a pleasure to see you.

Burglary

Once again the Parish has seen a great reduction in Burglaries, to date there has been only 1 reported crime of this nature. This was in the Naphill area. There has also been the introduction of a new Neighbourhood watch scheme in the Templewood area of Walter's Ash, this scheme will strengthen the community as well as look after the immediate area. Once again, with the lighter evenings now upon us and the Garden shed being used more frequently, please lock and alarm the door, in order to safeguard your property.

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB)

Anti-social behaviour has risen slightly, with the evenings becoming lighter. The youths that caused concern a few years ago have now managed to pass their car tests and are out and about with their newly acquired vehicles; needless to say they all think they can drive like Jenson Button. They are gathering in groups and therefore cause disturbance to the community. If this is happening near you please try and gain registration numbers and report them to the Neighbourhood team. Section 59 of the Police Reform Act 2002 can be used to bring this to a halt. The new play area at Great Kingshill will be open for use after the 8th April and therefore most of the youths will have facilities to use. Hopefully they will respect the area and also the residents surrounding it. Should you see any ASB please call the team on the above number.

Speeding

The new NAG speed-working group has met and a strategy on targeting the worst roads has been drawn up. There are three locations within the Parish that will have the T-SID erected within the next few months. These will be monitored as to the speed reduction that they cause. There is NO data that can be taken from these devices. The team now have access to the Speed Indication Device (SID). My staff will collate current and accurate speeding data from identified locations whilst

also providing a visible deterrent at the same time. Dates have been planned for April for enforcement and the deployment of the SID device will allow a further High Visibility presence.

Good News

The young male arrested following the damage to a water mains pipe in the Walter's Ash, has been dealt with via the Criminal Justice System.

The male who used telephone intimidation to a resident in the Great Kingshill area has been 'Cautioned' in relation to the Communications Act. A youth from the Great Kingshill area has been issued a section 59 Police Reform Act 2002 warning for the Anti-Social use of a motor vehicle.

Another youth from the Great Kingshill area has been issued with a 'yellow' card for Anti-Social behaviour within a motor vehicle.

Other Matters

The last HAVE YOUR SAY surgery was held at the Great Kingshill School, there was little turnout, but the feedback was positive and a few people expressed their concerns re the school parking but none were able to offer solutions that had not already been considered.

What Next?

The questionnaire is now on its rounds, giving you the opportunity to tell the NAG what priorities you feel the Police should be concentrating their efforts on. If you have not yet filled a copy in please do so, there is still time. The top three will become the main aims for the forthcoming year. You will be informed of the outcome via newsletters and the Police website.

High Speed Rail Link – HS2 – London to Birmingham through Bucks AONB.

The three possible routes run through Bucks without stopping, so are of no use to any of us, but carve up miles of our beautiful County. The route that will do the most damage to the AONB, Green Belt and environmentally sensitive areas is the one preferred by the present Government and HS2 Ltd. called Route 3. Route 2.5 goes through High Wycombe. If need for HS2 is justified, the route preferred by all Councils in Bucks is Route 4, the West Coast Main Line, which goes via Milton Keynes, but again cuts through AONB. The Chilterns AONB officers are opposing all three routes. The case for HS2 has not been justified. The first consultation is planned for the Autumn. Planning Appeal for Floodlighting on Manege at Hunts Hill Farm

People were surprised by Ms C. Wright's letter last month, asserting that "development at Naphill and Walter's Ash" (and at Hunts Hill Farm) "is unfortunately inevitable."

The floodlighting proposal has met widespread opposition. However, the Appeal is now in the hands of an Inspector. Residents have already put their points in writing to him so there is little point in taking up Gazette space going over it.

What does need to be said is that in 1965, the Chiltern Hills were designated by Act of Parliament as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, with policies to protect its scenic beauty and wildlife interest from intrusive development.

In these terms AONB's are ranked as of national importance, equivalent in planning status to National Parks, and Naphill lies at the very centre of the Chilterns AONB.

Field Off Clappins Lane

Many of you will have noticed that since my last report, mid February, the field has been "mown" to get rid of the many bramble bushes and other growth that were quietly taking over. By good chance, shortly after the mowing, Mike Pool and I had the opportunity of having a very brief meeting in the middle of March, with Mr Adrian Laird Craig, one of the part owners, who has been responsible for re-fencing and managing the field, during one of his infrequent visits to Naphill. (from his home in Edinburgh).

During the above meeting, we were advised that the field will be ploughed, sown with grass and then grazed to keep the field in order. This is managed under a

"Gentleman's Agreement" with three months notice on either side, by a local contractor from Speen way.

On the subject which concerns us all, we still have heard nothing directly from Fine & Country nor, indirectly, via the solicitors, Bignalls, who are acting on our behalf. Adrian's view, along with that of one of the other co-owners, is that the field is an asset that if not sold with planning permission (P.P.) in his lifetime, is to be kept and handed down as an inheritance until such time as P.P. is granted and the land sold for development. As with anything like this, there is no guarantee that the family will not receive and consider offers of interest, as it has done several times over the years, and his view may be outvoted. However he is adamant that any such possible consideration will be made with a unified front and communicated clearly to local interests. With this in mind, we can only assume that the land is currently **not** "on the market", and that any such future of offer to sale would not be deleterious to the community.

For the record, this "dispatch" has been checked and approved by Adrian himself.

Finally, I would like to express my personal thanks to Mike & Pauline Pool, Mike and Lynne Robinson and Lois Akhurst for their support in all this, the team of volunteers who distributed leaflets, also to all the residents of Naphill who attended the meetings, and expressed interest in being financially involved if necessary and those who so kindly contributed towards the expenses fund.

The mill is located 2 miles south of Princes Risborough, or from Naphill, at the far end of Lacey Green village. LEVEL CROSSING INCIDENT EXERCISE

The Chinnor & Princes Risborough Railway was pleased to play host to Oxfordshire Fire & Rescue last Saturday (10th April) by recreating a full scale major incident at the railway. The scenario saw one car

ignore the warning lights and proceed over a level crossing as a train approached. Unfortunately the car hits the train spinning off and colliding with an innocent vehicle which gets propelled into the path of the oncoming train trapping the occupants.

The incident which involved fire appliances from Thame, Stokenchurch and Princes Risborough as well as the Thames Valley Police and St John Ambulance was very realistic and highlighted just how easily life can be lost for just trying to save a few seconds. When setting up the incident it was scary to see just how fragile a car is when compared to a train. The Fire service placed a car across the track and a train was edged very slowly up to the car. Even the lightest touch at 1 mile an hour with the locomotive shattered the side windows and twisted the roof supports. Even knowing the incident was staged, being close to the car was actually quite scary with the front buffer of the train being considerably larger than the cars windows. Trains are much bigger and heavier than people often realise and they cannot stop quickly like a car.

Everything was made safe before casualties with pre prepared injuries were placed in the cars and on the train. The incident was dealt with in a very professional manner with both the injured and uninjured passengers being evacuated from the scene in good time. Extracting the injured train driver through the narrow train doors proved an interesting challenge. The seriously injured occupants of the car were dealt with carefully, calmly and with great care, not so the car which is now minus a roof.

The simulation was an excellent training exercise for both the emergency services and the railway. It clearly highlighted that it is just not worth even trying to compete with a train at a level crossing.



Drivers may not be aware that most level crossings are monitored by CCTV. It is worth noting that if a driver is found to have failed to comply with the lights or barriers at a crossing then they can be banned from driving and fined regardless of there being an actually collision with a train. A driver was recently fined £650, plus costs and banned from driving for doing just that.



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County Councillor's Report

Let us hope that "flaming June" will live up to its name because May has been a particularly cold month especially the middle part and whilst writing this report the outside temperature has not exceeded 6C all day – colder than days in December!

There have been several comments about the closure of Coombe Hill Lane for two days to facilitate major resurfacing work which I had requested back in February. This was the only satisfactory way to eliminate the many surface holes that had appeared during the winter. The contractors needed to work on the full width of the road rather than individual carriageways which would have meant a centre seam, a potential for frost damage should we have another hard winter. Also modern contractor's plant works on a wider width to accommodate dual carriageway resurfacing, so we had little choice but to close off the full road width rather than one carriageway at a time. Fortunately the road will not close until 09.30 am and re-open at 5.00 pm on each of the scheduled days. It was unfortunate the planned road closure came after the closing date of the last Gazette and readers have learned of the disruption from the press and road notices. I hope that by the time this article is read we will be enjoying a much improved road surface.

My Chairmanship of the County Council ends on the 27th May and once again I will have control of my own diary. With five or six events per week, many at the weekends it is a demanding role but with many wonderful experiences meeting dedicated people in education, the armed services, social care and the voluntary sector. I have been particularly impressed by the standards of our 'uniformed' youth, young Cadets, Scouts and Guides, really a joy to meet and fulfilling a much needed framework for a future adult society. Their leaders are to be complimented on their dedication and commitment. I must mention also the carers, young and old, without which our social care system would not work. We really are fortunate that we have such dedicated people. giving of their free time to help those in need. We are indeed fortunate to live in Buckinghamshire.

With the Election now behind us the result has brought about a need for a greater understanding of the problems facing this country. I hope that the promise of 'localism' whereby we may have a greater influence on local issues will restore the sense of working for the community on issues such as planning and the environment. We can but hope.

District Councillor's Report

The General Election is now over after a very busy campaign with an unusual national government; an arrangement we have not seen for 70 years. In terms of manifestos, I am particularly keen for the Government to return planning back to local level and for local people, not Government, to decide on housing. I am also interested in the introduction of a permanent stamp duty exemption for first time buyers up to £250,000 and for the abolition of the Home Information Packs (HIPs).

We met a large number of residents on 29 April in connection with the impact of lorries in Warrendene Road. I am pleased to say that we are working with Environmental Services very closely and, although there is no quick fix, all the relevant stakeholders are speaking to each other. What is not acceptable is the noise, dust and fumes. Residents do not want to be woken from 4am.

We are also attending a meeting on 21 June in Hughenden regarding the proposed High Speed 2 link. We need to look at this very closely and will keep you posted.

I was elected Vice Chairman of the Regulatory and Appeals Committee and attended my first meeting recently looking at among several items; the requirements for Taxis to have at least 70% nontinted screens. Very important for both the passenger and driver. I also attended Annual Council on 10 May. I am still a member of the Licensing Committee.

Looking ahead, I will be attending the first anniversary opening of the Hughenden Valley temporary shop and the Annual Parish meeting on 25 May in North Dean.

Finally, looking forward to seeing you at the Fete on 12 June.

Hughenden Parish Council

The Parish Council met yesterday, 11 May, on the regular second Tuesday of the month. As usual, a considerable amount of business was dealt with. Minutes of these meetings may be viewed on the Council's website

www.hughendenparishcouncil.org.uk.

Two particular matters were agreed which may be of interest to local residents. Firstly, the Council passed a motion about its current position with regard to the proposed High Speed rail link. 'The Parish Council is very concerned about the proposal from the government for a new high speed rail link from London to Birmingham, the preferred route for

which would cut directly through the Chilterns AONB. The Parish Council will continue to obtain as much relevant information as possible in order to respond appropriately to the consultation which is intended to take place in the autumn of 2010. The Council will co-operate fully with Bucks County Council, the Chilterns Conservation Board, the Chiltern Society, other relevant bodies and local residents in the hope that it can support a co-ordinated and informed response to the official consultation.'

