There was the familiar, welcome enquiry from them asking if everybody was safe and if any help was needed.

Recently there have been a raft of comments and reports over the proposed building on what was until last August, greenbelt land. In April 2017, I certainly would have happily signed the petition against this happening. The loss of this field is regrettable but recent comments about transitory residents and incomers? Were these helpful? The transitory residents are presumably our RAF community who in an emergency, be it a tractor fire or adverse weather are there to help and where would be without their help and presence when it comes to village events? Several of these RAF transitory residents have bought homes here so are they now incomers?

If we stop to think about it most of us are incomers, who live in houses which have been built over the last 60 years on what was open land. Surely we too must own responsibility for destroying the environment, for the traffic problems, the bad parking, the sewage problems etc. Whilst we are loath to lose a field, the view from our window, the inconvenience of extra people in OUR space, do we need to remember, "People who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones?" Perhaps, whilst fighting the bigger issues, we all need to try much harder to do our personal bit to make the world a better, safer and more sustainable place.

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Naphill & Walter's Ash Annual Treasurer's Report March 2020

I would like to start by thanking Mike Pool for his immaculate bookkeeping which has made the job of taking over as Treasurer very easy indeed. I know we would all like to show our appreciation to Mike for his many years of service to the Gazette.

It has been a great pleasure to be welcomed back onto the Gazette team and to see how much our village magazine has grown since I was last involved. The risk of someone taking over the Gazette and running it as a commercial operation is even greater now that it is such a fine colour product so I am pleased that the committee have therefore agreed to register the Gazette with the Charity Commission as soon as possible. We have already drafted a governing document and will shortly be submitting this for approval. If anyone would like to see it then there is a copy on the Naphill & Walters Ash web site: www.naphillandwaltersash.org.uk.

Below is a table showing our income and expenditure over the last year. This will look a little odd and the reason is that in preparation for becoming a registered charity we are changing from a receipts method of accounting (where income is recorded when it is received even if the payment is for a service in the future) to an accrual method of accounting (which records the income and expenditure in the financial year that it actually relates to). Both methods are perfectly correct but as our model is cash up front for a year's worth of adverts/subscriptions I felt that the accrual method would give us a more accurate financial picture of the year from now on.

The effect of this change is that the income figure looks very low because all the income from advertising is held back to the current financial year. I can assure you that the vast majority of this income has already been received and that the Gazette has more than enough to meet its commitments for the coming year whilst still holding a reserve for extra-ordinary events.

If anyone would like further information about any aspect of the gazette finances then I can be contacted using the details below.

Having reviewed our rates this year in line with an increase in printing costs from March onwards we have made a small increase in advertising rates for this financial year but subscriptions will once again remain at £3. Please do prepare yourselves for a £1 increase in subscription next year though! The delivery team will soon be knocking on your door to collect this subscription so it would be really helpful if you could have £3 in cash put aside.

The village hall committee held their meeting on the 3rd February. With the reorganisation of the Trustee committee moving forward, 11 members of the current committee have put their names forward to be considered for the reorganised committee. It was agreed that as it will be a restructured committee all eight positions would be decided at the AGM. It was also decided that the positions should be open to anyone in the village over the age of 18. To remind you they are, Trustee Board Chairman, Secretary and Administrative Officer, Treasurer and Financial Officer, Governance and regulation officer which includes ensuring the village hall committee complies with its governing document and charity law regulations and requirements with other laws that apply to the VHC. 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Allotments

Hughenden Parish Council has received several enquiries concerning dogs on allotments. The council wish to clarify the following:

Allotment Tenants

The Allotment Agreement states that 'the Tenant shall not bring or cause to be brought onto the allotment site any dog unless it is held at all times on a leash and remains on the Tenant's plot only. Any fouling must be removed by the Tenant and disposed of offsite.

Public Access

Allotments are areas of land designated for the cultivation of food crops. It is therefore not appropriate for members of the public to access allotments except where there is a designated Right of Way (Walters Ash Allotment & Hughenden Valley Allotment). Members of the public are requested to keep to the Right of Way and keep dogs on lead. There are no Rights of Way and therefore no public access at Louches Lane, North Dean, Cryers Hill, Windmill Lane, Primrose Hill and Red Lion Allotments.

Vacant Plots

There are vacant plots available at Cryers Hill, Hughenden Valley, North Dean, Louches Lane, Primrose Hill and Windmill Lane Allotments. Annual rent is £46 per plot. Half plots are available at most allotment sites. For further information on any of the above please email clerk@hughendenpc.org.uk or call 01494 715296.

