There have been two meetings of the Naphill Village Hall and Playing Fields Council since my last report in the December/January Gazette which seems so very long ago. Christmas seems to completely alter the passage of time.

We have a long list of maintenance items and improvements that we would like to make to the Hall and so a sub committee has been set up to prioritise these. All the organisations involved have been asked what improvements they would like to see and these have all been taken into account. High on the list is getting the roofs made watertight and investigating the installation of a hearing loop. We have yet to ascertain how complicated this installation might be but I know that this would be welcomed by many regular hall users. I will keep you informed of our progress in this matter. We are also hoping to get motion sensor lights outside the hall entrance so there will be some illumination when people are entering and leaving. We hope that these will be installed by the time you read

this. We have upgraded the Wi-Fi signal to the hall so that this will now extend into Bon Ami. We have bought new crockery for the Village Hall so there now should be 100 of everything.

Philip Hussey attended our December meeting to receive a gift of thanks for all his hours of work creating the Village map. This is a great addition to the Hall wall and we do thank him profusely for his skill and dedication in producing this work of art. If you see him in the woods do admire his posh new wellies which were his gift from us and so very necessary in the present weather conditions!

After Peggy's letter of "concern" at our marking in the Best Kept Village competition we were awarded an extra 10 marks which brought us up to the level of being Highly Commended and the resulting certificate is now displayed in the Hall. Thanks to you all for your work in keeping the village clean and tidy.

The Christmas Fayre was a great success making a good boost to our funds. All the stalls were sold and provided a good array of different and interesting Christmas gifts. Many thanks to Cathryn for all her hard work.

Napfest will on the weekend of the 5th, 6th and 7th of June and will follow a similar pattern to last year with a concert on the Friday night (pray for lovely weather again), the fete on the Saturday and then the classic car event on the Sunday. Friends of Naphill Common

You will be very welcome at our Open Meeting on Friday 13th February in Naphill Village Hall. Doors open at 7.30pm. Our main speaker is Charles Kent who will talk about 'Farming in the North Dean Valley'. The meeting is also our AGM so there will be some business which will be kept to a minimum, but you will be able to vote in a new committee including a new chairman. We would very much welcome your comments on what we have been doing and suggestions about what activities and events you would like us to undertake during the coming year. The Common is presently in quite a mess after the felling and widening of the main rides, so there is plenty to discuss.

We have been very fortunate in receiving an offer from John Shaw of the Chiltern Rangers who are willing to undertake tasks on the Common. The Rangers are a social enterprise group involving young people, founded by John and Tony Speight, and funded by the Bucks County Council. John Shaw will be at our Open meeting and will give a short talk on the Rangers and what they can do.

Our walks continue throughout the year. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3

hours) on the third Monday of each month, and has given the following list of dates: 16th Feb, 16th March, 20th April, 18th May, 15th June, 20th July, 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Our working parties will continue to open up the paths and clear scrub.

I am interested in collecting together information about the history of our common, which in turn involves the whole village. If anyone has information beyond that in Rex Leaver's excellent book and the little book by Ron Piercy about the Village Hall, I would be very grateful to hear about it. Perhaps someone out there has done some research and would like to see it made available to the public. Please let me know.

The state of the Common has already been mentioned. Perhaps it was inevitable that removing timber in foul weather would produce some ruts and mud. We must hope that, with the extra light now able to reach the soil, the vegetation will quickly return and cover the scars. The Friends of Naphill Common will do all it can to help the healing process.



Her wish was that there should be a 'Celebration of Life' where all her family and friends would gather to do just this. On Monday 22 December we all gathered at Naphill Village Hall. The hall was packed to overflowing.

We listened to music and watched videos chosen by Lynn, depicting her life. Her closest friends and family spoke about Lynn and Aaron, a family friend, read the speech which Lynn had written prior to her death, to be read at this event. Everybody was invited to go across to The Wheel where there was the opportunity to reminisce further, to raise a glass and enjoy the buffet laid on by Claire and her staff. Very special thanks to Claire who gave up her very last day off before Christmas to organize this.

I should like to thank everybody for their support, the cards, the flowers, the gifts and the donations in memory of Lynn. This has been a traumatic time and so I will be taking a break from 7th February until 23rd February. I am very sorry for any inconvenience this might cause but I trust that you will understand that this is a much needed holiday. The Saturday opening hours have also been revised and we will now be opening from 8.30am – 4pm. Of course life without Lynn at Shear Madness will never be the same but I am endeavouring to make it BUSINESS AS USUAL and I look forward to welcoming our customers both old and new.

Christmas Tree Lights

The team hope you all enjoyed the lights, which were on from 29th November to 5th January. The lead climber was Mike Leggett and up on top of the cherrypicker was its driver Mark Blamey from Saunderton. Also on high on the cherry-picker was Stephen Fountain of Widmer End for putting the lights up and Kevin Oxnard for taking the lights down. The team on the ground comprised Gary Putnam of Lacey Green, John Harris, Ron Collins, Terry Aldridge, Peter Brown, Peter Davis, Neil McMinn and myself. I should point out that the three members from outside Naphill all have Naphill connections: Mark Blamey's grandfather and uncle used to live in Naphill; Gary Putnam used to live in Naphill and his brother-in-law is Stephen Fountain. We are extremely grateful for their help in making our tree such a spectacle. We are also extremely grateful to Arbourtech Services of Downley Road who provided the cherry-picker free of charge once more.

This was the sixth year we have used the "new" LED lights (light-emitting diodes) and the garlands which have 40 sockets on each. There are a total of 5,390 LEDs providing the spectacle, including 350 in the sphere. So far the equipment is standing up to the harsh environment reasonably well. About 4 to 6 percent of the bulbs need replacing each year and

a few garlands are damaged by the stormy winds. Neither the manufacturer nor ourselves knows what the long-term reliability will be as the equipment is so relatively new.

The weather for putting up the lights on 29th November was exceptionally good – a brief window in between periods of really awful weather; we were extremely lucky. However, when we were half-way through taking down the lights on 17th January it started to snow, but all went well. The team was fortified by sandwiches brought out at half-time by Claire Christian from "The Wheel". Marlène Mason provided the essential mince pies, tea and coffee and, as last year and at the special request of Ron Collins, the hot mince pies were dosed with whisky.

Cathryn Carter distributed the collection tins in the village shops. Royal Air Force High Wycombe made a donation of £200 for which we are very grateful. We are most grateful to the village organisations which made collections and YOU, the public, who contributed to the collection tins. Without funds coming in to pay for replacement bulbs, garlands and other equipment, plus the insurance for the operation, plus the electricity, we could not brighten everyone's Christmas in the way we do. Thank you.

Thank You for Our Christmas Tree Lights

Once again, we were all delighted to see our spectacular tree lights this year. So many people have commented on how wonderful they always look, and how the tree reminds them of a giant Christmas pudding!

A Personal Perspective

This is probably the last insight into the life of one Parish Councillor, apart perhaps from further ones that might encourage you to put yourself forward in the elections that will take place in early May. This has been a repeated theme in various 'personal perspective' articles over the last four years.

I'd like to inform you that I will not be standing in May for re-election as a Councillor. It's been a hard decision to make, and I thank you for the general support I've had, particularly on certain initiatives. However, there are a variety of other things which have not received their fair share of my time. I will continue to ensure that the build-up to elections, whether contested or not, will run smoothly and will hope for the active support of many parishioners. I hope that this article will help you to understand the reasons for my decision, and why I still recommend that everyone should seriously consider putting their name forward as a possible Parish Councillor in the forthcoming elections.

There are a number of reasons I believe you might consider if you want to find out more about being a Parish Councillor. Not the least is the fair distribution of public money, on which decisions can be made on behalf of the local community. In addition, the collective voice of the whole Council can often be helpful in encouraging other organisations (Wycombe District Council, Transport for Bucks, Bucks County Council, for instance) to consider action which we believe will be in the best interests of our community. You would also learn a little of how 'local government' works, and be part of the 'democratic process' which is at the heart of much that we cherish, even when our personal view is not always that of the majority.

There can, of course, be disadvantages. Allocating a fair share of time to family, work or other interests is not always easy, and has probably been the main reason why we've lost some of our other councillors over the years. I'm no exception to those conflicts of time, and will continue to work for the interests of Hughenden Parish, and for Naphill & Walter's Ash Ward in particular, until the elections.

A Letter from our Methodist Minister

Dear Friends,

It can be a tricky conversation to tell someone something about their character or their actions that clearly they don't recognise in themselves.

In our bible study we looked at the book of the prophet Amos, whose doubtful privilege was to tell the Israelites how displeased their God was with them. But Amos wisely started with the surrounding nations one by one, telling the Israelites how displeased God was with the wicked political and military actions of those foreigners. The Israelites undoubtedly recognised the well-known dastardly deeds of their neighbours, and no doubt cheered when Amos roundly condemned each one. And probably a specially loud

cheer for the criticisms of Judah, their fellow Israelites, with whom they had fallen out years ago. Then smugly they expected in contrast his praise for them, God's chosen people. But instead Amos criticised their hypocrisy and religiosity, their wealth gathered at the poor person's expense, their manipulation of the law courts, acceptance of bribes, and their complacent refusal to recognise the signs already sent by God. Amos prophesied their doom. They did not change their ways, and 20 years later they were destroyed by the Assyrians.

There's a lot to be understood from that story, but it illustrates the human tendency to see other people's faults more easily than we see our own. Although our own press can be quite disparaging about this country, few of us bother to read what is written about us in the foreign press. What would they know anyway? And who cares what they think?! But we have a valuable proverb: The onlooker sees more of the game. The slightly deviant version says: The crowd sees more than the ref.

Most of us could offer an opinion about the goingson in distant places or in other people's lives, but we rarely appreciate their opinions of us!

Yet deep down, most of us want to be doing the right thing, (which is not quite the same as wanting to be seen to be doing the right thing!). Those of us of faith define our "right thing" by the morality expressed in our religion. Those of other religions or of none still have a sense of right and wrong, and still get a troubled conscience from time to time. But all of us can be blind to our shortcomings, and need an onlooker or an Amos to open our eyes to ourselves. And even then, sometimes we cannot bring ourselves to see ourselves as others see us, let alone how God might see us!

During February we begin Lent: with fun and feasting on Pancake Day, but with more seriousness thereafter. A season of self-examination. A prayer that God might open our eyes to ourselves, before we should open our eyes to the world around us.

May you see more of the "game".



Dear Parents / Supporters,

Until the end of last term, Naphill and Hughenden Scout Group consisted of 2 Beaver Scout Colonies, 2 Cub Scout Packs and 2 Scout Troops. Unfortunately, due to a lack of adult volunteers, the hugely popular

It is wrong to assume that the only people to suffer in this situation are the Hughenden Cubs directly affected. In reality the repercussions will be felt throughout the whole Group.

Hughenden Cub Scout Pack closed at Christmas.

Even before the closure, Naphill Disraeli Cub Scout Pack was already at maximum capacity while feeding only from Naphill Beavers. Between them, the 2 Colonies generate in the region of 24 Cubs each year. Take one Pack out of the equation and the pressure for places on the remaining Pack will be immense.

At the other end of the age range, transferring to Scouts, the result will be the reverse. Without its main source of recruits, numbers will dwindle drastically for Hughenden Scout Troop and Naphill Scout Troop also will be affected.

Equally, parents of prospective Beavers will become aware that by joining Hughenden Beavers their child will have less chance of progressing to Cubs, which will inevitably add to the already massive waiting list at Naphill Beavers, which already results in some children reaching 8 years old before even getting into Beavers.

For the reasons outlined above, It is vital that the Group maintains 2 Cub Scout Packs.

To do this we urgently need volunteers to step forward as Uniformed Leaders.

The more people who do step forward, the more the workload and responsibility is shared. Training and support will be provided, both at District/County and Group level. You won't be on your own. No previous experience is required to become a Cub Scout Leader, only enthusiasm and a sense of humour!

Until its closure, the Hughenden Pack met on a Wednesday evening at Hughenden Village Hall. This time-slot remains available but if it proves a stumbling block to prospective Leaders, it could be possible for the Pack to switch to a Monday evening at Naphill HQ.

Experience shows that the longer the time lapse, the more difficult it becomes to reopen a Cub Scout Pack. Parish Council Elections May 2015



However it is important to note that both your Proposer and Seconder must be registered electors living in the parish for which they are proposing you.

If you are interested in becoming a Parish or District Councillor you can Google the Electoral Commission Website for all the basic information. Deadline for Nomination Papers to reach Wycombe District Council is 4pm on 9th April 2015.

Several of the present parish councillors, for personal reasons, will not be standing again in the May 2015 elections. If you would like to serve the community as a Parish or District Councillor for the next 4 years, nomination papers will be available in due course. The more nominations the better!

Hughenden Parish Council Report

Happy New Year.

2015 will potentially see big changes in the political landscape as the General Election looms in May. However, we must also not forget that there will once again be elections for the Parish Council. As Roger mentions elsewhere, this will be an opportunity for those interested in helping the Community to put their names forward for election as a Parish Councillor. To help any who may be thinking of standing to understand what is involved, the Council are holding a 'meet and greet' evening at Naphill Village Hall on 17th April. Please do put it in the diary and we look forward to seeing you there.

The saga of the allotments rolls on with more twists and turns than Alton Towers. The process of transferring the ward allotments to the ALfP charity has been put on hold whilst the Charities Commission decide what to do next in the light of objections to the constitution they had put forward. Allotment site representatives are being kept informed of developments. From the allotment holder's point of view, this does not in any way affect their ongoing rentals.

There was a good response, the second time around, to our recent questionnaire and we are in the process of analysing the results. We expect to be able to give a flavour of these in the next newsletter.

The Council has now formally approved the precept for 2015/16. This is the amount it requests from Wycombe District Council to add to receipts from the Garden of Rest and the allotments to balance the spending budget and is raised through Council Tax. After three years of no increase, it has been decided to increase the precept from £154,710 in 2014/15 to £177,280, a rise of 12% or just over £5 per household. This might seem strange under current constraints, but we have started to get money flowing back into the community through grants and loans. The Council has determined that this should increase next year and we should support more projects around the Parish that can benefit the various organisations and facilities that do so much for Parishioners. It also has to take account of election spend by WDC that is allocated to Parishes and increased running costs generally. Even at this level though, Hughenden Parish Council remains one of the lower precept costs per household in the District.

Bradenham Parish Council Report

Happy New Year!

At its January meeting the parish council was grateful that one of the Walter's Ash residents was able to give the council a verbal report on his progress and ideas for increasing the safety for pedestrians at the junction of Bradenham Woods Lane/ New Road/Main Road in Walter's Ash. Various options were discussed at

the meeting and our County Councillor, Carl Etholen, offered to take the matter up with Transport for Buckinghamshire to have a survey undertaken as an initial consultation. How this will be paid for has not yet been decided or agreed. We were asked to include a second survey on crossing Main Road by the school in our request, but this is in Hughenden Parish. We will contact Hughenden Parish Council and await their response.

You will have noted that the centre white lines in Bradenham village have now been covered with black strips, they had been accidentally placed through the village. The covering is not ideal and somewhat messy, but it has been decided to leave the matter. Having the lines burnt off, would be prohibitively expensive, although the parish council had been perfectly clear in its request not to have the white lines replaced.

The parish council is supporting the R.A.F. in their pursuit of reducing the speed limit on New Road from 40mph to 30mph.

The design for an entry gate to Bradenham Village has at long last been agreed with Transport for Buckinghamshire and the National Trust, we hope to have it in place in a few months.

Flooding on Rectory Lane in Bradenham is a continuing problem and again our County Councillor offered to take this up with Transport for Buckinghamshire as we are not making any progress.

The parish council set the budget for 2015/16, again it includes an amount of money to pay for traffic calming. It was agreed to keep the precept the same at £7000.

Our next meeting will be Monday 2 March at 7.00pm at Bradenham Cricket Club.

WHY?

If you have a squeamish disposition you had better stop reading this now.

Queen Victoria, on being informed that she shared a common ancestry with a monkey, is reported to have been "not amused". She would have been even less amused had she learned that she had ten times as many bacteria in her body as human cells. And what goes for queens goes for the rest of us. Yes, the boffins have been at it again and have calculated the number of bacteria we are carrying around at about 100 trillion, that's a 100 million million or 100,000,000,000,000,000,000 or 10^20. That's quite a lot. Most of them are in our stomachs and small intestines where they do a great job in helping us to digest our food. There are probably 180 species on the skins of our upper arms and hundreds of species in the large intestine. They are everywhere. There is no point in trying to wash them off – we need them. We humans are perambulating ecosystems. We depend on them and they depend on us. So we have to keep them happy. We have to feed them with what they need or there will be trouble. Which brings me round to modern diets, something I have touched upon in earlier articles.

About 2% of the food we eat in the UK is organic. That means that 98% is not organic and contains all manner of residues from pesticides, herbicides, fertilisers and possibly hormones. The long-term effects of consuming these chemicals are not known, nor are the effects of consuming cocktails of these chemicals. So our 1020 bacteria are at risk.

Now back to the title of this article, "Why?". Why do we lucky few grow our own vegetables and fruit in our gardens and on our allotments? Apart from the monetary aspect and the great benefit of eating really fresh food, there is the possibility of eating truly organic food. Food sold under the organic label in shops can have been sprayed by up to seven different chemicals by the farmer and still meet "organic" criteria. United States regulations permit 38 different synthetic materials to be included in organic food and for the food still to carry the "organic" label. The proportion of synthetic material can rise as high as 5%. As for genetically-modified organisms (GMOs), the EU regulation states that crops can still retain the "organic" label even if they contain genetically-modified material so long as the proportion of genetically-modified material does not exceed 0.9%. That may be being realistic but it makes a mockery of the label "organic" as something supposedly wholesome and pure.

The average person in western Europe carries at least 30 man-made chemicals in his or her body. Isn't that horrifying? We did not intend to ingest those chemicals and we certainly did not vote for them. By growing our own food we can attempt to avoid those 30 chemicals - to protect ourselves and our 10^20 bacteria. But also, we can tackle an even more fundamental problem – nutrition.

It has been estimated that one third of the people in the UK are suffering from malnutrition. It could be one third of the readers of this article. I hope it isn't me. It is very difficult to detect when someone is suffering from malnutrition, but when one goes down with a recognised medical complaint it could be found, only at that point, that malnutrition was a contributory factor. Severe deficiency of vitamins or trace elements can lead to specific complaints, such as children being born to iodine-deficient mothers often having a low IQ. The cost to the NHS in the UK of dealing with poor dietary habits is £6 billion each year – much higher than the annual cost of smoking which is put at £1.5 billion. One of my personal pet theories, with so many overweight people around, is that they are not finding adequate amounts of vitamins and trace elements in their food so are compensating by eating more and that is a contributory factor to the plague of galloping obesity afflicting the nation. Obesity in adults was predicted to rise by 38% between 2003 and 2010 hence the word "plague".

So, in our gardens and on our allotments, how can we improve the situation with regard to nutrition? Initially, our soil may be impoverished. British farmland has lost about 40% of its trace elements since the Second World War, probably because trace elements have been taken up by the crops and not fully replaced by the return of compost and manure. Between 1980 and 1995 the percentage of soils classed as low in organic matter in the UK rose from 35 to 42 %, mainly because of the overuse of fertilisers and pesticides and the failure to apply enough compost and manure. Our gardens and allotments may have been farmland or may be impoverished for other reasons. The answer, therefore, is to ask a local farmer to deliver large quantities of farmyard manure every year and then to apply it progressively around our vegetable and fruit plots so that, after say three years, all areas have been covered and the first areas can be covered again in the fourth year. What this means is that the precious trace elements from the farmer's fields will be imported into our gardens and allotments together with humus to improve our soil so that our plants can thrive - and contain plenty of trace elements for ourselves and our 10²⁰ dependants.

Of course, by looking after number one in this way we

are being rather selfish. What about the rest of the population who eat supermarket food? All we can do is to draw their attention to the problem in the hope that public pressure will, one day, force the politicians to do something about the situation. Pass this article on!

So, now that you have read this article, why not eat a nice juicy and hopefully truly organic apple, and think of the 10^20 mouths you have to feed. Perhaps you have never thought of yourself as one huge perambulating ecosystem!

It is amazing the number of maintenance jobs that we need to get done before we can start to spend money on upgrading the facilities at the Hall, from tuning the piano, filling in the gaps in the hedge alongside the road, to replacing broken tiles on the roof to mention just a few. However we are determined to upgrade our facilities and have taken on board all your suggestions, some of which we are able to action shortly whilst others will have to wait a little while longer.