Secondly, it agreed to continue with the process of trying to facilitate the provision of some rural affordable housing for the Parish. The Council has considered the views provided at the open day on 10 March and subsequently. As part of the process, Wycombe District Council has requested that we update the Housing Needs Survey done in 2006, even though we are aware that 40 people expressed an interest on the day. English Rural Housing Association will look again at all the possible sites throughout the Parish during the summer, including those already considered. They will also look at any new sites identified by themselves, by the Housing Needs Survey or individual suggestions. Survey forms will be distributed throughout the Parish during September and will require a prompt response. The Council wishes to move the process forward with appropriate speed.

My fellow councillors have elected me to serve as Chairman for another year. I am pleased to be able to take on this responsibility and will do my best to serve parishioners well. Parish and District elections will take place in May 2011. At least councillors are non-political so there will not be a 'hung' council!

Hello from the **Hughenden**, Hazlemere & Chepping Wycombe Neighbourhood Police Team (HNPT) and welcome to the April edition of the newsletter for Hughenden Parish. If you need to contact the Neighbourhood Team then please dial the Thames Valley Police on the non-emergency number, 0845 8 505 505, and ask the police operator to put you through to the Hazlemere Police Office. The team would also love to hear from the community regarding any positive or negative feedback that you may have or any issues or concerns that you may wish to raise.

Burglary

The Parish has seen an increase in burglaries. To date, there have been five reported crimes of this nature spread across the Parish. Once again, garden tools are being used from insecure garden

sheds. Please lock and alarm the door. There are numerous ways of securing the doors with good quality locks aided by shed alarms. These can be purchased at low cost from Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators as well as domestic retail outlets.

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

Anti-social behaviour has remained the same as last month with very little occurring within the Parish. However, there have been several reports that youths have been causing problems at the RAF base. The possible offenders are either dependants of serving officers or local youths with connections to dependants. The Military Police are dealing with the reports at this stage.

The new play area at Great Kingshill has opened for use. The feedback from the area is that the youths love the facilities and the equipment has been a long time arriving. Hopefully, they will respect the area and also the residents surrounding it. Should you see any ASB please call the team on the above number.

Speeding

The T-SID has been deployed in three locations around the Parish, this device has shown that speed will decrease if a gentle reminder is at hand. There is NO data that can be used from this device, so we will have to act on perception of residents.

The mobile speed van has been and will be around the Parish. Figures from last year show that the mobile van had 855 activations, while the fixed camera at Naphill has no data available at this time.

The SID device has been out and about with the PCSO and early figures show that in Bryants Bottom 51% of vehicles that drove through in a set period were over the speed limit by varying amounts. Cryers Hill was also assessed.

Main Road Naphill was also targeted from the junction with Downley road, heading towards the

RAF base. The recordings were that around 44% were travelling in excess of the 30mph speed limit, all of varying degrees.

Good News

Following the damage to a vehicle caused during a road rage incident in Widmer End, an adult male has been dealt with via the Criminal Justice System. Two female youths from the Great Kingshill and Widmer End area have been issued with 'yellow' cards for Anti-Social behaviour in High Wycombe town centre. Two persons have been arrested for fraud by false representation, after they presented themselves as builders, carried out sub-standard repairs to a dwelling in Naphill and then charged extortionate sums of money for the work. Both persons are currently on Police Bail.

Other Matters

There have been reports that BOGUS builders are in the area, hence the above. These people tend to prey on vulnerable persons of any age, quoting work required to their properties. They carry out substandard work and the price increases day after day until the person's bank balance has been emptied. PLEASE DO NOT have any work carried out to your property unless you actively commission the work.

There also seems to be a possible scam going on via internet use. People have been contacted saying there has been a problem with the server and that by turning on the computer and the person being talked through a series of instructions, the scammer manages to infiltrate the personal details of the victim. There has been a lot of big-name dropping during the conversation, e.g. Microsoft and Apple. Please be aware of this style of call and contact your service provider if you are in any doubt.

The last **HAVE YOUR SAY** surgery was held at the Hughenden Valley Community Shop. Turnout was low but the feedback was positive and a few people expressed their concerns within the area.

Neighbourhood Action Group

Questionnaire. Only 100 people in Hughenden Parish filled in the NAG Questionnaire, a copy of which appeared in the April Gazette. The Police will accept further completed forms up to the end of May before they set priorities. The responses so far showed that areas of concern were speeding, parking, burglary, litter and dog fouling.

Speeding. A mobile van was recently set up in Walter's Ash to monitor cars travelling towards the Air Force Base. 128 vehicle speeds were recorded. 66 were under 30mph, 40 at 31–35mph, 17 at 36–40mph, 5 at 41–45mph. None was above 46mph.

Anti-Social Behaviour, according to Chiltern Police Area Commander, includes street problems, nuisance neighbours and environmental crime. Environmental crime includes dropping litter, failing to clear up dog mess, dropping bags of dog mess on paths or hanging the bags on bushes. Recently, a mother in Naphill was observed showing her children how to attach a bag of dog mess on a bush bordering a footpath.

Once again we have been asked to request, very politely, that everyone takes their empty cans, bottles, cartons, sweet wrappings, bags of dog mess, and other litter back home, or use bins provided.

Burglaries. In Hughenden Parish there were five burglaries around April. Thefts from garden sheds are on the increase, so police advise locking sheds, putting gratings on the windows and installing shed alarms, available locally for £10. They also advise more care on securing our homes and hiding car keys, because jewellery and cars are currently the thieves' first target.

replacements for the tatty old notice boards. They were made possible by generous grants from the Chiltern Conservation Board, Natural England, Bucks County Council, Hughenden Parish Council, Cllr Richard Pushman and Cllr John Gibbs' fund for local projects, and the Friends of Naphill Common's own funds. Thanks also to Philip Hussey who did much of the design and all the negotiations with the makers, and to those members who worked to erect the boards. The soil was full of flints but they eventually yielded when faced with the huge Australian crowbar supplied by David Greenwood. Our website has pictures of the epic task.

You may also notice that we have begun to clear scrub from along some of the paths near the end of Chapel Lane. This work has stopped now because we do not want to disturb nesting birds. Chiffchaffs and blackcaps have arrived and can be heard singing on the Common, along with residents such as nuthatches, great tits, blue tits, robins and so on. Once common, willow warblers have not been heard so far: their numbers have been getting fewer each year and it will be sad if we can no longer hear their delicate little songs. They are ground-nesting birds and it may be that they suffer from the many dogs that snuffle around the common.

Eighteen people joined our Rogation Day walk around the boundary of the Common. Some of the bounds are virtually impenetrable but we did our best to reach every corner from the wall of Bradenham Manor to Hunt's Hill Lane. There are photographs of the walk on the website thanks to Peter Davis.

Ron Collin's walks for health are still proving popular. Indeed, we would like to offer two walks each month; one fairly short – say less than four miles – another rather more ambitious – five or more miles – but obviously Ron can't lead both. Florence then gave the squirrel a thorough licking, at which time Alison realised that the cat thought that the squirrel was her baby! County Councillor's Report

The County Council is seeking the public's consultation on its new transport plan for the High Wycombe District. This will seek to address all matters relevant to roads, public transport and highway improvements in general. It will set the pattern of management for the next five years and give the opportunity for all readers to have their say. More information is available on the County Council website.

I have now concluded my year as chairman of council and can reflect on what has been a most interesting and enjoyable year. It has taken me the length and breadth of the county and Valerie and I have had the opportunity of meeting a wide range of residents especially those working in the voluntary sector without whom the county services would not properly function.

I have now been appointed to the Buckinghamshire and Milton Keynes Fire Authority, responsible for the Fire Service throughout the county including Milton Keynes. Also I have been appointed vice chairman of the Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee for Buckinghamshire. This is the equivalent of a Select Committee and scrutinises policies of both health and social care within the county. It involves a wide ranging survey of all matters pertaining to health care provided by the health authority and social care by the county council. Very interesting and very challenging with a lot of reading to catch up on!

I have had a letter from British Gas and county Highways to say that they are undertaking the essential replacement of 3.5 kilometres of gas main in the Wycombe Area, starting mid June and affecting Missenden Road and Cryers Hill Road over a period of nine months. This will also involve the upgrading of links with domestic properties. Although this will not affect Naphill & Walters Ash residents directly there will be difficulties with traffic congestion on some of the main approach roads.

The Office of Fair Trading is an important part of the county councils service to its residents. Advice is free and can be helpful where there has been misrepresentation in product or service performance. We also make recommendations where there is any doubt of services being offered especially by unregistered traders. Please remember that any rubbish or waste removed by a carrier who is not licensed, if subsequently illegally dumped, becomes the responsibility of the house holder who can be liable for a substantial fine. Please always make sure that anyone offering a cheap service for cash is a bona fide trader and vat registered, especially if removing waste matter.

The County has launched an online one-stop shop

for residents and road users, the first of its kind in the country. The new Service Information Centre will host all the critical information for transport and highways delivery for the County Council. It will allow members of the public to report defects on the highway, monitor progress of our planned and emergency works, track where our gangs are working on a day to day basis, view the winter maintenance in real time as well as act as our main communications channel for school travel planning, public transport and consultation on the development of the county council's Local Transport Plan 3.

Residents and road users can sign up to 'tfbalerts' on twitter and receive up to date information on where there is disruption on our network and keep them abreast of the latest news from the service, pointing back to the Service Information Centre. Visit www.twitter.com/tfblaerts to sign up.

I hope all readers have a pleasant summer break with some good weather.

District Councillor's Report

I was grateful for the excellent weather at the Fete on June 12. Did you manage to get to the Crick?

In my last report I was anticipating an announcement on the Home Information Packs. I am delighted this wasteful bureaucracy has been abandoned and perhaps a little confidence and common sense for both buyers and sellers will finally prevail. Of course, sellers are still required to commission an EPC (Energy Performance Certificate).

I await to see hear peoples views regarding the new academies for schools and delighted that regional planning will be abolished together with the garden grabbing system so used in the last administration. Locally, of course, residents do not want a continued erosion of our green belt. You have made that clear. We must listen to you. Importantly, building targets have been abolished and it will be up to the people and not developers what is built in this ward. Furthermore, with less money being available for affordable housing, this will have an impact on plans. Importantly, residents are very determined that no one will force affordable housing or any other inappropriate development on green belt land.

There is a lot of new legislation being announced and this will take time to digest for the impact it may have on this ward. We also have the emergency budget on 22 June to contend with.

I attended a Regulatory and Appeals committee on

7 June where amongst agenda items we agreed to a farmers market in Princes Risborough on Sundays, to be reviewed in two years. I expressed concerns regarding actual demand and parking in Risborough, bearing in mind the recent High Wycombe farmers market closed due to lack of demand.

I will be attending an update on the stadium project for Wycombe Wanderers/Wasps on 20 July.

Some of you may have seen recent reports in the Bucks Free Press about the vociferous activities of a group of Hughenden Valley residents at Council meetings. It is extremely unfortunate that a group of people has chosen to disrupt proceedings because of objections to the possibility of a small development of rural affordable homes in Warrendene Road. The emphasis in the press reporting could have been more balanced but, to be fair, much of the information contained in the reports was about right. The purported vote of no confidence in the Parish Council on this issue has no validity in law. This is for the fairly obvious reason that, if it did, any group of protestors could bring down a council at will. Hardly democratic!

Speeding

Two T-SID locations have been utilised, Bryants Bottom was used between 20/04 and 14/05 with the perception that speed has reduced since the usage. The other was Brimmers Hill, for a 4 week period as the road works and the school holiday had different impacts on the use. The remaining T-SID will be installed at Great Kingshill on or before 7th June. This will coincide with the healthy schools week. The Sid device has been used along the Missenden Road, (Red lion) at Great Kingshill with a total of 266 vehicles passing within a 37 minute timeframe, the vehicles were travelling towards Cryers Hill. The results confirmed that 39% of the vehicles were above the permitted limit of 30mph. There is NO data that can be taken from these devices. Dates have been planned for June. Enforcement and deployment of the SID device will continue allowing further High Visibility presence.