Precept

At its meeting on 28th January 2020, the Council agreed a 2% increase on the precept for the year 2020-2021. For the average Band D property this means an increase of 89p per annum. The Parish Council took this decision as it is expecting increased annual costs in the years ahead for Devolved Services. Having just agreed a further one-year funding package from Bucks County Council of £11,410, this could be the last year that the funding is offered and as such the Parish Council needs to make provisions for the years ahead.

Grant to Great Kingshill Village Hall

The Parish Council recently awarded Great Kingshill Village Hall a grant of £5,000 to assist with an upcoming kitchen refurbishment project. Seen as a vital community asset, the village hall provides education, fitness and entertainment to residents. The newly improved kitchen will, it is hoped, increase bookings for the hall and help the hall to become more financially independent.

Parish Council elections will take place on 7th May 2020. Elections to the new Buckinghamshire Council and the Police & Crime Commissioner Elections will take place on the same day. Hours of poll will be 7 am – 10 pm.

The Notice of Election will be published on 31st March 2020.

The period for nominations will then commence and the deadline for nominations will be 4 pm on 8th April 2020. Storm Ciara came with its potentially damaging winds and torrential rain, raising fears of damage on the Common. (As I write, we await the arrival of Storm Dennis, but at least it is forecast to be less severe.) A quick survey the following day (in still more wind and rain) found only limited damage. Our biggest fear concerned the ancient veteran trees, but the loss of any tree is regrettable.

Fortunately, as far as we could see, the damage was not too severe. Two fairly young trees had been blown down and several trees had lost branches. Surprisingly the oaks seem to be the most susceptible to damage. Three mature oaks had lost huge limbs which, in falling, had stripped branches from nearby trees. One handsome, middle-aged oak had snapped off at about half its height. An old beech growing beside path H21 has lost two huge limbs. We found no paths that were blocked although several could do with some judicious pruning to allow people to avoid the sea of mud.

Our brief survey reassured us that no veterans were damaged. We have 3 veteran yews, 20 beeches still standing, and 9 oaks. Quite what qualifies a tree to be called a 'veteran' is rather complicated. Obviously, they are old – but what counts as old depends on the species. Quick growing species such as fruit trees, birch and wild cherry, have much shorter lives than yew, oak and beech. A girth circumference of over 2.5m (8ft) is sometimes suggested as denoting a veteran. We have about 20 beech veterans with a girth of over 3m (10ft) The great beech at Dew Pond that was blown down in 2015 was our largest, having a girth of 5.44m (17ft-10½ins) and was estimated to be at least 400 years old. There are several other beeches almost as big. All were once pollarded, which made them grow more slowly and develop huge trunks to a height of about 2½m. Of our 9 veteran oaks, 3 have girths of over 4m and one has 5.26m (17ft-3ins). Such trees as these are of great ecological importance as they host of a large range of fungi, lichens, insects and other invertebrates while offering homes to a range of birds and mammals.

There are also some magnificent yews, mainly along the Southern edge of the Common. Of these at least three must count as veterans, having girths over 3m. and there are several others that are clearly very old. It was disappointing to find that one Yew is surrounded by litter. Please enjoy our Common, but take your litter home with you.

There have been some changes in the Officers and Committee of FoNC. Our Treasurer, Peggy Ewart, is standing down after many years of efficient and dedicated service, but will remain on the Committee. Neil McMinn has agreed to take on her duties, and Marian Miller will fill the post of Secretary, which has been vacant for a year and will join the Committee. Philip Hussey and Marek Pawlik are also standing down as committee members, again after many years of service, leaving a vacancy. If any member of FoNC is interested in filling the gap, please let me know.

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Growing Your Own

The government have announced that, at the end of 2020, they will no longer abide by EU rules and regulations. How does that affect our food? Genetically-modified (GM) crops are banned at present apart from Bt maize which has been approved by the EU and is grown in Spain and five other countries (but not the UK). However, in the future, our farmers may no longer be constrained by EU regulations and may be permitted to grow genetically-modified crops as they do in the USA and the Americas generally. The reason why EU farmers cannot grow GM crops is the fear of cross-pollination of the GM crop with non-GM crops, natural grasses etc, and thereby possibly creating havoc in nature.