Top of our list is to install a hearing loop in the hall and have accepted a quote to get this work done. At the same time they will sort out the CD system and put in something that is Bluetooth and iPod compatible. We have also asked for a quote for installing a hearing loop in the small hall and will let you know how that goes.

Other jobs are marking out a third disabled parking space alongside the current two and putting up another handrail to make access to the small hall from the kitchen easier. We are purchasing a new fridge freezer and the carpet in the entrance hall is due to be laid in half term. We are also getting quotes to replace the warming cupboard in the kitchen.

The willow tunnel in the play area is in need of regular pruning and tying back and this is becoming beyond the budget of Hughenden Parish Council who have been responsible for its maintenance up to now. They have asked us if we can find some volunteers to help with this. They will be given thorough training on how best to prune and tie back the tunnel, how regularly and at what time of year it needs doing. Could you help us with this? It will obviously only be for a few hours over the year but it is sad to see the tunnel becoming so overgrown. YOUR PARISH NEEDS YOU! BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

In May 2015 Hughenden Parish has the opportunity to elect a new parish council. For you that means that as a resident of the Parish you might like to consider standing, upholding democracy and helping make the Parish a better place.

You do not have to be a member of any political party. Indeed on the contrary good parish councils are concerned with local community matters and not politics. Parish councils are democracy on your doorstep and the following might help you to understand what being a parish councillor means on a daily basis and to encourage you to stand for election.

What is a Parish Council?

There is a common misunderstanding that parish councils are something to do with church administration - they are not. Parish councils are the elected first layer of local government and, as such, are closest to the electors. The next levels are the district (Wycombe District Council) and county (Buckinghamshire County Council). Parish councils are funded by a precept (that is an amount levied on the council tax you pay and for this Parish is currently a total of £177280 p.a.) and take responsibility for a whole range of local matters and community needs, such as allotments, playgrounds and the maintenance of local facilities under the council's control including recreation grounds, a cemetery, woods, ponds and bus shelters. Beyond this, they identify, support and manage local project initiatives and can fund grants to local organisations such as youth clubs and charities. Parish councils are consulted by the district council over matters such as planning applications in the parish

Hughenden Parish Council is one of the largest rural parish councils in the county, is divided into 4 wards (Great Kingshill, Hughenden Valley, Naphill/Walters Ash and Widmer End) and is made up of up to 15 elected councillors.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

By becoming a parish councillor you become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support. A community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped make, is

something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride. The role is a voluntary and unpaid one.

Anyone, from any background, who is eligible can be a Parish Councillor. Groups made up of diverse individuals tend to make better informed decisions. So it is important that councils have councillors who not only reflect and represent the communities they serve, but also have a broad range of skills and life experience. You don't have to be highly educated at all or have a trade or profession. Skills gained through raising a family, caring for a sick or disabled relative, volunteering or being active in faith or community groups can be just as valuable.

How much time does it take up?

Hughenden Parish Council meets on the second Tuesday of each month for its monthly full council meeting, to which members of the public are always invited. Meetings may last two or three hours, depending on the agenda set for the meeting to discuss. In addition you may be expected to be a member of at least one of the council's three standing committees to deal with specific subjects, such as finance, planning or environmental issues. In addition to these regular meetings you may be required to attend other meetings representing the council such as acting as a representative on a residents association. These meetings won't happen every day, so it's not going to take over your life but on average you may need to spend 3 or 4 hours each week and maybe a bit more. Obviously there are some councillors who spend more time than this – and some less, but in the main, being a parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community and helping to make it a better place to live and work. Council meetings are always held in the evening – as are most meetings of the other groups which councillors attend on the Council's behalf

What do parish councillors do?

Councillors have three main areas of work:

- Decision-making: through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
- Monitoring: councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
- Getting involved locally: as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their parishioners and local organisations. This often depends on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

Training can be had and you get great support from the Parish Clerk and his staff.

How long does a parish councillor serve for?

Once elected, parish councillors sit on the council for a maximum of four years. If they then want to stay in the post they can stand for re-election.

Am I eligible to be a Parish Councillor?

To stand for election on a parish council, you must:

- be a UK or commonwealth citizen, or;
- be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, or;
- be a citizen of another Member state of the European Union;
- be a least 18 years old.

To be eligible to stand for an election for a particular parish, you must

- be an elector of the parish, or;
- for the whole of the previous 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish, or;
- during the previous 12 months have worked in the parish (as your principal or only place of work), or;
- for the whole of the previous 12 months lived in the parish or within three miles of the parish boundary.

Interested?

The best way to find out what it's like to be a Parish Councillor is to telephone or meet with me as the Parish Clerk or talk to someone who's doing it now. Come along to a parish council meeting, speak to one of the councillors and find out what they think of the job.

If you want to become a parish councillor there are two things you need to do: get yourself nominated and get voted in at the election. If you choose not to stand as councillor please urge someone else to do so and remember to vote in any case. As the retiring Chairman I would like to thank all of these good folk for what they will do over the coming year, and the past committee members including Steve Roderick, Stephanie Morgan, David Greenwood and Daisy Leek for all the work they did during the past years as we struggled to build the Friends of Naphill Common. There is another person who must be thanked – Rachel Sanderson of the Chilterns Commons Project whose help has been invaluable.

Wessex Woodland Management, which is undertaking the felling on the Common, has contacted us to say that they intend returning soon to finish removing the felled trees and to mulch the tops which are left in heaps at present. They are going to try to repair the deeply rutted bridleways and finish other tasks around the ponds and the juniper. The exact date is not known at the time of writing but we have a meeting with them soon. I know that there are mixed feelings about the felling and its effect upon the Common but given that the Friends of Naphill Common had no official status we have been gratified by the way the company has consulted and cooperated with us. We hope that this will continue and that we can ensure that the Common eventually emerges with as little damage as possible and even some improvements such as wider paths and glades and with the ponds open to sunlight.

Our walks continue. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month and the dates are as follows:

16th March, 20th April, 18th May, 15th June, 20th July, 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Our working parties, organised by Peter Davis, will continue to open up the paths and clear scrub.

In this month we should see spring well underway. Let us hope that it brings in a good year. With less disruption on the Common (felling will start again in 2016) we may see the ground flora begin to recover and animals and birds return. I hope to see nuthatches, tree creepers and even hawfinches as well as such summer visitors as chiffchaffs, willow warblers and, if we are very lucky, wood warblers. Blackcaps have been around all winter so they should be nesting in the brambles. Perhaps it will be the year ravens take up residence: they sometimes fly over but I don't think they have nested.

Hughenden Parish Council Report

The current Council's time is drawing to a close as the elections loom on 7th May. No one can say it hasn't been challenging. The fraud, three different clerks, internal strife, AfLP. Enough for a new JK Rowling novel. But it has also been rewarding and over the last four years, we have improved systems, trimmed costs, brought in the Vehicle Activated speed signs, carried out a Parish-wide survey and funded a lot of local community projects. Some might wonder at the benefit of a Parish Council when the concept of localism that we hoped would give us more opportunity at a local level to influence our living environment, seems to have been handily forgotten soon after the last General Election. Tightened County and District budgets seem to lead to even less notice being taken of community views and it seems unlikely to change after the forthcoming election whichever party or coalition is successful. But that doesn't take away from the fundamental principle of local democracy and without Parish Councils, local communities have little voice. Despite the fact that you hear little about the Council unless a new scandal blows up, beneath the surface, Councillors work hard to keep this Parish the wonderful place that it is. The feature that received an almost unanimous vote in the questionnaire for the best part of living in this area was the beautiful countryside. With Government seemingly intent on undermining that and Wycombe District Planning Department seeming to do their best to support them, the Parish Council is the only local body that can truly represent public feeling.

So we would ask you to think about whether you can help to fight those battles and ensure that the Parish Council operates through democratically elected mandate by putting yourself forward for election. HPC is having an open evening at Naphill Village Hall on 17th April when you can find out more. The elections are on the 7th May and we hope we will get a good turnout to ensure that whoever is voted in is done so with a proper mandate.

We have talked at length about the allotments and the AfLP in the past. The latest in the saga is that the transfer has been delayed whilst the Charities Commission deal with a number of objections to the terms of the Scheme. We hoped to have the results of the questionnaire for this issue but have not had them in time for publication. Apologies for the delay, but they will definitely be included in the April Gazette.





The second person in the photograph, of course, is the photographer who has shown you what he or she wanted you to see - and likewise has concealed what they didn't want you to see.



Since Wednesday 4th February, some of the best mathematicians in our year 6 have been going to Wycombe High school to take part in Maths



I've rarely seen couples take such opportunity, and often such gateway is muddy and slippery, and not the best place for a delicate manoeuvre!

At the other end of our villages are the RAF entrances with gates of a different kind. Not a right of way for all and sundry, and not at all romantic. If you have the appropriate pass or papers, you're welcome. But at least the tarmac is kept clean!

Somewhere around the middle is Naphill Methodist Church on Chapel Lane, with two white wrought iron gates in the wrought iron fence, not locked, and of doubtful purpose except decorative.

Totally different is the child-gate at the top of our stairs at home. The latch is a complete mystery until you reach age 4 and realise how simple it is and no wonder how those grown-ups hardly pause as they pass through. The next stage is to learn to shut it again, for the safety of little sister!

Jesus described himself as The Gate, which sounds an odd name. He was thinking of the gate of a sheeppen. He regulates the goings-out and comings-in of his sheep, his people. Without some constraints, sheep will wander in and out, sometimes at their own peril and sometimes endangering others: badgers and muntjac are bad enough on the road, but sheep are bigger!

At airports and ferries our Passport Control does its best to allow only the right people in or out. (Yes I agree they have little control over the wrong ones who have already got in or the others who escaped out!) I don't think this is the kind of gate Jesus had in mind, where his sheep would be segregated from all others. And in any case he promised them "other sheep" who would join his flock.

Jesus the Gate is the one who protects the little ones, but allows the stronger ones to go out into the world, and allows in all who properly want to enter. In spite of his church's gates, he is not mere decoration. As one who was betrayed with a kiss, Jesus's style of love is far greater than a quick peck at the kissing gate!

Maybe you don't see yourself as a gate, but some gate-characteristics are well worthwhile, as Jesus perceived.


Lent Lunches

A New Informal Recreational Area

Grange Area Trust - Widmer Fields



Widmer Fields is an area of approximately 40 acres of Green Belt lying partly in Hazlemere and partly in Widmer End, High Wycombe. The land has been owned by a succession of developers since the 1950s and has

been subject to Regional Strategic Plans, County Structure Plans, Development Plans and numerous planning applications over the years. However, with the persistent efforts of hundreds of focussed, determined and passionate campaigning local residents, past and present, this area of conservation land is now under the protection of the Grange Area Trust, a registered charity, and safeguarded from development in perpetuity.

Wildlife protection in Widmer Fields

The area is being managed as amenity land for informal recreation, fostering the general health and well-being of the community who can enjoy quiet strolls, dog-walking, jogging, kite-flying, etc. It is also being preserved as a wild-life sanctuary. It lies within the Chiltern Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and landscape quality and biodiversity are cornerstones of the Management Plan for the Widmer Fields which recognises the wildlife habitats that have developed since active farming ceased in the 1960s. The three major habitats are:

- · Mature linear woodland
- Open Grassland
- Woodland

The Grange Area Trust welcomes residents to pay a visit to Widmer Fields and see for themselves the wonderful opportunities afforded by this tranquil sanctuary.

Location

The fields can be accessed directly from the car park opposite Widmer End Village Hall, in Grange Road, Widmer End, HP15 6AD and the public car park situated at Beaumont Way, near Hazlemere Cross-roads (B474 and A404) - just an eight minute walk down footpath HZ11.

Community Police News Speed Watch

Speeding is one of the factors that most affects the quality of life in communities.

It contributes to the severity of road traffic collisions and increases the impact on the lives of people in the community.

Community Speed Watch is a traffic monitoring scheme co-ordinated by Thames Valley Police in partnership with local councils and other stakeholders, but managed and run by neighbourhood policing teams and community volunteers.

How it works

- Speed Watch can only operate in areas up to a 40 miles per hour speed limit. Community volunteers work alongside Thames Valley Police officers to identify vehicles which break the speed limit.
- Registration numbers are entered onto a database which produces a letter informing the registered owner that their vehicle has been noted to have exceeded the speed limit and asking them not to do so in the future.
- If the same registration number is logged in another Speed Watch anywhere within Thames Valley, the owner will receive another letter advising them that if they are caught a third time, the information will be passed onto Roads Policing, who may take further action.

We have just had the figures confirmed for 2014 speed watch project

The total number of Speed Watch letters sent out in Buckinghamshire was 5148, with High Wycombe rural areas contributing to 4389 of those (this equates to 83.3% of all community SpeedWatch letters across Thames Valley police area).

Hughenden Parish is the largest of the contributors generating 2380 of these letters.

The records also indicate that the speed has reduced in the Great Kingshill Ward of Hughenden

This is great news and on behalf of Thames Valley Police and I would like to thank all that have been involved.

Speed Limits

Dear Editor.

In the March Edition of the Gazette, residents are asked to complete a questionnaire on the possibility of reducing the speed limit throughout parts of Naphill and Walters Ash to 20 mph. However, we are given no information as to the reason why the subject has been raised that will help to form opinion. Thus, any results are likely to be skewed by ideology rather than being strictly evidence based. Changes to speed limits, in any direction, will have consequences and are serious matters; therefore, it seems only reasonable we are provided with any information the Res. Assn. holds that generated the idea for a change. For example:

- a. Is it based on accident statistics (speed related) and what are they?
- b. Why did the idea arise: significant public demand/Police initiative/small focus group?
- c. Have the authorities (Police/Council) been approached and are they enthusiastic?
- d. What are the expected outcomes in relation to safety and effect on road users?
- e. Has any effort been made to find out the effect on areas that have introduced 20mph limits?

Before being asked to answer the question

we should expect to receive the whys and the wherefores. "Seems like a good idea" is no way to inform travel policy. On a similar vein, I note that 5148 Speed Watch letters were sent out in Buckinghamshire of which 4389 went to the Wycombe area and 2380 of these to Hughenden Parish. Given this information it would be easy to conclude that the Parish has the worst speeding drivers in the County. We could also deduce that those areas with no teams have no speeders! However, knowledge of how actively the monitoring was undertaken and the distribution and use of neighbourhood teams within the County may give a different impression. That drivers need to better observe speed limits is unquestionable. Nevertheless, statistics are only useful when accompanied by the complete picture.

Dear Editor,

I noted the proposal in the March issue to adopt a 20 mph speed limit across sections of Main Rd / New Rd.

However, I would question the wisdom of this.

There is no evidence to suggest that a speeding driver will pay attention to this lower limit. Indeed, logic tells me that if they are prepared to exceed 30mph then they will certainly exceed a 20mph limit.

What is therefore needed is far stricter enforcement of the existing 30mph limit - something which I would wholeheartedly support.

Furthermore, analysis of government evidence by the Institute of Advanced Motorists in 2014 shows that far from reducing accidents, roads with 20mph limits have seen increases in serious casualties of 26%.

Speeding drivers along Main Road infuriate me as much as anyone but I do not see that a 20mph will do anything to stop those intent on speeding, or reduce accidents.

Stricter enforcement of the current limit certainly could achieve this.

Speed Limits Opinion Poll

Thank you for the opportunity to reply to Mr Foggo's helpful letter and clear up misunderstandings.

No proposal to change local speed limits is currently

being advocated by the Residents Association.

This was a quick, simple poll to ask if residents have strong feelings for or against a change in speed limits, because concerns have very legitimately been raised by some N&WA School parents about children's road safety. They have had discussions with Police, Highways (Transport for Bucks), Bradenham Parish Council, Hughenden Parish Council and Hughenden Neighbourhood Action Group, as well as the Residents Association committee. Discussion points have included a pedestrian central refuge, road signage, and speed limits. It was a document on Traffic Calming, forwarded to them by TfB that mentioned 20 mph speed limits.

The RA is not currently committed to any particular view as to whether new measures can or should be adopted. Mr Foggo's comments will be applicable if a proposal is put forward and more data are needed. At present, no proposal exists.

Highways (TfB) receives road safety requests from numerous communities, but has limited funding, so will not allocate money unless there is very strong public support as well as a valid case. Therefore, to avoid spending time and money on a project, only for it to fail for want of public support, one of the parents, who is also a Hughenden Parish Councillor, set up a simple questionnaire on the Naphill website. To widen the response, the questions were also put to the Gazette readership to see whether there is broad local support for speed limit changes or not. As Walter's Ash comes under three different parish councils, NAWARA, which is the only organisation able to represent all the residents of both villages, was asked to help by putting the questions in the Gazette. Very little additional information could be given, as there was only half a page available.

The Residents Association has now done what was requested, and the parents group are considering what steps may be open to them. NAWARA continues to support Community Speedwatch, which is proving effective locally.

This is also a reply to Mr Rock's helpful letter, and I hope, clarifies the position on 20 mph limits to Gazette readers. At present there is no proposal on the table to change speed limits.

A Letter from Our Methodist Minister

Dear Friends,

April puts us between daffs and bluebells. Wordsworth's host of golden daffodils are in full bloom as I write and will be fading as you read this. The bluebells have no hint of blue, but their racing green growth will only slow when the woods are carpeted.

Yes it's General Election season, but I'm not speaking of anything between true-blue Tories and golden Lib-Dems. To be politically correct and fair I'd have to admire the entire spectrum of British flora and, much as I like flowers, that is not my purpose today!

This April starts with Easter and I daresay lots of chocolate eggs, greeting cards with bunnies and lambs, and the debate about whether the lawn needs its first haircut. There'll be a new optimism and more houses will be exchanged.

School term will end a full week before Easter, and assembly may include an attempt to explain why the crucifixion of their leader has been so important to Christians. A cross symbol may appear on your Easter card, beautifully decorated with multicoloured flowers, (not just daffs and bluebells!), or possibly an empty cross silhouetted against a glorious sunset (or is it a sunrise?), or much more unlikely a scene of crucifixion.

Yet the 1851 engraved stone tablet at the top of our church declares "We preach Christ crucified". Not very cheerful, you might say! Let's just celebrate Christ's resurrection. Surely that is the "good news"?

Yet in 1851 or in 54AD when St Paul wrote those words, it would have been just as easy as now to say "Forget Good Friday! Let's concentrate on Easter Sunday!" St Paul's point was that you can't have the resurrection without the death first, and though it might be offensive to some, and stupid to others, he was not going to duck the issue. St Paul believed Christ died for our sins, and the miracle of resurrection proved it was not in vain.

But to go back to the daffs and bluebells, as far as I know, neither flower would have been in evidence in Jerusalem that first Easter. Both flowers are a very British phenomenon. And Easter needs to pay homage to the Jerusalem events 2000 years ago, but translate them into the 2015 culture and language of Britain, or more particularly Naphill and Walters Ash.

May I wish you the blessings of this Easter.

News from RAF High Wycombe

Princess Royal Walks in Grandparents' Footsteps

Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal has repeated the visit made by King George VI and Elizabeth The Queen Mother to Royal Air Force High Wycombe in 1944, including a tour of the office of 'Bomber' Harris which remains in original and mint condition.



Princess Anne, commemorating the visit more than 70 years earlier, also took the opportunity to meet members of the local community and charity workers, as well as servicemen and civilians who work at the Air Force Station.

RAF heritage was on display outside the main gate with a historical presentation of the Hurricane and Spitfire 'gate guardians'. The Princess Royal completed the visit by formally opening the Station's brand new sports and fitness facility to be known as 'Southdown Gymnasium' in reference to the Station's original coded title during WWII.

Station Commander Group Captain Philip Lester



said "I am extremely proud to have provided Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal with an insight into my Station and to commemorate the visit of her grandparents more than 70 years ago. My whole force staff of contractors, Civil Servants and serving personnel, working with the local community, have shown the excellent support we provide to the headquarters of Air Command including welfare and fitness facilities, as well as our continued work to preserve the traditions and heritage of Royal Air Force High Wycombe."

During the Second World War, King George VI, accompanied by his wife Elizabeth The Queen Mother, visited what was the headquarters of Bomber Command, hosted by Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur 'Bomber' Harris. At the time there was a high rate of bombing raids, and the reigning Monarch would have witnessed an extremely busy but highly organised Operations Room.

After the tour of Sir Arthur Harris' office Mr David Brown said "It was an absolute privilege and pleasure to brief The Princess Royal on the history and heritage of the Station. I was pleasantly surprised by her high level of knowledge regarding the Station, Bomber Command and Sir Arthur Harris, and can safely say it has been the highlight of my 47 years working for the RAF."