Good News

Dan Jenner, from Hughenden Valley has been convicted for Drink Driving, and disqualified for a period of 12 months. He was also fined £250 and a further £100 in costs.

A female from the Little Kingshill area was arrested following a collision near the Black Lion public house at Naphill. She was arrested for Drink Driving.

A resident from the Widmer End area had his vehicle broken into in a High Wycombe car park, the offender was caught by officers and admitted the offence. Other similar offences have been taken into account. He was bailed to the Magistrates court in High Wycombe.

A male from the Naphill area has been arrested for the Possession of a Prohibited article he was charged and will be dealt with via the Criminal justice system.

A male from the Kingshill area was arrested for an Assault that took place within the home environment; he was later released without charge.

Other Matters

There also seems to be a possible scam going on via internet use. People have been contacted saying there has been a problem with the server and that by turning on the computer and the person being talked through a series of instructions, the scammer manages to infiltrate the personal details of the victim. There has been a lot of big name dropping during the conversation, i.e. Microsoft and Apple. Please be aware of this style of call and contact your service provider if you are in any doubt. This matter has been re-entered as there have been further calls to Police.

Hughenden Manor Park has seen an increase in people walking dogs and the general walking public, Police have received several reports that a female with a large 'PACK' of dogs, allows them to run off the lead. One of the dogs has already bitten a child, it is not known to what severity but NO hospital treatment was needed. However, this does not detract from the fact that this individual needs to cease her activities in this manner. Information as to her identity should be directed to the Neighbourhood team.

The last HAVE YOUR SAY surgery was held at Widmer End shops, Georges Hill. There was little turnout, feedback was positive and a few people expressed their concerns about youths in the area. The next will have taken place by the time you read this article, it is at Great Kingshill in June.

What Next?

The questionnaire has now been finalised. The NAG priorities will be set, following the meeting in June. The top three priorities will become the main focus within the forthcoming year. You will be informed of the outcome via newsletters and the Police website.

Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG)

Lots of NAG news for you this month so I will try and keep this update brief. 126 people in total responded to the questionnaire out of 7000 in the parish. The NAG priorities have now been agreed for the year. They are:

Speeding (82 people)
 Litter (49 people)
 Parking (46 people)

Just for your interest, priority 4 was burglary (44 people) and priority 5 was dog fouling (30 people).

The police will take the lead on speeding, with various initiatives being put in place around the parish. It has already been proved by work done elsewhere in the area that the majority of people who are over the limit

are local people, so with this in mind be aware of your speed at all times. Volunteers are requested to assist in the Community Speedwatch initiative, see article below.

Residents' Associations have been asked to take the lead on the problem of litter and various suggestions have been put forward such as community "litterpick" days or by asking each resident to keep the area in front of their own houses clear. The first task is to identify if we have any particular problems in Naphill & Walter's Ash so I am putting together an action list. Please let me know if you want to nominate any target areas, or of course if you have any ideas as to how this particular issue can be creatively tackled.

The police are also leading on parking problems, and they are commencing random morning and evening checks at our local schools, issuing warnings and then parking tickets on a zero tolerance basis.

Community Speedwatch

The Neighbourhood Action Group have been investigating various tools to help educate drivers about speeding through the Parish. We have the possibility of borrowing a Community Speedwatch machine from a neighbouring Parish Council or NAG. These machines have been deployed successfully in local areas such as Princes Risborough. The device monitors speed and the community volunteers take a description and note of the registration number. The drivers receive a warning letter from the Police who log the car numbers and details of persistent offenders. After a driver has been logged as speeding on a number of occasions, the Police may prosecute and even, in severe cases, may impound the vehicle. Other community groups tell us that it has been successful in reducing speeds amongst persistent speeders.

Spending and Council Tax Issues

Our June meeting touched on the government spending cuts. This opens up a window of opportunity for our local community to pursue concerns over waste of public money.

Examples of waste mentioned were:

(a) The wasteful planning appeal system in which we pay two or three times over for the District Council to make one decision, then the Bristol Planning Inspectorate to overturn it, and then even overturn its own earlier rulings. The system is fundamentally unfair as a developer can appeal against a planning

refusal but the public cannot appeal against a bad planning consent.

- (b) The spiralling cost of interpreters and translations in spite of policy to require a command of English.
- (c) The wasteful cost of 3-tier local government with county, district and parish councils (see Steve Cohen's recent S Bucks Star editorial). It was noted there is no control over parish council budgets. It was asked whether HPC's £180,000 expenditure gives taxpayers acceptable value for the few services it provides.

Green Belt and AONB Policy

The June meeting noted that it continues to be Government policy as well as County and District Council policy to protect Green Belts and AONBs. We have fought for decades to defend AONB and Green Belt. It therefore remains the duty of the Parish Councillors to work to preserve our environment in accordance with these policies.

However, the Bucks Free Press has twice reported public outrage at a secretive Parish Council plan, over many years, to *d*evelop Green Belt/ AONB land for "affordable housing". In the opinion of many local residents there is no justification for AONB/Green Belt farmland development when "affordable houses" exist in the town a short bus or cycle ride away and 98 are being built at Wellesbourne and Terriers. Further, people do not believe these can be kept separate from the general housing stock in the long term. If this plan goes ahead it will open the floodgates for many more, and set a dangerous precedent for private developers to follow.

The Bucks Free Press also reported a "No Confidence" vote against the Parish Council Chairman by a hall full of parishioners at the Annual Parish Meeting, which she refused to accept, although Radnage PC resigned en bloc after one such vote. It was noted that the Parish Councillors were returned to office unopposed, or co-opted, and not in any sense "elected" as claimed by the Parish

Council Chairman in the April Gazette. The Parish Council's mandate is therefore weak.

The NAWARA Committee regards the plans for development of "affordable houses" on AONB/GB farmland as of such concern as to require public discussion. A Public Meeting is therefore convened for Thursday 8th July at 8 pm in Naphill Village Hall, open to all residents, where any further issues regarding Hughenden Parish Council can also be raised. Representatives from other Residents Associations will also be in attendance.

A number of people have approached committee members with various complaints about the abuse of the Common: dog fouling, dogs harassing animals and birds, cyclists and horses using footpaths instead of the bridleways, tree felling, rubbish dumping and so on. It is important to stress that the Friends of Naphill Common group has no more power than individual villagers to determine what happens on the Common. The ultimate authorities are the landowners. Sir Edward Dashwood and The National Trust, and – because it is an SSSI - Natural England. However, we do have influence and an energetic committee willing to fight for the Common, so please continue to pass on your observations and opinions. Meanwhile we ask people to treat our finest local amenity with respect and be considerate to other people: with a little thought we and the Common can enjoy a superb future.

June was a busy month. I write before much of it has happened but, with luck, we had a visit to Moorend Common on 6th June. Like our common and most Chiltern commons, Moorend was mainly open heathland around the beginning of the 20th Century. Almost half was covered in trees and scrub by the late 1940s and three guarters by 2000. Dr Chris Smith produced a ten year management plan in 1996 but few of its objectives were achieved. The Moorend Common Conservation Committee produced a new plan in 2006 and they have been much more successful in its implementation. They have opened up several areas and tried to increase the diversity of plant and animal species. The common is particularly rich in ground flora including southern marsh orchids and common spotted orchids. Unusual for the high Chilterns, Moorend Common has several small streams which flow into a swallow hole and disappear. Presumably the water eventually reaches the Thames.

Naphill Common once had common spotted orchids and the much rarer spider orchid and lesser butterfly orchid, but these have all been lost as the tree cover has increased. If we were to open up some of the remaining glades we could reintroduce the junipers grown from cuttings recently taken from the four surviving specimens, and who knows what flowers might return? The largest of our struggling junipers, badly damaged by the snow, has produced copious clouds of pollen. Let us hope that this is not its last gasp and, if it is, that some of the pollen reaches its mate on West Wycombe Hill.

The Fete and our Midsummer Picnic will have come and gone by the time you read this, but don't forget our 'Walks for Health' on Monday 19th July, 16th August, 20th September, 18th October, 15th November and 20th December. All start from the Village Hall at 10 am and everyone is welcome. We hope to announce some other events in the coming

months including details of another fungus foray on Sunday 3rd October.

So, even without the aid of a crystal ball, I predict more teaching to the tests will follow. However with such innovative ideas as learning poetry off by heart and knowing the order of British monarchs our children will be well prepared for life in the 21st Century.

The Year 6 children took part in a rounders tournament last week and are currently participating in a hockey competition. In the first round, one of the players got hit by a stick just above his eye which resulted in a trip to A and E. But true to form, as soon as the blood had stopped flowing he wanted to come back and play for his team. We are now through to the final stages having played a closely fought draw with another local school. I loved playing hockey and it is great to see so many children playing at school and now taking it up at local clubs. County Councillor's Report

Leaving for holiday before the end of July and these notes being required before 15th August, it requires some foresight as to what future topics may be appropriate for readers especially at this time when so many changes are taking place in local government, many happening during the coming months. The most significant change I have noted so far is on planning The Minister for Local Government has announced that garden areas are no longer "brown field sites" and Planning Guidance PP3 requiring high density development will no longer apply. Hopefully this should see an end to "garden grabbing" and the loss of green space to high numbers of dwellings being squeezed into comparatively small plots. Naphill and Walters Ash have been particularly subjected to this unsuitable policy over the past ten years.

In July I had my first experience of the Overview and Scrutiny Committee for Public Health Services, of which I am now the Vice Chairman. This committee has a wide ranging remit and involves looking 'outwards' and across agencies. Its focus is on health and while its main interest is likely to be the National Health Service, it may also look at associated services such as the performance of the ambulance service. The July meeting dealt with the temporary closure of the Midwifery-Led Unit at Wycombe General Hospital, a subject which has generated much press comment. No doubt there will be many similar contentious topics over the coming months as we get to grips with the Government's plans to radically re-organise the NHS.

Back in June I promised that we would have new Village Name Plates at the entrance to our villages. I am now assured that these will be in place by the time you read this article! I have had to make some difficult decisions regarding road re-surfacing plans because of further cuts to the local budget. I am afraid that this is a foretaste of what is going to be a very difficult period of local government cut backs.

On a happier note my Community Leadership budget remains intact, for the moment. This allows me to help finance local community schemes which require some financial assistance. Last year I had a few requests from Naphill and Walters Ash but more from other parts of my Division, which is the whole of Hughenden Parish. Please let me have written requests before the end of October, stating what the project is, the total funding needed and what has been raised so far.

District Councillor's Report

I hope you have had a pleasant summer.

As you are probably aware, the new Government is issuing Legislation at some speed, which as you can appreciate is both exciting and challenging. There appears to be a number of good announcements particularly around planning placing more power to all of us, although we do need to look at the small print and how local initiatives can be put into practice.

I am still keeping an eye on the High Speed 2 proposals and as you know have argued against this on both an economic and engineering basis.

I attended a working group with Hughenden Parish Council to ascertain their process for a survey of residents needs on rural affordable housing together with the public follow up meeting. I am interested to see how this progresses and look forward to the presentation of the full results.

On a district level, I attended a follow up meeting on the tenant led transfer of Council homes with a full vote due in the late Autumn. I also attended a progress meeting on the Wasps/Wycombe Wanderers stadium project with a special Council on 31 August to vote on moving ahead.