The state of play at the moment is that in the USA genetically-modified crops meet little resistance and are freely grown by gung-ho farmers. And now we come to something really controversial. In the EU authorisation has not been given to GROW genetically-modified crops in general, but authorisation has been granted to IMPORT GM CROPS FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION (and 40% of our food is imported). By 2015 58 such GM crops had been authorised for importation and another 19 were being authorised. These crops are multiple varieties of maize, soyabeans, oilseed rape and cotton seed (for vegetable oil). In the USA 25 GM crops have received regulatory approval and 85% of maize, 91% of soyabeans, 85% of cotton and 95% of sugar beet are genetically-modified. In the USA and UK, 80 to 90 % of cheeses are made using GM Chymosin (rather than animal-sourced rennet). So the EU are horrified of cross-pollination of "normal" crops with GM crops but are quite content to let people eat the stuff. Quite a paradox. The EU population may think that, if the growing of GM crops is virtually banned then they will be spared from eating the stuff. Nothing could be further from the truth.

British consumers have no means of telling whether what they are eating has been genetically-modified since labelling does not contain such information. Even milk and meat produced in the UK is affected since the principal animal feed is soyabeans grown in the Americas and which are almost-all geneticallymodified (60% of feed for animals is imported). Taking refuge in crops labelled "organic" is no certain solution since the EU allows food to be labelled "organic" so long as the GM content is less than 0.9%.

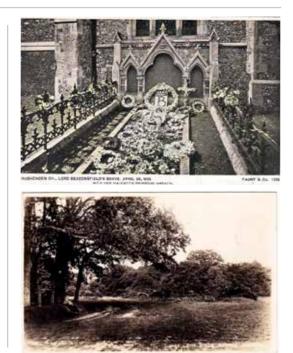

You could take GM food off your CURRENT menu by avoiding all sauces, cooking oils, margarine, butter, prepared meals, cheeses and milk. Put your name down for an allotment!

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A Message from the Vicarage

Oscar Wilde once famously said "I can resist everything apart from temptation". I wonder what images immediately come into your mind when I mention temptation – naughty but nice – tv adverts for triple layered chocolate cake from M&S, topped with double cream perhaps! It is fun to joke about being tempted in a light-hearted way, but in reality the consequences will vary from none, an inch on the hips, to a broken marriage or lengthy prison sentence, depending upon what particular temptation we might face.

We are all tempted in different ways, we all have our own weaknesses and character flaws, that is part of what it means to be human. How we respond to the potentially more serious situations, such as a deliberate avoidance of putting ourselves in a vulnerable situation - being alone with a member of the opposite sex, or having access to work or club finances is more than half the battle.

The biblical root of temptation can be traced all the way back to the book of Genesis, and the temptation of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. Before writing this I took some time to research the long range weather forecast for March. It's looking reasonably good, with mild temperatures and a distinct lack of rain on the horizon. I did this via www. metcheck.com so if it is pouring down, don't blame me, blame them.

This month I wanted to raise awareness of a charity event that another villager is undertaking this May..... Saturday May 9th to be precise.

Janet Keen is jumping out of a plane over the village of Hinton. Not for a laugh. Not for a thrill, and not for a bet.

Janet is doing this in support of a local charity, Robs ARTTT. The charity was founded by Rob Holland, a local lad who went to school in Holmer Green.

In 2007 Rob was admitted to The John Radcliffe hospital, just a few days before his 15th birthday. He had symptoms of gastroenteritis and irritable bowel syndrome. However, after extensive testing he was diagnosed with DSRCT (Desmoplastic Small Round Cell Tumors). Rob underwent five courses of chemotherapy, but such is the nature of this form of cancer chemotherapy is ineffective.

Rob died four months after his 15th birthday.

So what has all this got to do with Janet? Three quarters of the sufferers of this condition are in their teens or early twenties.

In July 2017, after five years of treatment, chemotherapy, and an amputation, Janet and her family lost their son and brother to a similar cancer that predominantly strikes in teenagers and young adults.



Will Keen was 19 years old.

The charity that Rob founded exists to raise awareness and fund research for a cure for this horrendous condition. Let's help Janet smash her fundraising target.

My name is Mandy Bates and I am the Social Prescriber for the Mid Chiltern PCN, which includes Rectory Meadow Surgery.



I have recently ʻdown moved from south' Sheffield to live in Chalfont St Giles. I have worked in the community for the last 20 years, primarily with mental health. but have vast experience of the problems we all face.