When naming the new sports facility it was important to recognise the Station's heritage. Prior to the start of the Second World War senior staff at the Air Ministry agreed that due to the threat from Germany Bomber Command should move away from Uxbridge in London. An area in the Chiltern Hills was selected and the building of Southdown began in November 1938. Named in the interests of secrecy, Southdown was built in just 16 months, and to this day original buildings are used by the officers, airwomen and airmen of the Royal Air Force.

Sergeant Stu McLean is in charge of the new gym and said "Her Royal Highness showed a great interest in the positive effects the new facility could have, and diverted the visit to ensure she was able to speak with some of gym users taking part in circuits. It is testament to 18 months of effort that this excellent facility is formally opened by such a prestigious visitor."

The Princess Royal was also met by schoolchildren from Naphill and Walter's Ash School. "I am also excited by the challenges of supporting the RAF Diaspora worldwide and United States Visiting Forces throughout the UK. Diaspora ensures that the 6000 RAF personnel not under RAF command remain linked to the Service, whilst the United States Air Force are able to operate from 8 Stations around the country. RAF High Wycombe is the epitome of the whole force and I am delighted to be working with such a committed civilian, contractor and military team."

The Station's new Commanding Officer has vast experience from his 28 years of Service, working on RAF Regiment Field and Light Armoured Squadrons, as well as serving with the Harrier Force and commanding 3 RAF Force Protection Wing at Basra. He has served around the world in Iraq, Afghanistan, Saudi Arabia, Turkey, Cyprus, Bosnia and Northern Ireland.

Since taking over Command on 12th April 2013, Group Captain Clifford has significantly improved facilities for the Station and strengthened the bonds between the whole force of serving personnel, Civil Servants, contractors and the local community. He is now due to deploy to Sierra Leone as the UK military deputy commander in the fight against Ebola.

Friends of Naphill Common.

Spring is here and what could be better than a quiet stroll on the Common? But, as you will know, much of it is in such a terrible state that walking consists of wading through mud and struggling over deep ruts. Wessex Woodland Management have assured us that they will work to flatten out the worst areas but it will be a long while until the grasses, sedges, rushes and mosses grow back to heal the scars. To make matters worse, felling will be resumed next year and at two year intervals, until the whole Common is thinned by one third.

There are to be some compensations. We have worked closely with the woodland management company, in an effort to minimise the inevitable damage and disruption, while maximising the benefits. As a result, the Common will be more open, with more sunlight getting in to encourage a richer flora. This should be most obvious on the some of the bridleways which have been made much broader. They have cleared away huge areas of holly in "bays" on each side of the paths so that they will be more sunlit and varied in appearance. We are going to use some of the more open areas to re-introduce the juniper cuttings which were taken several years ago from the four specimens that have survived from when the Common was a "juniper forest". Juniper does not thrive in shade and the old specimens are in poor health. We will have to protect the young plants from deer and rabbits for a while.

You may also notice some changes around several of the ponds on the Common. These have deteriorated over the years due to over-shading and filling in with leaves. A survey that we carried out last year showed that some are almost without either pond animals or flora, while even the best are choked with Floating Sweet-grass and Yellow Flag, with a rather limited variety of animal life. Our working parties and the Chiltern Rangers will try to clear some of the scrub and small trees around the ponds to let in more light. Later we may remove some of the leaf litter and vegetation from the ponds themselves; a little at a time, which we hope will allow the amount of frogspawn, newts and invertebrate life increases.

The struggle to protect and repair the Common takes a lot of time and energy. Please consider joining The Friends of Naphill Common so that you can help or, even if you can't join in physically, you will help us to maintain the membership numbers which enables us to wield influence. Contact our membership secretary Lynn McMinn 01494 56 4667. The Common has never needed you more.

We will soon be announcing our programme of events and activities. Meanwhile our walks continue. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month and the dates are as follows: 20th April, 18th May, 15th June, 20th July, 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the

Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Our working parties, organised by Peter Davis, usually meet on the first Sunday (and sometimes on the third Sunday) of the month and will continue to open up the paths and clear scrub around the ponds.

Bradenham Parish Council:

Sadly our March meeting started with the acknowledgment of the death of Councillor Jan Pearce, our Vice-Chairman, who had been our Chairman 2011-2014. His loss will be keenly felt and his numerous contributions to,life in our small community were recognised.

The parish council noted that Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB) had dealt with the flooding on Rectory Lane using the short term measure of cutting into the verge. This at least has removed the water from the road surface, but it has also shown that the water has damaged the road surface.

The parish council has also met with TfB and the location and width of buff coloured road strips have been confirmed for the section of Bradenham Woods Lane which passes through the village. This is all part of the parish council's traffic calming

initiatives. We are hoping to get the opportunity to share an MVAS, again to encourage traffic to slow down.

We were not able to report progress on a traffic survey at the junction of Bradenham Woods Lane/ New Road/Main Road Walter's Ash. The clerk is chasing this matter.

It was decided that the best location for the defibrillator would be the phone box opposite the Red Lion pub. Although the box is tucked back, it is a landmark that everybody would be able to locate in an emergency.




Some of you might have heard about a general election happening on 7th May.








Think - Olympics Opening ceremony!












A Letter from Our Methodist Minister

Immediately after Easter, my wife and I spent a wonderful week at Dinan in Brittany. The glorious weather lured us into a long walk each day, around Dinan, or along the coast near Dinard. All told we walked 50 or 60 miles, which is a long way for us!

It set me thinking about walking. How daft is it to travel to France when we have excellent walking routes on our doorstep?! Of course we would never get round to so many walks if we stayed at home! We would feel the need to see to some urgent job at home. But 400 miles away, with a dodgy mobile signal and no WiFi, and the threat of "roaming charges", meant that we were free to go walking.

We'd had a busy few weeks and were tired and stressed, but as we walked, we left much of that behind. We admired the scenery, the Spring flowers, the birds, people's gardens, and the blue sky. We chatted about these, but we also talked of deeper things and personal issues. I find it easier to talk about tricky and contentious matters walking side by side, than looking directly at someone.

So by the end of the week, we were a lot fitter in body (apart from an odd blister!), but a lot calmer mentally, and enjoying a much better attitude to each other!

If we had stayed at home, on the Sunday after Easter I would have been preaching about two people walking to Emmaus when a stranger drew alongside and walked with them, and they all talked about the goings-on in Jerusalem where Jesus had been crucified, and now his body had disappeared and there were claims that he'd been seen alive. Only after much discussion did they realise that the stranger was in fact Jesus, alive. Now you may wonder how they did not recognise him before, or you may ask why Jesus didn't just introduce himself, or indeed many other questions! Yet this brief testimony from the two witnesses, and a few other appearances of Jesus, transformed the lives of his followers then, and caused the foundation of his church.

In those days walking was a more normal means of transport, and there are many biblical instances of Jesus walking and talking with his disciples, teaching them as they walked along. There seemed no rush, but there was a background urgency and a purposefulness. A far cry from our world where everyone is rushing somewhere, but not clear where to, or why.

It would do us good to go and walk in the fresh air, be it in the Chilterns or Brittany. It would do us good sometimes to put aside the apparently urgent claims upon our lives, get the hamster off the wheel, and adjust to walking pace. It would do us good to walk and talk, of trivia and of deeper things.

See what steps you can take to change your life.



Picture This

I'm really chuffed to say that my last month's 'manon-a-mission' request for pictures for the Gazette delivered the goods. Peter Davis sent us this month's glorious cover picture of a magnificent Oak on the Common all dressed up in the vibrant green of late Spring, contrasted with the intense blue of Bluebells. It simply invites you to walk into the picture.

And I'm still on that mission; so do send your pictures.

In complete contrast to the cover-picture, on a grey, cold, windy Saturday in early April, I was teaching someone the art of large format photography. Large Format photography uses film and you might not be surprised to hear that the film is......large.

In fact the film comes in single sheets (one sheet per picture) that measure 125mm x 100mm (which is 5" x 4" in old money) and is why the camera is called a 5x4 large format camera.

So why am I telling you this story? Well, my pupil is a very successful commercial photographer who wants to change his approach to his photography. Right now, weddings and portraits are his speciality. As we worked together, he told me stories such as having to cope with hundreds of wedding guests, all wanting to have their photograph 'taken' with the Bride & Groom. Scary stuff for any photographer, and picture this: not only does he have to 'take' the photographs, he also has to keep the Bride & Groom and their parents happy and smiling as they go through this ordeal.

He told me that he loved the quality that you can only get from film; I understand that, film does have a very different feel to digital. And he said that he wanted to slow down and think more about what he is doing as he created his pictures – and I also understand that.

After a couple of hours on the technical stuff about a 5 x 4 camera, we ventured out into the cold carrying 15kgs of camera gear and 12 sheets of film. We worked for 4 hours in two locations. Bradenham Manor was our first and 'Vicar of Dibley' Turville our second. And he made just 2 pictures.

"Sometimes' he said, "for me, making a photograph is like a meditation. It is Mindfulness. Sometimes I don't even need to see the photograph. Creating it is enough"

By the time you read this, the Bluebells will be in full bloom and the air filled with that magical perfume. Bluebells are very willing models and photographically, they really do deserve your full attention. So slow down, find your pictures, breathe in and press the shutter and enjoy your photography.



Jean Lawrence Mann

13 January 1918 - 16 March 2015



How can you cover such a long life in so little time? To be honest I am not even sure where to start but perhaps the words written by her Canadian niece Jeanne might be a good way.

"I was so sorry to hear about Aunty Jean...she was a lovely lady....all my memories of her are so good...she was always smiling and up for anything, a truly fun person to be around. When I was 16 and visiting England (with my sister Lynda) she taught me to drive her car, took us horse back riding and up to Newcastle to see the Small Faces and stand in the dressing room where the Beatles had been the night before".

Jean was born in 1918, a year we only know about from the history books She was born, grew up and spent her entire life in Naphill She referred to herself as a "Naphillite". She travelled a little and befriended everybody she met.

I can't tell you an awful lot about her childhood but I think it was a happy one. She was one of eight children born to William and Minnie (nee Lacey) Lawrence and she was brought up in a bungalow on Downley Road which as well as home was also the local shop. She often recalled stories about keeping shop and helping to raise the youngest sibling, Tony, my dad.

In the back garden there was a tennis court where Jean played tennis with her family and friends. This bungalow was Jean's home for most of the first 70 years of her life, although there were some significant changes in that time. All Jean's brothers and sisters got married and this left her at the bungalow looking after her father William after her mother died. The bungalow was extended and became two homes when Tony and his new wife Amanda needed a home.

Jean always enjoyed fun and games with the growing family of nephews and nieces. Some fifty years later you will hear the next generation, Gavin's and Margos children, telling similar stories. In her nineties she was still playing cricket on the Crick with her nephews and great nephews and nieces, that is until she took a fall trying to take a catch and the older nephews and nieces told her it was probably time for a sit down; Jean humoured us and did not protest, but she was soon back in her garden playing catch with the children on their next visit.

Children in fact were one of the biggest focuses in my Aunty's life. She was fabulously generous and diligent with nephew and nieces birthdays and was also happy to baby sit and entertain the young members of the family. It was not only Canadian niece Jeanne that got to drive under aunties supervision, I remember being allowed, as a 13 year old to drive auntie's Austin A35 up and down the factory drive.

Aunty was a talented musician and she encouraged all the younger family members to develop their skills. We all loved to play on the piano in her front room. However little talent we exhibited as we tapped out our little tunes, Jean never asked us to stop. Fortunately for Jean there was a shining star amongst the many tuneless ones. My son Jason was one of these. Jean took him under her wing. and with her encouragement, Jason became a very talented organist who started his musical career here in Naphill and went on to take a post as an organist in Norway. Jean was enormously proud of Jason's achievements. Jean's lifelong faith meant she dealt with most deaths in an unquestioning way but the far too early passing of both Jason and Darren, her sister Phyl's grandson, rocked her.

I don't think many people saw Jean get angry, such was her patience, but Margo did! She tells how her Aunty got angry at her when she failed to clear up the deposits which her pony left on the bungalow drive and which Grampy then trod in and carried on his boots indoors. That was it, just the once and on that occasion, who could blame her!

Jean was well travelled. She visited Canada several times in order to see her sister Betty and Betty's family. She also travelled to Italy and I believe, as a Girl Guider, she and her friend Vera Goodchild embarked on other fun expeditions and adventures.

After leaving school Aunty trained as a secretary and spent her entire working life employed at Wycombe Council. For most of this time she worked in the children's department. She often told us how much she enjoyed her work. Although she was not directly working with children she clearly took a keen interest in them. Aside from her paid work connecting her to children, there was her voluntary work. She helped at the Sunday School which later became The Discoverers' Club.

She became despondent at the falling numbers at church and particularly in the falling numbers of youngsters. She had wanted to start a Children's choir but sadly this didn't quite come to fruition. Jean supported many charities but her favourites were Save the Children, the Poppy Appeal and the National Children's Home.

Jean was generous and giving of her time for the young, the sick and the old. One of my earliest memories is of Jean's friend Shirley who was also a teacher at Naphill First School. Auntie spent time visiting Shirley and taking her meals when she was dying of cancer. I am certain that there were many people before Shirley and numerous since who were touched by her kindness. To me she was the Saint of Naphill, always visiting others and always being kind and generous. Even in her very last months she had the same approach. I recall a conversation where she advised that she still

liked to go and visit the elderly in the village, then adding "well of course I am a lot older than some of them"! She spent some time in the care home at Saunderton at the beginning of this year and she was still asking the staff if she could help by making and taking round cups of tea.

Jean never sought reward for her caring and kindness, it was such a natural instinct. However, she did get rewarded when looking after her brother Tony after he suffered his first and subsequent strokes. When Tony married, his best man was Ted Mann. Ted had married but by the time he was visiting his old friend Tony, he was a widower. Whilst visiting Tony, who was also my Dad, Ted met Jean. Their frienship from years earlier was renewed, love blossomed, and at the grand old age of 79, in May 1997, Jean married, for the first time, to the younger, 70 year old Ted at Naphill Methodist Church. They both sold their homes, combined their funds, bought their bungalow at 54 Main Road and settled happily into married life. They lived there together until Ted's death 5 years ago. Jean stayed in this bungalow until her own recent death.

Devastated by Ted's death but not despondent, Jean then focused on caring for ailing sister Phyl at Beehive Cottage, the home built by their Grandfather, well over a century earlier. Phyl died just over a year ago aged 100. Soon afterwards Jean's lifelong and very special friend Vera passed away too. Jean lost her last connections with her youth and with that her vitality and love for life diminished. Jean didn't get the end of life she deserved or wanted but I am sure all the kindness she shared with everybody she met in her life will ensure that there is a next journey for her, as she firmly believed there would be, it will be among smiling friends and family, welcoming her to join them.

So that's it, a few memories which I hope shed some light on Jean's character and very long life here in Naphill. I am sorry these recollections are nearly all family based and perhaps do not fairly reflect Jean's life. The family meant a lot to her as did her community, her church and her great faith and love of God.

Friends of Naphill Common

Despite the state of the Common the signs of spring are beginning to appear. Chiffchaffs have been heard, blackcaps are around, great spotted woodpeckers are drumming away and green woodpeckers are yaffling. A handsome pair of stock doves are nesting in a hole in an oak, there is frogspawn in at least two ponds and some palmate newts and a toad have been spotted. So it is worth braving the mud to take a walk and see what is about.

The Chiltern Rangers and other volunteers joined our working party to clear scrub from around Daisy, Shipwash and Lady Horse ponds, and we made quite a difference. Much more light can now reach the ponds and this should stimulate the growth of vegetation which, in turn, will encourage the invertebrates and amphibians that were once there. We would like to thank all those who helped. The work at Shipwash was particularly revealing. It had been so overgrown that it looked one of the smallest ponds on the Common, but now it you will be able to see what a large and complex arrangement of hollows and banks it is.

What all the ponds lack is open water because they have become so choked with leaf litter and other debris. We intend starting a programme of dredging, but it has to be done carefully and in small stages so as not to disturb or remove too much of the pond life. In recent times Daisy pond has had the most vegetation and we will have to remove some of the floating sweet-grass, flag iris and leaf litter to give a little more open water. This pond is particularly important because it has, in the past, produced the internationally rare star-fruit. The seeds of this flower are almost certainly still in the mud at the bottom of the pond. Traditionally they were stimulated into germination by the feet of cattle drinking from the pond. Perhaps our work will have a similar effect and we shall see them once again.

Our survey of all of the significant trees on the Common is now almost complete. Besides being an informative record of our Common it has already served us well in enabling us to mark the trees that must be left untouched by the felling. We have been particularly careful to record the ancient pollards that originally stood in what was pastureland grazed by cattle and sheep: some of the trees must be well over 300 years old and host to a complex flora and fauna.

The patch of invasive Japanese knotweed, roughly opposite Beehive Cottage, is sprouting up again.

It is difficult to eliminate. Last year we injected poison into the larger stems around the perimeter of the patch and it is gratifying to see that it has not appeared where we did so, but the rest of the area will need treatment. The landowners, West Wycombe Estate, are ultimately responsible for its removal and they have assured us that they will carry out the work.

You will be very welcome on our regular walks. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month and the dates are as follows: 18th May, 15th June, 20th July, 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Our working parties, organised by Peter Davis, usually meet on the first Sunday (and sometimes on the third Sunday) of the month and will continue to open up the paths and clear scrub around the ponds.

Hughenden Parish Council Report

HPC FACTOID #1 - we manage ~250 allotments across our Parish - as many as Wycombe District Council

For a new council not even a full month old, we have been a busy bunch.

The six previous and two new councillors have already managed to meet up twice since our election on the 7th May. Once as an official decision making body, where our first task was for our outgoing Chairman to preside over the election of our new Chair and Vice-Chair, ensuring a smooth transition. Following on from that we had the usual monthly meeting to deal with May's business. Then, just two days later, some of us found ourselves at Widmer End Community School to deliver our Annual Public Meeting - updating residents on the last year of council business. You can find the Chairman's and financial reports on our website.

The subject of allotments came up in both meetings, so its worthy of noting a few things for those Gazette readers who tend their own or live close to either Louches Lane, Naphill or the Walter's Ash allotment gardens.

Firstly, this council like the previous one is in the complex process of untangling years of legal issues over the correct ownership of allotment land. We have a working group which leads this task and we are delighted to have continuity with former **Hughenden Valley Councillor James Perkins** remaining involved. Our own ward representative on the working group is Dennis Hackling. We recognize that as a Council we have to improve our communications with allotment holders and residents on this difficult subject - we have created the Allotment Liaison Committee as a direct result of this and that next meets at the end of May. There is also a new allotments section on our website, and we continue to post items on the gates at the entrance to every allotment.

Our first council meeting in this new four year term started positively, with the co-option of a new member. From our rather diminished number of 8 (our full complement is 15!) we are now plus one, with the addition of Phil Crawford for Naphill & Walter's Ash. This is fantastic news as it means as

a ward we now have our full team of four. As well as attending monthly Parish Council and committee meetings we all sit on other bodies, such as Village Hall and Residents Associations - with the four of us now - this means we can represent the ward far better. If you need to reach us on a local matter you can find our contact details in the front of this gazette on the Naphill.org.uk website as well as our own Parish website.

Briefly stepping back to just before the election, you will have received a copy of our Parish Survey report. Hand delivered by current and past councillors (which is a great way for us to walk around the ward and meet people), this summarised the results of the questionnaire that was sent out towards the end of 2014 and that so many of you completed and returned to us. Hopefully you took the chance to read it - if not you still can by visiting the Parish website and downloading it. This is an incredibly useful local study that the new council can use to align its current work as well as prioritise projects in the future.

Our last word this month is on hedgerows. With the recent sunny spells our trees and hedgerows have burst into leaf and grown. It all looks wonderful, but can encroach on our roads, verges and footpaths. Please be aware that under the Wildlife & Conservation Act 1981, as a responsible council (along with Bucks County Council) to protect nesting birds we will not be cutting between 1st March -31st July unless there is an immediate safety hazard, eg cutting back a hedge at a blind corner or around a road sign to improve visibility and promote road safety.

Friends of Naphill Common

Warmer, drier weather is to be expected as summer approaches and now that the ruts have been filled and the paths smoothed the Common is getting more welcoming. Slowly the grasses, sedges and other ground flora will start to re-establish themselves and, with the help of the increased sunlight due to the felling, a generous greening should appear. It has been a rather bleak and inhospitable period but we are over the worst and several people have remarked that the new,

more open, areas are an improvement. Certainly the cutting back of the ever-invasive holly is very welcome and it is easier to admire the ancient pollards. (The green marks we put on them to ensure that they were not felled will soon wash off.)