Finally, I contributed £60 from my community fund for the provision of a large hose reel and fittings for Naphill and Walters Ash School to help the children attend to their plants and vegetables throughout the summer. A big "Thank You" to the children for sending me such a colourful and cheerful card, which was much appreciated.

1. Report of July meeting

At its monthly meeting on July 13th 2010 the Parish Council passed the following resolution unanimously:-

Hughenden Parish Council is committed to protecting the AONB and Green Belt. However, it recognizes that there may be exceptional cases where a genuine need for rural affordable housing has to be met on greenfield sites, including small-scale incursions into the Green Belt and/or within the AONB. In such cases the Parish would seek to co-operate with Local Authorities to ensure that identified sites do not damage the environment, AONB or Green Belt, and to make sure that design and landscaping are appropriate to the setting.

At an Extraordinary meeting of the Council on August 5th 2010 it was resolved that Housing Needs Survey forms would be delivered to all households in the Parish towards the end of September, for return to Community Impact Bucks by October 22nd. It is hoped that there will be a good response to this Survey so that there is a clear indication of parishioners' views. This is a large Survey and the analysis will take some time. It is not expected that there will be anything further to report until the end of the year.

The Parish is, of course, aware of opposition from some residents to the idea that it may be necessary to use a very small area of greenfield land if sufficient 'need' has been identified to justify the building of a small development for local people. There will be a 'frequently asked questions' sheet enclosed with the questionnaire to households. It is hoped people will find time to read this so that any misconceptions about the consultation process, and the possible implications of the Survey results, may be clarified. Unfortunately there is quite a lot of misinformation in the public domain about this issue.

Parishioners are welcome to approach me, and other ward members, if they would like to discuss this matter further.

2. <u>Letter to Gazette editor from the Clerk to the</u> Parish Council

In the July/August edition of the Gazette, there was an item under the Naphill & Walters Ash Residents Association, signed by Malcolm Leflaive. In it, under the heading of 'examples of waste', he made certain comments about the expenditure of the Hughenden Parish Council and insinuations were made about the correctness of this expenditure.

I have worked for this Parish for just over sixteen years and in all that time, the external, and of latter years, the internal, auditor has never found any discrepancy with the way in which the accounts are maintained and this also covers the procedures the Council follows in awarding its contracts, which have never been brought into question.

Any parishioner can come into the office and see the accounts and every year we produce notes which are

presented to the Annual Parish Meeting. This is held in every ward of the Parish in turn, and this year it was held in North Dean Village Hall.

Some of the comments made by Malcolm referred to expenditure and decisions taken at District Council level and therefore have no bearing on the Parish Council. However, in item (c), he stated that there is no 'control' over Parish Council budgets. This is factually incorrect. It is true that there is no 'capping' on a Parish Council's precept. In other words, a Parish Council can request any amount of money from its District Council and, under current guidelines, it must be paid. However, it is disingenuous to suggest that there is no 'control'. As mentioned already, Parish Councils are subject to internal independent audit and external independent audit, and this is done every year for a Parish of Hughenden size.

Out of the money raised by the rating system and the income from allotments and burials, the Parish Council funds various items. The largest amount of money is spent on open spaces. This covers all the allotment areas (8 working gardens in total with approximately 210 tenants); upkeep of six of the play areas - HPC maintains areas in each ward that are under the ownership of the village halls, as many years ago these were in danger of closure as the village halls were finding them too costly to maintain. There are also woodlands and conservation areas around the Parish that require regular maintenance as well as several ponds, two of which are in the Naphill & Walters Ash ward.

The next largest single item of expenditure is for the Garden of Rest at Cryers Hill. This cemetery is for parishioners and their relatives and everyone who visits this area finds comfort and peace in extremely pleasant surroundings. The Garden of Rest is an area that each successive Council in my time has taken a pride in its maintenance and compliments are received on a regular basis, indicating that most people are happy with the way the area is maintained.

As previously mentioned, if any parishioner has any queries about the way the Parish Council works or how the money is spent, I am happy to try and help and can be contacted at the office on HW 715296.

2. Neighbourhood Action Group Update

Speeding

Litter

There have been numerous reports that the SKANSA construction company workers in the area have been dropping large amounts of litter. The Head Office of SKANSA has been contacted and this matter addressed. The managers were apologetic and informed police that all workers in the area would be informed of the concerns. Please report any further incidents to the Neighbourhood Policing Team directly and the matter will be followed up.

The parking around schools within the parish is a concern and will be a focus for police from September.

Other Matters

There has only been one report of a burglary in the Parish but there have been 2 reports of attempted robberies in the last few weeks at Naphill and at Cryers Hill. The offender seems to be a young male who is not very competent. When the victims have confronted him, he backs down and runs off. Please be conscious of items that you carry on show during the hours of darkness.

Public Meeting on Rural Affordable Housing on 8th July 2010

The objective of this meeting was to ensure that everyone was fully aware of the true facts about Rural Affordable housing and to gauge public opinion on this subject. Representatives from all Hughenden Parish wards attended the meeting including two District Councillors John Gibbs and David Carroll - 55 in all. An invitation was sent to Hughenden Parish Council but they declined to attend.

David Frost gave a presentation of information provided by Wycombe District Council housing departments and Housing Associations. This dispelled the myth that "Affordable" housing, is cheaper than housing on the open market. All similar housing in a similar locality carries the same valuation by Law. The term "affordable" relates to the way a property can be bought. A clear distinction between Affordable Housing and Rural Affordable Housing was highlighted.

Housing Association properties on brownfield sites can be purchased over several years through shared equity, with the purchaser increasing his share as his income improves, until he owns the entire property, paying rent throughout on the decreasing unsold share. A WDC property if rented for 5 years must be bought outright if the tenant wishes to purchase.

All new housing developments on brownfield sites must now contain 30% to 40% of "Affordable" accommodation. At Wellsbourne and Terriers alone, 98 are being built. Naphill has 15.

The Rural Affordable Housing scheme proposed by Hughenden Parish Council in partnership with English Rural Housing Association is different. HPC through ERHA [English Rural Housing Association] plan to build all the properties on GB-AONB-FARMLAND. A purchaser can only buy up to 80% of the property, with the rest paid for in rent. The 80% limit makes it difficult to obtain a mortgage and similarly hard to sell on. Only 2 Banks will provide such a mortgage, with stringent safeguards.

The stated intention is that these houses are for local people in perpetuity – that is anyone with at least 3 years connection with the Parish. But if a suitable new local purchaser or tenant can't be found in only 10 weeks of the property becoming available, other families on the WDC social housing waiting list are selected by WDC - not local families.

The Chairman gave a summary of the events of the past few months surrounding this issue and pointed out

the threats to local democracy that the conduct of Hughenden Parish Council had posed to residents. He called for total transparency in actions undertaken by HPC. In particular, that the forthcoming questionnaire (to be distributed by HPC) to be impartially worded and that the results to be independently audited and available for public scrutiny.

There was general consensus that the proposal posed a major threat to our environment and would set a dangerous precedent.

The meeting voted on two resolutions

Resolution 1. Do you support Affordable Housing?

41 voted in support; 7 voted against; abstentions not counted.

Resolution 2. Do you support Rural Affordable Housing in GREEN BELT-AONB Countryside?

49 voted against; nil in favour; abstentions not counted. Carried Nemcon

Thank you to all those people who have joined "The Friends of Naphill Common" (FONC) or who have renewed their membership. We now have almost 200 members! This is very gratifying: it gives us the strength in numbers to do things for the Common and hence for the Village. It also gives us the right to claim that we speak for a sizable number of local people when we try to negotiate for the conservation and enhancement of the Common.

As I have pointed out before, FONC have no special powers over the Common. The principal land owner is Sir Edward Dashwood, while the Bradenham Hill section is owned by the National Trust. As the Common is an SSSI, the public body "Natural England" has a role in preventing damage: its permission is needed for any action which might cause damage. It cannot force the owner to manage the Common in any particular way,

but it does provide guidance and, in some cases, financial support. Only these people can determine how the Common fares. However, it is clear from experience that there is a need for vigilance and we can make representations on matters of concern.

During the summer members of the committee have received enquiries and complaints about a range of issues and it may be worth mentioning them here in an attempt to encourage good practice.

Dogs. Obviously, common land is an ideal place for walking dogs and it is understandable that people see it as an area where their pets can run free. However, there are problems. One is that dogs foul the paths, especially near the entrances to the Common. Please try to encourage your dog to defecate well away from paths and bridleways and, if possible, please clean it up. If you do pick the mess up in a plastic bag please don't use it to decorate the bushes as, sadly, some do.

Another problem is that when dogs are allowed to run free they can do serious disturbance to wildlife. There have been cases of deer being killed and injured (there are roe and fallow deer as well as the ubiquitous muntjac on the Common) and dogs disturb birds that nest on or near the ground: for example robins, wrens, partridge and some warblers such as chiffchaffs, blackcaps and willow warblers. The numbers of willow warblers has dropped dramatically in recent years and this spring I heard only one singing. It should be possible to call off a well trained dog if it is harassing animals.

Dumping. It is illegal to dump rubbish on the Common. Garden rubbish is particularly bad because it risks introducing alien species into an SSSI.

Wild flowers. Someone was seen taking foxglove plants from the Common, presumably for their garden. Stealing wild flowers is illegal and you can be prosecuted if caught. In any case, it is unnecessary. Most wild flowers, including foxgloves grow readily from seeds and can be purchased cheaply. It is particularly mean to steal from common land where so many others can enjoy the flowers.

Mowing. It is understandable that people often mow the grass where their gardens abut the common, and some mow larger areas to keep the trees at bay or provide areas for children to play. Strictly, because the Common is an SSSI, mowing is not allowed, but there is a long tradition of mowing and the landowners have not intervened. What is not permitted is the extension of gardens on to the Common by erecting fences, planting garden shrubs and so on. If larger areas are mowed it is best to mow only once or twice a year, preferably in late summer, so that grasses and flowers have had time to release their seeds. In that way we will have species-rich open areas rather than the kind of grass desert to be found in urban parks.

You are very welcome on our 'Walks for Health' on the Mondays of 20th September; 18th October; 15th November and 20th December. All start from the Village

Hall at 10am. There will be a **Tree Identification Walk** on Sunday 5th September starting from the Village Hall at 10 am, led by Pete Legg, and another **Fungus Foray** on Sunday 3rd October starting from the Village Hall at 10 am. All free. Look out for our posters for more information.

Red Kites

David Leith wonders if there is enough carrion to maintain the local kite population. Almost certainly there isn't. A local gamekeeper tells me that all four lapwing nests on his shoot were predated by kites this spring and none of the young survived. This is a serious blow as lapwings are in decline. He has also seen kites taking young ducklings off the water. Three years ago I saw a kite attack a pigeon on the ground and most local keepers will tell you that kites predate young pheasants and partridges in the release pens. Farmers are no longer allowed to leave dead stock lying around their fields and the open rubbish tips which provided endless feed for kites in earlier times no longer exist. I suspect we'd have precious few kites were it not for their habit of taking live animals when carrion is scarce and for the sterling efforts of the residents who feed them. However in our regulation driven society even that probably constitutes unlawful disposal of food waste!

Scoop the Poop and be a Hero

Dog mess is the unpleasant but inevitable by-product of owning a dog and it is every owner's duty and legal responsibility to clean up after their dog. Whilst the *toxocara canis* infection from dog faeces is rare, it is still possible to become ill following contact, as well as being very unpleasant when faeces contaminate shoes or pram wheels.