I would like to take this opportunity to say "How do you do" to you lovely folk in Buckinghamshire, from this Yorkshire lass (as my dad would say). In just a few months I have realised, although miles apart, we all face the same difficulties that life throws at us. We sometimes feel overwhelmed and helpless, albeit we don't like to admit this, causing anxiety and loss of motivation and confidence, which can lead to social isolation and loneliness.

I have already met some wonderful people who have had successful and interesting lives. In my role I am able to meet patients in their surgery or in their homes, where it gives time to have a cuppa and a chat in a relaxed atmosphere, without being rushed.

I'm here to discuss any issues which are important to you. This could be advice and information, help with filling out forms, applying for benefits, filling in or referring for assessments or liaising with both statutory and local community agencies. I can help to find local groups and activities and go with you if you want to try something out.

Social Prescribing is about 'What matters to you,' it could help you have more control over your health and wellbeing in ways that suit you.

If you feel you may need a little help in some way, speak to your GP or other staff at the surgery

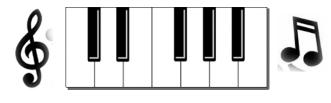
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MUSIC ON THE CRICK -12th JUNE

Summer Might be just a distant memory but have you ever considered where our summer migrants are right now?

In the past, due to the size of GPS tags, only larger species (Ducks, Geese, Raptors,)could be tagged. these days tags are so small that even warblers can be tagged.

One commonly held assumption is that birds like Swifts arrive in the UK for the summer, breed, then head straight back to winter in Africa, before repeating the journey again the next year. The concept that birds head to a single region of Africa to see out the winter is misplaced. Many species undertake a tour of Africa, arriving in one region before moving off to another after a few weeks. Tagged Swifts have shown that, after leaving the UK, they head through Spain and down the West coast of Africa To Senegal around early August before heading to the Democratic Republic of Congo where they stay till December. They then go southeast to Mozambique For about a month before starting on the return journey.

The reason species do this is to follow the seasonal rains and the food these provide. The stopovers on their return allow birds to fatten up for the journey ahead, rather than migrating with little fat reserves and struggling to find food in hostile areas. Cuckoos, Nightjars, Nightingales and some Warblers also use this strategy.

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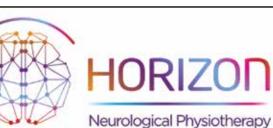
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Bad stuff/good news

March begins and we can start to put winter behind us – but don't hold your breath....my photo diary informs me that the 'Beast from the East' struck on March 18th in 2018! Hopefully winter is mostly behind us but what a winter we've had. A pre-Christmas general election, Brexit, Coronavirus, wildfires in the Southern Hemisphere, storms Atiyah, Brendan and Ciara with Dennis looming as I write, to name but a few of the world events of the past months. Sometimes it feels as if the planet is caught up in a maelstrom that affects each and every part of it alongside each and every one of us.

When we hear the news, it is often tempting to ask 'where is God?' as if somehow God is to blame for every bad thing that happens. But bad stuff is good 'news', the copy sells newspapers and airtime, so that's mostly what our media reports. From the Christian perspective, bad stuff IS good news. As the year moves on and seasons change, the Christian year also moves and changes. Behind us is the bright joy and celebration of Christmas. The story dramatically changes. The Bible tells us how the infant Christ was forced to flee from those who wanted him dead and were prepared to commit mass infanticide to ensure he did not survive. But Jesus did survive and grew to adulthood and became a loved and influential teacher. The Christian year spends the weeks after Christmas telling his story, but as the story is told we see it unfold as a Greek tragedy might unfold. Through the brightening days of spring, the shadow of Easter looms.

Shadow of Easter? Bunnies and flowers and eggs and sunshine – how is this shadow? We prepare ourselves for what is to come during Lent, a season of 6 weeks of spiritual discipline, however you wish to interpret 'spiritual discipline'. For some it is fasting or abstinence, for others it may be additional acts of charity or extra time in prayer and contemplation. Whatever you choose to do, for the Christian it is in preparation for what is to come....the bad stuff that is good.

Lent is a time to prepare for Easter and reflect on its meaning. After 3 years of doing good, healing people and giving hope to the hopeless, Jesus is arrested and tried on trumped up charges. Jesus Christ – God's Son and the goodest person ever – is executed by crucifixion alongside two criminals on the day we call 'Good Friday'. The disciplines of Lent allow us to walk the path towards the cross with Jesus and in the company of Christians throughout the world. Although we may make this journey every year, it seldom becomes routine. The disciplines of Lent open us up to receiving God's light and every year that light seems to illumine a different part of the path. What happens next explains why the day on which such an atrocity is committed has come to be known as Good Friday and why this bad stuff IS good news for Christians.