Incidentally, rumour has it that someone has been scattering seed in some of the bare patches: presumably wild flowers. It is obviously tempting to do this but, as the Common is a Site of Special Scientific Interest Grade 1 and a Special Conservation Area, it is forbidden to introduce any new species; so we hope the rumours are mistaken. In the autumn we will be planting out young junipers in some of the sunnier spots but these are not aliens. They are cuttings taken three years ago from the four ancient junipers remaining on the Common.

We will soon be publishing our programme of events, so look out for the notices and full details of all our activities can be found on our web site at naphillcommon.org.uk or follow us on Twitter @ NaphillCommon. Marian Miller has kindly offered to do another tour of "Naphill in 1913": this time from The Wheel up towards Walters Ash. Last year the tour of the other half of the village proved very popular and we hope to see you all again on Tuesday 23rd June at 7.30pm at The Wheel. The Friends of Naphill Common will, of course, be at the Napfest, with things to do for children and grown ups.

Our work parties will continue to try to make the common more accessible and to smarten up our notice boards in preparation for the Best Kept Village inspection. If you would like to join the work parties please contact Peter Davis (Tel. 569303). They are a friendly group who usually meet on the first Sunday (and sometimes on the third Sunday) of the month, but you can join in as frequently or infrequently as you like.

You are also welcome on our regular walks. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month and the dates are as follows: 15th June, 20th July, 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. A Naphill Family at Waterloo 15-18 June 1815:

People with ancestors at Waterloo are re-telling their stories for the 200th Anniversary. My family's tale is strange and surprising. Not one, but three of my ancestors, of three nationalities, none English, fought in three opposing armies, facing one another through the fog of war.

My French great-great-grandfather Claude Leflaive (1763-1850) lived in the sleepy wine village of Puligny-Montrachet in Côte d'Or, Burgundy. He was a vineyard proprietor in his spare time. During the Terror he sat on the feared local Comité. He was an infantry officer, Lieutenant of the nearby Auxonne garrison, where many young trainee artillery officers passed through his tutelage. One he never forgot, when he was 25, was a fiery 19 year-old Corsican. "Le sous-lieutenant d'artillerie Napoléon Bonaparte est en garrison à Auxonne 1788 – 1789". For a time he was Claude's subordinate, but roles soon reversed. 26 years on, he was Emperor while Claude was fighting in the veteran 146me Demi-Brigade, 2me Division d'Infanterie, at Waterloo.

The bitterness of defeat soon faded at home with his vines, his Chassagne-Montrachet-born wife Marie Anne, and his ten children. His 3-year-old son Pierre, born 1812, was my great-grandfather. Claude lived to be 87.

My Braunschweiger (Brunswicker) great-great-great-grandfather Carl Kämpe was a businessman from this ducal state bordering mighty Prussia, now in Germany. He was an officer in the 'Black Brunswickers' under the 'Black Duke' of Braunschweig-Wolfenbüttel, Prince Frederick, brother-in-law and cousin of the English King George IV. The Schwarze Schar (Black Brunswickers), average age 17, were known for their black tunics and silver death's head badge, and also for Millais' painting 'The Black Brunswicker' in which a young woman clings to a young officer leaving for war. The Duke put his Corps under the direct command of Wellington, but was himself killed at Quatre Bras on 16th June.

On 18th June, the Brunswickers played a key role on the right flank of the allied line in the vital stand at Château d'Hougoumont.

Forty-eight years later, in 1863, Carl's grand-daughter, Augusta, then a Prussian governess in France, met and wed Claude Leflaive's widowed son Pierre, and the Waterloo and Auxonne garrison histories were put together.

My Welsh great-great-great grandfather, on my mother's side, Lewis Gruffydd or Griffiths (1792-1837) was a stonemason at beautiful Tal y llyn, below Cadaer Idris in Snowdonia. In 1813, the King sent out for more troops to subdue Napoleon, requiring one conscript from this remote parish, chosen by lot. The man chosen, who was totally unsuitable to be a soldier, broke down and cried. Out of pity, Lewis volunteered to go instead. He signed up in the 23rd Royal Welch Fusiliers at Wrexham, and trained at Dublin. There he met and wed Jane (Jenny) Drumble, whose family, of far higher social status, disowned her. Jenny, with their infant son, was able to follow the 23rd to the

battlefields in France, Spain and Belgium, doing nursing and laundry duties, and, her tombstone says, "was on the field three days at Waterloo."

The 23rd, also made up of men in their teens or early twenties, was in Col Hugh Mitchell's brigade at the extreme right end of the allied line, in the bloody all-day engagement at Hougoumont, just yards from Carl Kämpe.

At the roll call, the morning after the battle, Lewis failed to answer to his name. Jenny searched field hospital wards of thousands of wounded, carrying her infant son. As she left a final tent, not finding him, the child called out "Daddy, Daddy!" She turned and saw Lewis, shot in the shoulder but alive. Back at Tal y llyn. Lewis found work at Corris Slate Quarry, but in 1837, aged 45, he was killed in a quarry accident. Jenny taught at a school and interpreted for French Prisoners of War, living to be 94. In 1932, her descendent Marian Griffiths married a Bristol doctor Charles Leflaive (my parents), finally combining these three heroes and survivors of Waterloo into one family.

Lancaster Log Book Signed Off - 70 Years Later

A former Lancaster Bomber wireless operator and prisoner of war has had his log book signed off 70 years after being shot down over Germany.

Flight Sergeant Joe Hughes was hosted by Chief of the Air Staff (CAS), Air Chief Marshal Sir Andrew Pulford, in the Office of Bomber Harris at RAF High Wycombe. CAS completed the log book by writing 'A duty done. Signed on behalf of a grateful Air Force and Nation.'



A framed photo of a Lancaster from 625 Squadron on a bombing raid was provided by the Air Historical Branch and presented by CAS, followed by a lunch held in Joe's honour, including Tornado aircrew representing the RAF's modern day bombers.

Shot down, captured, strafed and interrogated. Joe's log book had remained incomplete since January 1945 when his aircraft was shot down on its return flight from a night bombing raid. Aged 19 and on his 30th bombing mission, Joe was one of only 2 survivors having jumped out of the alight aircraft, doing up his parachute as his jumped and hoping he would not land in water as he could not swim.

Not knowing if he was in Germany or France, Joe navigated west using the stars until he came across a sentry post, and upon seeing the German 'Reichsadler' eagle realised he was in enemy territory. After some time evading capture, Joe's hunger and boredom got the better of him and he gave himself up to a passing German troop truck, which was subsequently strafed by an RAF Mosquito.

After a long and eventful train journey, Joe arrived at a Delag Luft prisoner of war camp near Nuremberg to join approximately 150,000 American, Russian and British prisoners. Solitary confinement and interrogation for 8 days came next, after which Joe was released to the prison, having claimed he had been shot down on only his first bombing mission.

It was at this point that Joe was reunited with the rear gunner from his crew, having believed he was the only survivor. For a crew that spent every waking moment together through training and operations, this was a huge morale boost.

In June 1945 the camp was liberated by General Patten's 3rd Army. However with nowhere to go the prisoners stayed in the camp for another week

before being flown to France, and then finally flying back to Oxford with the RAF.







My church calendar declares that in June we're back into "Ordinary Time". Well granted it's not Christmas or Easter, etc, but "Ordinary" does seem a bit bizarre for glorious June!

I'm sure you won't read this Gazette and not notice that it's Napfest time! Every organisation or group worth its salt in Naphill will be doing something, and hopefully all who are fit and able will be sampling the familiar and the unfamiliar on Saturday 6th.

There'll be something of a Wild West theme, with plenty of scope to go OTT, but you can be sure that a few will be historically accurate, some will be truer to the big screen version, and for others you'll have to work it out for yourself! And there'll be nothing "ordinary" about any of it!

June is also time for that elusive event: summer! We have a traditional first day of summer on 21st June and midsummer's day on the 24th: so that's about 7 days for the whole of summer! About par for the course! But even in ordinary years, that week is rarely the hottest, and rarely consistently dry and sunny. Our climate is not very ordinary! You couldn't accuse our weather of being boringly predictable!

June holds many birthdays in my wider family, a statistical blip, but I suppose that's just peculiar to our family: maybe we're not "ordinary"! When I was young my mother used to say I was "special": maybe I was, to her. But I discovered that being special sometimes meant that even if all my friends were doing something (exciting/daring), I was "special", and therefore couldn't join them. I longed to be ordinary/normal, like everybody else, to fit in with peer pressure.

For all of us our lives are mainly very normal and ordinary, but interspersed with the extraordinary and special. Some would say: "that's what makes life worth living!" In this month of June, in spite of it being "Ordinary Time", there is much to make it special, particularly if we look for it and get involved with it.

In our Christian tradition there have been famous individuals called by God to do great things, but a parallel theme is that every person is somehow known to God, and loved by God. Experiencing that theme transforms ordinariness into something much more special.

Our speaker last month, Mr John Bates, entertained us with A JOLLY ALONG HADRIAN'S WALL – a light hearted talk on his Border walk.

The government launched Armed Forces Day in 2009 and it has taken place every two years, with this year aiming to be the biggest yet in the county and one of the best in the country. Geocaching

On the 23 April I posted a comment on the Naphill and Walters Ash neighbourhood Facebook page. "Hi all, has anyone tried geocaching? if so would love to try it. Are there any local ones?

23 comments later I found myself meeting new neighbours and friends.

The evening of Friday 1st May was warm and dry. I left home armed with a coat, walking shoes, my mobile phone and met with Tracey and Elaine. After our introduction and battery checks we left for my first cach

Geocaching is an outdoor activity. Where you use a (global positioning system) GPS device or android phone to hide and seek a "cach". A cach is usually a waterproof container or bag with a logbook and pen. Some contain toys or trinkets (low value).

We left Moseley Road and set my first cach. I couldn't believe it, it was on my daily dog walk. I followed my phone, which pictured an arrow and distance. I entered the field and started looking with fresh eyes for hiding places, the needle moves to where the treasure is, so in a field it could be anywhere? I started to think, where would I hide a box and started looking harder and not just a glance. I loved having Tracey and Elaine to guide me as I would have no idea what to expect. The phone and app were easy to use. So I logged my details in the book and then onto my phone and

then I put the box back "where I found it" which, when it's hard to find in the first place, I put it back, and wondered; was it too obvious?

Tracy asked "well? Fancy another? ". Yes! I said. So again back on to the mobile phone to find another cach. This time, we had short car journey (if it wasn't a learning excercise I would have walked) to Bradenham and in to park woods which were alive with the sound and smells of spring. We even saw two Muntjac deers. The paths are very different from the common and very easy to walk around the woods. As we got closer to the hiding place I realised it could be one of many trees? This time it was a little more tricky and although both Tracey and Elaine had done this cach before, it still was hard to spot and we all had to look for it. The geocach is only as good as the person logging it on to the system, so I found only with experience will you know how to troubleshoot by looking at previous comments and history of the logbook, which again Tracey and Elaine were brilliant in helping me. "One more I said" this time the light was fading, the next one wasn't too far. And looking at the compass we walked through the beautiful bluebells of woodland. This was a little tricky and as we approached the cach we came to a pond and a clearing. But the cach was nowhere to be found; the log advised us to use a different coordinates. After a bit of a search, we found it. The light was almost gone when we reached Main Road, and said our good nights.

This was a great evening, and I would advise anyone of any age to give it a go. I did the same three caches with my young family, it does make it easier if one of you knows the general location, and they loved the treasure box seeing what had been left. We left mini dinosaurs! We are now planning holidays and have already seen a few that we can do in other areas, so yes; I have "cach'd" the bug!

It is and always has been a legal requirement to lodge a copy of any publication with the British Library - the law dates back to 1662.

The Naphill Gazette may well only have a local readership but 'parish' magazines such as the Gazette are a treasure trove for historians, etc and are an integral part of the 'Commonweal'. They would be in danger of disappearing for ever if it were not for this requirement to lodge copies with the British Library.

The reason for five extra copies has nothing to do with bureaucracy gone mad; it is because there are actually 6 legal deposit libraries. They are:

- British Library,
- National Library of Scotland,
- · National Library of Wales,
- Bodleian Libraries, Oxford,
- · University Library, Cambridge,
- · Library of Trinity College, Dublin.

And the reason why electronic copies are not acceptable is that they will never last as long as the printed page – a book kept in the right conditions is, to all intents and purposes, indestructible. Electronic media storage and retrieval is already beginning to cause great concern as technology changes so rapidly and electronic media does, contrary to popular opinion, physically deteriorate.

So, keep the faith with the printed page!

HPC FACTOID #2 - We own eighteen dog waste bins in the Parish - four of which are in NAWA. They cost ~£4,000 annually to look after and empty twice a week.

Our second month into this four year term and we are starting to get into the swing of things.

Let's start by saying well done everyone for a fantastic Napfest. This is the second year of the new three day format and it was a wonderful weekend. Great to see so many people supporting this event. One of the nicest stories we came across was that of the electrician who looks after all the power and lighting requirements on the Crick He doesn't live here - never has. He currently lives in St Albans but comes because he loves our village atmosphere.

Our quiet-ish location does on occasion resonate to the airborne thrum of Rolls-Royce engines and a few weeks back we had another example of this. As residents we've all appreciated this brief interlude from our back gardens or front pavement in the past. It was a real privilege therefore to attend the reason for this particular flypast, timed as it was for the lowering of the flag as part of the sunset ceremony at RAF High Wycombe complete with honour guard and band. It For some of us councillors this was our first invitation to the Annual Reception as guests of the still relatively new Station Commander Gp. Cpt. Philip Lester. He took the opportunity to thank all the organisations and people locally that support the RAF and again emphasized his desire to work with our local community.

One of our priorities as a new council is to spend less time in meetings and more time out in the Parish with residents, protecting and improving our immediate environment and with it, the quality of our lives. This isn't just us councillors but our staff too. To encourage this, the council decided to reduce the number of committees and the meetings held associated with them with immediate effect. This will have the benefit of giving time back to our staff as they won't have to prepare agenda and write up minutes for these either. We have also agreed that we should hold one of our monthly Full Council meetings in another part of the Parish this year. All our council meetings are open to the public to attend, either to just watch and listen or indeed to participate. Holding one of these in one of our local Village Halls or Schools gives more people the opportunity to see their council in action and engage with us. Watch this space as to when and where!

One of those areas where we like to get out and about is with our allotments. We have the annual allotment competition coming up on 18th July. We are looking to shake up the judging this year with at least one representative from our Allotment Liaison committee on the judging panel alongside councillors. We are also looking to add some other prize categories in the future. The range of produce is always impressive and many allotment holders put such hard work into their plots. There are also plenty of examples of inventive usages of everyday objects to improve growth and protect from the weather/insects. If you every need inspiration for your own garden, take a walk through one of the local allotment gardens (making sure your dog is on its lead if you bring one!)

Before this Gazette edition comes out we will be

holding our first council strategy session which is where we will be discussing and agreeing what our objectives are both in the short and long term. From the Parish survey we conducted, the areas of focus are pretty clear and one aspect has already been approved. That is the setting up of a Road Safety working group that will enable us to combine all the ongoing issues we have (Parking around the Co-op at Walter's Ash & outside the Post Office in Naphill, along with speeding and the general condition of our local roads) as well as new issues as they come along to ensure we coordinate with other local groups such as the Residents Association and Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) to keep driving these to some conclusion with the responsible agencies eg. Transport for Bucks.

The new gate at the entrance to Bradenham village is now in place and the parish council have received a number of compliments about the gate. The order for coloured strips to help speed reduction on Bradenham Woods Lane has been placed.

Paul Rogerson is pursuing a grant to have a defibrillator placed in the Bradenham phone box. The council have contributed £500 to this scheme.

The A4010 as a proposed HS2 construction route continues to keep the council busy. The chairman visited the Select Committee when they came to Stoke Mandeville Hospital on 11th June. The council have now combined its efforts to have the construction route removed from the A4010, with Princes Risborough, West Wycombe, Buckinghamshire County Council, the National Trust and Wycombe District Council.

An extra ordinary meeting was held to co-opt two new councillors to the council. Three very capable people had shown an interest and Richard Langridge and Paul Oborn were elected to serve on the council for the next four years.

At the same meeting the Head of Planning and Sustainability at Wycombe District Council addressed the Council with an update on the planning proposals for the Molins site in Saunderton and the Saunderton village Plan.

The speed limit review for New Road, Walter's Ash is currently being investigated by the Council. The proposal is to extend the 30mph zone further toward Lacey Green, but the proposal is not for it to go as far as the parish council had originally asked for. The RAF will fund the change in the speed limit, once it has been agreed.

The next meeting will be Monday 13th July at 7.00pm at Bradenham Cricket Club, members of the public welcome to attend.

The full length did not meet with DoT guidelines and NAWARA Committee was disappointed to see that the proposed extension is no further than just beyond the last bungalow and does not include the bend in the road. We consider this to be a dangerous, somewhat blind bend. However the notice asks for 'objections to or support for' the proposal as it stands, and we understand that any changes requested might require a new application, assessment and funding. Your say on Road Safety in Walter's Ash

A reduction to 30mph max speed has been proposed (and is being funded) by RAF High Wycombe along New Road which is currently 40mph as you come into Walter's Ash from Lacey Green.

If you walk along the footpaths by the road you will have seen notices pinned to the roadsigns about this but it hasn't really been publicised anywhere else.

Bucks County Council has indicated that only part of the section (0.15 miles / 240metres) should have its speed limit reduced (which would include the zebra crossing) missing out the entrance/exits to the Station, Parkwood and the Whiteleaf Bowmen Archery Club (0.3 Mile/ 480metres). This means those drivers entering Walters Ash from Lacey Green would go from a 60mph limit to 40mph just before the RAF Base and then less than ½ mile later down to 30mph.

There have been several collisions along this section of road including sadly, the fatality of a pedestrian in March 2013.

For the sake of the 400metres (and the whole 8 SECONDS longer it will take to travel this at max 30mph rather than 40mph) would it not make sense to apply the 30mph across the whole section which takes in The RAF car park

The public consultation is open until July 10th. Objections and representations to the proposal together with the grounds on which they are made must be sent in writing to the Council, marked for the attention of Laura Bamford, Legal Services (email lbamford@buckscc.gov.uk)

Many thanks to all those who joined the Friends of Naphill Common or renewed their membership at the Napfest. We have well over a hundred members and this support gives us the authority to work for the protection and improvement of the Common. As the recent felling has shown, we cannot control some of the decisions that are made but we can influence the outcome. We were able to mark those trees we felt should be preserved and those around the ponds that we would like to remove. We also managed to influence the way the bridleways were widened and get the worst of the ruts smoothed out. With your support we hope to have the same level of influence over the future series of felling.

Thanks also go to the historian Marian Miller for leading the history walk NAPHILL IN 1913. Following on from the very popular walk last year, Part 2 covered the half of Naphill between The Wheel and Walters Ash, visiting some of our oldest buildings.

You are welcome on our regular walks. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month and the dates are as follows: 20th July, 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9.30am sharp. All our walks are cost free to join.

The long walk scheduled for the 18 May had to be postponed owing to heavy rain. It was rearranged for Monday 1st June when fortunately the weather was more kind to us. The walk was five miles long

and started at The Black Horse in Fulmer. It took us alongside the Pickeridge estate which until recently was the HQ for the waste disposal group SITA. We noticed a significant amount of Japanese Knotweed on the estate as we passed by which will no doubt cause some concern if any development is going to take place on the estate! We continued walking through open countryside up Hedgerley Hill to Church Wood, an RSPB nature reserve near Hedgerley. From there we walked adjacent to the M40 motorway for a short distance passing Low Farm before arriving back at Fulmer. It was a nice easy walk with some lovely



countryside to appreciate. A fine lunch was enjoyed at The Black Horse by a group of thirteen.

Our work parties continue. The focus at the moment is on the paths and Japanese Knotweed eradication. Towards the end of the year we will be planting out the junipers and working on the ponds. meet on the first Sunday (and sometimes on the third Sunday) of the month, but you can join in as frequently or infrequently as you like.

Letter from our Methodist Minister

In the course of this year, more people will visit Spain than almost any country on earth, including my wife and I. Most will fly there, a few will drive, some like us will fly partway and then drive, a few will go by ferry, and a few thousand will walk there! The walkers are mainly pilgrims on the Way of St James, converging on Santiago de Compostela, (in NW Spain) after a few hundred miles.