Failure to clean up dog fouling is an offence in most parts of the district with a maximum fine of £1000. The council can also give offenders a £50 Fixed Penalty Notice rather than taking them to court.

The best way to clean up is use a doggy bag or carrier bag to pick up the faeces. This can be placed in one of the dog waste bins which are located in the most used areas of the district. It is also acceptable to place the waste, as long as it is wrapped, in litter bins or grey wheelie bins. The District Council has provided nearly 200 dog waste bins and they are also provided by some Town and Parish Councils.

If you want to take action against someone who hasn't cleared up after their dog, note the details of the offence as soon as possible – the name and address of the person in charge of the dog or their car registration details, a description of the dog, and the date and time and place. Contact the Council and ask for the Dog Warden who will follow the matter up. If you are not prepared to go to court we will still contact the dog owner and whilst we must have your details these will not be passed to the owner of the dog.

Free Poop scoops are usually available from Council Reception desks, including the main offices and those at Marlow and Princes Risborough. County Councillor's Report

Now that the majority of summer holiday are behind us we have the longer evenings and potential colder days to contend with and the problems with which they are associated. This was brought home to me by the county council's review of its salting and gritting programmes and the adjustments which may be made after last year's experiences. The transportation budget is under review yet again and prioritisation will be a difficult task. The Council is having a series of meetings around the County, called the Bucks Debate. We hope this might give a steer from the public, as to which services are regarded as essential and those which could be cut without too much pain.

My Community Fund is still intact and I am waiting for requests from local organisations that might need financial help in their voluntary efforts. Recently, Valerie and I were invited to attend the Guides boating or rather canoeing activities at Longridge, near Marlow. I had made a grant for waterproof equipment for kayaks. It was a wonderful opportunity of seeing what good use had been made of this money and to witness first hand the dedication of the Guiding leaders and Instructors and the enjoyment of the girls in their charge.

A recent survey of public concerns indicates that speeding traffic through our villages rates as the highest. It is also the hardest to control, as there are limitations as to what road engineering can be done to slow down drivers. There will be more frequent mobile speed checks, hopefully with a new site on the stretch of Main Road along by the Playing Fields. Sadly, from past experience at Widmer End many of the drivers caught exceeding the speed limit were local residents!

The County Council has teamed up with RELATE to offer counselling to victims of domestic violence. There has been an increase of 16% in the last two years in people reporting cases to the police, but there are still concerns that not enough are coming forward. This is an inclusive service for women and men seeking support around abusive behaviour towards them. This can be physical, sexual, psychological or emotional abuse, financial abuse and social isolation. Domestic violence can affect anyone and has a devastating effect on those who experience it.

Readers may feel this is not relevant to them but they may know of someone who could benefit from this confidential help.

District Councillor's Report

The challenge to deliver services for less continues. All Councils have to look at reducing cost, whilst preserving the cherished services enjoyed by many. Of course, the new Government has not wasted time in abolishing Quangos and cancelling or renegotiating on contracts. The waste has been unbelievable. I believe more challenges will materialise, particularly at Local level where the support grant from Government is being reduced further and the onus on delivering services is to sit with all of us under the "Big Society" agenda.

We await the comprehensive spending review announcement on 20 October for detail of the cuts necessary to get us back into the black. Locally, the unitary authority argument will arise again, albeit not for this Parliament at least. We also await the results from the Council tenants in the proposed transfer to a Housing Association, a very important change for Wycombe which will impact on the continued upgrading and maintenance schedule for Council tenants.

I am delighted that the next rescheduled resurfacing work on Junction 3-4 of the M40 will be implemented with a quiet surface replacement material. You may be aware that a proposal was put to Government last year for sound barriers and surfacing in order to reduce the impact of noise. This is good news after some 40-years waiting.

On 15 September, I will also be making a tour of the new facilities at the Swan Theatre, now that the refurbishment works have just been completed. I do hope that these improvements will help attract additional shows to Wycombe. I will also be attending the Battle of Britain service on 19 September.

Finally, have you ever thought about becoming a District Councillor? If you have, please call me as soon as possible as we are planning for the May 2011 election now!

Much of my working life was spent reviewing evidence and making judgements based upon it. It is hoped the Survey will be responded to in this way.

Neighbourhood Police News

Speeding:

The Roads Policing Unit has been active in the Kingshill area. It was found that the Missenden Road was a hot spot for speeding motorists and they have had a good success rate. Other locations were considered during the period that they were available but no enforcement was carried out due to lack of vehicle movement. The speed enforcement van has also been on location in Hughenden Valley, 15 motorists are now being processed. Section 165 seizures have also taken place on the Parish, these are vehicles that have been used on the highway without a minimum of third party insurance.

Police have also issued 2 section 59 warning letters to 2 local youths who had started to hang around the Kingshill common, they are playing loud music and dropping litter from their vehicles, in the early hours.

Litter:

Following last months report regarding the litter caused by the SKANSKA sub contractors, there has been a memo sent out to all the workers in relation to community awareness of this issue. This area of litter dropping will be monitored.

There is still an issue with certain areas on the Parish, where litter dropping is seen as the norm and that it keeps someone employed picking it up. There are litter bins close by but the offenders are too lazy to walk to them.

Parking:

The schools are due back within the next few weeks and there is great concern in relation to the Great Kingshill School. This is due to the ongoing road works outside, there is speculation that the contractors are running behind, by approximately 4 weeks.

New parking restriction lines have been installed in Ash Road, Walter's Ash following concerns of Pedestrian/Resident Safety for those attending the local amenities.

Other Matters:

There have been 2 reported Burglaries on the Parish in the last month. 1 was in Great Kingshill area and the other at Four Ashes. Please can I remind you to secure windows and doors when you leave the property unattended and that items of value are NOT left on view through windows.

There have also been reports that groups of youths in their newly acquired, modified vehicles meeting at open spaces in order to display their vehicles' ability. They wheel spin and race the vehicles around open spaces as well as having beat music turned up very loud. Please be aware of any spaces that would attract these youths and report them to the Neighbourhood team.

Hughenden Neighbourhood Action Group

As a reminder, the Hughenden Neighbourhood Action Group is a partnership of residents, residents associations, police and parish council. Its role is to focus on local issues related to crime and the fear of crime in the Hughenden parish area. Each year a questionnaire to determine the top three issues is completed by residents and this recently completed exercise identified speeding, litter and parking.

Various roads in the parish suffer from thoughtless drivers exceeding the speed limit, and considerable speeding data has been gathered by the Speed Reduction Working Group. The police are already focusing their attention on these stretches, and it is proposed that Community Speedwatch teams will be set up to reinforce the determination of residents to reduce the problem.

Many areas in the parish illustrate that to some littering is normal behaviour. Some parents no longer teach their children to keep the environment clean, so they become accustomed to the litter. The NAG is determined to improve matters and residents in the parish are being asked to remove any litter in the front of their property, as is done on the Continent. Together with street volunteers this should make a great impact. The argument that "I pay for this through the rates" is mistaken, as weekly litter picking of our streets would cost a fortune and the rates would increase accordingly.

Parking is mainly an issue around schools at peak times. Each problem school is being addressed individually in an attempt to solve its problems to the reasonable satisfaction of all stakeholders.



Friends of Naphill Common

Almost the whole of the present village of Naphill and a large portion of Walter's Ash stands on land that was once part of the Common. We know from maps and documents, summarised so well in Rex Leaver's excellent book *Naphill and Walter's Ash: looking back at village life*, how the present shape of the Common emerged. First, ancient encroachment formed islands of cultivation and pasture dotted with cottages such as those around Heysham, Walnut Tree Cottages, Vincent's Farm and Hunts Hill. Then, in the mid 1800s came the official enclosure which pushed back the Common to its present boundaries. It was at this time that the Main Road and its tributaries were laid out.

Clappins Lane, Stocking Lane and parts of Coombe Lane and Church Lane already existed. (Although the name 'Knaphill' is not recorded until 1599, 'Stokkynglane' appears on a document of the 1400s.)

However, there is still a lot that we don't know. The documents and maps don't tell us about the origins of the Common, its exact shape, how it was used or the details of the many encroachments. Where documentary evidence fails we can look for clues in the landscape and the Friends of Naphill Common would like to encourage people to try their hand at landscape archaeology. For example, we might try to trace the original boundary bank and ditch. There are traces of it behind some of the houses on the north east side of the Main Road – most obviously in the little meadow with a footpath next to Great Moseley Farm. Commons generally had funnel-shaped exits so that stock could be gathered before being taken off the common land. The last remnant of one of these exists as a hedge of hornbeam trees bounding the tapering gardens of the houses at the top of Stocking Lane.

There are tantalizing clues to other features. Before the Main Road was laid out around 1863 it seems that there was a road or track which followed the then edge of the Common. It ran from near the Wheel pub across what are now meadows between the present Main Road and Chalkpit Wood, joining Coombe Lane near Coombe Farm. Today there is a double hedge and other signs in the meadows which may tell us the path of the old track. There are clues showing that the lower part of the Crick has never been farm land, since its botany is closer to that of the Common. The fescue grass survives and until relatively recently there were harebells and gorse bushes. The part between the kissing gate and the Village Hall was a farm meadow until the early 1930s. It has quite different grasses and the line of the hedge can still be seen across the football pitch. If anyone is interested there is much more history to be discovered written in our village landscape.

Don't miss our Fungus Foray on Sunday 3rd October starting from the Village Hall at 10 am led by experts from the Bucks Fungus Group. Our foray last year produced 51 species including what may be a new variety related to *Otidea alutacea* (Tan Ear) – still to be confirmed by the experts at Kew. Even if you are not an expert – and I am certainly not - you will enjoy the walk. The Walks for Health all start from the Village Hall at 10 am. On Monday 18th October it will involve car sharing and the walk will be around Northend. On Monday 15th November it will again involve car sharing for a walk near Radnage. Both walks will be about 4½ miles and involve some steep climes.

Frank Munger - Obituary

Many thanks Trevor Hussey who spotted this The Guardian recently, reproduced here slightly abbreviated due to space constraints.

"Frank Munger, artist, born 2 May 1920; died 24 June 2010

The technical artist Frank Munger, who has died aged 90, specialised in cutaway line drawings of aircraft, their engines and missiles. His work was published in Flight International magazine for more than 40 years. Frank managed to make a seemingly complex subject readily understood, even down to the pilot's safety harness.

Using pen and ink on art board, he opened up aeroplanes, ranging from the lumbering Vickers Vimy bomber of the first world war to the supersonic Concorde. Frank's detailed knowledge of how aircraft were constructed was gained during the second world war when he was in the RAF.

He was born at Walter's Ash, near High Wycombe, Buckinghamshire, and attended Naphill primary school. He grew up with a passion for drawing, mostly

horses and internal combustion engines. He learned to dismantle and reassemble the motorbike engines of his friends and neighbours, and at the outbreak of the war was managing, without any formal engineering training, the servicing of food lorries.

He volunteered for the RAF, and, to his delight, was posted to a course for engine fitters at Squires Gate, Blackpool. Frank was then posted to a Vickers Wellington bomber squadron before moving in 1941 to Singapore.

By 1944 Frank was stationed at Guadalcanal, in the eastern Pacific, servicing Royal New Zealand Air Force Curtiss P-40 fighters. To his delight, these American-manufactured aircraft came with individual toolkits (British fighters came with but a spanner). After he contracted tuberculosis, he was sent home and, to his dismay, was invalided out of the RAF, having lost a lung.