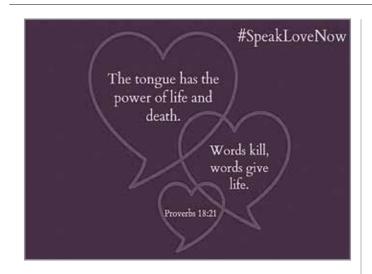

As a Padre, one of my favourite parts of my job is weddings! I love meeting the couple and working together towards the day and the marriage. I love the palpable excitement at the rehearsal. I love the buzz on the day as people arrive and eagerly await the bride. I love standing in front of the congregation and seeing happy and hopeful faces. I love a wedding! Have I written 'love' enough in the last paragraph!?

That's the thing though, isn't it...we use the word love in so many different situations and towards so many different things, meaning different things. When I say, 'I love port', it is a very different from saying, 'I love you' to my children. It's sad that we don't have different words to describe the different 'loves' that we feel and then want to express. We throw the word 'love' around a bit too much that it takes the intensity out what it means in certain contexts. It's made out to be a big deal when a couple tell each other they love each other for the first time... but how quickly are we to use it when our favourite song comes on, on the radio. And it's because it's the same word, but in different contexts it can mean quite different things. Ancient Greek has different words for different expressions of love and I think that's cool, because it means they can use the specific word to communicate at a deeper level what they are feeling and expressing.

Words are powerful, what we say and the specific words we use can build up or tear down. In a society where we communicate so much in written and not verbal forms choosing our words carefully is of great importance. Choosing the right words to communicate what's going on within ourselves takes time, and sometimes the words we know aren't big enough to express our feelings. Roald Dahl and Miranda Hart are known for making up words which go further than words already around, and the Greeks did it when trying to grasp Jesus' sacrificial love through His death. As we go into a season of 'love' which words will you choose wisely to communicate how you feel with those around you?

Firm Foundations for your Fitness journey

When I started the Small Group Training classes in early January, I wanted to offer people a fun but sound approach to building or rebuilding fitness & strength. Take a look at the diagram below. As is the case with building anything strong, we start at the bottom of the pyramid and work on mobility and flexibility, stability and coordination, but what does this mean in practice?

Essentially it entails moving well in all the major types of movement, whilst maintaining good posture & balance. This can be only achieved by using the right muscles, in the right way at the right time. This might sound obvious, however we have all picked up bad habits over the years, which lead inevitably, to niggles and aches and pains. Think about everyday things like standing up or lifting heavy boxes or bags. Our bodies are well designed to do these things safely, however all too often we start to "cheat" by using our arms to push ourselves up from the chair rather than the stronger leg muscles (putting unnecessary load on the shoulders), or taking the strain on the lower back when lifting boxes or holiday luggage. These bad habits take their toll.

Similarly, if we enjoy playing a particular sport we will become adept at the particular movements required for that sport, however this can create imbalances with opposing movements which we don't do as often. Revisiting the foundations of good movement helps such imbalances to be addressed, improving performance and reducing injury risk for the future.

With firm foundations we can then progress, by adding more resistance (weight) or learning more complex movements, to make these moves with greater strength, and ultimately with greater power or speed.

As we are all different and are all on different journeys, we have different fitness goals and needs, it is therefore important to ensure that everyone gets lots of individual attention. It is for this reason that the groups are small (4-8 people max) however still benefit from the support and camaraderie that comes with training with others. The amazing people who have joined so far are seeing the benefits already and enjoying the process. Why not get in touch with me to see how I can help you on your fitness journey?