But I wanted to tell you of a man setting out in a boat for Spain long ago. He wasn't a pilgrim but his reasons for travelling were kind of religious. He wasn't heading for the NW corner of Spain, in fact he would have settled for anywhere in Spain, or for that matter anywhere a long way away. Perhaps that's the way many people choose their holiday destination!

He wasn't from UK, but set out from Jaffa. No jaffa cakes in those days, but no doubt some jaffa oranges for the journey. It wasn't a regular ferry route, and this was a cargo ship, but he paid an agreed fare.

Like modern tourists, he was a man who was getting away from it all, except he hadn't been saving up his annual leave for that special holiday of a lifetime, and he should have been at work. He just didn't fancy his allotted task.

He'd been assigned to go to Mosul in Northern Iraq. Given the modern news reports from that part of the world, maybe you and I would also have preferred a different assignment!

In those days Mosul was a vast commercial, political and religious city, one of the biggest cities in the world, and no more troubled than any other city. But like all cities it was an immoral place. Our man's task was to go and clean up that city before it was too late.

Arguably an impossible task. But our man had no sympathy for the immoral people of Mosul: "Let them rot! I'm off to Spain!" And off he went.

Maybe you recognise this story of Jonah, and I'm sure you know of the storm, and how they threw him into the sea and he got swallowed by a great fish, who spewed him up onto the beach back where he started. Possibly you're less familiar with Part 2 of the story, when the Lord assigned him again to go to Nineveh (as Mosul was known in those days) and warn them of the looming disaster brought about by their immorality. Reluctantly Jonah went back to work, and I don't think he ever got his visit to Spain. But the people of Nineveh heeded the warning and changed their ways and disaster was averted.

For each of us the balance between work and leisure, between our responsibilities and our freedoms, is delicate but vital. Sometimes we are called to do the impossible, or are stuck with a situation we don't like and maybe don't approve of. Sometimes we'd prefer to run away (to Spain or anywhere!). Mostly, the right thing is to stick with it and see it through, but sometimes a break (a holiday) can refresh us, and give us a new perspective, and a revived enthusiasm.

I hope (and pray) that this holiday season will be good for you all.


Naphill Scouts

After packing the dog, jeans, tee shirts, storm-proof clothing, cameras and tripod, I was miffed to find that I hadn't enough room for my bucket and spade. I was on my way to the wild, Atlantic coast of Cornwall. Sun, surf, sunburn and endless Beachboys music.

I went for a recce. Porth Nanven was tiny. Tiny. It was also dangerous with a very fragile-looking cliff towering over the beach and.....,well, dull.... and not very inspirational. I recognised some of the

huge granite rocks which had starred in Nadolski's photographs. Yes, I know it's a bit sad that I can remember and recognise individual rocks and one day I'll tell you about rocks I'm acquainted with on the Common; but that's for another time.

Just one person was on the sandy part of the beach: just one person making great big, ugly boot-marks on the smooth, pristine, tide-washed sand. Not the footsteps I was hoping to follow.

I explored the beach. Nothing stirred my imagination. I slipped and slithered my way back towards the car and then I saw it. An inspirational picture emerged. Not granite dinosaur eggs and not sand. It was Sea Thrift; beautiful pink flowers set against the backdrop of the sea and the setting sun. My kind of picture.

So, the moral of my story is that you cannot borrow someone else's inspiration - you need to find your own. Be amazed, perhaps even be envious but be yourself and make your own pictures. No doubt a lesson in life as well as photography.

There were lots of people at Napfest this year being themselves and providing inspiration for the front cover. Thank you to all those who joined in with the making of the pictures. Enjoy making yours.

THE villages of Walters Ash and Naphill have had their fair share of local characters.

One such was Walter Edward (Monkey) Allen who farmed at Allen's Farm – 28 acres on the corner of Clappins Lane and Main Road.

The attractive farmhouse with lattice windows is shown in the picture, inset above.

The son of a vicar of Hazlemere. Monkey liked to

The son of a vicar of Hazlemere, Monkey liked to claim that he was a 'true English yeoman'. He was in his 80s when he died and was as eccentric in death as in life.

For his funeral he specified that his coffin be born to Hughenden church on his dung cart.

ruth on his dung cart.

In the photograph, above, is the funeral cortege in February 1928. It is led by two men formally attired including

top hats, then 12 members of the Naphill Brass Band, a police constable, the open cart drawn by a single horse, a motor car, and finally the mourners.

All as specified by Monkey Allen! He also directed that the inscription on his gravestone should describe him as 'yeoman, for over 40 years parish constable, special constable during the Great War, and 16 years Guardian of the Poor'.

Another well-known resident,

Another well-known resident, who achieved national fame, was the Windsor chairmaker H E (Jack) Goodchild, above left. Jack and his brother Sid, who was deaf, were the last independent chairmakers in the Chilterns, and one of the few who combined all the tasks involved in making a chair involved in making a chair, from bodger to framer.

They produced Windsor chairs of outstanding quality in chairs of outstanding quanty in their workshops. Jack's workshop was of wooden construction situated adjacent to the flint cottage where he and his family lived, at The Dovecot, Hunts Hill, Naphill, shown below

below.
A re-creation of Jack Goodchild's workshop with his tools, bench, splats, part-made chair etc is featured at Wycombe Museum.
It's well worth a visit.
Much of this information is taken from the book Naphill and Walters Ash, Looking back at Village Life, by Rex Leaver.

Friends of Naphill Common

The prolonged dry weather has not done much for our gardens but it has made the common accessible. On hot days there can be few places more pleasant to stroll and enjoy the shade – and we have over a year's grace before the sound of the chainsaw disturbs the calm again. Quite where the next phase of felling will take place is not yet known but we will let the village know as soon as it is decided. It is hoped that we will again get the chance to mark the valuable trees and the vulnerable archaeology before the machines move in

Within the prolonged sunny spell there were two brief periods of high winds and we have lost two trees as a consequence. One is an elderly, hollow beech, a short distance from the end of Forge Road. It split down the middle and fell across the bridleway. (Tree number 100 on our survey of the important trees.) It will have to be cleared for horses to pass. The other was a middle-aged horse chestnut growing on one of the Clumps. This is particularly sad as the Clumps once had several horse chestnuts, but most have become diseased and have been removed or severely pollarded. The fallen tree was one of the few remaining healthy specimens. As it was on the bank of the Clump the uprooting might have revealed something to tell us more about these enigmatic features, but alas it did not. A discarded clay pipe or a coin would have told us roughly when the banks were made, but close inspection of the damaged section revealed nothing.

It is not clear whether the recent felling is responsible for the collapse of the beech, or that vigorous clearing allowed the wind to hit the horse chestnut on the clumps. Perhaps we have to accept that when changes are made some trees will benefit but others may suffer.

We are already planning a programme of work for the autumn and winter, so if you would like to get involved let us know. At least four of the ponds (Shipwash, Small, Willow and Lady Horse) are in urgent need of attention. We need to drag out many decades' worth of leaf litter and accumulated branches, together with some of the floating sweet-grass, rushes and sedges. This must be done with care to ensure that we don't remove valuable plants and animals. Consequently we will only work on a section of each pond each year. With luck this should increase the amount of open water available for frogs, toads and newts. (We appeal to dog owners not to allow their pets to enter the ponds. Chemicals in their coats, such as those for flea control, can be devastating for pond life.)

We also plan to re-introduce the juniper cuttings taken from our few remaining junipers, so you may see some within wire cages to protect them from deer. The existing four aged specimens will be given a little more space and light in the hope that they can be revivified. In addition to our normal working parties we will be supported by the Chiltern Rangers and we are very grateful for their help.

Whether a member or not, you are welcome on our friendly regular walks. Chris Miller leads our short walks (2 to 3 miles) starting at 10:30am from the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of each month. Ron Collins leads the longer walks of about five miles (2½ to 3 hours) on the third Monday of each month

and the dates are as follows: 17th Aug, 21st Sept, 19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9:30am sharp. All free and open to members and non-members.

Our annual 'Bat Walk' will be led by Julie Hopton from the local bat group. It will start from the Village Hall at 8:15pm (just before sunset) on Friday 14th August and walk round various areas of the Common where we've found bats in the past. If you're planning to attend, please let me know (01494 564030) and we will try to provide enough bat detectors.

Also, our 'Fungal Foray', held in conjunction with experts from the Bucks Fungus Group to assist with identification of our finds, will be held on 25th October – meet at the Village Hall at 10:00am. Last year 92 different species were identified, of which 21 were new to the Common. This is a great opportunity to learn more about some common (and some not so common) varieties of our native fungi.

Our common is a most valuable and glorious local asset; a Special Conservation Area and a Site of Special Scientific Importance, Grade 1. If you would like help in its protection and enhancement please consider joining The Friends of Naphill Common. Visit our website for more information.

Letter from our Methodist Minister

Dear Friends,

Forgive me if you've heard me on about this before. Likewise I'll forgive you, for not remembering whether you've heard me on about this before!

We sometimes use the term "forgiveness" in quite a shallow sense, but for serious situations forgiveness can bring peace and reconciliation, where no amount of argument or pressure or force can succeed. At its best it allows aggrieved parties to forget, and to get on with life.

You may remember a few years ago a campaign to cancel the debts of the poorest nations. The burden of paying the interest on loans from their international creditors, was dragging their economies lower and lower. There was no possible chance of the debts ever being repaid, but some creditors (some very respectable banks and governments) were happy to ignore the sufferings of poor people and keep on receiving their legal dues. The concept of cancelling those debts was utterly unthinkable.

Yet with prolonged campaigning, many of those debts have been cancelled, and though those countries are nowhere near prosperous, they have at least had the chance of a new start. Some will make a better job of it, and probably some will not!

Greece is not quite in the same category, but their debts are astronomical. Maybe by the time you read this it will all be sorted out, but I suspect it will drag on for months and years. The EU and other creditors don't wish to throw away what is rightfully theirs, and would probably say they can't afford to. Yet the reality is that they are going to lose some of it, like it or not. At the moment there is confrontation, bluff and counterbluff, threat and counter-threat. The outcome looks like being determined by political manoeuvrings, rather than legal rights, and care for our fellow human beings

seems in short supply. Forgiveness looks a million miles away.

The last few years has seen an increase in personal debts in this country, and even in Bucks there have been some desperate situations. We have a food bank (like our One Can in Wycombe) in every town in Britain. Debt advice through such as CAP (Christians Against Poverty) is on an increasing scale. Bankruptcy of individuals and companies has burgeoned. That at least allows a new start for some. I think bankruptcy is a sort of enforced forgiveness, though proper forgiveness has to be voluntary, gracious.

When Jesus taught his prayer including "forgive us our trespasses", his words can be correctly translated as "forgive us our debts" (financial as well as moral debts), but He wisely included "as we forgive our debtors". Forgiveness is two-ended, or as Shakespeare put it "It is twice blessed: it blesseth him who gives and him that takes", though he was speaking of forgiveness's close relative, mercy.

May you and I and others find that mercy and forgiveness in our hearts.

Bradenham Parish Council

A defibrillator will be installed in the Bradenham phone box in July. This has been funded in part by the parish council and the rest has been organised by Paul Rogerson. To access the defibrillator you will need to call 999 from this phone box, at which point it will be established as to whether there is a need for the defibrillator. If this eqipment is deemed to be necessary the caller will be given a code which will allow access to the defibrillator.

During October our parish council is due to appear before the Parliamentary Select Committee for the hearings to discuss the HS2 construction route, which is currently planned as being routed via the A4010.

The parish council has agreed to support the speed limit reduction from 40mph to 30mph along a section of New Road, Walter's Ash, although the length of road to which this will be applied is shorter than the council had originally supported. There are strict Department of Transport guidelines in place which guide the speed limits set on public roads and to where and how these can be appied. The substantial cost of this speed limit review is being born by the R.A.F.

It was decided again to examine the feasibility of a parish council web site.

The next meeting will be on Monday 14 September at 7.00pm at Bradenham Cricket club which the public are welcome to attend.

Letter from our Member of Parliament

Over the next year there are going to be important decisions about local housing and planning policy for our area. I hope that local residents will take part in the consultations run by Wycombe Council as it develops its Local Plan.

The Local Plan will set the strategic framework for development in Wycombe District. It will set out what the housing and employment needs will be for the future and how and where they will be met. The Council can't just pluck numbers out of the air, but has to demonstrate to a Planning Inspector that that the Plan is based on hard evidence.

The key point is that once the Local Plan is in place Wycombe Council is in a much stronger position to resist speculative development and have confidence that its decision will be upheld at appeal.

Alongside the District-wide Local Plan there can be Neighbourhood Plans for individual towns and villages that set out how development will be planned there. Discussions have started in Risborough about such a Neighbourhood Plan.

Wycombe District will need more housing. Already, I get many young people telling me that they are in decent jobs but can't get even a first foot on the housing ladder. Not only is the overall population growing, but social change (people living longer and the high rate of divorce and separation) means that we now need more homes for any given level of population than we did a generation ago.

This all means difficult decisions for the Council. They've got to consider not just homes but the need for jobs, infrastructure, and services. Most of the District is Green Belt. If that is sacrosanct, pretty much all the development will be directed to the Risborough, Longwick, and Kimble area. Is that right? What is the best balance between conservation and development?

Already, there is talk of up to 2,500 new homes in Princes Risborough and of housing development on the Molins site at Saunderton. If those ideas come to fruition, there will be a traffic impact on the A4010 and on villages like Walters Ash and Naphill. And that is before we take into account the effect of what seems likely to be significantly larger development in Aylesbury Vale and Milton Keynes.

Please use your opportunity to ensure that Wycombe Council understands the implications of these developments for your community.

Hughenden Parish Council Report

HPC FACTOID #3 - We own & maintain 7 bus shelters in the Parish. We've been asked to add two more in Widmer End.

The school term is coming to an end, the summer holidays are just around the corner and soon we will have six weeks of relative calm on the roads and footpaths around our schools as the drop off carnage subsides. As thoughtless & dangerous car/van parking has become somewhat of a theme in recent issues of the Gazette, as well as being the number #3 most disliked issue (only trumped by speeding and dog fouling) by residents in last year's parish survey, we thought it worth mentioning in our column too. We are not alone in this, it is a national issue. Charities such as Guide Dogs for the Blind, Age UK, the RNIB along with the National Association of Local Council are seeking to re-introduce a blanket ban on pavement parking in this Parliament through a Private Members Bill.

Parking locally is a problem. There are a dozen reasons that this is the case. Various organisations such as ours can identify hotspots especially where there is a heightened safety risk (such as around the shops and garage at Walter's Ash and the Post Office in Naphill), we can try and find a solution (as we have found, it usually requires more than one), then permission has to be sought from those that it will affect to implement it, finally there is the battle to find the money to pay for it. In the meantime, those of us who drive and park/deliver on our roads, by our schools, our shops, our houses, could just THINK for a moment and park courteously both for pedestrians and other road users. The footpath is just that, a path for feet, not tyres. The space around junctions and driveways is to be respected, to allow visibility for vehicles to enter and leave.

Leading on from this, the specific issue of parking in Kilnwood, directly in front of the school took a step closer to being addressed now that RAF High Wycombe and the RAF Police have accepted that they have jurisdiction over the entire length of Kilnwood. In the past term we have been made aware of several close calls involving children, pushchairs and poorly parked or reversing cars. A meeting has recently been held between RAF Police, Thames Valley Police, the School and the Parish Council to thrash out what can be done to help calm the traffic and parking situation along that road and increase the safety for pedestrians especially at drop-off and collection times. We hope to be able to see some improvements taking place during the summer holidays in time for the new school year.

That meeting in part has been aided by RAF High Wycombe's Station Commander Group Captain Lester's stated commitment to work with and be a genuine partner in our local community. He has confirmed his attendance at our next full parish council meeting on September 8th which is open to the public, so do please come along to hear what he has to say.

We are pleased to support the Naphill Village Hall Committee's plans to put a teenage activity area on the Crick. The equipment, comprising a basketball hoop and multi-activity ball wall will hopefully be installed in time for plenty of use in the summer. Whilst the idea and the cost of the equipment and installation is covered by the Village Hall, the Parish Council has agreed to pay for regular safety inspections and maintenance in line with our policy for all other play equipment in the parish.

On the subject of new installations, some of you may have also seen that a new village noticeboard has been erected by the corner of Main Road and Templewood in Walter's Ash. This is part of the council's communication plan, to ensure we can reach residents and keep them informed via a variety of different ways, both new and traditional. Walter's Ash was one of our wards that was identified as not having any village noticeboard and we have sought to address that, it's a bit bare right now but you can help with this. If you have a local event or charity initiative which you wish to promote then please get in contact with us or the Parish Clerk.

Monkey Allan

In the July Gazette, there was an illustrated article on the late William Allan, the son of the reverend George Allan, vicar of Hazlemere. In his early life, William – known locally as 'monkey Allan', apparently because of his strange appearance – had various jobs, including a spell as a vet in Yorkshire. Yet he was still only in his early 30s when he returned to take over a small homestead in Walter's Ash, where he worked for some 50 years looking after cattle, horses and poultry. These long hours of work included milking, making butter and cheese, collecting eggs, and cooking for himself. Sometimes he would take goods to Wycombe riding on his horse-drawn cart. His dairy was always spotlessly clean.

A bachelor and somewhat of a recluse, he was widely respected and known to be a great admirer of Benjamin Disraeli. Indeed, this was one reason that his will – a copy of which I have, witnessed by Harold Oakshott of Firs Cottage, Walter's Ash – stipulated that he be buried in Hughenden churchyard.

Because of his unusual looks, village girls tended to go in pairs to collect their families' milk. Clearly, William appreciated their visits, naming two of his Guernsey cows Hilda and Maud after two them.

During his long life he served for some time as a Tory councillor on Hughenden Parish Council and was also on the Wycombe Board of Guardians as well as several committees including the School Attendance Board. In 1901, he was a census enumerator and during WW1 was a Parish Constable.

Following his death in 1928, undertakers J W Saunders found that his detailed will specified a plain oak coffin bearing only his name and date of death. Flowers were prohibited except for a single wreath made using flowers from his garden. Instead of a hearse, he chose to be transported lying on hay in his own dung cart pulled by his mare. Unfortunately, by the time he died, the cart was too ramshackle and his mare had also passed away so a local farmer carried out his wishes with a different horse and cart. The two-mile procession to the church, headed by the Naphill Brass Band (conducted by Mr Parslow) and four 'maiden ladies', was met at the gates by the reverend A L Whitfield. The funeral was very well attended, one of the mourners being Major Coningsby Disraeli.


Any readers wishing to know more about 'monkey Allan', who was a Bucks Yeoman, can find lots of detail in The Wycombe and Marlow Journal, including the funeral music played by the brass band and by the organist F. J. Brinell during the service.

William's farmhouse was later owned by a local Smith family but was sold in 1999 and subsequently pulled down and redeveloped for housing. And talking of housing, there is an Allen Drive off Clappins Lane in Naphill which is said to have been named in his memory, though the spelling is different. William himself maintained that his surname was Allan.

From all I have read, he sounds a fascinating character and someone I would love to have met.



Naphill came fifth in the De Fraine Cup this year. The results are only just in and the detailed marks are not yet available. The winner was Stewkley with 87 marks, 6 more than the runner up – Pitstone. There were only 3 marks between Pitstone and the next 3 villages, including Naphill. It will be interesting to see the marks for individual features in due course. The Judges' Comments for Naphill are given below:-

Areas around and in front of shops, pubs and bus shelters were litter free and tidy. Both pubs had a welcoming appearance which reflected summer and the enthusiasm of the landlords. The village hall is in good use, according to the information supplied, and has a well marked out car park. The recreation ground is in good condition and very well used. The adjacent children's playground is adequately furnished and maintained.

Vincent's Meadow is attractively laid out with winding paths that continually offer fresh vistas. Pickups Pond is potentially a very attractive feature but is becoming filled by grass and other weeds and could do with a maintenance effort.

To keep Naphill Common in good order is a big undertaking for the village, and it is clear that the Friends of Naphill Common are diligent in its upkeep.

Naphill shows much evidence of communal activity, with results evident in the attractiveness of the common and the generally neat appearance of the built up areas.

It is pleasing to have an independent view of our village, and we can be very proud of residents' efforts.

The Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Competition 1957 - 2015

The Editor's suggestion that this edition of the Gazette should have a Best Kept Village theme provides me with the opportunity of giving readers some background history regarding the County Competition which first came into existence in 1957 and has been held every year since with one exception in 1974. I have been associated with its organisation since 1970, firstly as a judge and then as chairman and finalist judge of the county competition since 1980.