In January 1945 Frank saw an advertisement for a junior artist's position at the studios of lliffe and Sons, near Waterloo station, London. Despite having no formal art training, Frank, having taken along his RAF notebook sketches, was accepted by Max Millar, the head artist. Millar knew that Frank's knowledge of aeroplane engines would be invaluable to Flight International's news of all the latest developments.

In the summer of 1945 Frank accompanied Millar to Rolls-Royce at Derby to help draw the new Griffon piston engine which powered the latest Spitfires. For Frank, it was the beginning of a 65-year relationship with the company. His first cutaway drawing of an aeroplane, the box-like Bristol Freighter, was published in March 1946. In 1955 he drew the Rolls-Royce Avon jet engine, which powered the RAF's Hawker Hunter fighter. He completed the full pencil sketch in just four days.

In the late 1950s Flight International published a series of "probe" drawings of the US's latest supersonic jet

fighters. With the manufacturers unwilling to divulge information, Frank and his colleagues gathered diverse snippets of data and production line photographs of the F-104 Lockheed Starfighter. His accurate deduction of how the jet was constructed led to an anxious call from the air ministry, demanding to know where he had obtained the facts about a supposedly secret fighter.

Frank retired in 1985 but continued to draw for publications. He also took up model engineering and watercolour and oil painting. A selection of his works now hangs in the RAF Museum at Hendon, north London. Frank left London and moved to West Hallam, near Derby, and joined the Rolls-Royce Heritage Trust. One of his last projects was helping to restore and test a Rolls-Royce Merlin engine. He won many awards from the Guild of Aviation Artists.

Frank was a quiet, unassuming man but at his studio desk, cutaway in progress, he always gave those interested a warm welcome. His skill with the pen, knowledge of what was needed and which details to omit, gave clarity and understanding to his drawings. He was once asked what makes a good cutaway artist. He replied: "An artist who really wants to know what goes on under the skin." He is survived by a son, Derek, and a daughter, Tricia. His wife, Helena, predeceased him."

Putting One's Best Foot Forward

I suppose that generally in life one takes one's feet for granted. Their construction is incredibly complicated but hugely effective and usually they just keep doing their bit, even when one often does not treat them with the respect they deserve. About two years ago I began to suffer from sore feet. Initially I thought that the problem would remedy itself. It did not do so and off to the Doctor I went. She diagnosed inflammation of the nerves and put me on a prolonged course of drugs. There followed a slow recovery, almost 2 years, until today I can walk normally and without pain. Marvellous, you may think, and indeed I accept that the improvement is most gratifying. There is just one problem, I am convinced that they are no longer my feet.

It seems to me that sometime during the last two years my own feet, veterans of running, rugby, cricket, tennis and squash, have been subtly removed and a second hand pair substituted. Surely my own feet must be lurking furtively, perhaps on the common. So please, if you are walking there keep a look out a pair of good looking feet, shoe size 9½ or 10 with a fine curved instep and brimming with foot power. You may think that this is a footling matter but I feel quite strongly about it.

Alternatively if anyone can suggest an effective way to integrate my new feet into my whole body system, I should be delighted to hear from them. And if it costs money to achieve this I will of course foot the bill.

Response to Hughenden Parish Council Article

Following the June Residents Association meeting report, the Gazette published a long letter from Hughenden Parish Council, accusing me (personally) of being "factually incorrect" and of "making insinuations about the correctness of their expenditure". To put the record straight, their letter requires a reply.

The item concerned was a routine, brief, factual report, as made by all village organisations, of items discussed at a meeting. HPC was mentioned in item (c).

The factual accuracy of the report can be verified by others who were present. Factual reporting is not "insinuation", as the Oxford Dictionary can confirm.

Taxpayers have every right to question council expenditure, especially at a time of national public expenditure reduction. A local council employee should not respond in this way to legitimate questions.

If HPC re-read the item more calmly, they will see that the point is not whether their expenditure against their budget or precept is accounted for correctly but whether the precept should be set lower in the first place.

Mrs Turner admits that "a Parish Council can request any amount of money from its District Council and under current guidelines it must be paid". This is exactly the point which was raised. It is misleading to say the HPC burial ground is a major cost as it is balanced by income from fees.

When we hear daily that huge organisations like Police and Armed Forces have to make savings of 25% or more by cuts in major costs areas such as headcount, pay, benefits and efficiency, it is inconceivable that HPC can find no savings.


Naphill Baby & Toddler Group

Part Two - Fete Side Story

In the slums of the upper West Side of Naphill two gangs exist. One, a gang of villagers from the neighbouring Lacey Green (mostly that drink in The Whip) called The Jets. The Jets compete with a rival gang of villagers from Naphill itself (some of which drink in The Wheel) who call themselves The Sharks. Each gang is in competition to "own" the village streets. Although both gangs sometimes get on together, for example at joint beer festivals, the tension between them is marked by their bullying and tormenting of one another in occasional charity summer pub cricket matches and other such events. After one of these matches, Riff, the leader of the Jets, suggests to his companions that they settle their differences with the Sharks once and for all by challenging them to a "rumble", which is their term for a tug of war at the annual Naphill Village Fete. The award is one of the most prestigious at the Village event, second only to Village Welly Thrower award. Although Riff warns that the Sharks may choose to just have a good old knees up at the Village Fete, the Jets are enthusiastic about his idea of a "rumble". For support, Riff meets with Tony, a former member of the Jets, who is like a brother, and who now works in the Naphill Co-Op store owned by good-hearted Doc. Riff asks Tony to attend a dance at the Naphill Village Hall, an area considered neutral territory where Riff can present the challenge to Bernardo, the Shark's leader. That evening, at the Village Hall where the dance is held, several members of both the gangs arrive. Everyone is told of the time and place of the tug of war by Tony. It will take place at the Village Fete in Naphill - at the 'crick' (An important such venue for these kind of events) in the third weekend of June 2011 at 3pm. Both the Jets and Sharks go searching for volunteers to help them set up the Fete, and for supporters to cheer them on, an important part of the "rumble". The village is awash with people from both sides, who watch the float procession – a customary event that takes place each year. After a few donuts, ice cream and a lump of candy floss, both teams sort themselves into position over the rope. The Sharks know that the secret of the "rumble" is good teamwork and a good rhythm rather than the overall strength of the team. This is unbeknown to the Jets who believe they can win through pure power. The rope and chalk are ready, as both teams take to the field in front of a packed crowd for the ultimate VillageFete showdown...

- (4) The Naphill Gazette is a monthly village newsletter, published, managed & delivered by volunteers, for the community, not a political, daily broadsheet.

County Councillor's Report

For those readers who may not be aware 2011 is the Census Year and will be held next March, I have been asked to inform the community at every opportunity the importance of completing the census form when delivered. A high response rate benefits the whole community because it directly influences central government funding and assists the council to direct resources where most needed.

The winter road gritting programme is now published. Priorities will be main "A" roads which give access to the emergency services. Other road categories will be cleared and gritted where they are needed for access to communities. This will not necessarily include bus routes. A register of four wheel owner/volunteers is being kept to take emergency workers to the hard to reach and disabled clients who rely on daily visits. Estate roads will not be gritted but salt bins will be kept filled for residents to use on road clearance, not for personal use.

In local government we are hearing much about the "big society"! This idea comes from the hope that there will be an increase in the voluntary sector to provide many of the community's needs. Self help has always been a feature of rural life but I am not so sure that urban areas have quite the same cohesion. Time will tell.

There is a certain gloom over county hall as the new cost cutting regime begins to bite. Unfortunately the council can only make real savings by cutting staff numbers but it is hoped that redundancies will be kept to a minimum by employees taking early retirement and many being redeployed to outside contractors. We will not know the true level of cuts required until the governments own review is completed and we know the level of grant support. This information, critical to our budgeting, will not be known until the end of November.

Some good news, I still have some of my Community Leader's Fund to allocate to local organisations who require support. I must have applications before the end of November.

District Councillor's Report

Whilst writing, it is just five days from the comprehensive spending review and with optimism we have to do all we can to deliver. If the coalition can get on with then that is a clear message. We must do the same.

We know the cuts are coming. I also know we have to deliver a zero per cent increase in the Council Tax for next year. This will mean a new mindset and changes to how we normally implement services. The voluntary sector will have more responsibility and the people power to implement change and take on services will be something I relish. I am hoping that the new Localism Bill will allow elected representatives freedom to speak for or against planning applications without prejudice and to work with the community to get stuck in and go for it,

such as the community shop in Hughenden Valley and our Post Office.

You may be aware that work is well underway to upgrade the train station and the building of a multistorey car park to coincide with the £250 million upgrade to the Chiltern line.

In late October, work will also begin to demolish part of the old Octagon on Abbey Way for the new 120 room Travelodge. The consultation on the stadium has had a very high response and with four weeks to go, there is little time left.

I expect to be attending Remembrance Sunday Services on 14 November, Special Council on 15 and the Regulatory and Appeals Committee on 22 November. The Chief Executive of Wycombe District Council will also be visiting the ward for a few hours on 2 December. Do you feel there are any opportunities or threats I could make her aware of? Or, you may be a business or community facility that would appreciate a meeting and/or visit?

Finally, I have some community budget left, which I need to allocate by the end of November. Please note I am unable to support the same organisation for two years. Please call or email at john_Gibbs@wycombe.gov.uk immediately if I can help.

Hughenden Parish Council

The Parish Council Planning Committee continues to meet every three weeks and to send its views to Wycombe District Council regarding planning applications. The number dealt with on any one occasion varies; on September 16th there were sixteen to consider and on October 7th the number was eleven. These applications come from all wards in the Parish and it is for ward members to give advice to the Committee in order to inform the response that is made to Wycombe District Council.

An application of particular interest to Naphill and Walters Ash was discussed last week. This was the application for a change of use from a car servicing and repair business to a jet wash ancillary to the existing petrol filling station and associated alterations at Walters Ash Service Station. The Council's response is given below.

The Parish Council objects to this change of use. The Car Servicing and Repair business employs several people and the proposed car wash would be self operating. The loss of the servicing and repair business would be a considerable loss to the community, as would any workshop facility. The car wash could result in considerably more traffic movements in an already congested area and the

extension of hours (the servicing business operates on shop hours - 8.30am to 6pm) would be inappropriate in a restricted area.'

Other advice given to WDC is outlined below:-

The Council strongly objects to the erection of a 1.8m high fence at 35 Vincents Way considering that the visual impact would be detrimental on the street scene in this rural location. The Parish has also strongly objected to the application for a garage and new access.

The Council also expressed a strong objection to an amended application at 238 Main Road, the ninth for this site, continuing to consider it is overdevelopment of the site.

There was no objection to an extension at Amble Cottage, Cherrycroft Drive, provided there is no intrusion on neighbours.

Neighbourhood Police News

Speeding:

Great Kingshill Residents Association organised a Community speed watch within the village. Police attended some of the locations to give support and safety advice to the residents. On 3 occasions the SID (speed indication device) was used instead of the community speed watch device. This experiment was seen as a possible way forward in the task of speed awareness. The speed watch device has in the past been borrowed from another Parish. By using the SID the community residents will have support from Thames Valley Police on every occasion. The speed being shown to the offending motorist allows extra time to prepare for recording the registration and speed of the vehicle.

The speed enforcement van has also been out and about in Naphill and Hughenden.

Litter:

The litter situation has improved slightly with the turn in the weather. There are fewer people out in the open air but the main source of the litter is that, from fast food outlets. It seems that it is now considered

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the NORM, to leave the empty containers outside the car door and drive off. If this is seen please contact the Neighbourhood team with any vehicle details and follow-up enquiries will commence.