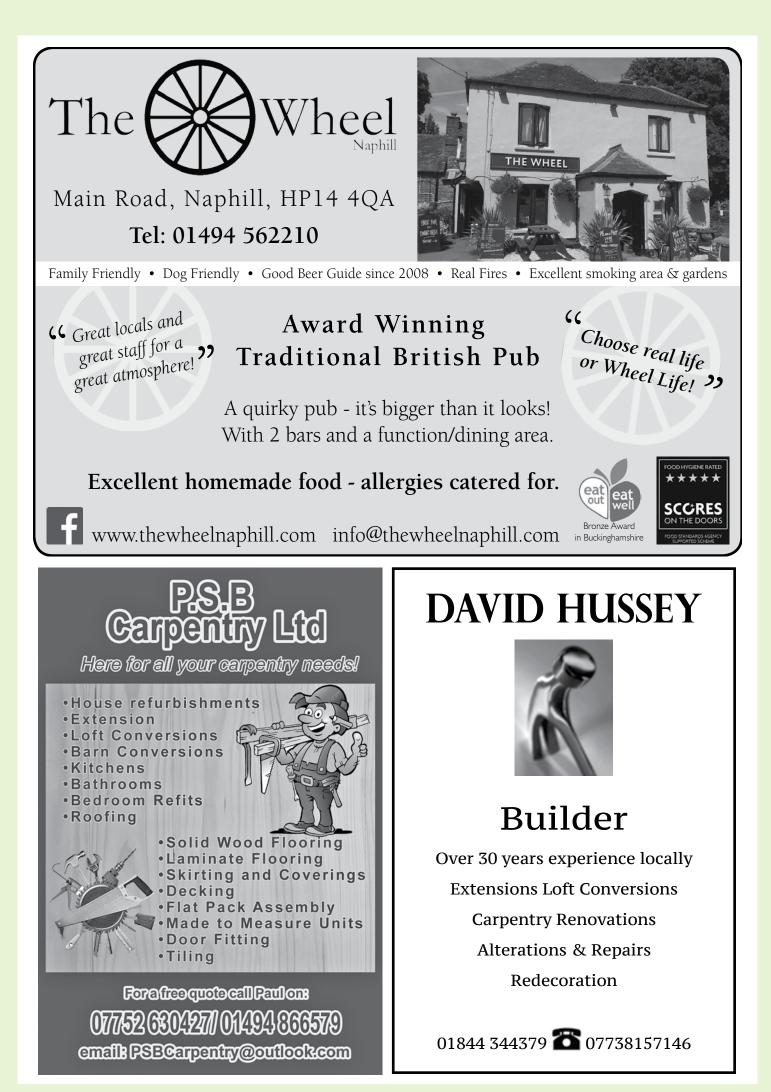
In the year below, the Planetarium has visited the school to teach Year Five about space. They learned all about the solar system and how light travels. The Year Fives learned a lot about space that day.

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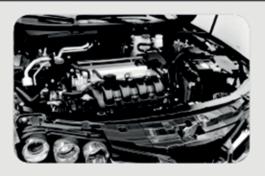

Our First half term...

It has been an incredible first half term here at Toddle In Group. With all of our children now settled and our community growing, we would like to share with you a little about water play.

Water play is an incredibly freeing form of exploration. The children find fun in all forms of water play from our automatic sink taps that fascinate them, a big puddle, or working out systems to connect, transfer and pump water from one place to another. The activities involving water are always a success! Today, our children have been exploring potion making in our water tray. They have carefully selected which container they need, how they will fill it, how it will look, and how it will smell. The children have a variety of tools at their disposal that include scoops, tubes, funnels and pipettes. Some potions needed to shimmer, they are magical after all, while some potions needed to be coloured. The children explored fresh rosemary, dried herbs, spices, and baked lemons and limes. These sorts of opportunities help the children to collaborate on a really imaginative level, whilst also exploring capacity, tuning in to their senses, and extending their descriptive vocabulary.

Another lovely water activity is bubble painting.

Here's how we suggest you try it at home:

You will need:

- A deep bowl
- Washing up liquid/bubble bath
- Whisk (or a fork)
- Straw
- Food colouring/paint (optional)
- A little water
- Paper



Help your child to fill the bowl with a little water and a few drops of washing up liquid, if you are adding colour one or two drops will do. Are there any bubbles yet, or do we need to add in some air? We add air to a balloon, and we add air to a cake mixture to help it to rise. Maybe a whisk will work. Maybe blowing through a straw will help (I would suggest practising blowing through the straw before placing it in the water mixture. Sucking through a straw will not be nice for your child!). Once the bubbles reach the very top of the bowl your child can catch their bubbles on to a piece of paper laid over the top. Watch while they pop, and leave a beautiful picture made up of lots of different circular marks.

As always, risk assess any of our activity suggestions to make sure they are appropriate for your own children. We love to see the fabulous activities that our children try, so please do feel free to pop in or get in contact by email to share your child's experience.