The competition was inaugurated by the County of Buckinghamshire Association of Local Councils, (abbreviated to BALC) around 1957 with the first cups presented to the association by Norman Gurney Esq, President of the Association, and T Leigh DeFraine Esq. These two cups are named after their Donors. It was not until 1969 that the Michaelis Cup came into existence for the larger parishes and town councils. In 1987 it was found difficult to judge and compare towns such as Marlow with large rural parishes like Haddenham. Being Chairman of BALC at the time, I donated the Pushman Cup for rural parishes and the Michaelis Cup was awarded to the Best Kept Town. In 1982 our then sponsors, the Wilkinson Sword Company presented the Association with a magnificent ceremonial sword, now called the Sword of Excellence and awarded to the village or town with the highest number of marks overall. In 1988 we had the possibility of competitors repeatedly winning the

same cup. To avoid this happening, we introduced a "cup winner's cup" donated by Margaret Tindall, a past chairman of BALC, and presented to the winners of the best of the five previous years' cup winners. The Dashwood Trophy, presented by the late Sir Francis Dashwood, is awarded to the best Runner Up who has not won a trophy in the past five years. There is also a shield presented to young people where it can be shown that they have helped in the preparation and tidying of winning villages.

The Competition is now organised into five categories based on population size. The Guerney Cup for small villages of under 500 persons, for example Bradenham. The Morris Cup, 501 to 1,500. Naphill competes in the DeFraine Cup 1,501 to 3,000. Thre is a cup for larger parishes such as Stokenchurch with more than 3,000 population, and the Best Town Cup, for example for Marlow. The Competition has five teams of three judges who give freely of their services and without whom the Competition could not be organised.

Most counties throughout the United Kingdom hold similar competitions, some organised by various groups such as The Campaign for Rural England and the Women's Institute but mostly by the County Associations of Local Councils. Here in Buckinghamshire we have ceded from BALC and become a standalone organisation with an excellent Co-ordinator and a small management committee, with a twice yearly meeting of Judges who deal with any policy modifications. It relies on sponsorship from the County Council and its four Districts and a contribution from Milton Keynes Council. The highlight of the year is Presentation Day in September with the Lord Lieutenant or his deputy touring the County in a coach supplied by Motts Coaches as part of their sponsorship donation and Savills Estate agents, who make an award to the village displaying a strong community participation in the competition.

It was in my Gazette Notes back in the early 1980's that I suggested that Naphill enter the competition. This was greeted with some amusement and scepticism at the time because most readers wrongly thought that it was a competition for the 'prettiest' village instead of the 'best kept'. In 1986 Naphill won for the first time and did so again in 1987! It won again in 1990 and then again eight years later in 1998 the last time it received the cup although it has had several Merit Awards since for obtaining 80 plus marks. Perhaps 2016 will be a lucky year. There are many anecdotal stories associated with the competition, too many to recount here but perhaps a subject for a further article.

The Competition now has high standards but remains increasingly popular with over 60 villages participating this year, a record entry. Over a five year cycle about 120 villages and towns provide the pool of entrants from which 50 plus enter. Competition amongst entrants has increased environmental awareness throughout the county and with the help of a volunteer force of local residents I think we can all see the improvements in our own communities. I have made many presentations and talks to villages and organisations over the years and I am always happy to give advice to any potential applicants.

I was doing a bit of early morning photography the other day. Not quite daybreak stuff, more prebreakfast. And on the face of it, nothing too exciting; allotments actually.

I'd noticed that these allotments were all tended in very different ways. The plants, the way the soil was turned and raked: raised beds, mown paths, piles of compost, rhubarb that looked like a herd of elephants might be living in there.

But the more I looked the more I could see. The rhythm of the planting, the pattern of dark circles of wet earth surrounding single columns of brassicas; lavender shimmering with Red Admirals eager for their breakfast; a tree shaded bench seat, brightly coloured watering cans lined up like soldiers filled and ready for action; a menagerie of ceramic creatures revealing the names of the plants they were guarding and a cluster of dwarf kayak oars that seemed to be growing and trying to escape the nets that held them in. A beautiful place.

Once I could see the possibilities, I then reached for the camera and started to make photographs of the pictures I could now see in my minds-eye. I used different viewpoints, shot into the sunlight to turn Red Admirals' wings into stained glass, settled the bench seat into its own landscape and transformed an old galvanised cold frame into a graphic of silver and green. And those watering cans!

I had discovered beauty in the most unlikely place. Simply by noticing and then looking carefully and closely, I discovered dozens of pictures right on my doorstep.

Do have a long look at Paul Goby's cover picture of the Bee Orchid. It's a rare beasty. Doesn't it make you ask how did nature produce such a beautiful piece of art; a forgery of a bee but a unique work of art. How many bees has it lured with promises of friendship - or more perhaps. Notice the soft warm light which contrasts with, and enhances the amazing hue and pattern of the Bee Orchid. Paul looked carefully, saw his picture and then created this beautiful photograph.

I hope that Paul's picture and my agricultural search

for beauty inspire you to get out there and discover the beauty surrounding you. Have a great summer and enjoy your photography.



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

Friends of Naphill Common

Good news! A goshawk has been seen on the Common, flying along the grassy area next to Bradenham Woods. Goshawks are predominately grey, like large sparrowhawks but much less common; rare according to some books. Females are larger than males. They generally fly at treetop level hunting birds to the size of pigeons and even pheasants and mammals as large as hares, or you may see them soaring high or perched with their body erect. They have traditionally been persecuted by gamekeepers and became extinct in this country in the 19th Century, but they have slowly recolonised parts of the country

and are now a protected species. Welcome to Naphill!

Less welcome visitors have been two Ring-necked Parakeets. These are spectacular, large (magpie-sized) green birds – see photo taken in my garden – unlikely to be mistaken for anything else, adult



males have a rose coloured ring round their necks. They are an introduced species (some believe they escaped after filming of The African Queen at Isleworth studios) that are rapidly extending their range from West London up the Thames and their loud screeching calls are often heard along the river at Marlow. They roost in huge numbers in the Twickenham area, where they create a great deal of noise and mess, so we must hope they do not find Naphill too congenial!

We have a lot of work to do this autumn. We want to return some of the juniper cuttings to the Common. We will position them on the sunny side of newly cleared areas and protect them from the deer with netting.

We also want to work on some of the ponds once the newts have left them. This will start on 1st October when the Chiltern Rangers will work on Shipwash and possibly Small Pond, helped by the Brownies and volunteers from FONC. Later we will work on Daisy, Lady Horse and Willow ponds. We will undertake a cautious programme, clearing only a part of the weed and iris clumps to give a little more open water. Meanwhile the Parish Council are going to work around Pickup's Pond (which is just outside the area of the Common), again with help from FONC.

Our usual working parties will continue to clear paths, cut back holly and generally clear up the Common. They will meet on 4th & 11th Oct., 1st & 15th Nov., 6th & 20th Dec, and then into the New Year. Please join in if you can: it really is an enjoyable and worthwhile couple of hours. (You don't have to be a member of FONC.) The details, including where to meet, are on our website, or contact Peter Davis who leads the working parties.

It seems that we have eliminated the Himalayan Balsam after several years of pulling it up, but if you spot any let us know. The more serious pest, Japanese Knotweed is very much reduced but still survives, so there is more work to do.

Chris Miller will lead short walks (2-3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village hall on the first wednesday of each month (7th Oct., 4th Nov., 2nd Dec.). Ron Collins will lead the longer walks (about 5 miles) on the third monday of each month (19th Oct, 16th Nov and 21st Dec.) Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9:30am sharp. Please join in – they are free and you don't have to be a member.

Our annual 'Fungal Foray', held in conjunction with experts from the Bucks Fungus Group to assist with identification of our finds, will be held on 25th October also meet at the Village Hall at 10:00am. All are welcome, including children. Last year 92 different

species were identified, of which 21 were new to the Common. This is a great opportunity to learn more about some common (and some not so common) species of our native fungi. Contact Peter Davis for more information.

Now, I ask you, is that not a story???? Well, at least the outline for a story?

"Why do you ask?" She said

I went on to say that I thought it would be fascinating to make photographs of initial carvers against their initials - the people as they are today pictured at the side of their carvings. Or in the case of a deceased pop star from the 70's, standing with an LP or maybe dressed in flared jeans.

"What a brilliant idea"

"Well, some carvings are expressions of adoration; I wouldn't want to inadvertently be the cause of any domestic disruption"

"It would be fine. I think that people would enjoy it"

A Letter from Our Member of Parliament

I enjoyed visiting Naphill village fete earlier this summer. For once, the weather was kind and the strawberries and cream on sale filled a gap very nicely.

This year we have also marked the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Britain. As I grow older and my sons reach the age of those young men who flew Spitfires and Hurricanes in 1940, I find myself becoming ever more acutely aware of the mixture of heroism and poignancy in the history of 'The Few'.

During the summer, I visited Lincoln. The Roll of Honour in the RAF chapel in Lincoln cathedral records the names of no fewer than 25,611 pilots and crew who gave their lives in defence of the freedom of Britain and the liberation of Europe. They included not just our own young men, but those from the then British Empire and from occupied countries in Europe. At the peak of the Battle of Britain, free Polish forces accounted for no less than 13% of our front-line pilots and Polish and Czechoslovak airmen fought bravely alongside our fliers throughout the war.

I was reminded of that in the most unexpected place – a

remote area of the Yorkshire Dales where we stayed on holiday. On the top of Buckden Pike, above Wharfedale, we found a simple stone memorial to five young Polish airmen killed when their bomber crashed during a blizzard in 1942. We owe them all so much.

Now back at work, I have restarted my programme of constituency surgeries. Any constituent can book an appointment by calling 01296 482102. If you do come to see me, please do try to prepare what you want to say and bring with you any documents that are important to the case. I almost always have every appointment fully booked and if everyone comes prepared, it means that others next in line don't have to wait so long.

Of course it's often quicker and easier to get action on a case by just emailing me or sending a letter to my parliamentary office. You can contact me on david.lidington. mp@parliament.uk. Letters should be posted to me at House of Commons, London SW1A 0AA. My staff and I will take the case up with whichever happens to be the relevant Government Department, agency or local council but we don't otherwise publicise it unless the constituent asks me to do so.

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Best Kept Village Competition Report

In the August/September Gazette it was possible to provide the judges' comments following their visit on 23rd June. As reported then, Naphill came fifth in the Defraine Cup with only 3 marks between the runner up (Pitstone) and the next three villages, including Naphill. The detailed marks for our village, in each category, are given below.

In making their judgements, judges are considering whether the feature they are looking at is Excellent and thus 5/5 or 10/10, Good 4/5 or 8/10, Average 3/5 or 6/10, or below.

The only Naphill feature given top marks (excellent) was the Common. Nearly every other feature was graded as Good. We can be very proud of this. The only feature judged as Average was the areas around shops; more pride in appearance could be taken here (eg weeds removed and litter cleared up). Villages that are really keen to win sweep shop frontages daily! This is difficult where the shop is by a bin or a bus stop but it could be done.

The garden around the War Memorial would probably have been considered excellent but the Memorial stone is in need of some tender loving care; steam clean perhaps?

The principal problems we have (1F) are the irregularity of verge and hedge cutting, weeds in the kerb stones, and the condition of the pond in Downley Road. These shortcomings are out of the control of the village itself, being dealt with by BCC, WDC, or HPC. The kerbstones are looking neater since the footpaths were repaired but where this has not been done (eg. along the Hughenden Valley road) the weeds proliferate to knee high! Some residents remove weeds on footpaths near their homes but we have a high age profile here and not everyone is fit enough to do this.

This year the De Fraine Cup was won by Stewkley, a result that is well—deserved. The villages that do best in the Best Kept Village Competition are those which have their own parish council. This is because some financial assistance can be provided, and also because many parished villages now organize their own grass cutting, etc. Hughenden Parish is as large

as a small town and contains nine villages in all; these villages are at a disadvantage in the competition as the 'playing field is not level'! HPC has yet to agree to take on grass cutting, etc. but it is certainly big enough.

Naphill has entered in each of the last three years and was commended in two of them. The marking system changed this year and it is now more difficult to achieve the 80 marks required. Our total was 78/100 in 2015. The Village Hall Council will consider whether to enter in 2016 sometime in the spring. Whatever it decides, the appearance of the village has been enhanced by people's individual efforts and by such things as colourful baskets, a new noticeboard, a pictorial map, repainted car park and railings, refurbished Hall sign, etc. and by extra litter picking efforts by a few.

The developer also owns the site adjoining the aforementioned brownfield site. Were this site and some additional land be developed for housing then the total development could accommodate approaching 800 houses. This would be a massive development, in effect creating a new village - which could justify the inclusion of a primary school and other amenities (e.g. a shop). In addition the development would extend towards Saunderton Railway Station and with suitable access could increase the usage of the station. Access would still be via Haw Lane but the traffic would be far greater and long queues could be expected to get to the site with traffic possibly backing up onto the A4010.

Not least in all these consultations is consideration of the effect on the countryside and the local villages. The site lies within the AONB and the Green Belt. The roads that serve it are already busy and likely to get busier with the additional developments scheduled for Princes Risborough and the nearby West's Yard (44 houses, access from Slough Lane).

Saunderton Development

Wycombe District Council are assessing the feasibility of building new homes in Saunderton – on the former Molins industrial site and surroundings . No plans have yet been approved. WDC are proposing to write an area action plan (AAP) and are consultating with local Parish Councils and residents.

Having examined over the past several years the possibility of a commercial tenant for the site - none was found. A planning application for 212 houses has been submitted to WDC for approval (15/05250/ OUTEA). The houses would be built on the former Molins factory premises – a "brownfield" site. Access to the site would be from Haw Lane. There is a shortage of housing in our area, new houses are needed and the development of a brownfield site is favoured by the Government. Nevertheless this site is problematic. Constituted as it presently is the development is not sustainable because it is remote from other urban areas and their associated facilities - meaning many more car journeys. Access at Haw Lane is a problem because the lane is narrow, lacks a pavement for pedestrians, is crossed by a narrow bridge and is prone to flooding close to the major road (the A4010).

The development as proposed is too small to justify the inclusion of amenities such as a school, community centre, shop etc. meaning that residents would need to drive to any of these amenities or

A trip down memory lane...underground!

When Royal Air Forces Association volunteer Ena Day attended the charity's annual conference she couldn't have known it would result in an invitation from the Chief of the Air Staff to visit today's equivalent of her old WAAF job.

Attending the Eastbourne conference to collect her certificate for being highly commended as a volunteer of the year, Ena met Sir Andrew Pulford, Chief of the Air Staff. On being asked about her RAF service, she talked of her time as a Direction Finder at RAF Hawkinge during WW II. Sir Andrew invited Ena to see how her job compares to modern day direction finding, and invited her to visit HQ Air Command at RAF High Wycombe.

The day started with a visit to Sir Arthur 'Bomber' Harris's office. Ena was very interested in the maps showing RAF locations, targets and routes, noting similarities to the maps she used while helping Allied pilots navigate their way home when lost over France or the Channel. She was particularly pleased to see RAF Hawkinge, near Folkestone, clearly shown. She also took the opportunity to see how modern day Direction Finders (Aerospace Battle Managers or ABMs) work at High Wycombe.

After lunch with the Station Commander and a group of ABMs, Gp Capt Lester was delighted to present Ena with a framed photo before thanking her for all her efforts.

The tour then moved to the bunker at RAF Uxbridge, where Ena relived her old job with a headset on

listening for the often faint calls of returning pilots. After taking a bearing from their signals and some quick calculations, she was able to pinpoint their



locations and guide them to the nearest airfield.

The day brought back many memories for Ena, some good, some not so good. Although she undoubtedly helped many find their way back to safety, it was tough for her to reimagine the conversations she had with pilots who sadly never made it home.

Ena started helping the RAF family in WW II and has done so ever since. From her many years as a Welfare Officer for her local Branch to her fundraising efforts today, she is one of thousands of volunteers dedicated to helping the charity that supports the RAF family.

The Late Malcolm Leflaive



I would like to say a big thank you to everyone, following Malcolm's death, for their many and beautiful condolence cards, kind messages and generous, complimentary recollections of Malcolm as a person, as well as the part he played in our community.

Malcolm was a man of many talents. He went to Merton

College, Oxford, to read Maths and Chemistry and

retained a life-long interest in all the sciences, but was even more inspired by the arts. In his spare time he turned his hand to painting, sculpture, writing poetry and short stories. Particularly, he enjoyed story-telling surrounded by a group of children.

Apart from enjoying his ability to mimic, Malcolm's grandchildren valued his facility with languages, especially when it came to homework, not least when Latin translations were involved.

Malcolm immersed himself in music. He enjoyed playing the piano, and had a wide appreciation of everything from Gregorian Chant to Mahler with a particular fondness for Beethoven.

For the greater part of his life Malcolm was an outdoor enthusiast and took pleasure in rugby, rowing, sailing, fell running and caving. For many years he was passionate about rock climbing and was always keen to pass on his love for outdoor pursuits to the younger members of his family.

The family moved to Naphill in 1977, and Malcolm developed a keen interest in the local environment and community. An abiding concern was the protection of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, in which Naphill and Walter's Ash lie at the centre. One of the threats in 1984/5 was the sale of Church Farm for a golf course, including the fields that spread up to the woodlands at Naphill. It would have included a driving range, floodlight, and related building development. Malcolm was a key player in a small dedicated team, who over 3 years got the plan stopped, with the full backing of local people, who also supported the team in getting the next wave of applications refused to turn Church Farm into a holiday complex with further building development in Green Belt/AONB countryside. A few years later Malcolm put the Residents Association's case, convincingly, to a Public Enquiry to stop part of the field bordering Clappins Lane from being taken out of Green Belt to allow housing development.

By 1986 it became clear that our villages needed a permanent team not only to monitor and manage the continual flow of planning applications, but also to represent majority public opinion on a variety of other matters and to assist individual groups as necessary. So the present Residents Association came into being with Malcolm as one of its founding members. He accepted the position of Assistant Hon. Secretary at that time and fulfilled the role until his death in June this year, 2015

Malcolm's Christianity was core to his being. He found a welcome at St Michael and All Angels Church, helped with organizing the rota for servers, and for a time represented the Church on the Parochial Church Council. It gave him great sadness in recent years that his failing health prevented him from involving himself fully as a member of the Church congregation and latterly made it impossible for him to attend Church services.

Those who knew Malcolm will recall his kindness, but also his great sense of fun. His enthusiasm for telling jokes remained with him to the very last days of his life, and it would have pleased him to think that he would be remembered for his quick wit and humour.

Hughenden Parish Council FACTOID #4

Last year we gave out over £26,000 in donations, grants and loans to worthy organisations in the Parish, from a £3,825 donation to the Naphill & Walter's Ash Forest School to the annual grant of £520 to the Gazette.

Grants, Donations and Loans 2016

The Parish Council has powers to award grants and loans to local community organisations which are consider to be in the interests of Hughenden Parish and its residents. For example, in the last year grants have been made to village halls across the Parish, various sporting organisations and to assist the

Hughenden Valley Community shop to establish their very successful café.

This year the Parish Council would like to receive requests from a wide variety of applicants - charities and non profit organisations only, so that the broadest range of local organisations can be encouraged and supported.

The Parish Council offer both grants for up to £5,000 and loans for potentially larger sums that are then repaid with interest over a maximum period of 7 years.

If you are aware of, or involved with, an organisation that could benefit from Parish Council financial assistance now is the time that applications for loans and grants should be considered for submission as the Parish Council prepares its annual budget during November/December.

Organisations should therefore write to apply by the end of October in time to be considered for the main bids. Whilst requests for small grants can be made at any time, there is no guarantee that any funds will remain available if the request is not submitted by the end of October.

This is a competitive process against other bids, unfortunately the Parish are not able to fund all projects submitted as there is a limited budget available. All applications are treated equally and if successful the payment will be made after April 2016. Applications should be made in writing.

Fireworks By Numbers

Just before Fireworks Night last year someone passed a comment on to me from a conversation they had had earlier that day..

"..are you going to the fireworks night?...

..oh yes we never miss it, we watch it from the Wheel it's safer over there!"

Now, that one comment got me angry, sad, and frustrated all at the same time. As a Fireworks Committee member I know only too well what we have to do to comply with the various stringent safety requirements and insurance conditions to ensure a safe and enjoyable display - so I thought it was high time to reveal some facts and figures around what actually happens to produce the marvellous event that so many villagers enjoy, and while I am at it put in a request at the end of my rant.