Parking:

The Widmer End School has been highlighted as a hot spot for parking at picking up times. A questionnaire has been delivered to all the local residents and Police are awaiting replies, to gauge the level of intervention required. The Great Kingshill School parking situation has continued to be a problem, with cars now being parked further down Cryers Hill and blocking access to residents dwellings. The school travel plan are working closely with Bucks Highways and other partnership agencies in order to try and reduce vehicle use and thereby increasing the safety of the pupils.

Other Matters:

Cash Point Machines: In the past few months there has been a rise in the number of devices being placed onto cash point machines. These devices typically either swallow up your bank/credit card or copy the data from it. The device normally has a mini camera installed which also records your pin number as it is entered. An individual or team of individuals then recover the device, including your card and then proceed to use your card in another machine and withdraw cash. Please take care when using a cash point. Before inserting your card just have a look at the machine to see that all is in order. The devices placed onto the machine are very professionally made and mimic the fascia of the cash point perfectly. However a tell tail sign that a device has been fitted is that the profile of the machine sticks out more. If two cash points are situated side by side have a look at the other cash point for reference. The device is normally stuck down with double sided tape so don't be afraid to lightly tug at the machine by the card slot to ensure that nothing has been fitted.

Another scam employed by criminals is to place a

piece of plastic into the card slot so that when you place you card into the machine it jams in the slot. A "good Samaritan" then appears at your side claiming to have experienced the same problem and offers to help. The Samaritan will then convince you to enter you pin number in his/her presence as this was the solution to getting his/her card free. After a few minutes the Samaritan will then state that the machine has swallowed your card and that you should report it to your bank. When you have walked off the Samaritan will pull your card out of the slot and will then withdraw as much cash as possible.

Please also be aware of persons hovering around the cash point. Criminals are desperate to obtain your pin number and will shoulder surf you whilst you enter your pin and then try and distract you as your card and cash are dispensed by the machine. Whilst distracted, which may involve a criminal dropping a £5 note on the floor by your feet, his/her team mate will then grab your card and/or cash and walk briskly away.

Always cover the keypad with you other hand as you enter your number so that no one can see it. If you are with a friend or member of your family ask them to stand close to you as well. If you do come across a device fitted to a cash point then either alert the bank immediately or call the police.

A recent documentary on the TV highlighted very young Eastern European Children begging by cash points. These children then pester you as you recover your cash from the machine, make you confused and then grab your cash.

Community Speed Watch. PC Lee Turnham brought a Speed Indicating Device to our meeting and explained that in future CSW teams will include a PCSO and 2 volunteers. The PCSO will record the speed band into which each passing car falls, for police statistics, while one volunteer notes the registration number of each speeding vehicle that goes past, and calls it out to the second person who writes it down together with the time and speed. Warning letters are then sent to the car owners. Prosecution follows receipt of a 4th warning letter.

Locations are suggested by the public, but safety of the CSW group is a most important consideration in selecting the exact position for SID and the group. The number of locations at which speeds are monitored each month will depend on the number of volunteers.

It has been a busy year so far. Our Walks for Health continue to be popular and our Tree Recognition Walk on 5th September also attracted a

good number of people. The real surprise was that on a very wet Sunday 3rd October thirty brave souls joined our Fungus Foray. Adults and children, including one in a pushchair, kept the leaders busy identifying specimens. Eventually we will get a report from the Bucks Fungus Group telling us what was found.

On 28th September two of our members, together with John Morris of the Chiltern Woodlands Project, acted as guides for a tour of the Common by the Royal Forestry Society. They expressed fascination with our common and were particularly interested in the veteran trees and the surviving junipers. They gave us some useful advice about conservation and the names of experts who may be able to help.

Our working parties have cleared a few of the paths but it is a huge task. We have been keeping an eye on our four remaining juniper bushes which are struggling for survival. You may recall that the biggest and best of them was severely damaged by the snow just before last Christmas. We have propped it up on an A frame but it is now connected to its root by a narrow strip of bark. None-the-less, it is still alive and even managed to put on small lengths of new growth. It is a male and in the spring it produced copious amounts of pollen, which may indicate that it is in difficulties.

It is good to see the Common being used by various groups and societies. Earlier in the year there was a run which took in several paths. This was welcomed but less desirable was the permanent orange paint markings on the route. We have written to the organisation involved and asked them to use degradable marking.

Our Walks for Health all start from the Village Hall at 10am on Monday 15th November; and 20th December. We hope to organise more in 2011. Our AGM will be on Friday 21st January 2011 at 7.30pm starting with a cup of tea and a chance to see the entries in our photographic competition. There will be a talk on the archaeology of the Common and local woodland by John Morris of the Chilterns Woodland Project and author of *The Cultural Heritage of Chiltern Woods*. I hope you can come.

Do Woodpeckers Commit Peccadillos?

Yes, the plural of the last word above does end in "es", even if it looks wrong!

First, many thanks to the good folks who have in a humorous way, made polite enquiries about my current feet, which are in good fettle despite having usurped the privileged position of their predecessors! I was in fact changing my shoes - not my feet - in the kitchen during the morning of 13th October when I spotted a green woodpecker in the garden. Oddly enough I hear woodpeckers often in the woods but rarely see one there. However every October, at least one woodpecker visits my garden and does a grand job of clearing the lawn of ants eggs. Monday was no exception.

He (I think because the male is more colourful than the female) stayed on the grass for 30 minutes close to the house and I had the opportunity of taking a closer look at him using binoculars. A truly lovely bird and what a beak!

Our ginger cat Frazer took an interest in the wood pecker as it pecked furiously at the ants eggs but was clearly deterred from taking offensive action by the busy and aggressive beak. Meantime I timed his peckings at about 150 to the minute so in 30 minutes he ate about 4500 ant's eggs. I most certainly approved.

It did occur to me that a sore neck would pose serious problems for a woodpecker as it would inhibit its feeding. And, of course, woodpeckers are not covered by the National Health Service (yet). I wonder whether there is a venerable woodpecker with whom the younger element discuss such medial problems. Nature is quite remarkable but we would never know.

To my surprise the same bird returned in the afternoon of 14th October and spent another 30 minutes terrorising the ant population. Splendid! I would certainly forgive woodpeckers if they did commit trifling offences.

Whence My Muck?

I have been applying farmyard (ie cow) manure to my garden and allotment since 1979. A local friendly dairy farmer supplies a load weighing about 3.75 tons every winter. I used to believe that what the cows ate was grass, plus meadow plants such as buttercups from the farmer's fields. How wrong I was! Modern farming is done on a huge scale, with scientifically-calculated amounts of various types of feed to ensure the health of the animals and to maximise the production of milk.

I was given a guided tour of the operation by my friendly farmer. He has around 700 mouths to feed. The food is stored outdoors in a series of mountains. He feeds his cows with about 20 tons per day. I'll just repeat that, 20 tons per day. It is a huge operation.

When he showed me the various types of feed I was astonished. In winter months there are 13 types, as follows: silage made from his own maize; silage made from his own hay; imported soya beans; imported soya bean husks; oilseed rape meal; palm oil; wheat; urea; limestone flour; yeast and, finally, by-products from the food processing industry such as sugar beet shreds, biscuits and orange peel. The proportions of each are finely calculated to give the cattle just what they need in their diet for their health and milk production. In the summer months the cattle graze on fresh grass but are also fed the

above list of ingredients when they come in for milking. The water used for the cattle's diet comes from the farmer's own 300-feet deep borehole in the Chilterns, and the water's content of trace elements is known. It seems unlikely that my farmer's cattle will be suffering from poor nutrition with such a carefully-controlled diet. Just as important, the manure I spread on my allotment probably contains a wide range of nutrients. I have carried out soil analysis. My allotment soil is now rich in trace elements, shows no deficiencies and no toxicity to plants.

Now to another aspect. In a handful of soil there are over 6,000,000,000 species of micro-organism. The above list of ingredients includes imported items such as soya beans, soya hulls, palm oil and orange peel. Some of the other ingredients may also have been imported. Now, with soil microorganisms being so tiny and so numerous, it is inconceivable that all of them will have been washed off the imported ingredients. Thus soil micro-organisms from foreign lands will have been introduced into my allotment soil over a great many years. This is an extension of globalisation into unexpected areas. About 30 million tons of farmyard manure are produced in the UK every year, and most of that is spread on farmers' fields as fertiliser. Whilst one can only applaud that returning of vital trace elements and organic matter to the soil – and the consequent reduction in the use of man-made fertilisers – it does mean that foreign soil micro-organisms have been spread onto UK farmland for many, many years.

Now let us consider my compost heaps. All our kitchen vegetable and fruit waste goes into the compost heaps. Out-of-season French beans from Kenya, apples from New Zealand, South Africa and Chile, bananas from Africa, South America and the Caribbean – almost every continent has an input into my compost heaps and thus some foreign soil and soil micro-organisms are introduced into my soil. I don't know how they get on with the locals – maybe there is World War III going on down there. What I do know is that this mixing of soil micro-organisms from all over the planet is relatively new and there may be unavoidable consequences, whether good or bad.

So here I am on my allotment, practising no-dig gardening to help the soil micro-organisms flourish and, at the same time, introducing foreign interlopers and begetting unknown consequences. But the situation is even worse. At least 10,000 foreign plant species have been introduced into the UK in the past few hundred years, some edible, most decorative. Garden centres are full of them. In many cases they will have been brought in originally with soil round their roots – soil from all over the planet.

Thus foreign micro-organisms of all kinds will have invaded our soil. What damage will they be doing? We do not know, but we do know the dangers of introducing foreign animals and plants which have no natural enemies here. Muntjac deer from India are grazing freely in our gardens and on our allotments and multiplying rapidly. Japanese knotweed is an extremely vigorous and hardy weed. Grey Squirrels from North America are outcompeting our red squirrels. The worst example I have heard of comes from Australia. Not too long after the initial settlement of Europeans, someone had the bright idea of importing rabbits. The original 24 escaped and, well, bred like rabbits. With no predators the rabbits colonised all of Australia apart from the extreme north, where it was too hot for them. They ate everything – grass, weeds, bark of trees and bushes until there was little growing in much of that hot, dry land. The topsoil was only an inch deep, became like dust, and blew off into the sea! So most of Australia is now barren with no topsoil. It could take thousands of years to regenerate the departed topsoil. So, if a few rabbits can create such destruction what about foreign soil micro-organisms destroying domestic soil microorganisms? Are we doing irreparable damage to a vital part of our environment? We simply do not know. The world of the soil micro-organism is so vast, with 6,000,000,000 species in a handful of soil; we may never understand the role of all of them in a vital part of our eco-system.

Are foreign soil micro-organisms not the same as our domestic ones? I do not know, but since the continents split from one landmass into six distinct continents, evolution has caused the plant and animal kingdoms to be significantly different. Logically, evolution may have caused the micro-organisms in those six continents to be different. Now, when we introduce foreign plants and animals into other continents we can cause havoc. Perhaps the same is true with soil micro-organisms. The equivalent of a sabre-toothed rabbit micro-organism might be gobbling up our poor defenceless domestic friends as you read this article.

New Developments at Chinnor

An opportunity for some enhancements to the Chinnor & Princes Risborough Railway has come with the redevelopment of the former Chinnor Cement Works by Taylor Wimpey who is creating a new estate of some 178 homes.

Outcomes for the Railway from this redevelopment include a new car park – twice the size of the present one, ownership of the existing sidings, together with some additional land beyond the end of them.

This redevelopment has given the Railway confidence to plan and invest in the construction of a new storage and maintenance shed. For a number of years, the Railway had leased a shed on the cement works site but with the demolition of the works this facility was lost.