This year will be the 23rd Naphill Bonfire and Fireworks Display (in it's current format), nearly half of the committee of 8 have been involved since the first event. We spend approximately £5000 on display category fireworks to produce the 30 minute display. All of our firers are trained by our suppliers Pains Fire-

works Ltd and have to attend a refresher course every year, which means we have the benefit of insurance cover from Pains for the event. Pains will also inspect the site prior to the day to run through all the safety aspects. One of our firers has gone a step further and achieved his certification from the BPA (British Pyrotechnists Association) a benefit of which is that we can now use even higher category fireworks = bigger and better bangs!

Now the Safety stuff - we have to produce and have in place;

- 1 Risk Assessment for the event
- 1 Safety Plan
- 1 Licence to store the Fireworks in a suitable, inspected environment prior to the event (no, it's not in the Village Hall, and I'm not going to tell you where it is)
- 2 Qualified First Aiders on the night
- 8 (minimum)Firework and Bonfire Marshals around the designated areas
- 1 Fire Engine on site throughout the event (thank you RAF for this)

So, that's what we need to do every year to provide the fantastic display for the 2000 or more villagers and others who attend. But to do this we need at least 50 people onsite during the event, to steward the gates, to marshal the bonfire and firework areas, to run the bar and BBQ, and at the end of the evening strip everything down so that by Sunday morning the Crick is returned to normal.

SO! Here is the request!

We urgently need more people to get involved both during the day setting up, and throughout the evening. Any time you can give us would be a great help, even just a couple of hours during the morning or afternoon, or if you're available, to help at the end of the evening when some of us will be flagging after a long day. All the committee (and others) are onsite from early Saturday morning until well after the public have left and as you can imagine are wilting by the end.

Please come and get involved, we really need some new blood to ensure this fabulous event will continue for many years to come. You can either contact our chairman Andrew Wilmot (on 562770) or me, we will be more than pleased to welcome your assistance in whatever area you can contribute.

It's not just a bunch of old blokes letting off some very big rockets!

.Wycombe Futsal

Throughout the history of grass roots football, coaches across the world have always searched for new and creative ways to help young players not only to learn the game of football but also to have loads of fun at the same time. Yet there has been a form of the game which has proven to fast track youth football development for many years, a tool which the FA has come to realise needs to play a vital part of the modern game.

Futsal has been around for generations and is popular in countries such as Brazil and Spain and is world's fastest growing indoor sport. Many players like Messi and Ronaldo have attributed many of their skills to the game, yet it is surprising that many english coaches have never heard of it and still use the old style of football coaching.

Two coaches from High Wycombe are now set to change this. Mark Mullenbach and David Salisbury are coaches who were looking for new ways to train their players in an environment which was both fun and educational. Having been re-introduced to Futsal by the FA, Mark then decided to do some research into Futsal and accepted that this was the future for his players. He began searching for games for some of his local players to participate in. He then began coaching

Futsal to a handful of his players, whose parents were willing to give it a go - and that's where it all began.

After a few short months parents began to see a real change in the way the boys played their game and the team became known for its passing style by fellow coaches. This low ranked team playing in the last division began seeing some positive results at the end of the season and almost halved the goals they conceded and doubled what they scored.

The positive impact the game had on the players and the lack of accessibility to any local Futsal leagues drove Mr Mullenbach to begin his own league and so Wycombe Futsal was born. The first to join was David Salisbury from Naphill who accepted a friendly game of Futsal and became hooked from the first moment, so much so that he has since left his employment to become a full-time Futsal / Football coach. The two coaches have now completed their first U9 league, which comprised 4 teams from local areas, all of which have only good things to say about their time with the association.

Parents who participated had nothing but praise for the sport with one parent commenting on how it was more enjoyable than the usual format as it was faster and more action packed.

Mark and David highly recommend that all coaches should try it at least once, but find it difficult to get most coaches to even give it a go. Both agree that coaching a youth team can take up a lot of personal time and many coaches don't want to commit to anything further. However in just six months, from a team of ten players, Naphill under 8s have had two of their team invited to join an advanced training centre and one boy invited to the Wycombe Wanderers development centre. David firmly believes that the skills learned whilst playing Futsal were fundamental in their advancement as players and are the main reason behind them being noticed.

The association tries to work closely with teams, parents and clubs to accommodate players where possible and state that if a player, parent or coach wants to play they will go out of their way to make it happen. Clubs can either enter teams into the league or parents who have an interest in their children playing can have them placed in a team during the 6-8 week leagues which allows them to stay with their local club and be able to play in a new club and make new friends. Even parents who have no experience in coaching but want to give back to football or just want to help young children keep active can form a team for the 6 week period. The league will help run and organise the entire process for you. Wycombe Futsal will even coach your team on the day. Matches, referees and venues are arranged, All coaches are level 2 FA qualified Football coaches, Level 1 Futsal and have up to date CRB checks, so you can be happy in the sound knowledge that your children are in good hands.

If you would like more info on Futsal the best method is to go online. There are YouTube videos on "What is Futsal" which will explain everything you need to know. Otherwise you can get hold of Wycombe Futsal either by phone or email and they will make a personal visit to you or your club to explain about Futsal in more detail. Along with the existing under 10 league (open to players aged 8 and 9 on August 31st 2015) sponsored by St Clair Accountancy and Veolia water, we hope to

add two new leagues starting up in October. The first would be for under 12s (this would consist of players aged 10 and 11 as of August 31st 2015) and an over 35 division. Most of the players already playing can now boast that their parents are also playing Futsal with at least 12 parents who played on our open day looking to form teams or join existing ones. Interested parties are urged to book their places as availability of qualified referees means only a certain number of teams will be able enter. A Letter from our Methodist Minister

By the time you read this, my friend and colleague Simon, vicar of the parish, will have preached his last sermon here and moved to his new patch across the M40, and I am into my eighth and final year here. Some stay longer than others, but mainly we clergy are passers-by, temporary residents, through-traffic.

At the recent passing of one of our life-long residents, we were remembering the people from past decades, and there was much reference to the names of village families, and the older ladies were of course referred to by their maiden names, which left me struggling to follow the conversation!

A few days ago, Her Majesty became the longest reigning monarch in the history of our country, a symbol of stability and continuity. At the same time Australia has its fourth prime minister in 2 years. World politics is turbulent, and few leaders remain for very long. Our Queen is a precious rarity.

Homo Naledi bones have been found in South Africa and recently publicised as some of the most ancient human-like creatures yet discovered. If these are our ancestors, we've changed a fair bit since then!

Each generation retains some of the past, but brings its own innovation, modernisation, and developments, which it thinks are "improvements"! Arguably the rate of change is forever increasing. Certainly there are features of our life which our grandparents could not have imagined, and we now take for granted.

And if we look forward to the future, there are changes which are not hard to predict in the next few years, or maybe a couple of decades, but after that, it would be pure guesswork.

One always hopes that changes will be for the better, but that is not necessarily so. All change is risky, and sometimes we instinctively resist change. Continuity on the other hand seems safer, even there are aspects of life which are unsatisfactory and need improving. As human beings we are caught between the two.

Our understanding of God (at least far as ordinary Christianity is concerned), shows an eternal permanent unchanging nature. One who is dependable, reliable, and who is not going to be chopping and changing to suit the whims of our very temporary mortal lives. Such consistency gives us some peace, in the midst of our troubles and chaos.

Yet God is not unaware of the progress of time and the course of history and the circumstances of each human life, and indeed has brought about a fundamental change: the coming of Jesus Christ, whose life has itself changed millions of lives.

And Church tries to express this mixture of eternal continuity and dynamic transformation, and sometimes we get the balance right! but only sometimes!

BLOG - The Benefits of Cycling

The idea of a cycle track near the existing walking track to town and back was renascent in my mind because it would allow people who live in villages like Hughenden, Naphill, Lacey Green and Walters Ash to cycle into High Wycombe or to nearby villages in a safe, convenient and enjoyable way.

The signs and benefits are on the wall or should I say on the cycle track. It would be so pleasant to get from A to B in safely, at a speed of choice whilst exploring and enjoying the area of outstanding natural beauty in which we live. Such journeys might well help relieve our stresses whilst improving our health and general wellbeing by regulating our blood pressure and maintaining a healthy heart. Below is an example of a cycle track at Spitalfields Farm in East London.

Perhaps you are one of the many people who like me would enjoy travelling on two wheels rather than four in the car! I should like to see a push to get the community fit. Why not organise cycling coffee mornings at The Community Shop in Hughenden (http://www.valleyshop.org/), at Bon Ami in Naphill (https://www.facebook.com/media/set/?set =a.167019153330530.35546.157487064283739) or Pony Espresso (http://www.ponyespresso.co.uk/) in Walters Ash? Let's cycle, socialise and encourage one another to keep fit. I am sure this will appeal to a wide range of people, especially those who want a safe and friendly atmosphere. There are also opportunities to become involved with the Project from Coates Lane to Hughenden Park. From a green prospective another benefit of cycling as against using a car is that it is kinder to the environment. Fewer cars on the roads would certainly help reduce pollution levels.

Children generally love to ride a bike for pleasure but why not ride for a purpose? If we had cycle tracks and routes our children might ride their bikes to school and a family outing could be a cycle ride. Many schools now offer cycling courses for their students.

I believe passionately that we need more safe cycling routes and cycle paths and so I have started by putting up my own petition on line at http://www.change.org and to date I have seventy-three signatures and other indications of positive support for this project but we still need more signatures. Please check the link at https://www.change.org/p/wycombe-district-council-or-bucks-county-council-new-cycle-lane-from-hughenden-buckinghamshire-area-to-high-wycombe-town-centre?utm_medium=email&utm_source=promoted_petition_activation&utm_content=control&tk=XC8ry-AZKeYn0qPvudwnpQuisY_svCgmd3AY0CUdRq8.

Recently I got in touch with Wycombe District

Council and spoke with Lesley Clarke who told me that she thought that this was a good idea and that she would contact her colleagues as to how this issue might be progressed. Next I made contact with our local MP, David Liddington, who confirmed his support. His area links to Steve Baker's, the MP for High Wycombe, so we need a common message and link by both men to help things move forward. Mr Liddington told me he would make contact with the relevant Councils to urge this Project forward.

I was also told that in the past the RAF wanted to build a safe cycle track for their staff and other personnel. If this were to be constructed we would have a cycle track going from Lacey Green to the RAF bases, then onwards to Walters Ash, Naphill, Hughenden and into High Wycombe. What a useful, fun cycle ride this would give us, which would undoubtedly be beneficial and help unify our community.

I have contacted the Hughenden Valley Residents Association and discovered that they had an idea to join up a cycle track from Hughenden Park to the Community Shop. My initial idea was to have the current walking path cleaned up, with a wider pavement to accommodate both pedestrians and cyclists. Currently the path is unlit, overgrown and there are safety issues with fast traffic and pollution. Safety would be a major concern due to the speed of the traffic.

The idea from Hughenden Valley Residents Association is to get permission and build an inside cycle lane and track from the Community Shop to High Wycombe, which would accommodate all types of users as far as Coates Lane.

As from now, it will be a single campaign by all parties to get people motivated to make it happen so that all of us can benefit. If it is planned and thought out properly, the opportunity of having a cycle track could flourish and as I you can see from this blog, I believe that there are substantial benefits in many different ways, which will enhance our lives in a wide variety of ways.


On the positive side there are so many things being planned and organised for us all to support and enjoy. As you will see, I am introducing a "Posting Board" where I will post these events and reminders.

We have experienced a couple of thefts from cars parked in the Village Hall car park. In one a car window was smashed and a handbag stolen and in the other property was taken from an unlocked car. Even though we are doing our best to find the culprit of these thefts and to help the victims, we cannot accept responsibility for cars parked in the car park, you do that at your own risk.

The ball wall on the Crick has been well used during the summer and subsequently the grass around it is wearing very thin and thus could get very muddy during the winter. We have discussed laying Astroturf but the area concerned is large and would thus be expensive. We have also thought of plastic grid to help, but feel that we need to get further advice as to the best solution.

Reporting road, pavement and footpath **problems.** If you are aware of a highway problem whether due to overgrown hedges, overhanging vegetation, pavement damage, hazardous road conditions, etc. Transport for Bucks advise we use the buckscc.gov.uk website. Select "**Transport**", then select "Report a highways issue". A choice of windows appears accompanied by a map which can be moved to cover the location of the problem. You then answer specific questions that identify problem. A photo can be added. Finally, you are given a reference number and told the date TfB will inspect/deal with the site. This is very helpful. However, there has been a snag with the website. On forward checking you may be told the job has been completed when clearly it has not. In that case you can ring 01296 382416 or 0845 230 2882 to report the work not completed and request a progress report. TfB are in the process of correcting their website to avoid confusion.

Should you consider the problem to be dangerous, such as a fallen tree on the road, or some other highway emergency you should call **01296 382416** (9am-5,30pm Mon-Thurs. 9am-5pm Friday) or **01296 486630** (out of hours and weekends).

If the site is under the control of Wycombe District Council or Parish Council (eg. Grass verge cutting) TfB will provide the information, but it will be up to the complainant to take the matter up with the appropriate authority.

Picture This

It seems that the 'Arboreal Initials Project' I featured in last month's Gazette has gripped the imagination of several Naphill &Walter's Ash residents. The Marc Bolan fan has been identified by a reader who is reported as exclaiming "Fame at last 'J', you've made it to the Gazette!". I'm keeping her real identity a secret until the Arboreal Initials Project website is opened; until then, she will only be referred to by her code name, 'J'.

Another reader has since related stories of teenage love and of him and his school-mates carving initials - "it's what we all did back then", - and also of a blue streaker. (And that is not a much rarer breed of parrot than the green, now inhabiting the Common).

So if you carved your initials on a tree on the Common and want to share a story, give me a call or email. Anyway, talking of rare things on the Common, this month's cover is a Panther. It is an Amanita pantherina. This is turning out to be a really good year for them - in fact for most fungi. Just like the wild cat that shares its name, the Panther is beautiful, dangerous and deadly. Don't touch it; just get up close, focus carefully and if you can, use a large aperture to blur the background for a Hollywood glamour style picture.

Fungi hunters will be absolutely fascinated to know that Swiss-born mycologist, Augustin Pyramis De Candolle (1778 - 1841), described this species in 1815, naming it Agaricus pantherinus. In doing so, he stole international press headlines away from Napolean Bonaparte's ill-fated invasion of Russia. Nonetheless, in 1871, Paul Kummer (1834 - 1912), a German mycologist, moved the Panther to its present genus, naming it Amanita pantherina. All these years and you never knew.

Finally, a photo-tip. If you're going to the fireworks on the Crick, use a tripod (preferably where other people won't trip over it in the dark or you'll spoil your shots...). Use a small aperture and set your shutter to either B (for bulb) or T (for time). Use a shutter release / cable if you have one. With B, press and hold the shutter release which opens the shutter; when you let go of the shutter release, the shutter closes. With T, press the shutter release which opens the shutter and press again to close the shutter. Point your lens towards a dark part of the sky where the fireworks are bursting (avoid including bright lights or the bonfire). When a firework is fired, press the shutter to capture the burst and keep the shutter open. Cover the lens with your hand. Wait for the next firework and uncover the lens. And then again. Now close the shutter. You should now have 3 fireworks on one photograph which always looks far more impressive than single fireworks.

Do share with us any impressive pictures of mega rockets or panthers of any genus.



Hughenden Parish Council Report

HPC FACTOID #5: Vincent's Meadow and Pond - off Downley Road adjoining Naphill Common is one of our ecologically rich, open, public spaces.

Here we are, half way through the first year of this new council with winter approaching. The work across our villages is shifting from grass cutting and hedge trimming to trees, ponds and structures. You may have noticed all our bus stops got a fresh lick of paint recently and that some of the wooden stumps and posts in the play area at Templewood have been replaced.

After decisions taken at last month's Full Council meeting, work will shortly be undertaken to rediscover the duckpond somewhat hidden behind the overgrown trees and bushes behind the Kilnwood bus stop. Some trees are being felled and new fencing installed. This is work long overdue as the pond and its ducks are suffering from poor light and now lots of falling leaves. The fencing, whilst secure, is a series of patches to ensure safety but is somewhat of an eyesore - especially when the trees and hedges are cut back. The work, which is planned to be carried out in the next 4-6weeks, will take a couple of days and will affect the footpath and the bus stop. We can only apologise in advance for any disruption it may cause.



One of our new council's initiatives - brought about as a result of the residents survey many of you answered last year- the road safety group has already had some success in landing additional funding that we will be putting towards 2 more vehicle activated speed indicator signs. Our objective by the end of our four year term is to have one of these at each end of the principle routes in the Parish (that means doubling our current four units). The Road Safety group is also involved in making the roads and footpaths around our schools safer for staff, parents, residents and of course children. To that end, we are working with NAWA School, Thames Valley Police and the RAF. TVP and RAF Police have now started joint patrols on some mornings outside the school entrances. The council has also approved releasing some of its Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) to acquire some plastic pedestrian safety barriers to protect those walking down Kilnwood to the pedestrian crossing in front of the school on the RAF base side from those drivers turning around or parking on the pavement.

The next few months will have us Councillors keeping busy. We are already thinking about next year's (2016/17) budget which we have to set in December of this year. Thank you for those that have already responded to our article last month requesting any applications from local charities and good causes for grants, loans or donations. There are also some long term council projects that we need to start to plan for. The expansion of our Garden of Rest at Four Ashes is one of these.

23rd Annual Naphill Fireworks & Bonfire


As I announced in last month's Gazette this year's fireworks display will be held on Saturday 7 November.

Friends of Naphill Common

Our pond project went better than expected, mainly because the Chiltern Rangers turned up in force. In the afternoon they brought some keen and lively young men from the Grammar School and in the evening we were helped by a host of Brownies who were just as keen and even more lively. Many thanks to both groups. With their help we cleared scrub from around Shipwash, Small, Willow and Lady Horse Ponds – far more than we expected – our estimate is that the work carried out would have occupied our regular working parties (10:00am on first and third Sundays of each month – see our web site naphillcommon.org.uk for details) for five months! We also managed to dredge some debris and weed out of the ponds and increase the area of open water. We stacked the debris (mainly leaf-mould) around the edge of the ponds so that whatever fauna it contained could make its way back into the water.

By the time this appears we also hope to have planted out some of the juniper cuttings taken, originally, from the four surviving junipers. The plan is to plant them in groups of three, two males and a female. We will keep a few back in case we lose some. They will be protected by chicken wire to prevent deer, squirrels and rabbits from attacking them, and we hope no Homo Sapiens will be tempted to do so.

How well the junipers will fare is not easy to judge. The books all tell us that junipers like a chalky soil and the Common is thick clay, but, since a hundred years ago it was described as a juniper forest, perhaps this particular strain is adapted to clay. Junipers also need plenty of sunshine so we have chosen sites where there is a maximum exposure, but nowhere on the Common is quite like the open grassland they most prefer. Perhaps the least good feature of the sites is the shelter of nearby trees. Juniper seeds need prolonged exposure to frost or, at least to 5°C according to Naphill's own Dr Chris Smith (1980 Ecology of the English Chalk, p. 336) and those conditions are rare in woodland, so the chances of offspring are not good. You might ask why we have persisted with this project given all these obstacles, but juniper is in retreat all over Southern England, including the open sites. Naphill was once a stronghold, so we hope we can make a small contribution to their survival.

The issue of children's "camps" or "dens" has arisen once more. Obviously it is excellent that young people enjoy the Common and building camps is almost inevitably part of that enjoyment. However, there are two main problems. The first is rubbish. The camps become dumping areas for plastic, glass, tins, bottles etc., and this becomes a danger to people and animals, as well as an eyesore which has to be cleared up. In most cases, some attempts have been made to keep the camp area clean by collecting rubbish into plastic bags, showing that hearts and minds are in the right place, but this process has not been completed by removal of the detritus.

The second problem is damage to trees. Some dens comprise elaborate structures created by banging nails in trees, sawing off branches and so on. We plead with our youngsters to enjoy the Common but in a "green" way, doing as little damage as possible. (As the Common is an SSSI Grade one and a Special Conservation Area, children, or rather their parents, commit an offence if damage is done. This also applies to the dumping of garden and other rubbish, presumably by adults.)

Future Events

Chris Miller leads the short walks (2-3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village hall on the first Wednesday of each month (4th Nov., 2nd Dec.). Ron Collins leads the longer walks (about 5 miles) on the third Monday of each month (16th Nov. and 21st Dec.). Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9:30am sharp. Please join in – they are free and you don't have to be a member. It is intended that the walks will continue next year.

Mum Goes to Forest School

As I put another pair of socks on, I wonder if I will be warm enough? After all, it is October and this is my first Forest School of the academic year with the new Walters Ash and Naphill School reception class.

The day is dry and bright but cold so I dig out my gloves and scarf. My own children attend the school so this is a great opportunity to share their Forest School experiences. The school reception office was buzzing! Gone was the silence of my childhood times. Fifteen coat wrapped rising 5 year olds join me clutching their wellies and eager to be on their way.

A request for adult support with the Forest School came home in a letter and I was happy to help. To me this is not a chore but rather another opportunity to share my own love of the outdoors. So, with current council checks and certification, I am now a regular part of the Forest School.

Suitably clothed and booted we set off with our charges. Before we get to the designated woodland the group must cross Main Road. As anyone who has been responsible for the safety of other lives will know, all senses are alert! This is the first time the class had been on a journey together beyond the school gates. The crocodile of hand holding pairs of children walk and talk into the woods. We stop near the entrance and chant the rules of Forest School before walking further into the woods. As we walk we are looking, speaking and listening about our surroundings, the autumn colours, the smells and the other interesting things we can see, berries, mushrooms, toadstools and other fungi. Soon we reach the "Hello Tree", whisper our names and make our way to the log circle.

For the reception year, learning respect for the world in which we live is important. This is encouraged in a fun way. We played hide and seek and the children had fun exploring, getting muddy and collecting bits and pieces. The simplest of things became part of the adventure. I joined a little girl and had a turn at painting on a tree with a brush and cup of mud whilst close by, a group of boys were enjoying themselves jumping off a log into mud.

Soon it was time to regroup back at the log circle and to reflect on what we had enjoyed best. It was amazing listening to these tiny people who had so enjoyed this new school experience. I was especially moved by one little girl who when asked what she had enjoyed most replied that she had found a new friend, not the regular reply from the other children.

The time was over all too quickly, so back into pairs, goodbye to the "Hello Tree" and the slightly slower walk back to school, all talking about their new experiences and also what they will be having for lunch! 

BOOK REVIEW – "KITCHEN GARDEN EXPERTS"

Author: Cinead McTernan, Photographer: Jason Ingram. Published by Frances Lincoln Ltd in 2014. ISBN: 978-0-7112-3496-3. Foreword by Raymond Blanc. Price: £12.11 on Amazon, including delivery.



This is a most amazing and delightful book which will appeal to two separate audiences. Twenty celebrated chefs divulge some of their secret recipes. Twenty head gardeners divulge some of their secrets of how to cultivate fruit and vegetables. The chefs are located in 20 top restaurants in England, Scotland and Wales. A guote from the book is: "it appears that these chefs have thrown away the rule book - with truly exciting results". I have a bright idea – the next time you win the National Lottery go on a gastronomic tour of these 20 restaurants and sample their wares. It would be a once-in-a-lifetime unforgettable experience. Usually two recipes are given by each chef so be sure to ask for those as well as other gourmet dishes. Weigh yourself before and after the tour and blame the chefs for the increase in weight!

Whilst you are waiting to win the lottery you could try out the recipes in the safety of your own kitchen. Such as "Assiette Anne-Marie" from Raymond Blanc of "Le Manoir aux Quat'Saisons" who has also provided a foreword to the book. Each restaurant is described and the grower and chef are given a personal profile. The book has an author, Cinead McTernan, but equal prominence is given to the photographer Jason Ingram who has visited the 20 kitchen gardens and restaurants and taken the most delightful shots of gardens, restaurants, vegetables, the dish on the plate and more. Indeed, it is the photographs which make

this a very good book for the coffee table.

But what I personally like the most about the book is the grower's "Kitchen Garden Secrets". I am always looking out for good ideas for growing fruit and vegetables, and this book has growing tips in spades. I carefully noted down no less than 52 tips to improve my gardening methods and gardening knowledge. Some of the vegetables were new to me, so I must try out Oca (a tuber from South America), Achocha (from South America), Cima di Rapa (a form of broccoli from Italy), Brakali Apollo (a Chinese broccoli), Broccolini (a hybrid of sprouting broccoli and Chinese Kai-lan broccoli), Telephone (an early summer pea from Italy), Cavalo Nero (a broccoli from Italy to be eaten after it has bolted and just before it flowers), Chervil root, Agretti ("beard of the monk" or "saltwort" which is like samphire), Red Orach, Akajiso and Shiso (Japanese varieties of Perilla), Golden Frills (a Chinese heritage mustard green) and many more. Several tips were new to me, such as: picking pears before they are ripe and leaving them in a cool dry store to develop; do not pre-water drills for radishes in order to encourage longer roots; wait until weed seeds germinate before sowing seeds outdoors; wild rocket is a perennial as are chillies; Fat Hen (a problem weed I have) is better than cultivated spinach; tie in the first side shoot of tomato plants to produce two productive plants and, finally, cut back parsley at the end of the season then grow it in pots in the greenhouse. What a wealth of advice! What a treasure of a book!

The author and the photographer have done very well and they have been greatly helped by the publisher who has provided excellent support. The book is highly recommended for food-lovers and growers. An ideal present for friends and family – and for yourself!

The Last Word





We are looking to get an on line booking and payment service set up to make the system simpler all round and more in line with current practices. Watch this space!

Most of our odd jobs have been completed so we are revising our strategic plan for improvements and developments to the hall. Let us know what you would like to see in the hall over the next few years and we will take in your ideas for consideration at the next meeting.

The ball wall is continuing to get a lot of use, which is great, but the grass around it is getting very worn and we are looking for advice as to how best to maintain this area. We have had a couple of quotes which have been very expensive so we are getting further quotes to see if there is any difference. Astroturfing the area is beyond our finances as it would need such a large area, but another solution could be the hexagonal matting that the grass can grow through.

We are also continuing our investigations into installing a defibrillator on the outside wall of the Hall. Grants are available for this through the British Heart Foundation and we have found a model that would meet our requirements. So - we have agreed to proceed with a grant application to the Heart Foundation and hope that we meet with their requirements.

Parking at Night. We were asked to find the rules that apply to parking at night. Police say you must not park on a road at night facing against the direction of the traffic flow unless in a recognised parking space.

All vehicles must display **parking lights** when parked on a road or a lay-by on a road with a speed limit **greater than 30 mph (48 km/h).**

Cars, goods vehicles not exceeding 1525 kg unladen weight, invalid carriages, motorcycles and pedal cycles may be parked without lights on a road (or lay-by) with a speed limit of 30 mph (48 km/h) or less if they are (a) at least 10 metres (32 feet) away from any junction, close to the kerb and facing in the direction of the traffic flow (b) in a recognised parking place or lay-by.

Other vehicles and trailers, and all vehicles with projecting loads, must not be left on a road at night without lights.

Bradenham Parish Council

Bradenham Parish Council has been busy in the last few months.

Our District Councillor, Carl Etholen, has given us an update on the situation with the Molins site, the Task and Finish Group have published their report and it will have been discussed at Wycombe District Council cabinet meeting on 16 November: you can see the report and the cabinet decision on the Wycombe District Council web site www.wycombe.gov.uk.

The Parish Council discussed the possibility of a more permanent vehicle activated speed sign and it was decided to get more information (including cost) for the next meeting. The Parish Council Chairman is to appear before the House of Commons HS2 Select Committee on 17 November petitioning against the use of the A4010 as a construction route for the building of the HS2 railway line.

We have arranged a demonstration session on 21 November for the defibrillator installed in the phone box in Bradenham village during the summer, with a leaflet distributed to the majority of residents.

We now have a number of jobs we have requested the County Council to undertake, but they are not responding to the request. The latest announcement that they will postpone non-essential work is worrying.

Our new website is ready to be populated, the Councillors and the Clerk are in the process of doing this.

The continued fly tipping near the bottle bank in Walter's Ash was noted and will be taken up with the County Council along with the lack of replacement of removed bottle banks. The Council has started looking at the budget for the next financial year and will finalise at the January meeting.

Our next meeting will be Monday 11th January at 7.00pm at Bradenham Cricket Club. The meeting is open to the public.

A Letter from our Methodist Minister

My friend has just become a grandma for the seventh time. And it's just as special! Under normal circumstances a new baby is always wonderful good news.

Mary's baby at Bethlehem was supposed to be good news, not just for the family but for all people. Both Mary and Joseph understood that the baby was special, but the baby's miraculous conception surely left a lot of their respectable friends and family tuttutting. And with no room at the inn, they must have doubted God's blessing. Yet the baby was born, and the amazing visits of shepherds and wise men perhaps reassured them. Soon they could return home and bring up their child like every other young couple. Or so they hoped.

King Herod lived in difficult political times. He was a puppet king with his strings pulled by Rome, and no shortage of men keen to replace him. Not surprisingly he was nervous of any claims to his throne. Rumour had it that a baby king had been born somewhere in Bethlehem, so he had all the baby boys under two years old slaughtered, just in case the rumour was true.


In fact the rumour was true, but he was too late: Joseph and Mary and the baby had fled as refugees to Egypt. That would be no consolation to the other distraught parents of Bethlehem.

Our children's nativity presentations rarely mention all this. We would sooner hear about a nice donkey, a kind innkeeper, and a warm stable, and then everybody on stage: shepherds, wise men, angels, ox and ass, to receive rapturous applause.

This is the cosy good news we enjoy hearing. The painful truth that God would come to this troubled world, as a helpless baby, and that his coming would begin so traumatically, and indeed end up so traumatically on a cross: this is a bit too serious for some people.

I'm writing these words a couple of days after the terrorist atrocities in Paris. The mood is sombre, fearful, suspicious, resolute, in varying proportions. Not what you'd want in this jolly festive season. Yet there is perhaps some resonance between the bereaved of Bethlehem and those of Paris: their loved ones slaughtered indiscriminately for misguided purposes.

I came across the drawing of two women weeping and trying to demonstrate love in their community. The drawing followed the Charlie Hebdo events of last January, but applies equally



to Paris today. The weeping woman on the right represents the vast majority of Muslims who want no part in IS and its radicalised violence. But she strikes me as not dissimilar to our images of Mary, and could equally be one of the mothers of Bethlehem.

Into this difficult world Christ has come. I perceive that as good news, and especially good that he has not avoided the painful.

In the midst of the political and social turmoil, I hope you find some peace joy and love in your personal lives this Christmas, and I pray that the New Year will show improved relationships between people of all faiths and cultures, right across this world.










Village Hall Christmas Tree Lights

Friends of Naphill Common

It has been a splendid autumn for colour and berries, and nowhere better than our common. The wider paths mean that it is easier to avoid the mud and our working parties are striving to improve further stretches, so walking on the Common should be even more enjoyable. You may get a glimpse of the goshawk that has arrived recently. Look out for a bird, very like a large sparrowhawk, often flying at treetop level with fairly slow wingbeats and long glides. You may have spotted the six junipers planted out on the Common. We chose the most open, sunlit spots we could find and, so far, they are doing well.

Our fungus foray was very successful. In fine weather it attracted 45 people including 12 from the Bucks Fungus Group. Fungi were not there in their usual abundance but despite this 76 species were identified by the experts. 18 of these were new to Naphill Common and one was new to Buckinghamshire. Walking down Ladies Mile (the side of the Common next to the houses) it was interesting to note that there were far more fungi on the old original turf than on the area of coarser grass where the huge sewer was put in over sixty years ago. We thank the BFG and their experts for the great service they give.



More and more people are joining our monthly walks. Chris Miller leads the short walks (2-3 miles) starting at 10.30am from the Village hall on the first Wednesday of each month. The next is on 2nd Dec. Ron Collins leads the longer walks (about 5 miles) on the third Monday of each month and the next is on 21st Dec. Meet at the Village Hall at 9.25am for a start at 9:30am sharp. Please join in – they are free and you don't have to be a member – but of course we would be delighted if you join. Similarly, you will be welcome at our working parties led by Peter Davis. There will be one on 22nd November and another on 6th December. Both walks and working parties will continue next year so for more details see the FONC website.

We are not yet sure where the next area of felling will be, but we are in contact with Wessex Woodland Management and will let you know when we find out. In the meantime we are continuing our survey to pick out trees and features that we want to protect. Even though the company has been careful so far there is a danger that heavy machinery could damage the numerous archaeological features on the Common. We will have

to clearly mark the trees and areas of archaeological significance before felling begins. If anyone has concerns about anything vulnerable, please let us know.

We hope that you will come to our AGM on 12th February 2016 at the Village Hall. There will be a famously brief time spent on business followed by a speaker (to be announced).

My thanks to all those who turned out on the morning of this event to help. All the committee members were there plus quite a few others. Most of us are ageing so a few younger helpers would be welcome next year! We all got well and truly soaked, but fortunately it was not cold. The Wheel provided us with a warming lunch which spurred us on into the afternoon.

We had been watching the weather forecast, along with most of the village, so we knew that the rain would clear around 3pm when there was a brief period of sun. The weather in the evening was good, with little wind, no rain and it was not cold. The crowds flocked in. This year, for the first time, we counted everyone who came, nearly 2,400 people, which was a record attendance. People came from as far as Beaconsfield to see our fireworks.

I think you will agree the display was fantastic with even more fireworks being fired electrically, giving a more polished and synchronised performance. Our gate stewards reported that when the spectators were leaving many commented on how good it was.

The bonfire was just palets this year which made it light quickly and also die down easily after the event. It also meant that there was less smoke and fewer flying embers. This year no one had to be treated for ash in their eye and just one child had a burned hand due to picking up a sparkler which was apparently dropped by their parent, so fortunately not too serious!

The bar sold out and the BBQ was on its last sausage! All due to the greatly increased turnout. It is always difficult to judge the numbers as it is very dependent upon the weather. Last year we had rain and so fewer people. attended and we made about £4,500 for the village hall funds but this year indications are that we have made over £7,000. I am sure you will agree that this is a fantastic achievement!

A lot of work goes on prior to the day and then on the day there is a lot of set-up and then clearing away. I would like to thank all of those who contributed in any way towards the fireworks display. Thanks, in no particular order to:

- The Wheel, and The Gate for their generous donations of barrels of beer,
- Wycombe Trade waste for the bins and considerable numbers of pallets,
- The RAF station commander, Group Captain Phil Lester who lit the bonfire and was very enthusiastic,





Growing Your Own

There is virtually no sowing to do in December and January. My autumn planting of overwintering onions in the garden and of elephant garlic and shallots on the allotment was done in October, leaving nothing else to sow or plant out this autumn. However, the great delight of December and January is visiting the allotment every day to take the crops; there is nothing like really fresh vegetables – the reward for a season of work of sowing and weeding. There is no need for storage space in the 'fridge or cupboard, the allotment is my larder.

The crops I shall be taking this winter from the allotment are: carrots, turnips, Brussels sprouts, red cabbage, purple sprouting broccoli, celeriac, celery, cicoria, spring onions, beetroot and leeks. (I had a crop failure of my parsnips in 2015). From the garden I shall be taking salad plants of various kinds, and herbs. From the garage, eating apples and cooking apples stored wrapped in paper and various types of pumpkins, marrows and courgettes - and onions, elephant garlic, shallots and potatoes. And the loft? Well yes, I grow things in the loft in the winter. I grow chicory, which is what one finds in the supermarkets in winter — a solid yellow/whitish salad about 6 to 8 inches long called a "chicon" which can be cooked as it is but we prefer the leaves to be stripped off and

eaten raw as a delicious crunchy salad. I sow the seeds on the allotment in spring and leave them to it, just keeping the weeds away until December/January when I dig the roots up, cut the leaves off just above the roots then place about 6 roots in a large black builder's bucket, fill up with soil and put the bucket in the loft where it is warm and dark – and cover the bucket with a black bin liner. After a few weeks the "chicons" start to grow, using the energy stored in the roots and moisture from the soil (it is necessary to water carefully from time to time). When the chicons are large enough I cut them off at the root and take them to the kitchen. New chicons will then grow from the root but they will be much smaller since the root will have lost a lot of its energy.

Another task in December and January are pruning. I have many fruit trees and fruit bushes which require a lot of pruning in the dormant months. If the weather allows I time my pruning to catch the next emptying

of the green wheely bin by Wycombe District Council. It is so nice of them to take away my prunings; I no longer have to have an enormous bonfire every year. As for weeding, December and January are dormant months so there should

be few weeds germinating and, hopefully, the weeding I did in the autumn will have sufficed.

We have 30 people who kindly deliver your Gazette to you 10 months a year which, if I have done my sums right, amounts to 300 bags a year!




I plan to allocate two bags to each deliverer, which will be used on a rotation basis. As long as I get the bag back each month this should work well.

Hughenden Parish Council Report

HPC FACTOID #6 In the first months of the new council our website has had over 37,000 visits and served over 77,000 page views.

You've probably done it at some point.

Maybe standing in a field, ankle deep in mud with the rain lashing your numb cheeks or in a echoing hall with two dozen screaming children, you've thought to yourself - why did I ever volunteer!

Well it happens to us Councillors too and for those that only started back in May, it can be rather disheartening. Those intentions of making a positive difference, giving back to the community and contributing to the area we live in, not just muttering about things being, or not being done but stepping up and making sure something is done - all of that promptly has a skipload of cold water poured over it when someone disagrees with what the Council votes to do and mounts a campaign against the individuals involved.

A Parish Council is about as fair a democratic body you can have in this nation. Unpaid volunteers living in the immediate neighbourhood representing their fellow neighbours, elected every 4 years with- in our case - 3 others representing the same area (Ward) that's roughly 1 Councillor for every 400 men, women and children who live in Naphill & Walter's Ash. Our MP on his own, by comparison represents roughly 110,000 of us across an area that stretches from Aylesbury to Stokenchurch.

We meet formally every month along with Councillors from the 3 other neighbouring Wards that make up our Parish and decisions are taken by majority vote at our local council chambers in front of other neighbours and recorded in our minutes which are then published and available to all. Those decisions are then carried out by our Council Staff and contractors all of whom reside in or very close to the Parish.

It is the nature of things that people are bound to disagree with decisions that the Council makes from time to time. Councillors even disagree. Don't think for one moment that every Council decision is unanimously supported. However, once made we should respect those decisions as having been arrived at fairly and democratically, by a group of local representatives who really care. If not, then finding those volunteers will become harder and harder and then perhaps decisions won't be made at all or will be made so far away that the people taking them won't

On a lighter note, many of you will have seen the Walter's Ash duck pond reappear from behind the Kilnwood bus stop in the past few weeks. Along with opening up the pond to more light and reducing the amount of leaves that will fall into it, a large part of the busy pavement has been reclaimed which improves safety for those waiting at the bus stop and walking past. Replacing the patchwork of fencing will be the next step which is now scheduled for the new year.

It was an impressive turnout at this years' service of Remembrance at the Village Hall & War Memorial. Wonderful to see the full spectrum of age groups in the audience as well as the local groups that were involved. It also made a difference with the traffic being stopped whilst we congregated around the stone

memorial for the laying of the wreaths and the minutes silence. Well done

Before Christmas takes us over, the next significant item for us Councillors to tackle is the setting of next year's budget (Apr 2016/Mar2017) at our annual Precept meeting. This will be our first as a new council. The budget we are operating on currently having been set by the previous administration back in Dec 2014. Along with business as usual items, such as grass & hedge cutting, we will be considering taking on some services from our County Council (so called devolution), the long term plan for our Garden of Rest at Four Ashes along with existing and submitted requests by community organisations and charities for grants, donations and loans. Thanks to those that read our appeal in October we have had a good response and thus we should be able to help the most deserving of these in the coming year.

It remains for us to wish all our parishioners a very merry Christmas and a jolly 2016.

In the light of the recent terrorist attacks in Paris, I feel it is appropriate to write and reassure you that there is currently no information to suggest an increase in threat to Service personnel, their families, or indeed the local community which we share, and which provides the Station with such excellent support.

Whilst the tragic events in Paris have not impacted directly upon the Threat to the UK population or Service personnel, you should note that RAF High Wycombe will be responding through a range of enhanced security activities. You may therefore note an increase in security presence and activity over the coming days; however, this should not be cause for alarm, as this activity is merely intended to reassure personnel and their families, and raise security profile across RAF High Wycombe, Service Families Accommodation and within the local community who share and frequent our facilities.

I am acutely aware that the local community continues to play an important role in supporting the day to day activities of the Station, and would request that local residents continue to remain vigilant in terms of reporting any suspicious activity they may observe in the local area. Where such activity is suspected, I would request that it is reported immediately to Thames Valley Police on 999 or 101, or where appropriate to the RAF Police on 01494 496721.