Subject to planning approval, the new shed will be purpose-built to meet the Railway's needs. It will include storage and engineering facilities which will allow engineers to work in the dry for the first time for a long while!

Railway Chairman, Roger Fagg, said: 'The redevelopment of the cement works and our working relationship with Taylor Wimpey has provided the opportunity for some important enhancements to the Chinnor site.

These will benefit the Railway for the long-term and make routine maintenance tasks a lot easier for our engineering team.

What SSAFA Did for Dad

Bill and Annie Harris live in Waddesdon. They are pictured holding an army dressed teddy bear which they won in a raffle at the Prestwood Steam Rally last July. The raffle took place at a stand run by the Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association, (SSAFA Forces Help).

"We always look for SSAFA because of what they did for Dad," said Annie.

The story of Alfred Brown, (Annie's father,) is remarkable. He was born in 1902 and died, aged 101, in 2003. In 1992 he was one of the 12 oldest people in the County featured in a DVD compiled by the Bucks County Museum. Each gave testimony on an aspect of their younger days. Alfred's was called "The Drummer Boy"

At the age of 14 he once went to a cinema in Aylesbury to see a war film. It included the story of a band boy who was honoured for his service. That did it. He only had some toy drums at home but he was going to be a drummer boy in the army. He found that the nearest recruitment centre was in Oxford so, without a word to his parents, he set out on the long walk.

He got as far as Dinton before being accosted by a policeman. He was told that he was too young for the army and that he would have to return to the police station at Aylesbury. With only a bicycle as transport the policeman had to persuade a drover to give Alfred a lift. The drover couldn't get his cart to the police station so he dropped Alfred on the edge of town and said that he could walk the rest.. Needless to say, Alfred didn't quite make it.

He did manage to get into the army - still slightly young at the age of 16. He eventually joined the Gloucestershire Regiment, later to become known as The Glorious Glosters

He served for 36 years in many different parts of the world, including Europe, inevitably, Egypt, India, Korea and China where he contracted an eye infection which was to dog him in his later years. Like most old soldiers he never talked about his war experience so the details remain unknown, even by his closest relatives

His story moves on to 1994, aged 92, when he was in hospital with no home to return to, for complicated family reasons. Bill and Annie were the only source of help, although they lived in a small, one-bedroomed bungalow. They agreed to take Alfred in, allowing him the use of the bedroom whilst sleeping on a settee, themselves. In the meantime they began to explore other sources of help and heard about SSAFA. They called the Aylesbury office and the charity responded very quickly with a visit from one of the 40 or so voluntary caseworkers who operate across Buckinghamshire..

From here things moved very swiftly. The caseworker secured help from Social Services in finding a small bungalow for Alfred near to Annie's home. After checking, in absolute confidence, his financial position, including his pension entitlements, he asked Annie to list his needs for furniture, carpets and equipment, including adaptations for the partially sighted. (By now Alfred's eyesight was poor enough for him to be registered blind.)

She was also asked to obtain quotations for the cost of these items. All Alfred's needs were met and his livelihood safeguarded for the rest of his life.

That's what SSAFA did for "DAD".

This is one small example of the kind of help SSAFA has been giving the Service community for 125 years. The work has now spread far beyond the veterans of 20th century wars and extends to all service and ex-service personnel, and their families, however long and however long ago their service. Of course this includes responding to the full range of the practical, financial and emotional problems which arise from operations in Afghanistan.

If any readers, in a private or professional capacity, hear of people who could qualify for such help they can be advised that an initial call to the following number is all that is required to obtain a quick, confidential response.

County Councillor's report

There are many changes taking place at County Hall, not least the re-structuring in the provision of services. Our staff consultation over the proposed new structure began on 19 October and will last until 17 January 2011. The 90-day period is due to the fact that over 100 staff across the council are facing redundancy. Within Transport for Buckinghamshire, we are proposing to lose 23 posts. Some of these are already vacant and others may be accommodated by individuals who wish to take early retirement, reduced hours or voluntary redundancy.

We are reshaping the teams who serve in the

Transportation Department from three areas into two – one north team and a separate south team. This will reduce the number of team leaders by one. We are also planning to halve the number of local area technician posts from 20 down to ten. There will inevitably be a reduction in the level of service, particularly as our localities staff progress to their new roles but we hope that readers will understand and bear with them as the settle into their new positions.

Nationally, people are being told they need to take greater personal responsibility as the Coalition Government battles with debts of epic proportions but Buckinghamshire County Council is at the forefront of rethinking how services should be delivered.

Feedback from the recent Bucks Debate, a programme of public events and online consultation, has helped inform the future budget process as the Council considers how 'the big society' concept comes into play at the local level.

A wide range of schemes supported or run by BCC, promoting greater individual responsibility, show that strong partnerships can encourage life-changing life choices. The ethos driving every scheme is a commitment to ensuring Buckinghamshire residents enjoy a high quality of life, living independently in their own homes as long as possible with access to stimulating activities and interests.

The perception of speeding along our village roads is being confirmed by recent data collected from monitoring devices that show passing motorists the speed they are driving at. When this is fully collated, the police will consider suitable sites for the mobile speed detector vans to be located. These are proving to be more effective than fixed site cameras. Readers will already be aware of the van at the junction with Bradenham Woods Lane at Walter's Ash. I was surprised at just how many drivers exceed the limit at this dangerous point.

The dumping of litter and garden waste on public – or indeed private – land is anti-social and the county has a very effective covert scheme to catch culprits and to follow up with effective prosecution. I notice continued dumping on Naphill Common, especially when it is within wheelbarrowing distance of adjoining properties.

Let us all hope that the New Year will bring with it the promise of better things and with less depressing news, although we will still have HS2 to worry about!

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking the many people who give of their time and energy to make our villages such a pleasant place to live. May I wish all readers a very Merry Christmas and a cheerful New Year.

I was very pleased to attend yet another excellent and

colourful bonfire night at the Crick again this year; it was even better that the rain stayed away with numbers looking quite healthy on last year. The Remembrance day services I attended at both Wycombe and Naphill were again very well attended and it was good to see so many of you there.

I have received many letters and calls regarding the planning application at Manor Garage. I have asked the Planning office to have this determined by the Committee if they are minded to approve this. I have also received a number of concerns regarding the stadium proposal. We now await the formal results from consultation.

Good news is that Wycombe have just been awarded the Purple Flag, a new national award for town-centres: this is similar to the Blue Flag for beaches and the Green Flag for green spaces. High Wycombe was one of only six towns and cities across the UK to be specially recognised for offering evening visitors an entertaining and safe night out. To win Purple Flag status, towns and cities must be welcoming to everyone, offer safe ways for visitors to travel home, provide a good mix of venues and attractions and appeal to visitors not just at night but during the day too. Purple Flag towns can expect to benefit from less crime and anti-social behaviour, and more visitors.

The Christmas Lights switch on will be on 18 November. Shoppers can benefit from free town centre parking in car parks owned by Wycombe District Council (off-street car parks only) on 18 November, 2 December and 16 December.

Finally, may both Julie and I wish you a Happy and Peaceful Christmas.

SPEEDING

Naphill and Hughenden Valley have seen visits from the mobile speed van since the last newsletter. The roads policing unit have now finished their high-profile enforcement in Great Kingshill and the results are being analysed, with a view to trying to obtain a certified location within the area.

The autumn has started to descend upon us and the nights are closing in. The leaves and other debris on the highway can cause terrible road surface conditions and we have already seen a few collisions within the parish. Please allow extra time for your journey and adjust your driving accordingly.

The SID device, along with a PCSO, will be out and about within the parish shortly. The intention is that there will be a location (ward) nominated for each week of the month. If a location is then deemed to require more visits, I am sure this can be arranged.

LITTER

As the litter situation with SKANSKA has not improved, I have asked the Parish Council to send a letter of concern to SKANSKA head office. There has also been a concerted effort in arranging for litter-pick days throughout the year. These will be advertised within the various resident newsletters. In Germany, the law requires that the house owner/occupier is responsible for removing litter outside of their property and to the centre of the road. While I am not suggesting that we have spies in the streets reporting everyone for the odd piece not picked up, it would be nice to see residents taking extra pride in the community and placing the litter in bins and not the street.

change and the others see no reason for change. The road reps for the school travel plan will now be making personal visits to residents to seek a way forward. Parking at Great Kingshill School has continued to be a problem, with cars now being parked further down Cryers Hill and blocking access to resident's dwellings. One of the Parish councillors has been working hard to work out a bus commute system that would benefit parents and other road users. He has been to see a system that has recently been rolled out in the High Wycombe area. The feedback has been encouraging. A letter has been produced and school pupils will hopefully be taking them home shortly.

OTHER MATTERS

There has been an increase in attempted burglaries across the parish, with offenders trying various methods to try to gain access. One notable attempt was the forcing of a timber front door while the occupant was home. The attempt was aborted when the front door chain stopped the offender. PLEASE remember to apply the chain, EVEN when you are up and about in your home. And remember to contact your Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators if you would like to purchase any small home security products.

Theft from motor vehicles has also been on the increase, with offenders being opportunist. They are checking vehicles on the off-chance that owners are leaving items on show and easily obtainable. Please ensure vehicles are secure and any items left in your vehicles are removed or out of sight. There is a Clear Car Campaign under way to draw attention to the pitfalls of leaving items in vehicles. Should you wish for more information please contact the Neighbourhood team.

We have some good news about the Common. The photographs shown here were spotted at Pam Smith's recent exhibition. They show the Clumps as they were just over 100 years ago: circular banks lined with trees, in open grassland. Since then, the inexorable spread of scrub and trees has engulfed them and today it is difficult to pick them out from the woodland. They were once significant and popular features of the Common, even to the extent of being photographed and made into postcards. It occurred to us that it would be good to restore one or more of them to their former glory.



Fortunately the Clumps are on that part of the Common owned by the National Trust, and their

Gardens and Landscape Manager, Neil Harris, is someone who cares about the local area and the value that the Common has for our community. He has agreed to cooperate with the Friends of Naphill Common in a project to clear around at least one of the Clumps and restore it as an attractive feature. There are five clumps in all and, if the project is successful, we may extend our efforts to others.



During the coming months we will be organising working parties to clear the scrub. They will be on Sunday mornings: 28 November, 12 December, 2 January, 16 January and 30 January. Meet at 10am at the Common end of Forge Road. Each will last up to three hours but obviously volunteers can leave earlier if they wish. We can provide a few hand tools. So, if you would like to be involved, please contact a member of the committee. It is a big undertaking and we would like combine it with a continued programme of clearing paths. We are insured for the use of hand tools but if chainsaws are needed the work will be done by the National Trust.

Dear Editor

We ask for correction of recent statements by the Gazette. Our Committee is concerned that both you and Sheila Draper have described reports of Residents Association meetings as "political" and unsuitable for publication. We are not political, but by definition Parish, District and County reports are political.

The Association has been part of village life for 40 years or more. Its Constitution specifically states: "The Association is not a political body and shall at all times remain free from political bias." It does not discuss or take part in politics. People who work hard for the village are offended by reports of their work being dismissed as "daily political broadsheet" material and censored. To avoid political bias, under the Constitution, members of local or national government bodies may not be office holders.

A key objective in the Constitution is: "To provide a focus for action by residents in defending the interests of Naphill and Walter's Ash." (the only body set up to do so). This often involves upholding Green Belt/AONB policies and opposing development.

On more significant threats, we avoid being divisive (as you and Sheila suggest) by convening public meetings where residents can exercise a democratic vote.
